The Grand Worthy Patriarch submitted his report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

Officers and Representatives:

Agreeably with usage, and in response to the kindly invitation of the friends in this flourishing town, we are again assembled in quarterly session, and are thus enabled to recount the trials and triumphs of another period in our history.

In the absence of reports from many of the County and District Deputies, the state of the Order in all the Counties cannot be given.

Brother Jost from East Annapolis has reports from only four Divisions which are

Brother Jost from East Annapolis has reports from only four Divisions which are working fairly; others may have reported to Brother Longley, who is absent from home.

Brother Mills from Annapolis West, in his report says "the Temperance interest is advancing." The County league is vigorously enforcing the Scott Act in some sections of the County.

From Cumberland County Brother Black writes that a larger number of Divisions than usual have reported and the returns are of an encouraging character. He states that "the Scott Act, although not proclaimed for the County, has already had a good effect. The elections aroused to activity the apathetic, and stimulated all to increased earnestness, while the provisions of the Act and the devising of means for giving it effect have formed subjects for interesting discussion."

From Digby County Brother Saunders has reports from nine Divisions, and he writes that "so far as he can see they have a latent, sound public sentiment in favor of total abstinence and prohibition in the County. This," he says, "is outraged by illicit Rum traffic, in which some of those in high places are participating. To the Christian forbearance and patience of the temperance body these men are under deep obligation for their official existence."

Brother Whitman has reports from five Divisions in Guysboro' County, "which are in good working order and growing stronger in temperance working power." He says "the friends of our order will rejoice with him that this County is coming

up to the help of the Lord against the rum traffic."

Brother Monaghan of Halifax County is in labors abundant. The duties of Deputy therein, he says, "are onerous as well as numerous." "Extent of territory 2070 miles, containing about 12,500 families, embracing a population of over 68,000." There are 26 Divisions in the County, 14 have reported to him. Many of the Divisions have been visited and words of encouragement spoken. Judging from the kindly greetings extended to the Brother on the part of the Divisions visited, the occasion must have been a source of pleasure as well as profit to all concerned. Brother Monaghan says Deputy Foster's report, which is in confirmation of his own observations, may be taken as the substance of the reports from city Divisions, and the same will apply to Divisions outside the city so far as heard from. It is as follows:—"The Division has met regularly; the members are united and harmonious, have performed their work in a satisfactory manner; are working assiduously for the increase of the Order; attendance a fair average." During this season the city Divisions united in holding several public meetings which were successful. The Cadets and Bands of Hope in the

city are doing well.

From Hants West, Dr. McMurray reports that the Divisions heard from "appear to be doing fairly well, meeting regularly, working harmoniously, and exerting a healthy influence in the communities where they are located." He remarks that "the difficulty in the enforcement of the law in restricting the sale of strong drink, still continues; no decision yet having been given by the judges on the appeals sent up to their bench."

Brother Crowell, of Shelburne West, (Barrington District), reports the Divisions with one exception working well. Quite an impetus has been given to the cause in the County this winter. Through the efforts of Brother Lewis, new Divisions have been formed and old ones revived, so that there are now 26 Divisions in

operation.

From Pictou West, Brother Rogers reports the Divisions in his District in working order. All the Divisions were visited by him, and with the exception of "Oriental" a lecture was delivered under the auspices of each. In company with other temperance workers he organized two new Divisions and resuscitated one. He says "our cause in this part of the County is in good condition. There are many long tried, intelligent and progressive temperance workers who are giving their time and energy in building up our good old Order." In the performance of voluntary special work, our Deputy travelled over one hundred miles, delivered eight lectures, and addressed about 1200 persons. This, on the part of a Brother, in addition to his duties as a minister of the gospel, is proof of no ordinary devotion to the cause of temperance and the interests of our Order.

In a somewhat lengthy report Bro. Hutchings furnishes an account of his work in portions of Halifax, Cape Breton, Guysboro', and Antigonish Counties. Beade lecturing and visiting Divisions, Schools, etc., he has organized eight Divisions during the quarter, re-organized two, and formed two Bands of Hope. He says "the Divisions visited are prospering, and that there is marked improvement apparent on every hand." From this it will be seen the Brother is doing effective work.

Bro. Fraser, of Lunenburg, reports that they were obliged, owing to the lack of help and sympathy, to allow "Unity" Division to go down. This is unfortunate as such organization is needed at Mahone Bay. The Brother suggests that the G. D. might obtain some legal information of a reliable kind as to the present state of legislation. He says he is informed our Laws are not now effective, the new law superseding all others. This he disputes; but at present inaction is the result. Such indefiniteness is hurful to our cause, and something should be done with the view of getting light on so important a matter.

Bro. Lewis has been working in the Counties of Yarmouth, Shelburne and Queens during the quarter. New Divisions have been organized, and the cause strengthened. Both Agents will report to the committee.

No report from Antigonish, Cape Breton, Colchester, East Hants, Inverness, Kings, Pictou East, Queens, and Victoria. This is to be regretted. It is hoped the brethren will be prompt in future. Yarmouth County has made some progress. Three new Divisions have been organized during the quarter. All the Divisions within the County have been visited within a few months, either by myself or Bro. Lewis. And while there is not all the activity manifested that is desirable for successful work, yet a healthy temperance sentiment prevails.

In a few weeks the Scott Act will have been submitted to the people for action. Whether the decision of the Privy Council in England will influence the voters, remains to be seen. The licensing system finds little favor in Yarmouth. The record of the people there for forty years points to prohibition, rather than licensing, to counteract the terrible evil. The question with many has been how best to accomplish our purpose. While some looked to the Scott Act as a sufficient remedy, others preferred applying to the Local rather than the Dominion Parliament for the necessary legislation. Perhaps, after all, no better method can be No. 1.

devised than continuous effort to educate the people up to the principles of total abstinence.

Permit me to call the attention of the Grand Division to the matter of insurance connected with our Order. This part of the work is calculated to promote our interests, and it is hoped the Deputies will inform the people in relation to it.

The Grand Scribe and Grand Treasurer, and the Committees in charge of the sexeral departments will, I doubt not, furnish all the figures and facts necessary to a clear understanding of our position.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Representatives :

The era of progress inaugurated in this jurisdiction more than twelve months ago still continues bright with promise. The predictions of those who pronounced the unprecedented success of last year but the temporary effervescence of enthusiasm—the result of a happy concurrence of favorable circumstances not likely to occur again—have not been realized by facts. Our grand old Order still countinues to push its conquests in all. parts of the jurisdiction, with no sign of decrepitude or decay, but with increasing energy and power.

THE STATISTICS

Of the past quarter are suggestive and encouraging. It is true that the first quarter of the year is usually the hardest and most discouraging so far as statistics are concerned, and that the causes which render it so have been in full operation during the last quarter; that while some Divisions, after their summer's rest, had concentrated their strength by reducing their membership, and others had concentrated their strength by reducing their membership in preparation for the winter's campaign, an unusually large number, which had for some time held but a trembling existence, have ceased working and gone on to the suspended list. It is therefore ground for mutual congratutation, that not withstanding these unfavorable conditions, the net increase of members during the past quarter is more than two hundred in advance of that of the corresponding quarter of last year and amounts to seven hundred and forty seven.

SUSPENDED DIVISIONS.

The following Divisions, having failed to make returns and payments to the Grand Division for four consecutive quarters, have been suspended, viz:—

FINANCES.

Two hundred returns for the quarter ending December 31 have been received at this office. 183 were accompanied by the per capita tax, and of the remaining 17, 13 were exempt according to the resolution of the last annual session. 45 Divisions have failed to send in their returns or per capita tax. The Grand Scribe has exhausted all the resources of eloquence, appeal and entreaty in urging the Deputies of delinquent Divisions, if they cannot pay the per capita tax, at least to send in their returns; but in this he has encountered signal and humilisting failure. The receipts for per capita tax for the last quarter, however, amount to the sum of \$72.90, being \$24.4 in advance of those of the corresponding quarter of last year. The receipts for supplies are \$20.3.33, showing an increase on those of the corresponding quarter of last year of \$10.2. The total receipts for the General Fund have reached the noble sum of \$92.3.4.

YEAR BOOK.

Eight hundred copies of the Year Book for 1883 have been distributed in the usual manner, have been well received by the Order. According to the direction of the annual session a limited number of copies are kept on sale by the Grand Scribe.

AGENCY.

The report of the Agency Committee will be laid before this Grand Division and will demand their grave consideration. A thousand copies of the Agency Report for 1883 have been distributed to the subscribers and Divisions, according to the resolution of the annual session. All the Divisions in the jurisdiction have been supplied with subscription papers; but as yet but few have taken any action in relation to them. As a consequence the receipts at the Grand Scribe's office are considerably below those of the corresponding quarter of 'ast year, and the committee has been obliged to over-draw on the G. T. to meet/expenses.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PROPERTY.

The Committee on Property appointed at the last Annual Session of Grand Division, having duly considered the purposes for which they were appointed, beg leave to report to the Grand Division. Several Divisions in different parts of the Province have sought, by application to the Grand Scribe, for information as to the best mode of having their halls settled on a basis that will secure them in perpendicular the property of the tuity for the advantage of the Order. This committee would earnestly recommend all our Divisions owning the buildings in which they meet, to have the land on No. 1. **[19]**

which their halls are placed deeded to the Grand Division, not with any design of the appropriation of such property by the Grand Division, or of alienating it from the Division or Divisions to which it legitimately belongs; but, on the contrary, and solely for this end, that the Grand Division, as the guardian of the rights and interests of the Subordinate Divisions within its jurisdiction, may secure and conserve the property in real estate held by the Divisions, for the benefit and use of the Divisions respectively owning such property, and for the stability and permanence of the Order in the localities where such Divisions exist. It is advised, therefore, that for each hall there shall be three or four Trustees, to be nominated at the first meeting of the Division in April of each year, or at the latest, the 15th of that month; and that such nomination be reported to the Grand Division Executive within ten days after the nomination, for confirmation by the Grand Division, -and in the event of a Division failing to nominate Trustees at the time above specified, the Grand Division may appoint them without such nomination; that all vacancies occurring in trusteeship of halls, whether by death, forfeiture of membership, or other cause of ineligibility, shall be filled by the Grand Division, on the nomination of the Divisions concerned; that a Division forfeiting its charter, or remaining inoperative for one year, shall thereby render its existing trusteeship void, and will make it necessary for the Grand Division to exercise the right of appointment of other Trustees, without the usual nomination; and the Trustees so appointed shall have the right of letting such premises for purposes consistent with temperance principles, and such Trustees shall hold the rents of such premises in trust for the Grand Division, and shall appropriate such rents as the Grand Division may direct for keeping the property from which it arises in repairs. In the event of it becoming necessary to transfer or dispose of a hall or Division room the proceeds shall be held by the Grand Division, for the erection of another half or Division premises in the same locality, under the sanction of the Grand Division.

This committee deem it advisable for the Grand Division to recommend to Divisions wishing to secure their halls in perpetuity for the benefit of the Order and the cause of temperance in their locality, the following form of Deed, viz:—

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE ORDER.

Grand Worthy Patriarch:

The Committee on the State of the Order beg leave to report:

It is a source great pleasure to the committee to be able to report progress all It is a source great pleasure to the committee to be able to report progress and along the line. The tide of success of last year has not proved itself a mere transient excitement, but a solid and well guarded advance towards prohibition. From every part of the country and from every department of our work there comes evidence of energy, vigor and growth. The Almighty has signally blessed the various instrumentalities at work during the year.

1. The reports of some of the County and Divisional Deputies are full of

encouragement and indicate a healthy state. Many of the County Deputies have neglected their work and no reports from them have come to hand.

2. The increase in membership of our Order during the past quarter has been most satisfactory.

Net increase of Divisions	11

The losses from all sources amount to	1380

Leaving at the close of December quarter a membership of	3,337

We are also pleased to report that since the close of the last quarter II new Divisions have been organized and two have been resuscitated, making the present

number of live Divisions 258, and increasing the present membership to 13,650.

3. The agency work has been vigorously prosecuted during the quarter. The agents at present employed — Brothers Hutchings and Lewis—have done excellent work in visiting and organizing Divisions; in stirring up the public mind on the general question of temperance, and putting heart into our propagation No. 1.

work. We would earnestly impress upon our Divisions the adoption of somesystematic plan for the collection of funds for carrying on our agency work.

The Watchman, our official organ, has changed hands during the quarter. Mr. Halliday, the former publisher, was released from his agreement and an agreement entered into with Mr. Woodworth of Kentville, to continue the publication at the subsidy of \$400 per annum. The price of the paper has been reduced to 50 cents, and its first numbers present a good appearance. We would commend this enterprise to the whole Order, and bespeak for Mr. Woodworth and his agent a cordial welcome everywhere. With the increased circulation looked for, the organ will be better prepared than ever to advance the interests of temperance throughout the province.

5. We find the finances in a healthy condition, and would exhort Subordinate

Divisions to be as prompt as possible in the payment of per capita tax, and especially in the transmission of the Quarterly Returns, and recommend that the Grand Scribe give a prominent place to this reminder in the official organ. The whole work of the Executive, financial and otherwise, recommends itself to the Order

for its efficiency and thoroughness.

6. We have been pleased to note the organization of several Bands of Hope during the year. At the present time, with our organized strength throughout the country, we ought to do more in training the young in the Bands of Hope and Cadets of Temperance. Our future must depend largely upon our recruits from the ranks of the young.

7. We would again direct the attention of the whole Order to the advantages offered by the "Sons of Temperance Mutual Relief Society."

8. We are pleased to say that we are vigorously prosecuting the work in which we have been engaged for the past forty years. We are now reaping harvests from seed sown during the past. The adoption of the Scott Act in so many counties in Nova Scotia is a testimony to the efficiency of this work of education. We look upon this Act only as a stepping stone to total prohibition. All our work is but hastening on the total destruction of the liquor traffic, and consequently the abolition of the drinking customs of the day.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch submitted his report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

Officers and Representatives :

Let us congratulate each other on being privileged to meet in quarterly session in this fine section of our Province, and in a locality made famous by one America's most gifted poets. We need not recall the conflicts and errors of the past that made the story of "Evangeline" possible, which reads now as a dark page in history. Rather let us continue to assist in perpetuating those principles which "beat swords into plow shares and spears into pruning hooks—when nation shall not lift up the sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

Our march during the quarter continues onward. Difficulties have arisen; but they must be met with the view of triumphing over them.

Legislation has been of a character very perplexing. The powers and prerogatives of the Dominion and Local Governments in relation to the drink traffic are not as yet settled. While the General Government has power to pass the C. T. Act —a local option law—it would appear, from the decision of the Privy Council in the case of Hodges vs. the Queen, that the power to pass the Dominion License Act may possibly not be permitted.

No. 1.

Counties that have never adopted the C. T. Act, and where prosecutions have been conducted under it, are placed in an unpleasant, embarrassing position, in consequence of the recent decision of our Supreme Court, without suggesting a remedy. I respectfully ask that the matter have your earnest attention. On a former occasion the statement was made that our body encouraged the adoption of the C. T. Act. We should aid the friends in its enforcement where it is adopted.

At first it seemed doubtful whether any action would be taken at Ottawa to meet the case of counties where no licenses were granted previously to the adoption of the Act. Urgent requests were sent by letters and telegrams to members representing the Government and both Houses. Finally, through persistent efforts on the part of the friends of temperance among the representatives—conspicuous among whom was Brother Robertion of Barrington—an amendment was obtained to make the Act workable.

The following are the extracts from Reports of County and District Deputies so far as received.

Antigonish.—Reports received from three Divisions which are doing well-Nothing from Brother King.

Annapolis East.—District Deputy Rev. Brother Jost has reports from four Divisions. With one exception they are in a very good condition.

Annapolis West.—District Deputy Brother Mills has reports from eight Divisions, the whole of which are active and harmonious. Five new Divisions were organized in his District during the quarter. Upon the whole, he says, the outlook is encouraging. He regrets the hindranee to the cause resulting from the Supreme Court decision.

Capte Breton.—County Deputy Bro. McLennan has reports from eight Divisions. All, with one exception, are in good working order. A Band of Hope in Sydney is in a flourishing condition, and tells for good on the families with which it is connected, and the community generally. There has been quite a revival in the cause during the winter. He speaks of appeals pending under the Scott Act.

Colchester.—County Deputy Brother Layton has reports from seven Divisions which are fraternal and harmonius, and so far as he can learn, the other Divisions with one or two exceptions are in good working order. The legal aggressive work in the county, owing to the recent Supreme Court decision, is, at present at a stand still.

Cumberland.—Deputy Black has reports from eight Divisions doing good work. He says "as he anticipated the agitation incident to the adoption of the C. T. Act has greatly stimulated the cause in the County. Many of the Divisions have been quickened into unwonted activity, and a strong determination is evinced to keenly contest the ground against the foe."

Nothing from Digby.

Gaysboro'.—Deputy Whitman has reports from ten Divisions which are in good working order.

Hatifax.—County Deputy Brother Monaghan has reports from seven city Divisions and from ten outside the city. With two exceptions they are doing well. He speals of a possible opening for a Division at Meagher's Grant. He has been unable to visit Divisions outside the city; but all save one have been visited in the city, and he was pleased with the manner in which their business was transacted.

West Hants.—Rev. Brother McMurray reports from seven Divisions; all of them are working well. He speaks of the Supreme Court decision as being hurtful to the cause; but the friends hope to be successful in opposing the drink traffic.

East Hants.—Brother Blois has reports from eight Divisions whose average attendance and work are good.

Nothing from Lunenburg. At the same time it is known good work is being done in that County. And in the stand recently taken to prevent licenses being

granted, our Deputy, Rev. Brother Fraser acted nobly.

Pictou West .- Rev. Brother Rogers has reports from all the Divisions in his District excepting two, (which, it seems, refused to report.) He says the order seems to be in a prosperous and vigorous condition throughout his District. He alludes to the hindrance caused by the Supreme Court decision; but hopes yet that the Scott Act shall be made a terror to the rum business in the county.

Pictou East.—Brother McGregor has reports from six Divisions. From the answers given, all appear to be in a healthy condition. The New Glasgow Division is very prosperous, fourteen initiated at last meeting. He thinks there is an

opening for a new Division in his District.

Queens. - Brother Wright has reports from seven Divisions, all in good working order.

Shelburne West .- Brother Crowell has reports from eight Divisions; with one exception, all meeting regularly, and working harmoniously.

Nothing from East Shelburne.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

Officers and Representatives:

The present condition and prospects of our Order in this jurisdiction must be highly gratifying to every true Son of Temperance. The Returns from the Divisions for the last quarter show an advance all along the line exceeding that of any quarter of which we have any record. Recent events—the temperance legislation of the Dominion Parliament, the coming into operation of the License Law of 1883, and the recent decision of the Judges of this Province in relation to the Canada Temperance Act,—have made temperance pre-eminently a "live question," and a strong and general impression as to the necessity of organization in order to resist the terrible encroachments of the liquor traffic. The result is seen in the large accessions which have been made to our membership. Three-fifths of the Divisions reporting show an increase of members and less than one-fourth a decrease; while the Divisions organized during the quarter have started with an unusually large number of charter members.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.

Avard Longley, Esq., who was born at Annapolis in 1822, and died at Paradise on February 22, 1884.

Bro. Longley became associated with our Order in 1849 or 1850, and had therefore been an active Son of Temperance for about thirty-five years, more than thirty years of which time he was a member of the Grand Division. He was twice elevated to the honor and toils of the office of Grand Worthy Patriarch, which he filled with great advantage to 'the Order. He had also been a member of the National Division for more than twenty years.

He was a consistent and spirited advocate, not only of temperance principles, but of the necessity of such laws as would restrict the traffic and at length destroy it. Having been elected, first to the Local Assembly, and afterwards to the Dominion Parliament, he was able in both those houses to do eminent service to the cause of temperance; and in neither case did he allow his political views to interfere with the higher duty which he owed to this great reform, and to the moral welfare of the country.

Rev. Edwin Clay, M. D., who was born at Kings County, Prince Edward Island, in the year 1822, and was, whilst yet young, an active temperance worker. He studied for the ministry; but at length took a diploma and commenced as a practising physician. In 1857 he was initiated into the Grand Division, in the city of St. John.

He subsequently removed to Halifax, and was appointed emigration agent.

He was a fluent and effective speaker, bringing to bear upon the temperance question not only great natural talent, but vigorous argument drawn from his acquaintance with physical science.

He was a useful and influential member of the Order; his sound sense, learning and ready utterance making him an able advocate of the great principle of total believes.

He was a man of kindly disposition and generous heart, charitable to the poor, thoughtful of the comfort of others, full of sympathy for the afflicted, and ever ready to champion any noble cause, or assist in any good work.

Resolved, That we consider the time propitious for all temperance bodies, and other christian workers, to ask from the Dominion Parliament a statute which will render illegal the manufacture of, and traffic in ardent spirits and malt liquors; and further

Resolved, That the Grand Division invite the co-operation of its fellow temperance and christian workers, in this province, and that Grand Divisions in the other Provinces of the Dominion be invited to take similiar action, each in its respective jurisdiction, with a view to having presented to Parliament, at its next session, such a petition as will unmistakably reflect the opinions of the people of the Dominion on this all important question.

Resolved, That an address be prepared by the Grand Division Executive, embodying the aforesaid resolutions, and sent to all temperance and religious bodies in this Province, and to the several Grand Divisions in the Dominion, inviting their co-operation.

Rept J. Parsons, P. G. W. P., from the Committee on the State of the Order, submitted their report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE ORDER.

Grand Worthy Patriarch :

Your committee desire to express, in words of highest commendation, their delight in the perusal of the reports of the Grand Officers and standing committees for the quarter ended 31st March.

In addition to the praiseworthy care manifest in their preparation we notice that every sentence is worthy of attention, and we trust that the Subordinate Divisions and every member of our Order will carefully peruse those statements when published in the columns of the Watchman.

OUR MEMBERSHIP

is of the most gratifying character in every respect. As to numbers, we stand with our 15,450 active members in advance of any period in our history, and far ahead of any other Grand Division in the World. Not only in numbers, but in our efforts, our contributions, our successes and/the activity and influence of the Divisions and individual members throughout the towns, townships and counties of Nova Scotia, of Order is one of the most powerful of moral agencies in the land. We refer, with great satisfaction, to the fact that our active efforts have always been in accordance with the principles of the Order. We have kept steadily in view, for ourselves and for our fellow-men, the precepts taught by the words "Love," "Purity" and "Fidelity."

Our activity has been more through love for our race than from fear, envyor hatred of intoxicating liquors. Our very hatred of the liquor traffic is begotten by the love we bear to our neighbors and the members of our own households; and our efforts to suppress intemperance are among the finest instances of philanthropy which this inieteenth century affords. We have 273 active Divisions in this jurisdiction, with an average of 56 members each. The fact that only 238 violations of the pledge occurred—about 1½ per cent. on our membership—speaks well for the steadiness of our societies, and the honor and stability of the members, many of whom are induced to renounce strong drink and enter the paths of sobriety. Shelburne County, with twenty-eight Divisions, takes the lead; but Kings, with less Divisions, has the greatest number of Sons of Temperance—1464. Fixed Light Division, in Guysboro' County, reports the largest actual increase of the quarter—50; and Western Star Division in Digby is the "banner Division," with a membership of 228. So the honors are divided. And thus may they always be distributed among the various counties that in generous rivalry seek to advance the cause of all mankind. Our ret increase during the quarter (2039) is probably in advance of the whole year's gain of any other Grand Division on the continent. In our enlarged membership we behold heavier responsibilities resting upon us on every hard; may we all prove faithful to our obligations.

FINANCES.

Our income has been large—on General Account, \$1,002.53; on Agency Account, \$596.65. Total, \$1,599.18. And our expenditure has been generous and judicious. The current expenses have all been met, the payments have been only for the efficient working of the various departments of our service, as the Treasurer's accounts shew. We have kept our two able and diligent lecturers—brethren Hutchings and Lewis—steadily employed; and being out of debt. we have \$815 in our treasury on General Account, and \$200 for agency work.

One reason for our success and of the confidence reposed in us, is the careful manner in which our finances have been managed. Every dollar expended has represented one hundred cents or more in actual temperance service, and the people everywhere look to our old Order with increasing confidence.

PROPAGATION.

This work consists of two parts:

1. The agency and publishing work of the Grand Division.

2. The individual and educative work of the Subordinate Divisions.

The laster cannot be summarized, but is of incalculable benefit, and serves to prepare for and consolidate the former. The attendance in the Subordinate Divisions, the work therein performed, the public meetings held by the Divisions and the influences emanating therefrom, cannot be tabulated and laid before you, but without which little would be accomplished. We suggest that each Division should hold a number of public meetings throughout the year.

THE AGENCY WORK.

has been successfully prosecuted by Bros. Lewis and Hutchings, the former in the counties of Shelburne, Queens and Lunenburg, and the latter in Hants and Halifax counties. The total of 113 public meetings addressed, attended by upwards of 15,000 persons, and the organization of twelve new Divisions by the agents for the small outlay of \$600, must be gratifying to us and to all "to whom these presents shall come."

Our lecturers deserve and receive the heartfelt sympathy and endorsation of this Grand Division, and we would commend them (if such were not superfluous) to the temperance workers of Nova Scotia.

An important part of our work is among the young. We regret to state so few Divisions have Bands of Hope reported under their control. We suggest the pledging of the boys and girls in Sabbath Schools, Day Schools and Bands of Hope, and the distribution among them of temperance literature, so that twenty years hence our men and women may be a unit upon this important question.

OFFICIAL ORGAN.

We congratulate the WATCHMAN on its increased circulation and consequent usefulness. At least four thousand families of our fifteen thousand members should be visited every week by the news and facts of its columns. The publisher, Brother G. W. Woodworth, deserves our thanks and active co-operation in his efforts at extending the circulation and usefulness of the paper.

LEGAL MATTERS

are somewhat mixed just now, and probably no action that we could take would improve them. The recent amendment to the Canada Temperance Act was in accordance with the propositions of the leading members, and no doubt are beneficial. But whether the law is yet perfect is a question that only the future can decide. The desideratum is that whenever any question arises it should be settled without delay, and we trust the Government will lose no time in having settled the constitutionality of the License Act of 1883, and all other questions that may arise within their control.

THE S. OF T. INSURANCE SOCIETY

commends itself to the good sense and business knowledge of our Order. It is a degree in fact, rather than by grips or signals. At a very small expense a member can have his life insured for the benefit at death of his surviving friends.

THE NATIONAL DIVISION

will honour this Grand Division, in July next, by holding the 40th Annual Session in Halifax, and it is desirable that by every means in our power we shall give the representatives and visitors from other jurisdictions most cordial and becoming welcome. We suggest that a special session of this Grand Division be held in Halifax at such time previous to the National Division session as shall be considered most convenient by the Executive of this Grand Body.

OUR DEATH ROLL

reminds us that we are drawing along in the journey of life. Our brothers Longley and Clay, together with other members of the Subordinate Divisions, have passed away during the past quarter. Their lives were our examplars, and their deaths are warnings to us all to be up and doing "while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

Two Divisions have been organized since the close of the quarter, one in King's and the other in Pictou County, increasing the aggregate membership to 16,185.

The returns show an increase of members in 13 out of the 17 counties. In the race for laurels, Hants and Halifax counties divide the honors-the former having the largest number of members, 1503, and the latter the largest number of Divisions, 31. North Sydney Division, No. 167, Cape Breton County, has had the largest increase of members during the quarter, showing a net gain of 51, and Western Star Division, No. 161, is still the "banner" Division, with 224 members.

A notable feature in the returns of last quarter is the large increase, as compared with those of the previous quarter, in number of temperance tracts distributed-an important work which is no longer confined to our travelling agents, but is engaging the attention of our Subordinate Divisions also.

FINANCES.

196 Divisions had paid their per capita tax for the last quarter, up to the time of closing the books; 10 divisions are exempt according to resolution of last annual session; 10 Divisions have paid up since the books closed; 13 Divisions are supposed to be inactive; and of the remaining 46 a considerable number have ceased working for the summer, with the intention of resuming operations in the autumn.

The receipts for per capita, tax during the quarter amount \$827.80, two cents less than last quarter, which is confessedly the best quarter of the year. The receipts for supplies amount to \$123.88, and the total receipts for the General Fund are \$951.68, an increase of \$222 on the total receipts for the corresponding quarter of last year.

Our two indefatigable agents, Bros. Thos. Hutchings, P. G. W. P. and T. M. Lewis, have been "in labors more abundant" during the past quarter, and with encouraging results, as will appear from the report of the Agency Committee which will be laid before you. The resources of the committee are not, however, equal to the necessities of the important work under their direction. The receipts of the fund since the annual session are \$124 less than those for the corresponding period of previous year. It is true that last year was, on many grounds, an exceptional one. It is also probable that the receipts of last quarter have been considerably affected by the contributions of the Divisions to the "Reception Fund" of the Grand Division. Nevertheless, it seems only reasonable to suppose that, as the growing and vital necessity of our agency work came to be realized and understood by the Order, they would never permit our Agency Committee to be embarrassed in their work by lack of funds. The committee enters upon the work of the present quarter with an almost empty treasury, and are compelled to apply to the Grand Division for further assistance.

NATIONAL DIVISION.

The National Division of North America held its 40th Session in the city of Halifax, in this jurisdiction, on the 9th of July and following days. One hundred and twenty-seven representatives were present, of whom sixty-five were from the Dominion of Canada, and of these twenty-eight were from Nova Scotia. A report from the Reception Committee appointed at the annual session will be, in due time, laid before the Grand Division. The session was in the highest degree pleasant and harmonious.

The Decisions and amendments to the Constitutions involved no important changes, and evince the indisposition of the National Division to tinker laws which the experience of many years has brought so near to perfection. The official Synopsis of Proceedings is appended to this report. Your representatives present at the session, guaranteed, on behalf of this Grand Division, to the Propagation Fund of the N. D., a sum of \$100, which action it is hoped this body will confirm.

PROHIBITION.

The Grand Division, at its last quarterly session, adopted important resolutions in favor of petitioning the Dominion Parliament, at its next session, for a prohibitory liquor law, and instructed the Executive to communicate with the several Grand Divisions in the Dominion, and the religious bodies in this Province, with a view to procure their co-operation in this movement. In accordance with these instructions, the Grand Scribe forwarded to the Executives of the several Grand Divisions in the Dominion, a circular embodying the resolutions of this Grand Division, and inviting their co-operation. Two Grand Divisions alone responded —Ontario and Quebec. The former decidedly declined to co-operate, and the latter clegated the matter to their September session. Under these circumstances the Executive deemed it inexpedient to take any further action until this quarterly session.

TEMPERANCE TEXT BOOK.

This Grand Division, at its last quarterly session, instructed the Executive to take steps to communicate with the Trustees of public schools throughout the Province, and urge them to introduce Dr. Richardson's Temperance Lesson Book [74]

I. The 40th annual session of the National Division was held on July 9, 10, and 11, in the Legislative Council Chamber, the use of which, on application of the committee, was granted to the Grand Division of Nova Scotia by unanimous vote of the Council. The committee suggest that a suitable acknowledgement of the courtesy be made by the Grand Division through the G. W. P. and G. S.

2. On the evening of July 9, a public formal reception meeting of the delegates was held in the Academy of Music, which was largely attended by members of the Order and of the general public. 3. Rep. Thomas Hutchings, P. G. W. P., from the special committee appointed to arrange for a public meeting, submitted their report, which was accepted.

Rep. John E. Butler, P. G. W. P., from the special committee to whom was referred the communication from Rippling Stream Division, No. 596, relating to a private signal, submitted their report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

PRIVATE SIGNAL.

Your committee to whom was referred the application from Rippling Stream Division, No 596, for some suitable distinguishing flag to be used by those who follow the sea, that they may be known as Sons of Temperance wherever they go, herewith submit a flag which they consider suitable, not only for that purpose, but as one that may be used on temperance halls, or wherever Sons of Temperance may gather. The design is a white burgee, from three yards in length, up to any size desired; bordered blue and red, with blue triangle and the six pointed star of our Order in the centre, with letters L. P. and F, red, in the body of the flag. Your committee believe such a flag would come within reach of all who desire one, and might be of great use when flown on vessels whose crews are largely of our Order, they being immediately recognized by it, and made to feel at home wherever they meet a Division of our Order.

Your committee would recommend that the Grand Scribe be empowered to order for any one requiring such flag whatever size they may desire, charging only such sum as would pay cost and charges on same. Your committee would also recommend the Grand Division to have the design of the flag registered at Ottawa, that others than Sons of Temperance may be prevented from using it without the permission of this body.

We would also suggest that the attention of the National Division be called to the matter, and that they be requested to adopt it, or something similar, as the distinguishing flag of the Sons of Temperance.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE ORDER.

Grand Worthy Patriarch :

Your Committee on the State of the Order are able to report well-sustained, if not increased prosperity and activity throughout the whole jurisdiction. As we scan the field occupied by this Grand Division we perceive much for which to thank God and take courage. Our Order was never so strong in numbers, so energetic in operation, so potent for good, and so far reaching in its influence, as at the present time. The tidal wave of temperance revival, which originated in Yarmouth on the West, soon after, and in connection with, your own election to the Grand Worthy Patriach's chair, has swept over the length of the Province until it reached Mainadieu in Cape Breton, County, and New Haven in Victoria County on the extreme East. Nor is there any evidence of subsidence. Reports from every quarter are cheering in the highest degree. We have reason to believe that this state of affairs is due, very largely, if not chiefly, to the energy of your Agency Committee, and to the enthusisam of the two Grand Lecturers in that Committee's service, Brothers Hutchings and Lewis.

Your committee regret to find a somewhat serious falling off in contributions towards the Agency Fund during the last three quarters. We do not think, however, that this decrease in the receipts of the fund is indicative of any diminution of interest in this department of our work. It may simply indicate that the agents were laboring during these quarters in portions of the province where money is not so abundant as it is in places where their labors had previously been expended. In any case it is clear to your committee that the agency treasury must be speedily replenished, and kept replenished. The treasury of the fund is at present the motive power of our advancement. Given ample funds and our Order will go on steadily and grandly, "lengthening its cords and strengthening its stakes;" while, on the other hand, if abundant funds are not furnished work must be crippled and curtailed.

We strongly recommend that in accordance to the request of the Agency Committee \$200 be voted from the General Fund for their special, important and sesential work. A very promising feature of the last quarter's operations was the large increase in the number of temperance tracts distributed. Literature is essential to the spread of our principles, even in the Province of Nova Scotia, which is comparatively intelligent on the subject of temperance. The mass of the people have much to learn respecting the nature and effects of alcoholic liquors: and there is perhaps no way in which the knowledge they require can be furnished so cheaply and effectually as through the medium of well selected temperance tracts.

Every one of our Subordinate Divisions should have a standing committee on tract distribution, whose business it would be to place a suitable temperance tract in each home of its neighborhood once a month.

In regard to the proposal to petition the Parliament, at its next session, to enact a Prohibitory Liquor Law for the Dominion, it may be as well, in view of the adverse sentiments expressed by the Grand Division of Ontario on this matter, to take no further steps in that direction in the meantime.

But the same can hardly be said of Ontario and Quebec; at the same time we feel satisfied that the remarkable agitation now going on in these two great Provinces will speedly eventuate in such an education of public opinion, as will enable temperance men then to see their way clear to co-operate with us, flooding parliament with prohibitory petitions at no distant date.

The past quarter has been signalized in the history of the Grand Division by the

fact that the National Division met within its jurisdiction.

The meeting of the Supreme Body, which convened at Halifax on the 9th of July, was an exceedingly pleasant and profitable one to all who were privileged to attend its session; and may we not cherish the hope that a beneficent influence has extended from that meeting to the remotest bounds of our Order.

The lectures and addresses delivered by our distinguished Brothers General Cary of Ohio, and E. Carswell of Ontario, in different parts of the Province, will

be long remembered with delighted recollection.

The 40th session of the National Division reflected great credit on its own wisdom, and also conferred a lasting benefit on the Order in America, by electing our esteemed and efficient Grand Scribe, Bro. R. Alder Temple, to the position of Most Worthy Scribe.

The guarantee of \$100 towards the Propagation Fund of the National Division, which was given by the representatives of this Grand Division and referred to by the Grand Scribe in his report, meets with our approval, and we recommend that this sum of \$100 be appropriated to the purpose mentioned.

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

HALIFAX, Nov. 11, 1884.

Officers and Representatives :

With another year's experience we are again privileged to meet in annual session, "to interchange the greetings of an exalted friendship," and to plan for future action.

The year just closed has been quite successful. The Grand Scribe's report will shew a large increase in membership. The Grand Treasurer's report will indicate financial prosperity, and the Agency Committee have been enabled to compass work equal to that of any previous year.

That two agents have been continuously employed, abundantly proves that the interests of the people in relation to temperance work have not been neglected.

During the year portions of nine counties have been visited officially by your chief officer, who has thus reached every county in the Province within two years, and it is due to the friends to say, that everywhere your representative met with a cordial welcome.

Convinced of the necessity of having competent agents kept constantly at work, (from this department of service much of our prosperity depends,) I hope that our agency work will receive special attention at this session.

In this connection it may not, perhaps, be out of place to refer to the Organ, a publication largely subsidized with the view of aiding our cause, and advancing the interests of our Order. Unwilling to pronounce judgment on an enterprize which many honored brethren have approved in the past, yet, it may fairly be questioned whether the money voted from year to year in its support is a profitable expenditure.

There is good reason to believe that the Canada Temperance Act is gaining in public esteem. While in some counties, because of legal difficulties and the apathy of the people, it is semingly a dead letter, in other counties it is a power for good.

What is needed at this crisis in our history is substantial aid. If some general scheme could be devised whereby a fund could be raised to guarantee the enforcement of the law, it is firmly believed that the traffic would receive a check, such as has not been witnessed in a lifetime. This, with other legitimate means, would hasten the time when our people would be prepared, as never before, for total probabilities.

Special reports have been received from our agents, Brother Hutchings and Lewis, recounting their labors during the quarter. The items contained in their report of a general interest, will be given in the regular report of the Agency Committee.

Reports have been received from every county in the Province. As it is the practice to publish those for the October term in the Year Book, only short extracts will be given at this time.

Annapolis East.—Rev. Brother Jost says he has no reports from any of the Divisions, Few, if any, have had regular meetings during the busy season. Farming operations have been very much retarded by the frequent rains; and during the fine-weather the work has been more than usually pressing. Brother Lewis has been with them, stirring up an interest. Col. Hickman has visited the valley in the interests of the Good Templars.

Annapolis West.—Brother Mills has reports from nearly all of the Divisions in his District. He says the Order is in an active working condition, that harmony prevails, and that the outlook seems encouraging. He speaks of Brother Lewis who has been lecturing with acceptance.

Antigonish.—Owing to the absence of Brother King from the county no regular reports have been received. Deputy Cunningham writes saying he hoped to be able to attend this session.

Brother W. P. Cunningham says that although their Division is prospering as well as could be expected, yet drunkenness prevails to an alarming extent. Legal difficulties are a hindrance in their work.

Cape Breton.—G. W. A., Brother McLennan says the Divisions in his District are doing pretty well, but there is any amount of liquor sold in the country. They propose making another effort to enforce the law. He speaks of a visit, in company with Brother Hutchings, to a Division at South Bar, which was not in working order.

Colchester.—Brother Layton reports those Divisions heard from as doing good work in a quiet way. He says that nothing is being done to prevent the sale of jiquors. Failures in enforcing the Scott Act have almost discouraged the people.

Cumberland.—Brother Black says that he is able to report a most decided advance in temperance sentiment during the year. One case had been tried under the Scott Act, and an appeal taken. Nine Divisions reported to him.

Digdy.—Rev. Brother Saunders has no reports from Divisions. He speaks of the enforcing of the law as the great question of the hour. He has not time to discharge the duties of his office.

Guysboro'.—Rev. Brother Whitman has words of cheer from his county. He says that good results have followed Brother Hutchings' efforts in agency work.

Hatijiax.—Brother Monaghan reports that, so far as he can learn the meetings of the Divisions, with two or three exceptions, are fairly attended. A fair average of the members are attentive to their duties. Several Bands of Hope are sustained by some of the Divisions, a few members of the Order, male and female, devoting much valuable time to training some hundreds of children in temperance principles.

West Hants .- Rev. Dr. McMurray says that many of the Divisions are doing well; others are not working with their wonted energy. He says an agent is needed

East Hants.-Brother Blois says that there is not much change to notice. The law is not enforced as it should be, Six Divisions report doing their work in a

Inverness. - Deputy McLeod has no reports from Divisions. The Division in his place has gone down. This county needs special attention.

Kings .- Brother Farnham says that the cause is as strong in his county as ever, and that the reports from Divisions are very encouraging. The want of money prevents them from enforcing the law. Many of the friends have had to sustain heavy burdens through failure in law suits.

Lunenburg.-Rev Brother Fraser says that the temperance interest is advancing rapidly in the county. The liquor traffic is being pressed into centres, so that the country districts are freer from it, and it is becoming more disreputable every year. Children are being trained to temperance, and the workers are greatly encouraged in their arduous toil.

East Picton. - Brother McGregor says that as far as he can learn the Divisions in his District are holding their own, but not advancing much. At a meeting held in New Glasgow last week \$600 were subscribed, as a guarantee fund, to enforce the law. He reports the death of Brother McKay, a worthy member of Lochinvar Division.

West Picton.—Rev. Brother Rogers reports substantial progress. He organized four new Divisions during the year; all having a prospect of long life and usefulness. He says the friends are much tried by the present position of the Scott Act, and that the time has come when the ballots of temperance men should tell for the right every time, so that it may be impossible for drunkards, or friends of strong drink, to occupy high political or judicial positions.

Queens.—Brother Wright says that the past year in his county has been one of marked success. Through the influence of Brother Lewis six Divisions have been organized. The Order has increased in membership, and the outlook is promising.

Richmond.-Brother Morrison reports that Brother Hutchings organized a Division in St. Peter's, which is the only one in the county. He says that every night since the Division was opened additions have taken place, and there is every reason to hope that the membership will be materially increased during the quarter. It seems this is the only temperance organization in the county.

Shelburne. - Brother Locke reports the Divisions in his District in good working order, and temperance principles prevailing in the different localities where they are organized. He says, "the Scott Act seems inoperative in Shelburne town, owing to the fact that in former suits which were appealed, the prosecutor was burdened with heavy costs;" and now the temperance friends are much dis-

Victoria. - Brother McCurdy reports the six Divisions and two Bands of Hope Victoria.—Brother McCurdy reports the six Divisions and two Bands of Hope organized by Brother Hutchings during the past and present year, all in a prosper-ous condition. Meetings are regularly held and numbers are increasing. He says that efforts are being made with the view of ascertaining the feelings of the people in regard to the Scott Act.

Termuda.—Rev. Brother Coffin reports the Division in Hamilton in good working order. He says that there is ample room for other Divisions, but it

seems hard to move the people.

Yarmouth.—So far as reports have been received the Divisions are in a fairly good working condition. The Scott Act is being enforced with vigor. A guarantee fund has been raised, and, from present indications, those engaged in the traffic must surrender.

Some of the brethren have recommended County Divisions or organizations, with the view of planning for practical work, and of promoting more of the social element among the members. If the details could be compassed such an effort might be well worth a trial.

Great as are the difficulties against which we have to contend, there is consolation in the fact that, outside of the city of Halifax, the license system is doomed. Two thirds of the counties have already pronounced in favor of prohibition. Other counties are preparing to submit the question to the people. But success, worthy of the name, comes of well-directed effort. Let us plan and work. Let our forces be united and the time may not be far distant when this mighty moral "movement" shall exert a power throughout the land that cannot be ignored. No fear need be entertained that business depression would come upon us through its influence. For, despite the manifestoes that have been issued by those engaged in the traffic, picturing ruin and decay if their power were dethroned, success in the great temperance enterprise means commercial activity—real prosperity—comfortable homes and happiness for the people.

With the sincere desire that this session shall be harmonious and profitable, and that the incoming Executive shall be abundantly successful in all their efforts to promote the interests of our Order and the welfare of mankind,

Three Divisions have been organized, and one dormant Division re-organized since the close of the quarter, increasing the number of Divisions to 289, and the aggregate membership to 16,760.

It is observable that the number of admissions to membership is large for the summer quarter; but the number of expulsions is exceptionally large. Still water becomes stagnant, and the inactivity of the summer season must naturally result in considerable loss; but the returns show that the work of excision has been carried on with a strong hand, two Divisions alone, Nos. 57 and 389, suffering an aggregate loss of nearly one hundred members.

All of the counties show an increase of members but Colchester, Victoria and Yarmouth. Halifax still has the largest number of Divisions, 31, and for the largest membership Hants must surrender its laurels to Kings, which reports 1591. The Divisions which have had the largest nett increase during the quarter are WHITE ROCK, No. 358, YOUNG BRANCH, No. 313, and ROUND HILL, No. 495, the first showing 38, and the latter two 33, each. WESTERN STAR, No. 161, is still the "Banner Division," with its 231 members, but will find strong com-

petitors during the current quarter in NEW GLASGOW, No. 17, and STAR IN THE EAST, No. 61.

DIVISON RESUSCITATED.

Northern Light, No. 404, located at Parker's-Cove, Annapolis Co., originally organized in 1876, was reorganized on the 3rd inst, by Deputy T. M. Lewis.

FINANCES.

One hundred and fifteen Divisions had paid their per capita tax to the Grand Division before the closing of the books; ten Divisions were exempt according to the resolution of last annual session; fifteen Divisions are supposed to be dormant; the remaining forty-five are delinquent, some of them having exhausted their funds in building halls, and others not having resumed operations after their summer's rest. The Grand Scribe issued a reminder to Divisions in arrears, according to custom, on the 15th of October, with decidedly good effect. The receipts of the quarter for the General Fund amount to the sum of \$1,055.16; more than \$200 in advance of the corresponding quarter of last year.

The operations of the Agency Committee have been conducted, during the quarter, with the usual energy and gratifying success, as will appear from the report of the Agency Committee, which will be laid before the Grand Division. The receipts of the Fund for the quarter are \$348.78, and show a considerable decrease as compared with those of the corresponding quarter of last year. This decrease is in part accounted for by the transfer of one of our agents, for a month, to another field of labor; but while some of the Divisions have contributed nobly to this fund, it is sufficiently clear that the Order at large has not yet grasped the immense importance of sustaining our agency work in its fullest efficiency, even at the cost of some personal sacrifice.

THE PROGRESS OF THE YEAR.

The record of the year's operations is well calculated to inspire sentiments of gratitude to the "Great Patriarch above," whose guiding hand in the preparation of our agencies, in the removal of hindrances, and in the subordination of human passions, prejudices and interests to the triumph of our principles we devoutly recognize. Each quarter has given us the joy of conquest, and brought us nearer [116] VOL. XI. to our recompense. The review may well encourage us to man the bulwarks of truth and sobriety, and publish them to the generations following. The following comparative statement will give an intelligent idea of the advancement which has been made during the year, viz :-

Sixty-one new Divisions have been organized during the year, and seven old Divisions have been resuscitated. 8,574 persons have been initiated into our Order during the year—1200 in excess of the previous year.

Our indefatigable agents, Bros. Thos. Hutchings and T. M. Lewis, have been doing the work of giants, neither deterred by weariness, nor dismayed by opposition, nor disheartened by the apathy which they have had to confront. They are worthy of all honor, and when the history of the great moral conflicts and reforms of this country shall be written, their names shall appear in brighter bla-

SUPPLIES.

In consequence of the pressing demand from Divisions the Grand Scribe has been obliged to anticipate the instructions of this Grand Division and publish a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws. By the advice of the Committees on Printing and Constitutions the new issue will comprise only the Constitutions and Code, By-Laws and Rules of Order of Subordinate Divisions, with the Regulations for the Settlement of Property, adopted at the Pictou quarterly session, inserted as an appendix. This action will need the confirmation of the Grand Division. An authorization will also be required for the publication of an edition of Constitution, By-Laws and Rules of Order of the Grand Division, in a separate form. In obedience to the instructions of the last quarterly session the Grand Scribe has had a hundred charters printed for the use of Bands of Hope; but up to this date only two of the old Bands have applied for a charter.

SUPPLEMENTARY RETURNS.

Two hundred and twenty Divisions have sent in Supplementary Returns for this annual session. The items of these returns which relate to property have been summarized and handed to the Committee on Property, who will report to the Grand Division. From the above figures it will not be difficult to conceive why it is that so many of our Divisions run such a brief career. Ten cents for quarterly dues, and three-fitths of that required for per capita tax! It is worthy of consideration whether the time has not come for this Grand Division to exercise its prerogative and fix a minimum sum for initiation fees and quarterly dues, for all Divisions to be hereafter organized.

TEMPERANCE TEXT BOOK.

In accordance with the instructions of the last quarterly session the Grand Scribe, early in August, put himself in communication with the Superintendent of Education with a view to ascertain to what extent Dr. Richardson's Temperance Lesson Book has been introduced into the public schools of this province. Mr. Allison was pleased to reply that he would make enquiries of the Inspectors of Schools and in due time inform this office of the replies received from those officers.

OFFICIAL ORGAN.

The affairs of the official organ will demand the gravest consideration at this annual session. A report from the committee will be laid before the Grand Division, and the action of this body thereon will no doubt be controlled by an accurate conception of the true and best interests of the Order.

IN MEMORIAM.

It becomes the painful duty of the Grand Scribe to give official notice of the death of a young and worthy member of this body—Brother William E. Robin-son, of St. Croix Division, No. 379—who was initiated in the Grand Division at the Windsor session, in January, 1883, and died on the 24th July last, in the 23rd year of his age.

In conclusion, Brothers, the signs of the times are full of meaning, and point to a general movement of the temperance host all along the line. The work of wise and careful preparation belongs to the present hour. For the sake of humanity which is struggling to deliver itself from a thousand wrongs, and for the sake of our country which is bewildered by the burdens which oppress her, let us buckle on the armor afresh, and, animated by lofty purpose and kindled with the inspira-tions of patriotism, let us take prompt and bold measures for advance, and we may live to see the day when the "gigantic crime of crimes," thrown from this tried Dominion which has writhed so long beneath its yoke, shall perish—"slain by the breath of His mouth, and consumed by the brightness of His coming."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER

The Committee on the State of the Order, having had submitted to it the reports of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, Grand Scribe and Grand Treasurer, beg leave to report:

That the documents before the committee all indicate the past year to have been, for our Order in this jurisdiction, one of very gratifying prosperity. The explicit information and definite particulars in the reports of our Executive will be seen to be full of promise as regards the progress of our principles, and the final and early triumph of the cause of total abstinence, and the prohibition of the liquor traffic. This committee gladly recognizes the efficient and valuable services rendered by our chief officers in various counties, both in the Western and Eastern sections of the Province. The zealous and judicious labours thus generously rendered in the spirit of christian self-denial, and with whole-heartted interest in our work, have contributed, in no small measure, in advancing the prosperity of our Divisions. The Grand Division, we doubt not, will readily indorse the references to our agency work for the past year. The unwearied services of our two indefatigable laborers have called forth, wherever these agents have gone, the hearty commendation of our fiembership and of the friends of total abstinence generally. The blessing of the Most High has rested upon their faithful and valuable labours, and to Him be all the praise.

The general healthiness also of our financial position is to be attributed in some degree to the labors of our agents; but especially to the measures adopted by our Grand Scribe, and the attention given by him with a view to this result.

THE AGENCY FUND

There is, however, another aspect of the financial question calling for earnest consideration. We are gratified to have been able to keep two so efficient agents and lecturers in the field; but if we are to carry on this arm of our tervice in full efficiency, it is necessary, and of the highest consequence, that this presety shall evoke the more general, and the more liberal sympathy and material aid of our Divisions. Our Agency Committee should never be allowed to feel crippled in the efforts demanded in their work by depleted resources. More extended, systematic and generous contributions are essential, that we may push our operations into every portion of the province, and that the advances already achieved may be followed by wider and still more glorious results.

THE PROHIBITION MOVEMENT.

It is highly gratifying to mark the progress, now so manifest, of the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic, and the hold which this subject is taking of the public mind. The very general revival of interest therein, in the more central portion of our Dominion, should be inspiring to the workers in this cause among ourselves. We are glad that in some of our counties the Canada Temperance Act is being vigorously enforced, and are persuaded that similar determination, sustained even by moderate financial aid in all the localities that have adopted the Act, would bring about a gratifying change in many places now grievously cursed by the sale of strong drink, and would hasten the complete triumph of the work of prohibition. Funds to secure the enforcement of law are indispensable, and by wise measures may be raised in sufficient amount as may be required. We are hopeful that if apathy on this subject anywhere exists, a more zealous and courage, our spirit will soon prevail, and may achieve a successful issue in the entire removal of temptation to inebriation.

THE OFFICIAL ORGAN.

It will be readily admitted that decisive action is called for in regard to our Official Organ. We cannot afford to have so necessary, and so valuable an instrumentality as the Press made use of in our cause inefficiently. We trust that the feeling in this Grand Division, in regard to this matter, is so general and hearty, as that steps will be taken, with wisdom and energy, which will give us an organ that will wield a wide influence, and will greatly aid in our work—one of which we may have no reason to be ashamed. But as this subject will be brought before the Grand Division by the standing committee entrusted with its direction, we shall forbear in reference to it any further remark.

SUPPLEMETARY RETURNS.

The importance of these returns in the information in many particulars which they afford is very evident. From the synopsis given in the Grand Scribe's report there is an indication of one reason why some of our Divisions have so soon run their course. It requires no great clearness of vision to discern that the low rates of fees and dues in some Divisions, and the failure to collect the dues, must inevitably cause such Divisions to break down. We think the time has come when this Grand Division should interpose its prerogative, (see Cons. Sub. Div., Art. 5 and Sec. 1) and fix a minimum rate of fees and dues for Divisions. We recommend the Grand Division to give instructions to its agents to use their influence, when organizing new Divisions, to secure the adoption of a scale of fees and dues which will be sufficient to keep these Divisions above financial embarassment.

It is necessary to call attention to the publication of the new edition of the Constitution and Code, By-Laws and Rules of Order of the Subordinate Divisions. We recommend the publication of the new edition be confirmed by this Grand Division, and also that the Grand Scribe be authorized to issue a new edition of the Book of Constitutions.

We note that some District and County Deputies have to complain of tardiness and neglect on the part of the Divisional Deputies in sending in their quarterly reports. Omission in this matter, or want of punctuality, cannot but occasion inconvenience, and we trust that, in future, there will be little or no occasion of further complaint in the same direction.

The times in which we live are full of interest to us as temperance workers. A crisis of no small moment is now upon us. It is on every account to be hoped that our grand and effective organization will be found all that its warm friends have often affirmed respecting it, and that it will be so used by our fraternity as a whole in carrying forward our warfare in the cause of sobriety and in battling against strong drink and its abettors, so as to speedily rid our country of the burden of ruin which this great engine of unrighteousness has imposed,

WORTHY BROTHERS,—The Committee on Invenile Organizations beg to report as follows:

At the quarterly session at Baddeck your committee was instructed to prepare a charter for Bands of Hope, to be supplied to Bands applying for the same, and also to so revise the Constitution and By-laws of Bands of Hope as to provide for the formation of Bands in localities where no Divisions of the Order exist.

Both these duties have been attended to. A neat and appropriate charter has been prepared and issued to such Bands as have applied for it; and Art, 3 of the Constitution has been revised and altered to read as follows:

"This association shall be under the management of a Board of not less than seven directors or managers, including a superintendent, four of such managers to be males, elected annually by the Division, or Divisions, to which the Band belongs, and three to be ladies, chosen annually by the elected managers; provided, however, that in places where no Divisions exist the managers may be appointed by the parties interested, subject to the approval of the Grand Divisions.

The committee recommend that the alterations embodied in the above be incorporated in the next edition of the Band of Hope Ritual.

Immediately on the preparation of the charter, the accompanying circular* was sent to the various Divisions. The committee would reiterate the appeal made in the circular and strenously urgeon Divisions the absolute necessity, if we wish to maintain our ground, of a thorough education of the young in temperance principles, and, to attain this education, to establish and maintain Bands of Hope wherever they can possibly be introduced.

Divisions are requested to send immediately to the Grand Scribe the name, locality and date of organization of all Bands already in existence, and also of those that may be established in the future, together with the name of the organizer and the names of the children who became members on the day of organization—the number not to exceed thirty-five. This information is required in order that in issuing charters the Bands may be numbered in their proper order, and be assigned the position on the roll to which their age entitles them.

The committee recommend that they be authorized to substitute the certificate of membership issued by D. Cook, of Chicago, for that now used by the Bands, and to procure a supply, as the present stock is about exhausted.

They would further recommend that the agents of the Grand Division be instructed to give special attention this year to Band of Hope work.

Returns have been received from twenty-one Bands, showing an aggregate membership of fifteen hundred and ninety-four. The returns of seven Bands which appeared on the record last year with a total membership of two hundred and ninety-three have not been received, but some of them are known to be working.

Worthy Brother,—Although we have been under the operation of the Scott Act since the first of May last, the first prosecution under it only took place a few weeks ago, when one seller at Amherst was convicted before the Justices of the Peace, at the suit of a prosecutor appointed by the County Alliance, the Inspector of Licenses having declined to act unless provided with funds for the purpose and indemnified for the costs. An appeal in this case was taken to the County Court, principally on the grounds that the Act is not in force in the county, and it will come up at the session which will open on Nov.

come up at the session which will open on Nov. II.

Liquors are very freely sold, though with a little more caution than usual. I am able, however, to report a most decided advance in temperance sentiment during the year. The lecturers employed by our own and other Orders have worked faithfully and successfully in arousing the people to increased activity, and I can safely say that the temperance sentiment of the county is stronger than ever before.

All of the Divisions which have reported to me, except one, record initiations during the past quarter, two of them averaging about one addition per week. I append a tabular statement from returns received.

I beg to make a suggestion. The great work just now is the successful application of the "Canada Temperance Act." This, in my opinion, can never be successfully done until this is recognized by our Municipal Council as a part of our criminal code, and the same provision be made for its enforcement as is made for criminal offences. Temperance men have so long been accustomed to enforce temperance acts by individual and voluntary efforts that municipal authorities have been led to believe that it was no part of their business. Would it not be better to lay it fairly on the powers that be, and to demand of them the prompt execution of this as of other wholesome laws? If money is necessary for this let it be provided from the public revenues. If the public once come to the conclusion that it is the duty of our Municipal Council to provide for the enforcement of this law, they will be careful to appoint proper men to this work and cease to blame temperance men and temperance organizations if the law fail in its intentions.

Dear Sir and Brother, - Up to this date (October 31, 1884,) I have received reports from eleven Divisional Deputies for the quarter ending September 30, 134. Of these five reside in districts outside the city. The apparent oversight of the other Deputies will explain the delay in the forwarding of this report to you. The non-receipt of reports of twenty Deputies out of thirty-one in this county is be regretted, especially when it is desirable that full particulars respecting the state of the Order should be known to the Grand Division in annual session. Some of the Deputies I have not heard from during the year, and from others I have received but two reports. A few only reported to me at the end of each quarter.

The Grand Scribe informs me that there are thirty-one Divisions in the county of Halifax, with a membership of 1,481. Eight of these Divisions were organized

during the present year.

So far as I can learn, the meetings of the Divisions, with two or three exceptions, are fairly attended; a fair average of the members are attentive to their duties as Sons of Temperance, and about one-half are imbued with an active interest for the spread of temperance and the increase of the Order. Several Bands of Hope are sustained by some of the Divisions, a few members of the Order, and and female, devoting much valuable time to training some hundreds of children in temperance principles. The Section of Cadets of Temperance in this city is struggling for an existence, notwithstanding the large amount of time devoted to its interests by several respected members of the Grand Division.

One or two Divisions may possibly be compelled to suspend operations during the ensuing year, owing to difficulties beyond their control. The city Divisions

are exerting a good influence on the public mind, and it is to be hoped that the results of their work in the future will be as conspicuous as the progress made by

their efforts in the past.

For many years all the city Divisions met in the building long known as "Temperance Hall." These Divisions, after long years of hard work, decreased in number from six to true. These two, from the force of circumstances, had to remove from the room they had occupied for a quarter of a century. This seemed to (apparently) operate against their usefulness. The veteran members of both labored on with strong hopes of better days to come; and now it affords me pleasure to report to you that the Chebucto and Mayflower Divisions have united in purchasing a building (at a cost of two thousand dollars), in which they will have ample accommodation for their regular sessions and other gatherings, besides affording a large room for the meetings of their Band of Hope. These Divisions may be said to have already taken a new lease of life; and the members of both will no doubt make their influence felt in the future as in past years.

A large amount of work devolves upon those who labor in behalf of temperance in this city, where persons engaged in the liquor traffic have little difficulty in inventing easy methods of evading the license laws and receive assistance in "burking" the operations of restrictive clauses on frivolous technicalities. The state of matters in regard to the license law and its enforcement in the city is very unsatisfactory at the present time. My successor in office may be enabled in a few weeks to present a definite report on this question to the G. W. P. for the

Dear Brother,—I am preparing this, my third annual report for the Grand Division, in your own beautiful town of Yarmouth. You remarked, I think, that my last report was rather darkly shaded. Being now, however, at a distance from Lunenburg, and distance lends enchantment to the view. I trust that while this report may be shaded more brightly, it may be as truthful as the last.

I regret very much that I will not be able to meet with you in your annual session, being prevented by circumstances that I cannot occurs creek to mantion

I trust however that the successes and encouragements of the past may be overshadowed by those to be won and declared in the near future; for our banners are
sure to wave triumphant on every breeze, sooner perhaps than the most hopeful
dare now anticipate. But I must report and not prophesy.

THE GRAND DIVISION YEAR

now closing, began with very little activity in temperance matters. At Bridgewater the traffic had been considerably checked; but there was then a decided bull; and our enemies were gaining ground again. In other towns and villages the traffic was open and insolent, taking advantage of the uncertain state of our laws, and threatening us with a severe repulse. The battle came on, and the victory was ours; and to day our noble cause stands far in attwance of what it did a year ago. Temperance sentiment has greatly improved. We have gained much ground and we hope to hold it. Coming now to particulars I may first notice the

GREAT LICENSE CONFLICT,

as it may be fitly called. When the "Liquor License Act, 1883" was proclaimed, uncertainty ruled the day for a time, but in a little while things became clearer.

The last clause settled the validity of our Provincial law until May 1st at least, and the temperance people took advantage of it and secured quite a number of convictions with some heavy fines. On the other hand, three liquor dealers, two in Lunenburg Town and one at Mahone Bay, acting under the new law, circulated petitions and applied for licenses. For about two weeks before the meeting of the License Board the conflict went on. Counter petitions were circulated and largely signed. At last the court day came—the 21st of March, now an historic day in Lunenburg. The agitation had opened the eyes of many, and when maters were explained, they had their names removed from the petition for license, No. 1.

saying they had signed ignorantly or under misapprehension. In this way the petitions from Lunenburg were reduced below the required number, and thrown out, while the one from Mahone Bay was brought down to the neat one-third, and after being considered, was on the strength of the counter petition also thrown out, and the applicant, according to the law, disqualified from applying again for three years. And so Lunenburg County was rescued from the disgrace of going back to the old litense system, to which so many places blindly cling. We were greatly aided at this time by

the now well-known and popular T. M. Lewis, Esq. He cam strike the iron while it was hot, and many a lusty blow he gave it. He came just in time to e gave it. Through mud and slush, and rain and snow he travelled and labored, visiting schools whenever an opportunity offered, and addressing meetings in school-houses and churches, speaking to audiences varying from a few dozen to 700 or more, and making good

impressions everywhere.

He also revived one Division, re-organized two and organized one. These numbers may seem small to those who do not know the county; but to those who do know it they are very encouraging. Lunenburg County, is temperance missionary ground, where visible results will for a time be small, but which should not for a single year be neglected. Sow the good seed, sow in faith with much toil, and the harvest will come in due season. I am not able to state the amount raised for your Agency Fund, but I do know that your agent deserves credit for his energetic efforts in its behalf.

OUR DIVISIONS

OUR DIVISIONS

are prospering as a whole. I am compelled to write this before receiving the reports from Deputies, and so cannot give you particulars, as I would like. Of Chester Division I cannot say anything.

Noble, at Petite Riviere is holding its own. Lunenburg Rock, in Lunenburg Town, now numbers over 150, and has among its members some of the leading citizens. They also have a flourishing Band of Hope, numbering about 200, I believe. Unity, at Mahone Bay, was reorganized and now numbers nearly 70; they have an organ, which they intend to purchase. They will probably hold public meetings during the winter, at least once a month. Phoenix, at Bridgewater, was revived last winter and is progressing favorably. New Germany, at the place of the same name, was re-organized, and is taking steps to build a temperance hall. Homeward Bound, at Ritcey's Cove. was organized on ground once occupied by I. O. G. T., and they have a Cove, was organized on ground once occupied by I. O. G. T., and they have a fine Division, which will do good work.

PUBLIC MEETING.

Besides the public meetings addressed by your agent-about 40, I believethere have been but few others, the summer being an unfavorable time. Lunenburg Rock, Unity and Homeward Bound have each had a temperance picnic, ending with a grand meeting in the evening, in Lunenburg in the Drill Shed, and at the other places in large churches. I attended the first two and can pronounce them a decided success, making the best impressions.

THE SCOTT ACT

Movement has been making slow but steady headway. A few earnest workers have for some time been agitating it, and in May last it was decided by the County Alfiance to take steps to have it brought before the people. Since then petitions have been circulating, and in many places have been well signed. Its friends have good hopes of carrying it sometime during the winter. Our movements may be slow, but I trust they are sure.

ANNUAL REPORT.

Worthy Brother,-In compliance with your wishes it becomes my duty to furnish you with a report of the work performed during the past year in the interests of the Order, hoping that it may be of some service to you in preparing your

official report for the Grand Division.

Since the last annual session it has been my privilege to labour in the counties of Guysboro', Antigonish, Hants, Halifax, Inverness, Victoria, Richmond and Cape Breton, and it affords me a great degree of satisfaction to report results of a most pleasing character from nearly every standpoint. Quite a number of new Divisions were organized, others (after a brief period of inactivity) brought into line again, while those which had continued in the work were encouraged to persevere; in fact, a general awakening seemed to have taken place throughout the whole of the sections visited during the year.

It affords me pleasure to be able to report the tone of public sentiment rising to to a higher plane; inquiries are being made, and information sought for, in reference to the more advanced principle of prohibition, and an increasing desire expressed to have its leading features brought out more prominently on all occasions; these facts all point to an advanced public opinion that speaks favorably for the future welfare of the race, and the continued prosperity of our cause throughout our widely extended jurisdiction.

It may be well for me to say that while great advances have been made, and important victories won, there is yet much land to be possessed, for in some portions of our Province the custom of moderate drinking prevails to a considerable extent, and hence the difficulty in the way of successful work; especially is this the case in the county of Antigonish, and in many places on the Island of Cape Breton. This sad state of affairs is mainly due to the fact that a backward movement has been going on for some years past, and no effort made to check the current of disaster from this standpoint; it is to be hoped that a brighter morn is near at hand, when the men of influence and position (both in the church and out of it) will haste to the rescue of those who are the victims of this curse of strong drink.

During the past year considerable difficulty has been experienced by the friends of the cause in their endeavors to carry out the provisions of the "Canada Temperance Act" in some of the counties that have adopted said Act; but it is to be hoped that the amendments made, together with an increasing desire to have the law enforced, may be the means of effecting the object sought to be attained all the more speedily, that the long wished-for period may soon come when this abominable traffic shall cease to exist. Let us give no quarter to the enemy by word or deed, but, trusting in God, and truth, and right, go forward to victory in

the interests of our common humanity.

The important position at present held by this Order should incite us to still greater efforts for the triumph of our principles; for the work done by many of the greater enors for me chumps of our principles; not the work done by many of the Divisions has tended, in a very great measure, to mould the advanced public settiment that exists to-day in Nova Scotia, thus placing us in the front rank among the Provinces in the Dominion of Canada. To hold this ground, and thus keep pace with the times, the work must be continued all along the line, our object and aim being the final success of our cause.

Let us bear in mind that the efforts made in different parts of the world must hasten the day when the higher principles of prohibition shall be recognized in all 1727 VOL. XI.

GRAND WORTHY PATRON'S REPORT.

Worthy Representatives :

Another year, with its cares and responsibilities, has rolled away, and we are again assembled in annual session.

The year just passed has not been marked by any very great gain; but we stand in a slightly better position than we did one year ago. One new section has been added to our number, and one resuscitated. The rest are doing fairly well. When we consider the many drawbacks we have to contend against, it is rather a surprise to us that we even hold our own; but that we have made any gain is almost

To the Grand Secretary belong the statistics of the Order, and to him I leave the figures and facts connected therewith. He will, without doubt, give you all the information in his possession.

The state of the Order and the condition of the several Sections, come more properly under my jurisdiction. The Deputies have, in some instances, withheld the information they should have placed in my possession-information necessary for you as well as myself.

I can speak personally of Acadia, No. 2. It is not in as good a condition as it ace was. No blame can be attached to the Worthy Patron or the Associate Patrons-they have labored incessantly for the Section; but the members have not responded as they should. The honorary members are much to blame for this state of affairs. Had they, or the active members, taken half the interest in the Section the Patrons did, the result would have been different.

Of Victoria, No. 13, Deputy H. Dore reports that they have not met as regularly during the hot weather as they usually do; otherwise the Section, in numbers, influence and finances, is in a good condition. Great praise is due the Worthy Patron, J. P. Smith, for the good position the Section holds.

I have no report from New Dominion.

Some dissension arose during the year among the members, and a few, having separated themselves, asked for a charter for a new Section. For reasons which will readily suggest themselves to the members of this body, it was not deemed advisable, in the interests of the Order, to grant one. I have reason to think the decision was acknowledged by most of the members interested to be a wise one.

A request was made from some of the brothers in New Brunswick for information necessary to form again a Grand Section in that Province. I regret we had not a red book we could spare them; whatever other information we could furnish we cheerfully did. You will rejoice with me to know that the Order is again looking up in that Province.

Your Executive were directed to memorialize the National Division, S. of T., to change the age of admission to that Order to sixteen years instead of fourteen, as at present. That body did not, in their wisdom, deem the change a wise one: and we must do as we have done in the past—strive to make our Order so attractive in itself as will induce youths to join it (where it is in existence) in preference to the older organizations, believing as we do that it offers more advantages

Your attention is called to the necessity for an addition to Article 5 of the Constitution, sub-sections "Duties of W. Patron," obliging him each quarter to give a report of the monies received and expended, with amount in hand belonging to the Section. No. 1.

If the Grand Officers were in a position to visit different portions of the Province, no doubt the Order of the Cadets might be strengthened, and Sections formed in many localities where they do not exist; or could the Grand Section send an agent through the Province for that purpose, we might expect good results. Unfortunately neither seems possible at present, and we can only work in our own localities and patiently wait. It would be disastrous to the cause of temperance if our Order should be allowed to die out.

I therefore urge you, brothers, by the recollections of the past, to use all the influence you possess to extend to others the benefits you have yourselves received. More particularly do I drige the honorary members to be more zealous in the work, not forgetting the advantages they have derived from their connection with their Sections.

To the Grand Worthy Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Section C. of T., of Nova Sectia, in annual session assembled:

WORTHY BROTHERS,—The official year which has just closed has been one which, in the history of our Order, has not been marked by any extraordinary

Since last session of this Grand Section the various Sections have moved quietly along, all doing their good work with more or less success; and on the whole the results of the year are somewhat encouraging.

MEMBERSHIP.

At our last annual session we had in working order four Sections. Since then one of our old Sections—viz: St. Andrew's, No. 7, of Pictou—has been reorganized, making five sections now in working order, with one hundred and seventy-seven (177) active, and sixty-three (63) honorary members—a total of two hundred and forty (240).

There is somewhat of a decrease in the active membership, owing chiefly to the fact that some of the Sections have been undergoing a pruning process—cutting off delinquent members—a process probably more profitable than otherwise.

I am also pleased to report that, within the last week, I have forwarded a charter and sett of ritual to Weymouth Bridge, Digby County, and have no doubt but that a section is now, or will in a day or two be established there. I have also been in correspondence with parties in Truro, and have strong hopes that a flourishing section will soon be established in that town.

To the W. P. and members of Chebucto and Mayflower Divisions:

Time with its rapid flight has added another year to the roll of our existence; and in submitting this, the twentieth annual report, the managers regret that it is not so favorable as that of last year, the membership at present being not much over three hundred as compared with four hundred reported last year. Several causes have contributed to this result, and not the least is the want of a suitable room to meet in. This want may exist for a time without serious seeming consequences, but cannot be continued from year to year without detrimental results. The matter has been brought to the botice of the Divisions, but so far without result. The managers have pledged hemselves to assist in every possible way, and have promised on behalf of the Band to subscribe \$250 towards a suitable hall. Another cause of the decline is the loss of one of the most esteemed and earnest managers—one who last year was reported as having become a bride with high hopes and bright anticipations of a happy future. Their hopes and anticipations have been blighted by the remorseful hand of death, and the flowers are blooming on the graye of her who this time last year was full of life and vicor.

are blooming on the grave of her who this time last year was full of life and vigor. In the demise of Mrs. Holloway the Order, as well as the band, has suffered an irreparable loss; but we must bow in submission to the will of Him who rules in the armies of heaven and among the children of men, gathering them home one by one. Brother Holloway, who has been the efficient secretary of the Band for several years, has thought fit to sever his connection with it—for a time at least. This has also contributed in a measure to the decreased membership.

The annual prizes for entertainment were presented at a regular meeting of the Band, the children very readily agreeing to forego their annual festival out of respect to their deceased manager and organist, whose death took place on the day before that which had been fixed for the entertainment.

The annual picnic was held this year at Prince's Lodge, on August 6th. The children, as usual, marched in procession to the boat, accompanied by the members of Acadia Section of Cadets, preceded by the band of the 66th Volunteers, to whom the managers are indebted for their services. The accommodation at the Lodge is not to be compared with that formerly had at McNab's Island. The day was fine and the excursion fairly successful, the receipts about balancing the expenses. The managers are again indebted to friends who so kindly assisted. They have, however, to regret that, owing to no fault of theirs, a number of their patrons were again left on one of the wharves while the steamer passed on, the person in charge of the boat refusing to call as advertised.

Only one entertainment was given during the year, realizing \$10.25 for the funds of the Band.

For many years the Grand Division of this Province, recognizing the great importance attached to the education of the young in the principles and practices of total abstinence, has taken a lively interest in the BAND of Hope movement, and for the more systematic prosecution of the work has had a standing committee.

on Inventile Organisations.

While much work has been done and much good accomplished, the committee feel that renewed and extended efforts are required in order to reap the full benefits of the movement, and now appeal to you strongly urging you, if you have a Band of Hope in connection with your Division, to take renewed interest in it; if you have had one and allowed it to go down, to resuscitate it; if you have never had a Band to take immediate steps to organize one; in all cases to encourage, by every means in your power, the education of the young in the principles of the Order. The children of to-day will be the men and women of a few year hence. If the Order is to be maintained and extended, the training of the young in temperance principles before they acquire the taste for intoxicants will be found one of the most efficient means.

As one means of inducing the members of the Bands to feel an interest in their organizations, the committee have prepared a suitable charter which will be issued free of charge to all Bands organized up to the present time. It is also the intention of the committee to number each Band according to the date of its organization. Divisions are requested to send the Grand Scribe the name and date of organization of any Bands now in existence, together with the names of the children who became members on the day of organization—the number not to exceed thirty-five, that their charter may be prepared without delay.

The reply to this address was made by P. M. W. P., General LOUIS WAGNER, of Pennsylvania, who, after thanking the brothers for their cordial welcome, briefly reviewed the progress of our cause since the dawn of the Order, and concluded with an invocation to all to press onward to the end, confident in the ultimate triumph of our principles.

Rev. Bro. Temple, Grand Scribe, then delivered an address of welcome on behalf of the Grand Division and the Order, and as a full synopsis of the address is to be found in the National Division Journal, it is meet that the same should be inserted here. Bro. Temple said:

Most Worthy Patriarch, Officers and Representatives:

In the name of the Order in this Province, I welcome the National Division of North America to Nova Scotia. Sixteen thousand Sons of Temperanee in this jurisdiction extend to you the hand of loving, fraternal greeting, and assure you of their loyal devotion to the National Division of North America, and their strong desire for the supremery of the greet principles which you advocate.

strong desire for the supremacy of the great principles which you advocate. It is a matter of satisfaction to us that you have come to sit in council in Halifax at a time when our Order is in the high tide of its prosperity in this province. The glad tidings of the recruited energy, and stately march of the cause of Temperance in other parts of the National Jurisdiction, and pre-eminently the heroic struggle for the adoption of the constitutional amendment in the United States, and the concentration of forces for pushing the adoption of the Scott Aet in the Western counties of this Dominion, have come to us like music in the air, and charmed us into new life. The outlook was never more promising than a present. The affirmation of the principle of Prohibition by the Dominion Parlisment, the legislation for the more effective enforcement of the Scott Aet, and the recent coming into force of the Licence Act of 1883, together with the decision of local Judges on Appeal cases, have aroused public interest and made Temperance a "live question." The voice of the pulpit, the utterances of Ecclesiastical assemblies, and the powerful advocacy of the press, have been taking hold of public opinion and shaping it in the mould of Temperance and Prohibition. The unusual activity of Temperance organizations has been rewarded with unlooked for Southern Scotta is to-day ready, with harness on and lance in rest, waiting for the hour and the blast of the bugle to make a final and triumphant charge on the foe, and cast a decisive and jublant vote for total prohibition.

Twenty-one years have rolled round since last the National Division assembled in Halifax. Since that day our Order, which was then young, has come of age. Our membership has grown from four thousand to sixteen thousand, and our Divisions have increased from one hundred to two hundred and eighty. The rank and file of our Divisions are of warrior blood, and with honest heart and loving purpose will work for the good of mankind, not halting from weariness, nor deterred by ingratitude, nor palsied with fear. The age of chivalry is not over. Our work is too serious for mimic 'pageants and holiday reviews. We war for the rescue of our country from the inexorable bondage of wrong.

We have flowers for the graves of those who have gone to their rest. And for those who are with us to-day, and have come with dinted sword and battered shield and helmet from many a well-fought field, we have a heart-felt welcome. We yield them the tribute of our admiration for the consistency that has never qualied, and a wealth of affection for the good which they have done. We welcome our brethren from that great country, which, under the smile of Divine Providence—and Great Britain—has become one of the most enlightened and progressive nations on the face of the earth. It is proper that you should pay your respects to the little peninsula that has stood for ages as a sentinel at the mouth of the great Saint Lawrence, and turns from your shores the gigantic ice-bergs that annually come down from the North. It will be instructive for you to look upon a country that can live and be happy without the luxury of a freidential election. It will be a pleasure to you to know that every eighth inhabitant you meet is pledged to total abstinence, and in twelve counties out of eighteen practical prohibition is in operation. You have come to us in force, but we acquit you of any deliberate intention to annex this country. We assure you of a free passport through our city and our frowning cliadel, and exempt you from all impertinent questionings by zealous officials, who have a keen scent for dynamite and missing teaspoons.

May Heaven bless you, our fellow-workers in this great cause! You are winning honors in a higher aristocracy than that of belted earl. All honor to your noble country, the birth-place of our Order! All honor to the "hundred-harbored" State, which originated the Maine Law, and flinging its banner to the breeze, with the proud inscription, "Dirigo," invited the world to follow. And in the long aftertime when our Order shall have grown old, and shall have fought its last battle, and sheathed its sword amid shouts of victory, may your country and ours still stand side by side, "chartered among the nations as the home of those-principles of right and freedom which shall herald and welcome the coming of the Son of Man."

Our principles are so universally disseminated in this province that I hesitate to refer to them, but a brief summary may not be

By moral and Christian effort we seek to reclaim the inebriate, arrest the moderate drinker in his downward career, and save the young from the pitfalls of intermography.

We have enrolled under our banner the ripe experience of age, the judgment and firmness of middle life, and the enthusiasm of youth, all laboring in the same holy effort to advance the welfare of our common humanity, and to ameliorate the condition of our suffering fellow-men.

We hake our Order attractive by impressive ceremonies, and a solemn obligation to lives of purity, sobriety and nobility of character. We perform no unmeaning ritualistic service, no pagan rites; as pioneers of the grand host that is marshalling to overthrow the gigantic wrong of intemperance, we claim front rank.

Our deeds of valor have not been wrought on bloody battle-fields; but by the magic, silent influence of love we make homes happy that were once desolate; we elevate the standard of truth, of righteousness and peace; we bring to the discussion of the great problem, intelligence, patriotism and true heroism.

All classes in society are connected with our fraternity; the religious and sectarian opinions of our members we leave with their conscience and their God; neither do we dictate partizan action in political matters.

As I listened to the sweet music of the "Bands of Hope," I thought, what a force is this, that is now being called into action. It is the grand reserve for the next generation. Welcome, then, thrice welcome Bands of Hope and Cadets of Temperance!

Pliny relates the story of raising an obelisk. The stone was to stand ninety-nine feet in height, twenty thousand workmen were to pull at the ropes and work the hoisting apparatus. There was to be great responsibility and risk. To insure carefulness and skill the king resorted to a singular expedient. He ordered the son of the engineer to be bound to the apex of the monument in such a way that his safety could be secured only by its successful erection.

The kingdom of Christ in our homes and churches is a spiritual monument, founded on the rock of Divine power and purpose, rising through generation after generation to bear its top stone to the highest heaven.

Our sons are bound to this obelisk, our children will share the fate controlled by our fidelity. We cannot escape this issue. In our own homes, in the homes of our neighbors, are growing up those who will bring joy or sorrow to our later years. If we could see this, as in those olden days the engineer saw the possible fate of his boy, what alertness, what zeal, what fidelity should we display. None lively or dieth to himself. Our failure in duty will involve those we hold most dear.

Twenty-one years ago a voice, now silent in the grave, welcomed the National Division, to this city by the sea—to Nova Scotia. It was a royal welcome never to be forgotten by those receiving it. It was an hour of joy, an hour of sadness; one fourth of the membership of the Order in the loyal North and West in the Republic was enlisted in a terrible conflict. Civil war, relentless and cruel, was raging in the States.

Sons of Temperance met on bloody battle fields. Brave, heroic O'Neall, whose expiring breath was a prayer for the success of the army of freedom. Dearly be loved Townsend and others in the sunny South land never forgot the grand old Order and its annual re-unions in all of those dark days. At last the crimson tide of war was stayed by the triumph of the principles of freedom and the emancipation of a race.

Peace, sweet peace, reigns over all our broad domain, and with the triumph of our cause will be ushered in the day when "the swords shall be beat into plough shares, and the spears into pruning hooks, and the nations learn war no more."

This is the age of progress. In the moral contest we are waging there can be no fears as to the final issue. We are determined to storm the citadel of intemperance by moral and legal means, till it shall crumble and fall to the earth. We will wage this war till the white flag of total abstinence shall float over the two great English speaking peoples, and the principles of prohibition shall be the organic law of both nations.

We come to receive your welcome as citizens of the Great Republic, whose flag we love, as subjects of Her Majesty, residents of neighboring provinces, intimately connected by ties of blood and friendship, and as members of our beloved fraternity. I can but express to you, as representative of the American nation, attachment to Her Majesty, admiration for her domestic virtues, and respect for her as the ruler of our mother country. Under the emblems of two great nations, we, to-night, renew our obligations to our time-honored Order. Again thanking you for this reception, I sincerely hope that our stay in your midst will be to you a source of pleasant recollections, no less than to us.

I have heard the story; that one of the stones cut for Solomon's temple, being of curious and peculiar shape, seemed to have no place in the building. It was tried in one place and another, and then thrown aside. During the years the temple was building the discarded stone became moss-covered and was the laughing stock of the workmen. But when the temple was almost completed, inquiry was made for the top stone, the crowning beauty of the whole. And it was found in the despised and neglected stone, and they raised it to its place amid shouts of joy. So was it with Christ, "the stone which the builders rejected:" So will it be with His principles and doctrines.

The greatest heroes are not found on historic battle grounds, and true martyrs are crucified on unnoticed crosses. But crowns and white robes will be awarded at last to those who have followed their Master "even unto the end."

The space thus far occupied in this record, so far exceeds that which perhaps ought to be occupied, that a mere mention of the other participants in the proceedings is all that will be allowable. The other speakers were Edward Crummey, of New York; Rev. E. E. Caster, of Michigan; C. A. Everett, of New Brunswick; and F. M. Bradley, of District of Columbia. Bro. W. E. McDonough, of New York, sang "Men of Thought," and "The Old Oaken Bucket." Mrs. G. L. Sanford, of Connecticut, delivered an effective recitation, and the Band of Hope sang their pledge. The same juvenile choristers closed a very successful meeting with a verse of "America" and "God save the Queen."

On the afternoon of the 10th, the members were grouped at the western front of the Province Building, and were there photographed by Mr. Ray, of the Halifax Photographic Company.

The next public event was the monster meeting in the Park Street No. 1. [199]

Rink, when P. M. W. P., SAMUEL F. CARY, of Ohio, read an historical sketch of the forty years' life of the Order. Over three thousand people were present. A sub-committee from the General Reception Committee had worked hard to make all necessary arrangements, and had succeeded so well, that there was not the slightest "hitch." The large audience patiently listened to the details, and those who were not directly interested in the proverbially dry statistics were afterwards rewarded by one of the veteran General's most eloquent and effective extempore addresses, which all felt more than repaid them for their long wait.

The newly-elected Most Worthy Patriarch, Bro. B. F. Dennisson, spoke briefly, and Bro. Macdonough again sang the "Old Oaken Bucket." The 63rd Rifles Band, engaged by the committee, played selections during the evening, and the thousands who attended, went away satisfied that the Sons had given them a treat rarely enjayed.

The session of the National Division was brought to a close on the afternoon of the 11th, when a farewell ode, written by the gentleman who composed the ode of welcome, was read as under, and well received:

Our conference ended, friends, we part, And, parting, fain would keep The kindly thoughts that in each heart Have found a lodgment deep.

Together we have talked and planned, And, aiming still at good, Have wrought united, heart and hand, A willing brotherhood.

The Sons of Temperance National Mutual Relief Society was organized June 25, 1879, by a commission of nine members of the National Division, appointed by the M. W. P. Its object is to strengthen and perpetuate the Order of Sons of Temperance. It is divided into three classes. The insurance is as follows:—

In Class A		 	 		\$ 500
In Class B.	 	 	 	- 1	1000
In Class C		 	 		 2000

Until the classes are full the insurance is one dollar for each member of the class. Any member of the Order between the ages of eighteen and sixty years is eligible to any of these classes.

The assessments are graded according to age at the time of joining the society, and are not increased with advancing years.

The society is co-extensive with the jurisdiction of the National Division, hence no local epidemic can affect its stability.

Since the organization of the Relief Society we have collected assessments on sixteen deaths in class B, and twenty in class C, and have paid to the heirs of deceased members \$21.568.00.

deceased members \$21,568,00.

The net gain in membership for the past year is thirty per cent. One hundred and thirty members of the National Division are members of the Relief Society. No representative to the National Division who has joined the Relief Society has yet died.

During the past year we have aided the officers of the National Division in their propagation work, and in the future we shall continue to do this more effectively. The Relief feature will largely increase our force of workers and organizers.

Our admission fee is small.

We have no quarterly or annual dues. Our assessments are equitably graded.

We pay no death claims caused by drink.

We fulfil all promises.

We claim that for safety, simplicity, economy, and promptness, we are excelled by none and equalled by few.

We insure only Sons of Temperance. The Executive officers of the various Grand Divisions should therefore give us their hearty co-operation. Our success is theirs.

We invite all temperance workers and organizers to correspond with our General Secretary. In connection with M. W. P. and M. W. Scribe of the Order, we wish to arrange for organizers throughout North America. Live, active men and women will be paid for their work.

The success of the Relief Society wil give additional popularity and permanence to the Order.

We want a soliciting agent in every Division in the States and Provinces.

COST OF MEMBERSHIP.

We do not need large admission fees, and no charge is made for Beneficiary Certificates. Other societies charge you from five to ten dollars admission fee. Our fees are as follows:

Furthe No. 1. thousand dollars must pay on every death, whether the deceased is insured for \$500, \$1000 or \$2000.

The treasury of each class is separate and distinct. As each class has its own members and its own deaths, it has also its own expenses and its own treasury. In keeping the accounts of the classes seperate, we have the only equitable plan

of giving different amounts of insurance in the same society.

When a death occurs the assessment card is sent directly to each member from the main office, and all remittances are forwarded to the General Secretary, who returns a receipted card. This is simple and easily understood by all.

There is no divided responsibility in the handling of assessments. The Relief Society is managed by a Board of Government consisting of fifteen of the prominent members of the National Division. The most Worthy Patriarch, three Past Worthy Patriarch and the Most Worthy Treasurer are now members of the Board. These gentlemen are chosen because of their business qualifications and their general fitness for the work.
