ALLIED DESTROYERS WIN BRISK BATTLE

GERMAN GUNS POUND WHOLE BRITISH LINE

Enemy Opens Stupendous Bombardment at Dawn—Is It the Great Blow?

London, March 21 .- The artillery action on the western front could be distinctly heard at Dover and other towns on the east coast of England. The doors and windows of the houses at Dover, for instance, were continuously shaken by the heavy concus-

The firing, which was the heaviest that has been heard in this district from such a distance, began at 3 o'clock this morning, and lasted at brief intervals until 7 a.m. At Ramsgate, beside the sound of cannonading, bright flames were seen at sea, while the vibration of the explosions shook the windows and dislodged tiles from the roofs.

London, March 21.—The Germans shortly before dawn this morning began a heavy bombardment over a wide section of the British front, it is announced

The statement follows:

"A heavy bombardment was opened by the enemy shortly before dawn this morning against our whole front from the neighborhood of Vendeuil, south of St. Quentin, to the River Scarpe.

"A successful raid was carried out by us last night in the neighborhood of St. Quentin. Thirteen prisoners and three machine guns were brought back by our troops. Prisoners also were taken by us in patrol encounters southeast of Messines, and in another successful raid. carried out by us south of Houtholst forest.

"Another raid undertaken by the en-emy in the neighborhood of Armentieres was repuised."

From Vendeuil porth to the River Scarpe is a distance of nearly 50 miles, and the beginning by the German artiliery of a heavy bombardment along y mean that preparathis wide front may mean that preparation for the much-advertised German offensive in the west has been begun. Amsterdam, March 20.—A war credit of 15,000,000 marks was brought before the Reichstag today for first reading. Count von Roedern, secretary of the imperial treasury, said Germany's monthly war costs had increased from 2,000,000,000 marks in the winter of 1915-16 to 3,750,000,000 in the last five months owing to the increased supply of necessaries of war. The secretary gave the total cost of the war as 550,000,000,000 marks, of which he said the Entente had expended 370,000,000,000. marks, of which he said the Entente had expended 370,000,000,000.

Toronto, March 21.—The Ontario Government is not prepared to extend the rights of the women electors in this House and allow them to sit in the Legislature. Hon. I. B. Lucas told the House this morning that there was no

general demand for women being given this right, and public opinion was not behind it.

Women, he said, are not allowed to sit in municipal councils, and there never has been any demand that they should be allowed to do.

Mr. J. C. Elliott, the West Middlesex Liberal, in introducing the bill to allow woman to sit in the Legislature, said he didn't think there could any longer be any opposition to the measure.

Women now have the right to vote, and they should, therefore, have right to sit in the House. Women are now elected to boards of educa-

tion and they have given good service.

Sam Carter, South Wellington, wanted a vote, owing to the "cynicism and hypocrisy" of the attorney-general saying there was no demand from the women. He would have been willing to have the bill with drawn, but for the hypocrisy of the attorney-general which he has shown



CANADA'S LABOR RECORD.

ANADIAN organized labor need not reproach itself for any serious strike in Canada since war began. There is no record, in fact, of any serious trouble whatever among artisans employed on war work. While wage increases have been secured and conditions improved by the efforts of unions, no tie-up of munitions, ship-building or other essential industries has occurred. This fact stands out to the credit of organized labor, especially at this time, when American shipbuilders are on strike because they cannot secure more than \$10 a day for work that under ordinary conditions brings \$5 to \$6 a day.
