Chiefly among these articles are horses, fat stock, barley, eggs, etc. We would also further say that we hope the time will come when the barriers of high tariff shall be broken down and trampled under foot, and we think that it would be a time for great rejoicing among the farmers.

There were present: Trustee Stephenson (chairman), Cook, McRobert, Craig, Turner, Love, Durdin, Ferguson, Childs, Johnston, Allister, Tanton, Brady, McElheran, Jeffers, Yates, Principal Merchant and Secretary Abbott.

COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE REQUIREMENTS. 1'rincipal Merchant's monthly report showed 352 pupils on the roll from the city, 37 from the county and 1 from outside counties, making a total of 390, the average being 358. He suggested that measures be taken to notify parents of pupils' absence in order to secure a better attendance. As to the equipment for chemical and physical apparati, he found fair provision for the former but the physical was very poor. It would require \$800 or \$900 to put it on a fair basis such as Parkdale and other schools. The gymnasium should be equipped with light gymnastics in the shape of Indian clubs and dumb-bells—he thought such preferable to heavy gymnastics. Supplies should be furnished, such as record books for the teachers by which he might obtain an idea of their work, and also stationery to send parents as notification of their children's absence.

Some discussion arose over the report, Trustee Jeffers speaking strongly on the subject of truancy and suggesting the necessity of preventing it. He had heard Principal Merchant express the cipinion that there were more absent in one day from the Institute here than there would be in a year at Stratford.

Principal Merchant admitted that the

Principal Merchant admitted that the statement was within bounds. He did not attribute it to truancy, but thought parents should be more rigorous in seeing their children attend. To send them a monthly report of their attendance would be helpful.

Trustee Love moved that Mr. Merchant's recommendations be referred to No. 1 excepting as regarded the gymnasium which should go to No. 2. Carried.

Trustee Jeffers, seconded by Trustee Yates, moved that the principal in his monthly report include the names of the all absentees. Carried.





THE C. P. R. BONUS. HOFFMAN'S C Sick Headache. perintendent Tait Explains What a Divisional Point Is—The Committee Recommend the Payment of

the Bonus. the Bonus.

The Finance Committee met Tuesday afternoon and talked with Superintendent Thomas Tait, of the C. P. R., respecting the payment of the bonus of \$25,000 to the C. P. R. Company, as agreed upon when the road was constructed. The wording of the bylwaw was somewhat ambiguous, many of the citizens being of the opinion that the Railroad Company was going to make London its divisional headquarters, and also erect car shops.

that the Railroad Company was going to make London its divisional headquarters, and also erect car shops.

Superintendent Tait's interpretation of it was that the company agreed simply to make London its divisional point between Toronto and the Detroit River.

The company would by this endeavor as much as possible to change all the train crews in this city excepting on some of the through trains. There would be no carshops, but the company would build a machine shop 40x80 for the convenience of the car repairers and other workmen commonly attached to a divisional point. The number of people that the move would insure London would amount to something like 200 families or more as the business of the road increased, but the company would not submit to be bound to guarantee any number.

The committee then passed a resolution recommending that the money be placed to the credit of the company and authorized the city solicitor to draw up an agreement in accordance with the superintendent's interpretation of the hylaw, the same to guarantee that the divisional point be permanent, and in default of which the penalty will be forfeiture.

The C. P. R. Company will proceed with the erection of the machine shop immedi-

The C. P. R. Company will proceed with the erection of the machine shop immediately, and as soon as the difficulty of disposing of the Carling Creek is adjusted the station will be erected.

Ossian and Simon Magnus were bought in England by William Easton, \$10,000 having been paid, it is said, for the former. Ossian was purchased for J. B. Ferguson, for his stud farm near Lexington, Ky. He was by Salvator, out of Music, and was bred by the Duke of Hamilton in 1880. As a 3-year-old Ossian took part in fourteen races, of which he won six, was second twice and third three times. Early in the season he was unplaced, but at the Goodwood meeting he won the Sussex stakes, 1,037 sovereigns. At the York August meeting he took first place for the great Yorkshire stakes, and then went to Doncaster for the St. Leger, which he won from Chiehlurst, second, and Highland Chief, third. What the People Have to Pay Under Combine Rule.

"Retail Grocer" writes: Now that a Dominion election is at hand there is one very important matter which you do not half enough talk up in your papers, nor do those who have been lecturing on the Reform ticket for the last two or three months, and that is the sugar monopoly; and sugar is a thing which enters largely into every man's house or family, be he poor or rich, and as a matter of course they are interested in getting it as cheap as possible. After the Hon. Alexander Mackensie went out of power the first thing that Sir John Macdonald's Government did was to raise the duty on imported to compete with the sugar refiners here. After having given them a complete monopoly of the whole business and power to charge whatever price they chose to, the refiners commenced making a very inferior article, particularly in what is called yellow refined sugar, and which is most generally used, and with the exception of their No. I brand (which is not altogether what it ought to be, either) is horrible stuff, not at all like what they used to make when the duty admitted of competition, and whole sale dealers to import. They take advantage of their position to make trash and charge a big price for it. I think every retail dealer can testify what a slow, tedious, horrible job it is to take it out of the barrels into drawers ready to retail out. It is just like taking out tough, damp, blue clay. I am a retail dealer of the article, and there is no job I go at I so much dislike. Since this monopoly came into existence I think we pay about 100 per cent. mere for sugar than we ought to do if we had an honest Government. When in the old country last summer I saw excellent yellow refined sugar retail at 14d per pound, and the very best for 2d per pound, which have to be retailed here for 2d per pound, which is retailed here for 8c or 9c by the single pound. So it is evident we pay here very much more than we ought to if our refiners were not so highly protected by our Government.



Speaking of this question on Saturday evening, he said: "I am not a politician and de not wish to mix myself in political discussions here; but I cannot help seeing that unrestricted reciprocity with the United States would be a grand thing for Ottawa and the St. Lawrence Valley. It would help our railways, because the traffic between the two countries would be enormously increased. All talk of nartial reciprocity is our railways, because the traffic between the two countries would be enormously increased. All talk of partial reciprocity is useless. The Americans will not listen to it. Look at the immense water powers on the St. Lawrence River, which practically separates the two countries, and the power on the Ottawa and its tributaries! If the restrictions upon trade between Canada and the United States were wiped out millions of capital would be invested in utilizing these water powers to run mills and factories. Capital would also be available for the development of the iron and other mineral deposits around here. Unrestricted reciprocity would greatly increase the value of

procity would greatly increase the value of every lumber mill and every sort of prop-erty in and around Ottawa. Any business man can see that." man can see that."

The Derouto Mail, editorially, talks out on the "old flag" yarns of the high tax apologists in this strain: It was expected that the old flag would be appealed to on behalf of the Administration at some period

during the present dramatic campaign; bu no one who regards Sir John Macdonald during the present dramatic campaign; but no one who regards Sir John Macdonald as an astute statesman would have cared to predict that he himself would rush forward, as he does in his manifesto, covering himself in the ample folds of the Union Jack and shouting treason at all who differ from him. The treason cry is a feature of the contest which really should have been left to the screaming sisterhood of partisan organs. Coming from the leader of the party it is apt, urless, indeed, there is very substantial ground for it, to convey the impression to the cooler heads that there is some bad feature of the situation which it has been deemed advisable to cover in a storm of patriotic passion. That there is ground for the charge of veiled treason has yet to be proven. Were the Opposition plotting the overthrow of the monarchy, and were the plot discovered, then good reasons for the accusation would present itself. But so far as can be seen the Opposition is simply asking for a broad measure of reciprocal trade with another country. Now, reciprocal trade, broad or narrow, is not necesserily treasonable. If it were, the gentlemen at Ottawa, who have already proposed to return to the treaty of 1854 with "modifications" and "extensions," would be a nest of traitors. In fact there must be treason all round, only Sir John and his colleagues are treasonable in but a few articles, whereas Mr. Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwright are treasonable in all. But the lesson of the campaign of 1878 teaches very forcibly that the treason cry when raised for a party purpose, and when based upon insufficient evidence, has very few terrors for Canada. The people here are loyal to the Queen and loyal to the institutions of the land but

when it comes to a question of commercial policy they fail altogether to detect the avenue through which treason can lift its horrid head.


