GERMANY IS WARNED TO AMEND CONSTITUTION

BOLSHEVIKI OFFERING TO MAKE PEACE WIT

GERMANY'S GOVERNMENT MUST AMEND CONSTITUTION OR ALLIES WILL OCCUPY MORE TERRITORY

Supreme Council of Peace Con ference Decides To Send a Strongly Worded Note To Germans-The Article Complained of Must Be Supp ressed Within the Next Two Weeks.

Paris, Sept. 2.—The supreme council of the peace conference decided today to send a note in forcible terms to the German Government, pointing out the contradiction with the Versailles treaty of the provision in the new German constitution providing for the representation of Austria in the German Reichsrath.

The council demands the suppression of the article within a fortnight, declaring that otherwise the Allies will be compelled to undertake a further occupation of the left bank of the Rhine. The article objected to in Article 61 of the German constitution as in contrast with Article 80 of the German peace treaty, for bidding German interference in Austrian affairs.

Article 80 of the Versailles treaty reads:

"Germany acknowledges and will respect strictly the importance of Austria within the frontiers which may be fixed in a treaty between that state and the principal Allied and associated powers; she agrees that this independence shall be inalienable, except with the consent of the council of the league of nations."

The text of the paragraph in the German constitution referred to has not been received in this country. It appears, however, that the clause applied to all the territories of German-speaking peoples in Europe, and therefore to German Austria with the effect of providing that Austria might have a certain number of representatives in the German Parliament proportionate to the Austrian population.

acceptable to guests and the family, but it is also a good plan occasionally to prepare at home some other meats that can be used cold, such as corned beef, tongue or meat loaf. These may be served with a salad or simply sliced, garnished with parsley or lemon, and accompanied by a piquant sauce.
