The Police Took the "Pot."

VIENNA, Jan. 8.—The police last evening made a raid upon the Jockey Club on suspicion that illegal games were being played in its rooms. The card rooms were crowded at the time with the elite of the aristocratic and diplomatic circles of Vienna and large sums of money were at stake. The police seized 450,000 florins and checks and took the names of those present for future action. The Prince de Montenuevo, president of the Jockey Club, hastened to the offices of the Ministry of Justice to protest. The prince was informed that the Emperor himself had especially sanctioned the raid, whereupon the prince promised that gambling should cease at the club.

The Situation in Paris.

PARIS, Jan. 9 .- The Government prepartions to suppress disorder in Paris are not based upon any apprehension of a Royalist outbreak, but upon attempts of the Extreme Socialists to arouse an insurrection. The Government does not view even the Socialist movement with serious apprehension, and is confident of its ability to maintain order. The mob of Paris no longer possesses the formidable character which it exhibited in the days of the Commune and 1849. The police could paralyze an Extreme Socialist demonstration at any moment by putting their hands upon the leaders, but it is thought best to wait for some open act of lawlessness before taking such a decisive course. rection. Disastrous Ice Shove in the Ohio at Cincinnati.

A Ponderous Aggregation of Power Several Boats Sent to the Bottom of the River-Loss \$300,000.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 8 .- At 2 o'dock CINGINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 8.—At 2 o'dock this afternoon the ice gorge began to move slowly, at first fracturing its icy body with detonations like the sound of muskerry. Crunching and grinding the shores, crashing against the great stone piers of the monster bridges, on it went, increasing its speed every minute.

Nineteen steamers and 100 coal barges, empty or loaded, at the landing had but two or three inches of oak plank to present to this ponderous aggregation of power. Every man was at his post on the steamers.

steamers and the wharf boats to their moorings were parted, and as often skilled hands repaired them.

The two bridges above the public landing broke the ice somewhat and prevented the otherwise inevitable destruction of every boat. By 9 o'clock to-night all apparent danger to the steamers at the landing was over. The gorge had passed and the river was comparatively clear. One tow boat, the Matthewson, valued at \$10,000, was destroyed.

Down below the destruction of coal barges and other property, from accounts at 10 p.m., has been terrible. Three harbor towboats were working heroically to break the ice and save property. The gorge that moved past Cincinnati extended from Coney Island, above the mouth of the Little Miami, to below Anderson's ferry, a distance of nearly eighteen miles. For ten miles below this the water was clear and open. Then came another gorge, beginning at the mouth of the Great Miami and extending below Lawrenceburg. This lower gorge was about five miles long. It is impossible to get perfect details tonight, but here is the nearest approximation of the destruction of coal fleets: Forty-five loaded barges, worth \$4,000 each, \$180,000; 60 empty barges, worth \$2,000 each, \$120,000; grand total, \$300,000. This includes the boats that were carried away on Friday. Not one cent of insurance is held on any of this property. The three hartor towboats, Comet, Benwood and Alice Barr, were heard from at 10 o'clock to-night. They are safe and are working heroically to save property.

When Queen Victoria dies, her mortal remains will rest in the gray granite sarcophagus with the late lamented Irince Albert's ashes, at the Frogmore mausoleum at Windsor. Underneath the arms of the Queen and Prince Albert, on the monument is inscribed 'Farawell, well helyed. Here is inscribed "Farewell, well beloved. Here at last I will rise again." The white marble recumbent statue of the Prince Consort is in the uniform of a field marshall, wearing the mantle of the Order of the Garter. This is on the right. The left side of the lid and the unoccupied space is where Queen Victoria's body will be laid. CHEAP LODGINGS FOR HOMELESS LONDONERS.
Twelve lundred beds at a penny a night each are offered to London's homeless poor in a new Salvation Army shelter erected on the bank of the Thames near Blackfairs Bridge. A shelter with 400 beds was opened a year ago, mainly to "clear the embankment of its destitute," but this was always more than crowded, with dozens of applicants for beds turned away nightly. THE AUSTRIAN DUELLING LAW. THE AUSTRIAN DUELLING LAW.
Some changes have just been made in the
Austrian law in duelling. The punishment for duelling is always to be imprisonment for duelling is always to be imprison-ment. The maximum penalty for a duel fought out without fatal result is two years' imprisonment; for a duel fought without seconds or witnesses ten years, and for killing an opponent fifteen years. Seconds, doctors, and witnesses are not liable to punishment.

DEPRESSION IN BRITISH SHIPPING.
The extreme depression into which the shipping industry of England and the continent has fallen is shown by a startling array of statistics just made public. There are numbers of idle steamers in every port in the kingdom. On the Tyne alone there are 150 laid up, with a total tonnage of 350,000. Seventeen vessels are laid up at London. At Liverpool there are 156 steamers idle, with a total tonnage of 159,000. The total number of vessels laid up in English and Scotch ports is 479, and the total tonnage 856,000. Besides these there are laid up in continental ports 99 steamers lied up in continental ports 99 steamers.

total connage 856,000. Besides these there are laid up in continental ports 99 steam-ors, with a total tonnage of 100,000. As a result there are 5,000 men idle, which means a loss of £50,000 in wages monthly.

ANTIQUATED, WITHOUT DOUBT Even if the Dominion voters' lists were ompleted in East Elgin in December, 1891, as the St. Thomas Times asserts, does not that prove that they are decidedly antiquated? Before a man could get on the lists last fall, unless his name was "stuffed" on the lists by unscrupulous manipulators, proof had to be given that he had lived in Canada for twelve months previously. We thank our contemporary for reviving this question of defective and antiquated voters' lists. It enables us once again to urge the necessity for making a radical, a democratic change, in the compiling of the lists. The lists should be made up by competent, non-partisan officers a few weeks before an election, and the time of prior residence required should be not more than six months. They would thus obtain a quality of lean and nutritious flesh much superior to the lardy bacons which come in from foreign countries where Indian corn is the staple and almost the only food." This is, in my humble judgment, a capital suggestion, especially just now when the farming interest in the old country is so sorely depressed. I have no doubt Prof. Robertson's hint will be gratefully followed up.

For instance, in the county of Kent, where I reside (the garden of England), Mr. John Potter, a journeyman papermaker at a mill in Maidstone, has been placed upon the commission of the peace. He is the first workingman in Kent yet raised to the bench. At Shrewsbury a journeyman tailor, at Coventry a mechanic, at Leicester a foreman in a boot and shoe manufactory. One highly-scandalized Tory protested indignantly at this clevation of artisans to the magistracy, but received for answer the scathing repariee: "Well, sir, what is it you want on the bench—brass or brains?"

PUTTING UP THE BARS.

Measures for Restricting Emigration Introduced in the U. S. Congross.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—Mr. Hare, from the committee on immigration, reported to the House yesterday, with the recommendation that it pass, the bill introduced by Senator Chandler, and passed by the Senate in July last, to facilitate the enforcement of the immigration and contract labor laws of the United States. In addition to conforming to the present requirements of the law, vessel owners are requested to furnish to inspectors of immigration a manifest prepared at the port of departure showing the age, sex, place of residence and previous history, and other information that will disclose the character of the intended immigrant. The House committee amended the measure so as to exclude persons physically imperfect, blind, crippled or unable to perform manual labor or likely to become a public charge; also persons belonging to societies or organizations which sanction or justify the unlawful destruction of life or property.

Mr. Chandler in reporting the bill to the Senate stated that it was only preliminary to a further bill which he expected for report, and which would reduce to a minimum the number of immigrants departing from foreign shores to the United States who are not entitled to admission.

PLUNGED THROUGH THE GATE. Unmanageable Street Car Horses Dash in Front of a Train—The Driver Killed—Miraculeus Escape of the Passengers.

How the Vote of the Electoral College Will Stand.

Dissatisfaction With Its Cumbrous Machinery Expressed.

Michigan Democrats Have a Say for the First Time in 40 Years.

Washington, Jan. 8.—It is now definitely known that the electoral college will cast 276 votes for Grover Cleveland, of New York; 144 for Benjamin Harrison, of Indian, and 24 for James B. Weaver, of Iowa. One curious and unprecedented fact is that in four consecutive Presidential elections some one of these candidates has received popular votes. This is the first electoral college since 1860 in which the candidate of a third party has received electoral votes. Cleveland's plurality in the electoral college is one of the largest ever given a candidate for President in the history of the country. It is also a remarkable electoral college in another respect. The electoral vote in Michigan, Ohio, California and Oregon will be divided. The State electors meet to-morrow, and will declare the result. Then messengers come on to Washington with the official returns from the different State capitals.

A CUMBROUS MACHINE.

Public dissatisfaction with the antiquated machinery of the electoral college is evidently on the increare. It has frequently happened that by the operation of this machinery a candidate was inducted into the Presidency who in fact received a large minority of the popular vote. The arguments in behalf of this anomaly are well known, but they are decidedly musty, and have less and less influence on the body politic. The idea that the people of this country cannot be trusted to choose a President for themselves is growing steadily in unpopularity. Michigan has already hicked ever the traces in this master, and will be represented with approximate fairness in the electoral college this year for the first time.

Besides this you have to pay to the concierge upon signing the lease \$4 or more as a tip. Add to this \$40 for extras. The next number on the programme is to furnish your apartments, and furniture in Paris is more expensive than in the States and not so good. In the medium line they have much poorly-made goods, but if you buy the finest the finish and make are superior to the furniture made in America. Your apartment has no cupboard or closet, as taxes are leviced for each of them when made in the wall, and as well the number of windows. You are obliged to furnish your kitchen and sleeping rooms with the movable presses or wardrobes. The only advantage over our country in the saving of dollars is in the way of a cooking stove; they are built with the numbes and cannot be removed; they C. M. At midnight Mr. Blaine's physician issued the following bulletin: "Mr. Blaine's condition has been more favorable this afternoon. He is now at midnight sleeping quietly and shows a fair degree of strength. The probabilities are that no change for the worse will take place tonight, although no positive assurance can be given on this point. As compared with last night and this morning, he is better."

USED A LOADED PEA. New York Entchers the Victims of a

New York Entchers the Victims of a Nevol Ewindie.

New York, Jan. 8.—A number of the big butchers in this city have just discovered that they have been systematically swindled for a period of ten years. One of the private detectives who has been working up the case for them says that the great butchering and abattoir establishments have within the period named been defrauded to the extent of millions of dollars. The detective asserts that "the nimble pea" which has figured in this attack on their purses and their substance is not exactly the pea of the man with the three walnut shells who is a familiar figure at country fairs, but the pea of commerce—the little iron balance that hangs on the short arm of the beam used by butchers in weighing all their wares.

This old-fashioned and simple contrivance for weighing, which was invented possibly thousands of years before the Christian era, has always been supposed to be incorruptible. It remained for a New York swindling genius to discover some means of making this old contrivance a hollow mockery.

It remained for a New York swindling genius to discover some means of making this old contrivance a hollow-mockery. This figure of speech is not exactly accurate in describing the pea, because, while the pea should be hollow, it is plugged with lead so as to consummate the swindle. The swindle has been carried on by the buyers of the refuse fat procured from the wholesale butchers. The most of them carry on an immense business. Some employ as many as 20 or 30 big wagons, which make daily rounds of the large butchering establishments with which they have contracts. The fat trimmings that are cut off from the carcasses of the butchered food animals are piled up during the night and await the coming of the fat wagons. Strange as it may seem, the weighing of this fat is usually left to the purchaser, who carries his weighing beams in the wagon, and as each lot is weighed it is thrown on to the wagon and checked off on an account book by a clerk.

Now comes the operation of the swindle. The investigation of the detectives shows that the drivers of many of these wagons carry duplicate scales—one set bearing the stamp of the official sealer of weights and measures, and another set to which is attached the loaded pea. The carrying of both is a precautionary measure, so that if an inspector should demand a sight of the scales at any time those bearing the official stamp could be exhibited. The beam controlled by the loaded pea has been the one almost invariably used in the cases investigated. The official pea weighs four pounds and is hollowed out at the bottom. The Winter Assizes for the county of Middlesex opened before Mr. Justice MacMahon at 1:30 this afternoon. Mr. Henderson, of Toronto, is court stenographer. John Morgan was chosen foreman of the grand jury.

In charging the grand jury his Lordship said he was pleased to see such a large number of those summoned on the grand inquest present. It was fortunate that in every county assize courts were held at least twice a year, and in some cases three times. While congratulating the jury and the county at large on the small amount of crime, his Lordship regretted that they were called upon to look into a case of the most sorious offense against the law — that of murder. The late Detective Harry Phair, with whose murder the prisoners, Burke and Wilson, were charged, had been a member of the city police force for a number of years. Had he seen Burke in the act of indecently exposing his person or had he seen him acting in a disorderly manner he had a perfect right to arrest him. In the indictment appeared the words "malice aforethought." This did not mean premeditation, but intention. Unless Detective Phair saw Burke conducting himself improperly and thus violating the law, he had no right to arrest him without having a warrant for such arrests.

Before beginning his regular discourse he defined his own position with regard to the United Labor party and the Anti-Poverty Society. "On last Sunday ovening," he said, "to meet a reasonable expectation, I read a statement of the doctrines of the United Labor party platform and of the Anti-Poverty Society, my teaching of which doctrines had led to the series of events so happily terminated by the removal from me of ecclealastical consures. I have official letters of the apostolic delegate, signed by his hand and attested by his seal, declaring the removal of the ecclesiastical consures, and, moreover, commending mo to the hishops everywhere that I may be permitted in their respective dioceses to celebrate mass. My representative, moreover, was informed by the apostolic delegate that he knew of several archbishops and bishops who would be pleased to have me in their diocese. I have received an invitation from a venerable prelate to visit him and deliver a course of lectures in his cathedral. I am content, and prefer for the present to remain as I am, saying mass every morning and fulfilling my literary and lecture engagements. Business has also transpired in under grades at 10½ c to 10½, and altogether about 5,000 boxes have been placed in a quiet, unassuming way during the past week. A straight bid of 10½ c was refused for a lot of 1,000 boxes of June and July goods, which demonstrates some anxiety on the part of English houses to possess under grades. English markets are very strong, and we look for an advance in the cable, despite the desperate efforts that have been successfully made of late in keeping the quotation 2s to 3s below actual sales in the Liverpool market. An undertone of excitement is evidently at work beneath the strength that has recently come to the surface, and English buyers are apparently trying to secure all the stocks on this side without showing their anxious hand if they can help it. 
