

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

In his annual report to the common council, presented at yesterday's meeting. Chief Kerr reviews the year of 1908 in the fire deparment. The bilgade now numbers 134 men, of whom 1/30 are permanent. There were 160 fire calls during the year—123 in the east end and 27 in West End. The chief gives the total fire loss for the year as approximately \$23,159, and total fire insurance loss approximately \$26,659. In 1907 the figures of insurance loss were \$113,400.56. Four lives were lost in fires during 1908.
