Martial Law In Part of Ireland

LLOYD GEORGE ANNOUNCES CERTAIN IRISH AREAS TO BE UNDER MARTIAL LAW

British Premier Declares That Government Is Forced To Take Drastic Action As Result of Murders of Uniformed Men-Death Penalty For Those Who Disregard Conditions of Proclamation—Arms and Uniforms in Prescribed Districts Must Be Surrendere d.

London, Dec. 10.-Martial law, to be applied to "certain areas" of Ireland to put down "murder and outrage," and a move to bring about conferences between the Government and Sinn Fein leaders on the Irish situation, were announced by Premier Lloyd George in the Commons today. In announcing this "double policy" of the Government, the premier declared that under martial law persons found possessing arms after a certain date, unauthorized persons wearing uniforms, would be liable to the death penalty.

On the other hand, to facilitate negotiations, the premier announced the Government had decided to give safe conduct to Sinn Fein members of the House of Commons who had not been involved in the commission of serious crime.

In making the announcement regarding martial law, the premier said the Government had been driven to the conclusion, especially after the last two terrible incidents, that it must take stronger action in certain disturbed areas.

Side by side with the encouragement, the Government was anxious to give all those who desired peace—and they were growing in numbers and independence, showing that intimidation was decreasing-the Government was determined, declared the premier, to do all in its power to break up the terrorists. Under martial law, said the premier, a proclamation would be issued, demanding that all arms and uniforms be surrendered within the prescribed areas by a certain date. After that date unauthorized persons found possessing arms would be treated as rebels and be liable to the death penalty on conviction by a military courtmartial.

The same penalty, added Mr. Lloyd George, would be applicable to unauthorized persons wearing uniforms.

A reasonable time would be allowed for the surrender of arms before these provisions came into effect.

Geneva, Dec. 10.—Machinery for putting the economic blockade into effect, when occasion should call for such action, was discussed by the assembly of the league of nations at this morning's session. The proposed machinery, intended as a weapon against an offending state, consists of any international blockade committee of eight members appointed by the council of the league to study the subject of application of the /blockade and report to the secretary-general of the council, whom the league hag charged with the duty of informing the council of facts which appear to show the covenant had been broken.

On receipt of such information, according to the proposed plan, the douncil must meet to consider the situation, and informally the members of the league. Where the covenant-breaker has a seaboard, the council should forthwith consider, says the report, which members can conveniently be charged with the duty of carrying out a marine blockade.

At the opening of today's session, Premier Hymans announced that in order to complete the work of the assembly before the end of next week speeches should be reduced to ten minutes each, and that two gessions should be held daily, beginning Monday.

MILLIONS OF BRITISH WAR **MEDALSTOBEDISTRIBUTED**

London, Dec. 10.—Canadian Associated Press.—It is understood that the distribution of the 1914-15 star, the British war medal, and the Victory medal, will probably occupy about four years. In all 3,000,000 have been distributed to individuals or sent to record offices at home and to the overseas dominions and the colonies for distribution. This distribution includes 500,000 1914-15 stars, over 900,000 British war medals, and 80,000 Victory medals. The approximate number of British war medals required is 9,000,000 and of Victory medals 5,500,000. After deducting the medals already distributed, about 12,500,000 remain for distribution, and it is estimated that these latter will be distributed at the rate of about 3,000,000 per annum. A correspondent of the Daily Mail declares that the Victory medal now in course of issue, is so incredibly mean in appearance that no written criticism or photograph can possibly convey a correct impression of it.



AGRICULTURAL COURSE TO AMERICAN OUT-OF-WORKS BE HELD IN AILSA CRAIG! RESPONSIBLE FOR CRIME WAVE, SAYS MAGISTRATE From January 4 to 28, Under Direction of Department of Agriculture.

nper Rider, Charged With Trespass, Given Chance to Find Work.

An agricultural and domestic short course will be held in Ailsa Craig from January 4 to 28, under the supervision of the department of agriculture. The course will include feeding, care and judging of live stock, marketing, and the formation of co-operative marketing associations. There will also be a special three-day course in practical work on sheep and hogs. Agricultural short courses have been held in nearly all parts of Middlesex, and their value is shown in the fact that 250 young men have been trained in stock judging to such an extent that they have been capable of competing in judging contests at London, Tounto and the Guelph Winter Fair.

Although the courses are held primarily for the benefit of women and men between the ages of 14 and 30 years, the department will not adhere strictly to age but invites all who wish to attend Given Chance to Find Work.

"It is the men who come to this country in desperation, because they are out of work in the larger cities of the United States, who are responsible for the bank robberies and other crimes so prevalent here," said Magistrate Graydon in police court today, while he lectured Frank Fulton, charged with trespassing on the G. 





Unemployment and High Cost of Fuel and Food Felt.



The gradual increase in unemployment and the excessive price of fuel and tood are beginning to make themselves felt in this department, the report states. Four children were cared for because their mother was seriously ill, and one because the father is in hospital and the mother was irresponsible.

Expenditures from the general fund totalled \$960.98, while 166 advances tetalling \$2,217 were made.

During the month 1,158 men applied at the office. Of these 684 were Londoners, and 271 from the district. The remaining 183 applied by mail for assistance of various kinds. Two bundred and forty-three soldiers' dependents called at the office and 119 wrote.





"The tumult and the shouting dies: The captains and the kings depart.' Was the fate of Tyre just the result of an arbitrary flat or the whim of chance? Was it not rather the outworking of the principle stated centuries afterwards by the Messiah: What shall it profit a man to gain the whole world and lose his immortal personality? Turgid waves of selfishness floated the business of Tyre, material ends had the right of way. Spiritual values cut no figure in her sheet of assets and liabilities. EUDORA.

Eudora was transplanted direct from ancient Greece where the word for happy gift" became the feminine proper name and was given much vogue among Greek damsels. Its quaint sound, as well as its pleasing significance, brought it to French romance as Eudore.

But the first Eudora and the one whom our adoption of the name commemorates, was one of the Nereids of Greek mythology. Like Amphitrite, Thetis, and Galatea, she was the best-known of the sea nymphs. According to mythology, the Nereids, fifty or a hundred in number, were the daughters of Nereus and Doris, and were attendants upon Poseidon, god of the attendants upon Possidon, god of the sea. They were represented as having entire human form and riding upon sea horses or other sea monsters.

Another form of the name—Eudoria was much used by Greek empresses, and imperial brides who bore a name unsuited to the Greek ear, assumed it voluntarily. Through the saints of the Greek Church, the name reached Russia as Jevdoksija. Lapis lazuli is the stone assigned to Eudora. 

EX-KAISÉR AND HIS SONS ARE LIKELY TO **GET ANNUITIES**

Settlement Between Prussian State and Hohenzollerns Held Over.

SOCIALISTS WIN

Bismarckian Precedent in the Seizure of Hesse Estates in 1866 Is Cited in Fight.

MERLIN, Dec. 9.—It is believed that the settlement between the Prussian State and the Hohenzollern family will hold over until the elections in February. So much is assured by the radical attack upon the agreement in the Prussian Diet. Whether this means that the Hohenzollerns wiii get less than was originally conceded depends upon the

outcome of the elections.

The Monarchists, who have not hesitated to fight as such in the interests of the abdicated king, expect the defeat of the present coalition and its replacement by a bourgeois ministry. It needed almost a year to bring to a climax this conflict over the Hohenzollern estate.

this conflict over the Hohenzollern estate.

This week's tumult in parliament, when paper balls were thrown—which one Socialist deputy moved be collected and placed in the Hohenzollern museum—and when for fifteen minutes the Monarchist Kaufman was drowned out by Socialist Jeers was the culmination of a wrangle which began when Dr. Sudekum and Dr. Seine, Socialist ministers, signed a settlement last January. They signed it in the belief that it gave the Hohenzollerns no more than their legal rights as private citizens.

Contract Now Discredited.

Since then the legal authority of the contract has been discredited, as the law by which the property passed to the royal family was carelessly or inaccurately recorded. The dispute showed also the legal distinction between the state and the crown. In a similar issue two of the very men who were upholding the Hohenzollern rights had then signed a memorangum contending for the state. These two are the present legal expert of the Prussian ministry of justice and Dr. Hergt, leader of the Monarchist Conservative party.

A precedent was also found in Bismarck's expropriation of the estates of the Grand Duke of Hesse in 1866. The law professors of that time upheld his view that the state and crown property were inseparable, and the overthrown monarch had no property. The value of the Hohenzollern property in the settlement can only be guessed, but it is generally believed to have a market value of 1,800,250,000 marks. The properties now charged to have been incorrectly transferred from the state to the crown are among the most valuable holdings, and include the university grounds in Berlin, real estate near the Friedrich street station, lots and parks in Potsdam and elsewhere, and about half the paintings in the old museum of Berlin.

The former kaiser already has obtained 52,000,000 marks, paid to him in Holland by the state, and has 40,000,000 coming through the sale of two houses in the Wilhelmstrasse, now the residence of Franch Eibert.

To him has been promised 100,000,000 in return for operas, theatres, museums, etc., which it is intended to repay immediately to the state pending settlement.

GERMAN CONTROL OF MOVIES FAILS

State of Mecklenburg-Schwerin Has Disastrous Experience in First Trial.

BERLIN, Dec. 9.—Germany, the land of state enterprise, has learned not to experiment with government ownership of the "movies." The state of Mecklenburg-Schwerin has just finished a lesburg-Schwerin has just finished a lesson which cost over a million and a half marks and which reads very much like a comic cinematograph scenario.

It began by founding the company with state money under the management of the mechanical expert of the state theatre. He engaged a secondrate theatre director from Berlin on a five-year contract at 50,000 marks a year. When the first rehearsals were under way he went on a personal strike for the title of "Regierungsrat" or state councillor. He also is accused of charging a 10 per cent commission on all supplies purchased, and of making all employees smoke cigarettes he sold them at a 30 per cent profit. A photographer was imported at 180,000 marks a year, and nearly every rehearsal was enlivened by a quarrel between him and his wife, who accused him of coquetting with the actresses.

The first film turned out by the state factory was greeted with laughter by the "trade" and could not be sold. So the company was placed under the supervision of the minister of education, a man who confessed he had only recently gone to a "movie" for the first time in his life and had no idea of the industry whatsoever.

The Berlin director was discharged while making the second film and prompedy filed suit for the balance of his contract. Now the ministers asks the state for a million marks to save the enterprise from ruin. The Legislature has ordered a complete investigation and prosecutions.



COUNTY COUNCILLORS TO CONSIDER GRANT FOR SCHOOL NURSES

Whole Afternoon Given Up To Big Guelph Show Closes With Speech-Making, Presentation Discussion of Educational Questions.

SYSTEM MEDIEVAL

President of East Middlesex **Association Meets Opposi**tion in Praising States' Schools.

Ample proof that the residents of the rural districts in Middlesex are awakening to the great importance of educaborne out in Thursday's ession of the county council. The afternoon, up to the time the council as a body, as the guests of the board of governors of the Western University inspected the new site, and some of the present buildings of that institution was wholly spent in the discussion of educational questions.

Two deputations waited upon the council. One representing the Women's Institute and headed by Dr. McKenzie Smith appeared before the members in the interests of medical inspection and nurses in the public schools in the rural and urban districts of the county. A reputation headed by P. J. Thompson, inspector of public schools of Middlesex East sought a grant of \$200 for the East Middlesex Educational Association. Warden Thomas Clark promised that the two requests would receive consideration by the proper committees.

Pleads For Grant.

Dr. McKenzie Smith made a plea for a grant of \$12,000, so that four nurses could be employed to carry on the work in Middlesex. These nurses, she claimed, would inspect the pupils of each of schools three or four times in a year. Each nurse would care for approximately 50 schools of 60 class rooms. They would also visit the homes of the pupils where necessary in order that she might get the cooperation of the parents in remedying any defect found in a child.

The nurses, she said, would examine operation of the parents in remedying any defect found in a child.

The nurses, she said, would examine the children for defects of the nose, eyes, ears and for diseases of the scalp, tonsils, lungs and skin. They would also be on teh lookout for children subjected to enaemia, mal-nutrition and weaknesses of the heart. There were, she said, an unbellevable number of children in the schools who were suffering from defects which should be treated. The parents of these children, ted. The parents of these children, said, were almost always unaware anything seriously was wrong, was especially true when the eye-

This was especially true when the eyesight was concerned.

A plea for the grant was also made by Mrs. McNaughton of Lucan. She told of the wonderful results which had been obtained by the clinic which is in operation in that place. She said that it was not charity for children to be treated or operated upon in the clinics, because every child had an equal right to care. She spoke of the large number who were found to need glasses.

Nurses Needed.

Inspector P. J. Thompson told the council that he was fully convinced that nurses were needed in the schools. He believed that if the health of the children received attention greater progress would be made in the schools. This, he said, would amply repay the county for any expenditure. He felt that if even 30 pupils were treated that the grant would have been worth while. Reeve J. E. Harrison, chairman of the educational committee of teh council, told the board that it had been planned last summer to put the work under a board of directors composed of the two

ast summer to put the work under a coard of directors composed of the two ol inspectors, representatives of the women's institutes, the educational committee of the council or others ap-pointed by that body and the board of trustees of the county. Mr. Thompson, speaking on the East Middlesex Educational Association said that it had been formed along with a like organization in Western Ontario to seek a better educational system. He believed that out of the discussion which would take place in the meetings of the association, a new and better system would evolve.

WEALTH IN MINING

IN NORTHERN ONTARIO Teachers To Train Men As

Geologists Needed, Says Professor Russell. "One of the greatest needs in Ontario today is efficient teachers to train men to become practical geolo-

gists," said Professor J. W. Russell of the department of geology, at the Western University to a large and enthusiastic audience in the arts building, Thursday evening in speaking on the subject of "Mining Development in Northern Ontario." The time has come to get efficient men to open up and explore the country north of what is now known. In that country there is considerable wealth in almost every line of mining, The people of Ontario are ignorant of the wealth of that country, and some means will have to be provided whereby the country can be opened up."

Professor Russell has made a careful study of Northern Ontario in relation to its mineral wealth, and gave outstanding figures of what it has produced for Canada during this year. He said that up to the present time the mineral output of Canada is estimated at \$300,000,000, and Ontario has produced about one-half that amount. In his lecture he told the audience of the opening of Northern Ontario, first as a timber country, then as an acriculture belt and later to what is the general occupation there now. Guilietti went before them with a scheme whereby the first month's increase and a portion of every month's wages thereafter were to be set aside to create a fund with which the workers should purchase ships. His proposal was received with great enthusiasm and there was constituted among the workers of the sea a co-operative named after the Italian national hero Garibaldi, himself a seaman. To quote the constitution, the co-operative was organized "with unlimited capital for a period of four years and renewable thereafter;" its purpose to "carry on navigation by means of national ships; to aid the Italian merchant marine; to aid in the economic and moral development of the workers of the sea." Miss MacSwiney expressed the belief that the fatal hunger strike of her brother had greatly benefitted the Irish political independence movement. She told of the series of telegrams she had exchanged with Mr. Lloyd George in an attempt to fix responsibility for her brother's prison sentence and for the treatment he and his relatives had been accorded by the British Government.

Lloyd George Responsible.

"The result of this exchange of telegrams," she added, "made me feel that Lloyd George was responsible before God and man for the death of my brother. I shall continue to spread truth of that situation throughout all of Ireland."

Miss MacSwiney gave an account of what she characterized as conspiracy between officials of Brixon prison and the British home office "to defeat plans of the family to take the lord mayor's body back to Cork," because, she said, "The British feared an uprising, and they did not want any more trouble than they already had.

"We Irish are no domestic problem of England," she said. "We are an international problem. Our ideals, the ideals of all Irish republicans are the same, and my plea to the people of the United States is that you at least give fair play and justice to us for the Sair play and justice to us for the British tories of the separatist movement do not carry all the facts. We are not divided, and we intend that the whole world shall know the truth, both of a

John Farrell Discusses Situation With Lambton County Councillors.

SARNIA, Dec. 9.—Consideration of the educational needs of Western Ontario was stressed in an address to the Lambton County Council at tonight's session by John Farrell of Forces who was a member of the deputation which appeared before the royal commission on university finances at Toronto yesterday.

FEW UNEMPLOYED IN CITY OF WOODSTOCK

WOODSTOCK Dec. 9.—A survey of the labor situation here shows that notwithstanding the large number of men reported out of work in other cities there are comparatively few out of employment here. Some of the local factories are running short time, but none are closed down, and only a small proportion have reduced their staffs to any extent. 
Kent Farmers Will Hold Meeting Saturday To Discuss Project.

MEIGHEN GOVT. DODGES NEEDS

Robertson Passes Responsibility On To Provinces and Cities.

BUY CANADIAN GOODS

Advises Citizens To Purchase Product of This Nation's Labor.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9 .- (By Canadian Press.)-The attitude of the Dominion Government toward the unemployment situation in Canada is set forth in a statement which was issued this evening from the office of the minister of Fatally Injured labor. It is, in brief, that unemployment problems are the more direct concern of the municipality or prov-W. G. McMahon Thought To ince in which the unemployment exists, and that they should be dealt with primarily by such municipality or

primarily by such municipality or province.

Federal aid could be given only when the problem becomes too difficult to handle locally. The Government of Canada, it is stated, is willing and anxious to do what is needed to aid the local bodies in solving the problem. But it cannot assume obligations which properly belong to a particular municipality or province. Through the department of labor the Federal Government will be glad to co-operate with the provincial authorities as necessity appears and through the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment it will continue to give special attention to disabled or partly incapacitated soldiers.

Makes No Distinction.

Makes No Distinction.

"Obviously," says the statement,
"there can no longer be any recognized distinction between the physically fit returned man and other unemployed workmen. The disabled or
partly disabled returned soldier must
and will continue to receive special
attention."

attention."

In opening, the statemest sets forth that the Government has been kept closely informed respecting the problem of unemployment and has done all possible to provide against the foreseen inevitable contraction in business. The employment service of Canada, carried on co-operatively by federal and provincial authorities, has, it is stated, secured employment for more than 600,000 men and women since March 1919. March 1919

"Up to September 1929, labor in Can-ada was well absorbed, Toronto, Vic-toria and Vancouver being the only points where unemployment was complained of," continues the statement.
"At those three places unemployment outside the city at good wages was offered during September and October for 3,400 men with practically no response. Since that time the situation of the control of the c sponse. Since that time the situation is changed, in that men engaged in seasonal occupations, or who lost their employment through the contraction of industry, have taken the outside employment offered so that the opportunities of two months ago no longer exist."

longer exist."

What Was Done.

The statement reviews briefly what the Federal Government has done to try and improve the situation. The reopening of work on the Welland Canal in 1919 gave, it says, employment to between 2,000 and 3,000 workmen. The extension of the shipbuilding program employed some more. Immigration of industrial workers has been restricted to a minimum, and 3,600 requests for skilled workers filed by Canadian employers with the department of immigration since January last, have been gration since January last, have bee

is being utilized.

Many employers are retaining as many of their men as possible, manufacturing stocks, the sale of which is uncertain, rather than cut down their staffs.

The statement draws attention to the fact that the purchase of Canadian-made articles will help to reduce unemployment. ployment. "If every citizen will do his or her part in giving employment, where and when possible," it closes, "and will purchase only the product of Canadian labor where obtainable, the unemployment ploblem will be minimized."





"The Hapsburg will never give up their former countries," said Kovacs. "I am reliably informed that former Emperor Charles insists on first entering Vienna, and thence marching in triumph to Budapest. But the Magyars will never again acquiesce in losing their deady-paid independence."

Kovacs expresses the opinion of large masses of the rural population.

Prince Louis Windischgraetz, a personal friend of the Emperor, contested successfully for a seat in the National Assembly of Hungary and might contribute materially in helping to victory the case of his friend and former sovereign. He told the Associated Press correspondent:

"There can be no doubt about the claims of Charles. He is the crowned king of Hungary and until he resigns or arrives at some agreement with the nation, any attempt to dethrone him is an overt act of revolution.

"Hungary," the prince continued, "is now dependent on the help of one of the not strongly opposed to the return of the Hapsburgs, the more so, because it is an essential condition of maintaining permanent order in Eastern Europe. Besides, the restoration of the dynasty is

ermanent order in Eastern Europe. Benot explicitly vetoed by the treaty of Yeuilly.

"Charles, as a man, is the ideal ruler. He is entirely democratic, and a reformer, and although the caluminations
of his enemies spared neither his person nor his family, I am convinced that
under more favorable circumstances he
would have been the most popular and

most beloved king in the whole

the most beloved king in the whole world.

"The talk of the claims of the Wittelsbach dynasty is mere nonsense; even the Hapsburg dynasty is blamed for not being sufficiently Magyar. Nobody can possibly think of electing a totally foreign king and dynasty.

"One thing is certain," concluded the prince, "we shall never indulge in plots, and if Charles is ever to return to Hungary, he will come back openly, and not in cowardly secrecy."

VALUABLES FOUND BY DIGGERS IN SEWER

Boston, Mass. Dec. 9 .- A sewer gang quit work at noon recently with a valued treasure trove. In the slime of an old pit near the Quincey House they had found three gold rings, coins, watches and other valuables. Hotel employees suggested that the hotel had a claim on the articles as the property probably belonged to guests of bygone days. The police suspected that 'they were part of the loot of thieves, but when the men showed coins dating back to 1787, stamped with a pine tree on one side and "Massachusetts" on the other, they insisted that the statute of limitations made the property theirs. With the ancient coins they found beer checks which the foreman of the gang said he intended to keep with a "pine tree shilling" as a souvenir of the past. One man, who was caught in Central Europe, had in his possession a number of queer-looking postage stamps upon which were printed Soviet propaganda matter. The authorities were able to enlarge this to ordinary size.





What Will Check America's Carnival of Crime?

In Chicago more than a thousand denizens of the underworld were recently rounded up in a swift series of spectacular raids, which marked the advent of a new chief of police. In New York City, since the first of the year, the Tribune tells us, "the unsolved murders alone total more than 100," and the hold-ups, robberies and thefts reported by the police represent a property loss of more than \$3,100,000. In Philadelphia, according to the Inquirer of that city, there have been 100 murders in eleven months; and a recent record of 50 hold-ups in one day has resulted in plans for a special motorcycle squad of banditchasing riflemen. In Pittsburg, according to a corresopndent, "there has been an increase of 20 per cent in crime this year, and "13 murders remain unsolved by the police." In Boston, says the Herald of that city, "hold-ups by gunmen are becoming increasingly numerous." In Cincinnati the Commercial Tribune states that "every agency of robbery is working overtime." In St. Louis conditions have recently compelled Chief of Police O'Brien to organize a "drive" against gunmen, gangsters and the criminal forces generally. Cleveland's records show 70 murders. Detroit confesses to an increase in homicides and robberies over its average for the last six years. In San Francisco the head of the detective bureau reports that "crimes of violence have increased since the advent of prohibition." In Seattle "robberies, hold-ups and burglaries have been occurring with disturbing frequency," according to the Seattle Times, which adds, "The entire country is experiencing a veritable epidemic of crime."


WORKERS UNCHANGED

Cleveland, O., Dec. 10.—The wages of 7.000 union employees in the women's garment industry here will remain unchanged under a decision handed down last night by the board of referees which supervises labor relations between the Cleveland Garment Manufacturers' Association and the Cleveland branches of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union. The decision also provides that a scientific system for measuring production shall be installed as soon as practicable.

The workers and the 35 large manufacturers of women's garments affected announced they will abide by the decision.

The workers had demanded a wage increase of 15 per cent. The employers requested that wages be reduced to the scale established October 19, 1918, which was about 15 per cent lower than the present scale. The manufacturers later withdrew their demand.

NORWEGIAN VESSEL **GROUNDS ON SUNKEN** LEDGE OFF HALIFAX

Steamer Reported in Perilous Condition Due to Heavy

Halifax, Dec, 10.—Canadian Press.
—Expert seamanship on the part of the 39 members of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Romsdal-fjord enabled them to reach land in safety today after their ship had piled on Broad Shoal aS mbro Ledges, in a driving sea, early this morning. The steamer struck in clear weather, just inside the Sisters Bell at 3 o'clock.

The crew got away in two boats after great difficulty, and were eventually guided into a haven at Sandy Beach by means of signals from shore, shortly before 10. o'clock. While making heir way to Ketch Harbor, a mile and a half distant, the crew witnessed the breaking in two of the steamer they had left less than two hours before.

Halifax, Dec. 10.—The Norwegian steamer Romsdalsfjord ran ashore on a sunken ledge at Sambro, off Halifax harbor, at 3 o'clock this morning. No loss of life is reported, but there is a heavy sea running, and the ship is in a perilous position. Her position is about half a mile to the eastward of the rocks upon which the Bohemian struck last Pebruary. The Romsdalsfjord, a freighter of 3,000 tons, was bound from Norway to New York, and put into this port for bunkers. Tugs which went out in response to S. O. S. calls from the stranded ship were reported forced back to harbor by the heavy weather outside. The marine and fisheries department steamer Dollard left at 6 o'clock for the scene of the wreck. At \$ o'clock the crew were reported leaving the Romsdalsfjord in two boats and making for Ketch harbor. Heavy seas are breaking over the vessel.




