



With the slogan "Greater Production is a Word Necessity" and under the caption. "Every girl or young woman should be engaged in some useful occupation," the argument reads:

"The entire world is calling for goods of all kinds—things that are manufactured by machinery in factories. Most everybody is behind in orders. Everybody must catch up! One way to accomplish this



and the employe, between labor and capital. As one notes developments in England, in the United States and in Canada, the conviction is forced upon us that things will inevitably be worse before they are better. That is not pessimism. It is an honest realization of conditions as they are.

Today the worker is looking for higher and still higher wages. Truth to say, he has a hard row to hoe. The employer resist the rapid upward trend, and strikes and lockouts are the logical outcome. ## FOOTWEAR PRICES ARE TOO HIGH

Says Col. Price Before Board of Commerce.

JOBERS HAVE BIG SURPLUS WOMEN WANT EXTRAVAGANT STYLES

"Excessive profits," to quote "That Man O'Connor," were revealed in a probe of the boot and shoe business, before the Board of Commerce at

prope of the boot and shoe business before the Board of Commerce a Toronto.

An illuminating statement on the business was made by Col. W. H. Price, who has been looking into the matter for the board. His examination lasted for two days, and embraced five manufactures, twelve retailers and four jobbers. This was supplemented by answers to certain questions since. After explaining how the manufactures fix their prices (on estimates made several months before the shoes are sold Col. Price told the board that prices of various materials have been going up at an alarming rate. Prices of uppers, for instance, had risen by 127 per. cent. between 1913 and 1919 the rise had been 338 per cent. Sole leather had increased by 177 per cent since 1913 while findings had advanced by 109 per cent. Labor costs also had risen sharply, the advance since 1913 amounting to one hundred per, cent.

Some Lose Money.

The Colonel went on to say that, while the production in 1913 was three times as great as now, the turnover, in dollars and cents, was just as great today as six years ago. The evidence showed that the manufactures figured on 25 per cent. gross profit on sales prices. Some of the smaller concerns lost money last spring.

Dealing with the question of hides the Colonel said the market was under the control of the United States firms and that Canadian manufacturers were rationed in kid by New York and Philadelphia houses. Discussing the increase in prices, he hought investigation of the business of tanning, leather-manufacturing and jobbing would be necessary to ascertain whether the manufacturinger of boots and shoes was making too much profit. As to the jobbers, the speaker said they were making a profit of twenty per cent, fifteen from thre manufacturer and five from the consumer. One lobber on a turnover of \$336,000 in 1917, made a gross profit of \$79,000 and the profit of \$17,000. 





## STRONG SPIRITS LOCKED UP AND 200 GO TO TRIAL

If New Licenses Refused, Montreal May Go Bone-Dry.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—As a result of raids made here by provincial law officers the Inland Revenue department vaults of Montreal are stocked to capacity with \$40,000 worth of spirits of liquor and over 200 alleged violators will have to stand trial before the license commission on Monday charged with selling the prohibited "booze."

That Montreal will be bone-dry of its own making, in the near future is the opinion of the prohibition law officers, if they secure convictions in the cases they now have entered against proprieters of hotels and cafes. This depends upon the license commissioners who may or may not grant new licenses to prospective vendors of light wines and beers desirous of taking the places of houses condemned by the license commissioners.
