





THE BUDGET DEBATE.

The debate on the Budget in the Provincial Legislative is nearing its end. When Mr. Copp has concluded his remarks every member of the Opposition will have spoken with the exception of Dr. Sormany. Not that the member for Gloucester was backward in coming forward he was in fact preparing to add his contribution to the debate when unfortunately another member "butted in." The doctor was annoyed, left the House in his judgeou, and has not since been seen in its precincts. The member for Gloucester is a very flery gentleman and his speeches in the past have awakened greater in therest from their lurid denanciations of the Government than any information they contained.

Mr. MoLeod, who opened the debate, after explaining the expeditures of the past year, compared the revenue collected by the old Government with that which had been collected in the past four years by the present Ad-ministration. The comparison showed there had been increases in every department and that the receipts from stumpage had been doubled. While spending much greater sums on agriculture, education and public works, every dollar of the increase had been met out of current revenue and not by the issue of tonds, a feature which the extravagance and mismanagement of the old Govern-ment had compelled them to resort to. Mr. McLeod wai also able to point with pride to the fact that the present dovernment had added less than \$200,000 to the perman-ent debt through their own initiative. All of the capital expenditures, with the exception of \$200,000, were tha pressit of legislation passed prior to 1907, for which the present Administration was not responsible.
