The Irish Land Tenure Bill.

LONDON, April 11 .- In the House of Commons to-day the Irish Land Tenure Bill, introduced by Dennis Kilbride (anti-Parnellite member for South Kerry who accompanied William O'Brien to Canada). was read the second time. Its object is to prevent landlords from levying rent on improvements made by tenants; to reduce the period of the revision of rents from fifteen to eight years, and to repeal the "eviction made easy" section of the Land Act of 1887.

Tea Troubles.

LONDON, April 11 .-- The opinion freely expressed here is that the proposed duty of 10 per cent on tea imported into Canada from countries other than those where it is produced, is ill-advised and bears the marks of unfriendliness to England. 

D'Alton McCarthy Makes the Speech of the Day

In the Dominion House Commons.

The Tariff Remains a Protectionist and Monopolist Measure Despite Its Much-Heralded Modifications-A Skirmish in the Public Accounts Committee.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.] OTTAWA, April 11.—The public accounts committee met this morning and spent the whole sitting debating Mr. Mulock's motion to examine witnesses under oath. The Opposition wanted the oath to be applied wherever the committee decided to apply it with the object of eliciting the truth from witnesses who might otherwise excuse their consciences from impelling them to divulge all the facts. In 1891 witnesses before this committee confessed to things they had denied a year before, and excused themselves on the plea that on the first occasion they had not been under oath. The Opposition members of the committee urged that it was necessary to ask the House to give this power to the committee. The Government, however, opposed the motion. Those members of the Government present were Foster, Caron, Ouimet, Tupper, Costigan and Wood. They said that if a particular or special case arose where fraud or misappropriation was suspected then the committee could go to the House and ask for power to examine under

Messrs, Lister, Davies and Mills pointed out that this course was impracticable because when witnesses answered questions untruthfully it was impossible to make a special case. Mr. Mulock charged that there was an attempt to block investigation into the public departments led by eight members of the Government who had charge of eight of these departments. Mr. Lister said it was evident that the Government was trying to frustrate the object of this commission, namely, the investiga-

tion of the public expenditures. Mr. Foster stated that whenever it appeared that there was fraud, then the Government would sanction the putting of an oath. He did not think the commission should go into these investigations with a view of finding out something wrong, but merely to see if the accounts were in proper form and according to the rule. On the motion being put it was defeated on a straight party vote of 32 to 21. An amendment declaring that in special cases when fraud was charged the House should be asked to give the power was carried. IN THE HOUSE.

Mr. McCarthy quoted statistics in controverting the assertion that free trade was bad for England, and showed how much worse Canada was under protection. Under it the export in manufactures had increased by a paltry \$1,500,000. Mr. McCarthy then entered into an analysis of the effect of some of the changes in the tariff. The showed, 41 per cent higher in Canada than in Great Britain, and woolens an average of 32 per cent. On the common or low grade goods the difference was 56 per cent. This was calculated on the old tariff, but he conwould be just as high. 





To Make Balloting for School Trustees Compulsory

Debated at Length in the Local Legislature-And Defeated by a Majority of 18.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, TORONTO, April 11.-Interest centered to-day in the de. bate on Mr. Meredith's proposed application of the compulsory ballot in elections for separate school trustees.

Mr. Meredith began by saying that the B. N. A. Act provided that separate schools should be established wherever the people desired them, but the mode of operating and equipping them was to be in accord with the other schools. Both systems were to be inspected by the same person.

Mr. Ross dissented from this statement. Mr. Meredith persisted in it, saying that he, personally, would not have any objection to a Roman Catholic inspecting the public schools, and he did not see why a Protestant should not inspect the separate schools. It was also within the power of the Legislature to regulate the books to be used in the latter institutions. Mr. Meredith repudiated the idea of an attack upon the Roman Catholic Church. He had no ambition to be a Protestant champion, but it was his right and his privilege to assert the position he assumed upon questions affecting the interests of the people. If the Anglican Church, of which he was an unworthy member, should make demands similar to those advanced by the Roman Catholic Church, he would cast just as fearless a vote as he would at the present time. The position taken by the hierarchy, he said, was that these schools were schools

of the church and should be absolutely under its control. He denied this. The Government had contended that the Roman Catholic people were not asking for the ballot. Members of the House should effect this reform on their own responsibility. His proposition was that the school law should be so changed that wherever there

was a board, citizens should have the protection of the ballot. Mr. Ross began by saying that the Province had suffered from the strife-

engendering homilies of such men as the leader of the Opposition. In view of the excited condition of public opinion, he did not wonder that the honorable gentleman had advocated with unusual solemnity, and with less strength of argument than usual the application of the compulsory ballot to public and separate schools. If any person was responsible for the multiplication of separate schools, that person was Mr. Meredith, who, with his followers, had joined in the war of creeds. Mr. Meredith wanted national consolidation in regard to education, but his line of action was leading to national disintegration. Mr. Meredith had said that separate schools were inimical to consolidation, and that the evil should be remedied by the application of the ballot to elections of trustees. If separate schools were inimical to consolidation they should be abolished, said Mr. Ross; such was the logical inference of the gentleman's argument. Mr. Meredith had criticised the Government for departing from the act of 1863 in regard to separate schools. Mr. Ross wanted to know if that act was so

the people. The Government thought that changes should be made from time to time. The Liberal party was ready to give the chil-Conmee, M.P.P., was elected president, dren who attended separate schools as good an education as was given to those patronizing public schools. This end had een secured by amending the act. In Quebec Protestant schools were not interfered with by Catholics, and the Protestant minority was treated with almost unprecedented liberality. This was a lesson to Ontario not to be less liberal. He had noticed an advertisement in a French-Canadian paper, reading as follows: 'Wanted-a separate school teacher, third-class certificate, salary \$300. None but Protestants need apply." Should this not be a reproach to the "liberality" of Protestants in Ontario. Mr. Ross charged Mr. Meredith with creating leprous sores of intolerance which would have been a disgrace to the country five centuries ago. Mr. Meredith did not propose what would be the logical outcome of his speech—the abolition of separate schools-he merely proposed the application of the ballot to

the election of rustees. Mr. Wood (Hastings) followed. EVENING SESSION.

Mr. Ross' bill regarding fees of officials alters the sliding scale of percentages which fee-paid officials are required to restore to the public, the old schedules not being suited to the excessive business occasioned by the growth of large cities. Division Court clerks are required under the new law to return 10 per cent on receipts between \$1,000 and \$1,500 a year, 20 per cent on receipts from \$1,500 to \$2,000; from \$2,000 to \$2,500, 30 per cent, and over \$2,500, 50 per cent. Registrars, local registrars of the High Court, county court clerks and surrogate registrars will be required to return 10 per cent on receipts from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and by the same regular gradations, up to 50 per cent on receipts over \$3,000. Sheriffs and county crown attorneys will be required to return 10 per cent on incomes of from \$5,000 to \$2,500, with the sliding scale up to 50 per cent on returns over \$3,500. The deductions now made in the case of sheriffs are extended to clerks of the peace and county crown attorneys. An important change is also effected to the advantage of the municipalities. Registrars were formerly required to pay a proportion of their gross receipts to the Province and of their net receipts to the municipalities. Both these refunds will now be made to the municipalities under the new act.

IS THERE ANYTHING WRONG

With the Village of London West's Finances?

A Breezy Meeting of the Council-New Books for the Officials.

The session of the London West Council last night was attended by Reeve Macdonald, Councilors Hamilton, Hammond, Moore and Clerk Bartram, and among the crowd of spectators was ex-Reeve Spence. The account from Messrs. J. R. Morrison

and J. C. Stewart for \$20 each created a prolonged discussion. The parties had been appointed village auditors in 1891 and served for three years. For the first two years of their term they were paid, but for the last year no money was forthcoming. The claim had been presented before.

Mr. Stewart addressed the council in support of the claim.

Reeve Macdonald turned up the minutes of past years, and said that the whole proceedings of the council in former years had been one mass of errors from beginning to end. The fact of not receiving the auditors report of 1892 had caused a great deal of trouble. The treasurer had been summoned to appear at the meetings of the finance committee several times. Notices had been sent to Mr. Nicholls, to which he replied that if the committee wanted to see his books they could go to his house. Such an abominable report as that of the finance committee of May 26, 1893, he had never seen in civic affairs. Had Mr. Nicholls not called on him he would have felt it his duty to recommend his removal from office.

Mr. Moore-It has been my idea to clean out all the present officers and start anew. move, to begin with, that the services of

the clerk be dispensed with. It may be stated that last year the report of the auditors was not printed, and it had been decided not to do so at the meeting of May 26. On that date, however, the report of the auditors was approved by the finance committee, and the accounts of the treasurer and collector were allowed ac-

This had, Mr. Scarrow said, been done to save expense, as it would have cost about \$20 to publish the auditors' report.

Mr. Spence said that if Mr. Macdonald had not referred to the matter in the manner in which he did, he would have thought nothing about it. He (Spence) considered he had just as much at stake as the present

The Reeve-We are not talking about

Mr. Spence-At the time the auditors report was brought in the people of the village knew the state of affairs. I think the minutes of the book will show that my actions were straightforward, and you cannot point a crooked finger at anything I have done. (Hear, hear.) Reeve Macdonald (producing an ac-

count)-There is an account of \$243 76 from the Bank of British North America, of which there is no record. Mr. Scarrow-There is nothing wrong, anyway. The village got the money. If the treasurer was here he could give a

satisfactory account of it. Mr. Moore (to Mr. Scarrow)-Now, here we have two statements. The clerk says they did not have a clear detailed account from the auditors last year; Mr. Stewart says we have, so what are we to believe. Here it is four months since we took office and we do not yet know how things stand.

Mr. Scarrow-If you are so anxious to see the accounts, I am sure you can see them at the houses of the officials. The reeve suggested that Mr. Moore make a motion that the treasurer and auditors be ordered to appear before the finance committee.

Mr. Moore-I have a motion before the council already.

The Reeve-There is no seconder. The motion was not put, and the account

was referred to the village financiers. Mr. Scarrow moved that the statement of the auditors be corrected, and that the finance committee meet and have them straightened out.

Mr. Moore moved in amendment, that the auditors be instructed to prepare a new statement to Dec. 31, 1893. Carried. Mr. Moore-All I want is a statement to the cent. At the beginning of the year the treasurer stated there was a balance of \$94 75 to the credit of the village, while here we have statements of two overdrawn bank accounts.

Mr. Moore then moved that a committee composed of the reeve and the chairman of the finance committee be appointed to secure a new set of books, and that the accounts be started anew from Jan. 1. Carried.

Mr. Scarrow followed with a motion that the collector's rolls be returned at the next meeting of the council. Carried. Mr. Hamilton (to the collector)-How are the taxes coming in?

Mr. Lord-Pretty slow. Mr. Hamilton-Can you not make the taxpayers pay up? You might issue war-

Mr. Lord-Well, perhaps I will. An account from Mr. Horn for \$10 70 for tile supplied and laid was referred to the

THE EIGHT HOURS' DAY.

An Interesting Experiment in Great Britain.

The Happy Medium Proved to be a Great Success.

(London, England, Daily Chronicle.)

We have received from the proprietors of the Salford Ironworks an advance copy of the report prepared by Mr. Wm. Mather, M.P., on the year's trial at these works of the 48 hours week. The report contains the history and results of a freely-made exhaustive trial of the eight-hour day, or 48 hours per week, at the same wages paid as for the 53 hours' week, under conditions that render the conclusions arrived at applicable to all, whether employers or employed, who are engaged in the engineering and machine-making trades of the country. During each week the number of men employed at the works averaged 1,200, and the character of the work performed was similar to that of the preceding six years. About one-third of the men were employed on piecework wages, and no overtime whatever was worked, except for breakdowns and repairs. Extra men were employed on the double-shift plan to meet extra pressure of work. The trial was arranged with and watched by the chief officials of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers, the great trade union of the engineering and machinemaking trades of the United Kingdom. The first action taken by Mr. Mather was to invite the workpeople to a meeting in one of the workshops to hear the views of the firm on the proposed experiment. At this meeting he told them it was the desire of the firm to devise some plan by which the hours might be shortened so as to benefit them and not be disadvantageous to the business. In view of the altered home habits of the working-classes, he proposed that the working day should commence at a quarter to eight instead of six, an arrangement which would enable them to get a comfortable breakfast at home with their families. There would be one hour allowed for dinner, and work should cease at half-past five on five days of the week and at twelve on Saturdays. This proposal was referred to the executive council of the union, who agreed that it should be given a fair and honest trial provided the current rates of wages were maintained. A notice was accordingly issued that on Feb. 20, 1893, the works would commence running 48 instead of 53 hours per week, and at the same

STATISTICAL RESULTS The turnover in the trial year approximated so closely to the average of the preceding 6 years as to be practically the same. As regards quantity of production, there

was actually a larger output in the trial year, but owing to reduced prices the turnover did not increase with the amount of production. Comparing the ratio of wages to turnover in the trial year with the same ratio in the preceding six years there was an actual increase of 0.4 per cent. in the former. But as selling prices were lower, while the quantity produced was relatively greater, the ratio of the cost of wages to the turnover in that year must have been proportionately less. The returns show a marked economy in gas and electric lighting, wear

and tear of machinery, engines, gearing

etc., fuel and lubricants, and miscellaneous stores. When full allowance has been made for the increased fixed charges due to interest on plant and machinery, rent and taxes, permanent staff on fixed salaries being employed five hours less per week, the balance of the account is in favor of the trial year. The saving as the direct consequence of the shorter hours is shown to be 0.4 per cent... which, by a remarkable coincidence, exactly counterbalances the increase in the wages account. Shorter hours have also operated to greatly reduce the amount of lost time.



New British-Canadian Cable.

LONDON, April 12.-The steamer Faraday, with part of the Commercial Cable Company's new cable, sailed from here teday. The cable is to be laid from Waterville, Ireland, to Nova Scotia. The entire cable will be 2,000 miles long. The Faraday, not being large enough to carry the whole cable, will drop the shore sections about 500 miles first and then lay the deen sea section, which is smaller than shore ends. The cable was manufactured by Siemens Bros. & Co., of London, and is guaranted to aford 33% per cent. improvement in speed over other cables in use by the Commercial Cable Company. This will insure transmission at the rate of 50 words a minute.



THE SPRINGBANK RAILWAY.

Interesting Reply by President Break to Mayor Essery's Charges.

To the E ditor of the ADVERTISER: The mayor's reported remarks in vesterday's Free Press in regard to my letter constitute a gross misrepresentation of facts. I am not an adept in making statements that are more plausible than truth. ful, but I am quite willing to place myself on record and allow the citizens of London to pronounce judgment on the action of both parties in this matter. He says part of my former letter was

true and part of it was not, but he fails to point out the untrue-a duty I am not unwilling to perform, in regard to statements contained in his interview.

1. He says we were seeking incorporation under the Railway Act of Ontario, which would give a perpetual franchise, but he omits to state that the perpetual franchise would apply only where the railway would run through private property. The streets of London and adjoining townships would be just as much under the control of their respective corporations as they now are, and we could not occupy one foot of them without their consent, both as to the terms and length of franchise.

2. His objection to the words "From a point in or near the city of London," falls very flat after the explanation contained in my first letter. We appreciate what a calamity it would be for London to wake up some morning and find trolley cars running throughout the city, and voluntarily offered to strike out the words "in, or," thus precluding the possibility of such a disaster.

3. "Under their bill they could put up any kind of a railway they saw fit to, and no one could insist upon any rights for the traveling public," says Mr. Essery. He must mean if powers were obtained under the Railway Act that such would be the case. Now, if the Railway Act of Ontario gives power to operate railways without any provision for the rights of the public (a proposition too ridiculous to require refutation) the act should be repealed or amended at once to avoid a recurrence of the gross injustice now being done to the traveling public by railways operating under it.

4. Another serious menace to the city's rights would be to build a bridge across the river "at or near Springbank," to allow free access to foot passengers to the waterworks park. The bridge was not an absolute necessity to the success of the railway scheme, as the same purpose could be served with ferry boats-electric launches for instance.

5. "They would be able to build a line over any of the streets or highways of the townships of Westminster or London, along the margin of the river;" but he omits to add as regard the highways, "subject to the consent of the municipalities controlling them."

6. Here we have a great difficulty. On account of the waterworks dam, the railway might be flooded, and the appalling sight be witnessed of the steel rails floating down the river with some spring freshet, and then the company would want damages. Terrible to think of, and yet this matter was never mentioned when the bill was discussed before the committee.

7. "They gave no maps nor profiles of where they propose to go, and on being asked where they are going, they replied they were going where it was in the interests of the company to go." We had a map of the proposed and alternate routes, but were not asked to show it. and were not even asked where we were going. Maps and plans could avail nothing when the building of a railway to Springbank over any route was opposed "from the word go.

8. The most serious objection was the probable action of the electricity on the waterworks main. This is an objection which might appear plausible if we were asking to run on the Pipe Line, but when we agreed not to run on or near it, without the city's consent, and further to leave no room for doubt, to become liable for all damages to water pipes on account of the electric current, grounds for objection on this account wholly disappear. He forgot to object to the electrifying of the source of the city's water supply and the possible result of electrolysis to the citizens. There would be more truth than jest in this statement, if in the construction of the Springbank railway the hoped-for result would be obtained of making London a magnetic center that would attract theusands of excursionists from Woodstock, St. Thomas and other surrounding towns and villages during the summer months, and instead of having our city almost depopulated on every holiday we would have an influx of visitors such as was never before

known. These visitors would spend 10 cents on the electric railway and \$1 and upwards with our merchants, etc. 9. The petitioners for the Springbank railway and the directors of the London fault is as well founded as the one contained in the old fable of the wolf and the lamb, in which we are told that when the wolf could find no fault with the lamb itself, it made a supposed fault of one of its

forefathers an excuse for making a meal of 10. "The Government tried to arrange the matter and prepared another bill, but the company would not accept it. Neither would we. The offers they talk about were made when they found it a last kick. They were not acceptable because they were indefinite." This is what the mayor is reported as saying, but the facts are as follows: We applied for incorporation under the Railway Act, but the Government refused to grant charters to short ines except under the Street Railway Act. The bill was amended accordingly, and we were prepared to accept it as amended, and so stated to the committee. The amendments we agreed to were not as a last kick, but at the very outset, and there could be nothing indefinite about an offer to insert clauses that would fully protect

With reference to the concluding statebeen and are now willing to meet the city on a fair basis for electrifying the lines, and I challenge the mayor or any one else to prove that our proposition is not a fair and just one. The concluding sentences as reported in the interview with the mayor suffice to show how prejudiced that official is, and how eager he is to give his influence to outsiders as against our company.

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

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

THE SINGLE TAX.

Mr. John Johnston Champions It at Labor Hall-Land at the Reot of All Things-Mr. Ashplant Combats It.

Pursuant to challenge, the "single tax" theory was publicly debated in Labor Hall last night by Messre. H. B. Ashplant and J. Johnston beforea most attentive audience. Mr. Johnston championed the single tax and Mr. Ashplant combatted it. Both gentlemen showed great breadth and depth of information, quoting the works of political economists with a familiarity that indicated extensive reading and research on the subject. build. Each debater spoke for ten minutes alternately, Mr. Johnston, who spoke very fluently, was outspoken in his support of a tax on land values only. He emphasized very strongly the fact that land was at the root of all production or registered the release of two solitary labor. Every manufactured product drunks. That was all. The products of land were the only things absolutely necessary to human life except air. A man who could succeed in getting into his own hands all the land or the products of land could make slaves of every person on earth. The land was the property of the whole people, and if a man took any part of land values he was taking part sympathy extended to her during her late of the value of the people. The speaker pointed out that it was impossible to divide the land, share and share alike, because a fresh distribution would be required every time an infant was born. The single tax was the alternative. Every tax laid on the products of land independent of land must be a double or treble one. Take iron. It first suffered a tax as a land product. Then it was taxed as pig iron and then as ma-chinery. Take the instance of a young man boarding. The farmer who raised the necessaries of life was first taxed on his land. He puts that tax on the food that he sold to the boarding-house keeper. The latter collected it from the young man, who, therefore, paid three taxes. Was that just? Upon what did the manufacturing aborer exercise his labor? Upon land products only. It might be timber, iron, bones or anything else. Therefore the monopolist of land products could make the States and off the Middle Atlantic coast. trustees.
