The man was quite mad, and after being captured was sent to Bedlam and thence to Dartmore where, after 34 years, he was transported to Australia, where he set up in business as a house painter. Nearly two years later, on May 30, 1842, and almost in the same place, John Francis fired at the Queen. He was sentenced to death for this act, but was afterwards reprieved, and was transported to Tasmania. The third attempt was made on July by a deformed youth named John William Bean, but his pistol missed






