Electricity Blinds

Chicago, March 1.-Universa! blindness is to be humanity's tribute to electricity, is the theory expressed by Dr. H. Preston Pratt. Eye specialists have been the first to discover the corroding effects of the electrical currents being generated by millions of dynamos in every corner of the civilized globe, explained the professor. Day or night we are never free from their influence he said The eyes, the most delicate portion of the human body, will suffer first. Dr Pratt cited the increasing prevalence of failing eyesight. Later will come a gradual sensitizing and burning of the hands.

The wavering of the incandescent globe, the sputtering brightness of the arc light, the glaring white of the vacuum tube were specified as the agencies which already have made the Americans a spectacled and blinking nation.

The shock from a telephone battery, the spark of a "jumped" trolley pole, the snap and crackle of the power station dynamo and motor were cited as stronger but less ever present contributors to the same effect.

HOW ROCKEFELLER DODGED SERVERS

Has Secret Passageway from Home to Sons.

WENT IN AND OUT AT WILL

Majority of the Big Scandard Oll Men.

New York, Feb. 28.-According to a statement made yesterday in the office of Lawyer Henry Wollman, who reprethe charter of the Standard Oil Company, the process servers who are hunting for John D. Rockefeller, have just made what is to them a most disagreeable discovery. They have learned, to their astonishment and chagrin, king at No. 4 West Fifty-fourth street, and would cost but half the money and the residence of his son-in-law, E. per night. Nothing came of the sug-Parmalee Prentice, at No. 5 West Fifty-third street.

For weeks and weeks the sleuths have been wondering why they could not catch the elder Rockefeller. They have had him, as they believed, neatly "spotted" on several occasions at his big town house.

Then they seated themselves patiently in front of the brownstone mansion and peeked calmly and triumphantly through the iron railings.

After they had waited for several hours they would get word that Mr. Rockefeller had left his house and was on his way up to his gabled retreat at Pocantico Hills, up in Westchester County.

Henry Wollman, counsel for the state of Missouri in its suit against the Standard Oil Company, said yesterday:

"If we had \$1,000 we could hire 50 process servers and then, I suppose, we could get our hands on Mr. Rockefeller somehow, some time. But our present force has been baffled by the passageway between his home and that of his son-in-law, and by the multitudinous passageways in the Standard Oil building, No. 26 Broad-

Pratt lives in Brooklyn, in a row of mansions all inhabited by Pratts, all of whom are red-headed.

THE MOTHER TONGUE.

[From the Chicago Record-Herald.] Two direct opposite agencies are at work upon the English speech, one exerted upon its form, one upon its substance. The first is the movement to secure a system of spelling which shall more adequately represent the sound of words, the second is a tendency to adapt the sound of the word to the spelling and to reduce idiomatic expressions to the dead level of logic.

The spelling reform movement responds to an almost universal feeling that the spelling of English is needlessly cumbersome, that it makes the way of the child and the foreigner too hard, and that it causes a waste of time. Yet the feeling is held back from any great effectiveness by the coexistent conservatism of the educated mind. The power of youthful memories is such that the sight of a word spelled differently from the way one has been accustomed from childhood is a distinct shock. The movement is extensive but not strong. Indeed, it seems now to be on the decline, practically, however many theoretical adherents it may have gained, The British reading public have not taken kindly to it, and the better American houses have dropped many of the reformed spellings which have for years distinguished American usage. There is a strong realization of the unity of the reading world. On the other hand, the pronunciation of English words in America is drifting farther from the traditional standard. The large number of immigrants from European countries is partly responsible for this, but the ultimate responsibility rests upon the schools. If a large number of teachers come from homes where English correctly spoken is not the home language, and if their vocabulary has been gained largely from reading, without any consciousness of the pitfalls that lurk for them when they transmute the visible sign into the audible word, it is also true that the inheritors of English speech too often distrust the authority of their own knowledge, when challenged, Tennyson speaks of this strange abdication of memory at the moment when it should assert its sovereignty:

As when we dwell upon a word we Repeating, till the word we know so

Becomes a wonder, and we know not

So the child that has always pronounced "forehead" correctly till she learns to spell, in awe of the spelling painfully accustoms herself to say "fore head." The tyranny of print makes the child severely forords as "boatswain and "forecastle." There is an awkward hiatus in such a combination as "not at all," as the slaves of formalism pronounce it, none in the natural

utterance of the words. The same mistaken zeal corrupts instead of improving, many phrases. The descendant of English speaking people says unconsciously "Hadn't you better?" until unwholesome brooding over the phrase, aided by suggestions from a half-bred teacher, substitutes the artificial "Would you not better?"

Too many students of the language go on the principle that whatever is is wrong. Too many of them teach others so. The language loses its spontaneous grace and becomes a lifeless thing. Until spelling becomes phonetic, and that day seems far off, spelling must not rule pronunciation. The phrases which naturally rise to the lips of those of English blood are not to be too rigidly controlled by those ignorant of the origin and history of the spoken language. 


