A "RANKER" WHO ROSE Low Record For Gold Exchange

[Canadian Press.]

New York, March 23.—Another break in foreign exchange quotations today between New York and London brought the rates down to the lowest within the memory of the oldest brokers. The decline was followed by the announcement of the engagement for shipment here of \$6,300,000 from the gold holdings of the Bank of England to Ottawa, the largest amount in one day since the return movement to this country began, and bringing the total up to \$24,800,000. This represents nearly one-third of the gold sent from the United States to Ottawa in the early months of the war. This disturbed condition of the exchange narket is attributed chiefly to the enormous purchases of war supplies in this country by the governments of the Allies. Exchange on Paris moved today to its highest record, which actually means the lowest as regards the purchasing power of French money here.


