



CHANCE FOR CANADA.

Interviews with local merchants engaged in the iron and steel trade clearly indicate their desire to obtain, if possible, supplies of iron and steel goods from Canada, says this week's bulletin of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, in referring to the report of Acting Trade Commissioner Claude Dyers, of Leeds, England. The stoppage of imports from European sources brought about by the war and the fact that the production in the United Kingdom is, to a large extent, being diverted to military purposes, has curtailed the supply available for commercial use.

Merchants hesitate to rely on United States firms owing, it is asserted, to the constant difficulties which arise in regard to deliveries when once an order has been placed.

It is further intimated that if Canadian makers of such lines as steel wire rods, steel billets, copper or brass rods are able to land these goods at United Kingdom ports at prices which would compete with other sources, a unique opporturity now awaits them.
