

An Act to enable His Majesty to make such Regulations as may be necessary to prevent the Inconvenience which might arise from the Competition of His Majesty's Subjects and those of the Most Christian King, in carrying on the Fishery on the Coasts of the Island of Newfoundland.



HERCAS, by the Chirteenth Article Preamble. of the Creaty concluded at Utrecht Treaty of on the Fourth Day of April, Dem cited. Stile, in the Bear of our Lord Onethouland feven punded and thirteen, between ber late Wajesty Duten Anne and the Wost Christian

King Louis the Fourteenth, it was, among other Things, agreed, That the Juand called Newfoundland, with the adjacent Mands, Hould, from that Cime forward, belong of Right wholly to Britain, and to that End the Town and fortrels of Placentia, and whatever

ANNO other Places in the faid Jaand were in the Polletion of the French, Hould be yielded and given up, within Seven Monthe from the Erchange of the Ratification of that Creaty, or tooner if polities, by the Woll Chilitian King, to those who had a Commission from the Ducen of Great Britain for that Purpole; nor hould the Soft Chillian King, Dis Beirs og Succellogs, og any of theft Subjects, at any Cime thereafter, lay Claim to any Right to the faid Island and Islands, or to any Part of them; moreover, it thould not be lawful for the Subjeds of France to fortify any Place, in the laid Juand of Newfoundland, of to exect any Buildings there, besides Stages made of Boards, and hats preffary and uleful for diping of fish, or to resort to the faid Juand beyond the Cime-necessary for fishing and dyping Kish: Chat it thould be allowed to the Subjects of France to catch fill. and to dry them on Land, on that Part only, and in none other besides that Part of the Jaand of Newfoundland, which aretches from the Place called Cape Bonavista, to the Porthern Point of the said Juand, and from thence running down by the Western Side, and reaches as far as the Place called Cape Riche: "And whereas, by the Kifth Article of the Treaty of Peace, concluded at Paris recited. Paris on the Centh Day of February One thousand seven bundred and firty-three, between his Wajelly and the late Wolf Chistian King Louis the Kisteenth, and Dis Mand of Newfoundland, fuch as is specified in the Thirpage, concluded at Versailles, between his Wajelly and

Wolt Catholick Bajelty, it was, among other Chings, agreed, that the Subjects of France thould have the Liberty of fifting and diging on a Part of the Eout of the teenth Article of the Creaty of Utrecht, Achicle is confirmed and renewed by the prefent Erenty: And whereas, by the Fifth Article of the Definitive Ereaty of the Woll Chillian King, on the Third Day of September One thousand seven hundzed and eighty-three, it was, smong other Chings, agreed, Chat his Wajelty, the Bing of Great Britain, hould be maintained in his Kight to, the Mand of Newfoundland, and to the adjacent Mands, as the Mhole were affured to him by the Thirteentb

teenth Article of the Creaty of Utrecht, excepting the Mands of Saint Pierre and Miquelon, which were ceded in full Right, by the faid Creaty of the Third Day of September Dne thousand seven hundred and eightpethree, to bis Wolf Christian Wajesty; and that his Wajesty, the Wost Christian King, in order to prevent the Quarrels which had before then arisen between the Two Pations of England and France, consented to remove the Bight of Fishing which belonged to him in virtue of the aforesaid Article of the Treaty of Utrecht, from Cape Bonavista to Cape Saint John, lituated on the Eastern Coast of Newfoundland, in Kifty Degrees Moth Latitude, and Dis Waselfp the King of Great Britain consented, on his Part, that the Fisherp assigned to the Subjects of his Wost Christian Wajesty, beginning at the said Cape Saint John, nassing to the Porth, and descending by the Western Coast of the Mand of Newfoundland, should extend to the Place called Cape Rage, lituate in Forty-leven Degrees and Fifty Minutes Latitude: The French Fishermen should enjoy the Fishery which was assigned to them by the said Article, as they had the Right to enjoy that which was assigned to them by the Treaty of Utracht: And whereas, Declaration of by a Declaration delivered by his Hajesty's Ambassadoz King of Sere. Extraozdinary to his Wolf Chzistian Pajesty, bearing 3, 1783, re-Date also on the said Third Day of September Dne thousand seven hundzed and eighty-three, his Majesty engaged not only to insure the Execution of the lastmentioned Treaty with His known good Faith and Punduality, but to give all possible Efficacy to such Principles as may prevent Dispute; and, that the Kishermen of the Two Bations map not give Cause for daily Quarrels. was pleased to engage that he would take the most politive Wealures for preventing his Subjects from interrupting in any Wanner, by their Competition, the fishing of the French, during the temporary Exercise thereof which is granted to them upon the Coalls of the Mand of Newfoundland, and that he would, for that Purpole, cause the permanent Settlements which thousa he formed there to be removed; and that he would give Diders that the French Kilhermen thould not be incommoded

moded in the cutting of Wood necessary for the Repair of their Scaffolds, Huts, and Fishing Boats; and that the Thirteenth Article of the Treaty of Utrecht, and the Wethod of carrying on the Fishery which had at all Times been acknowledged, hould be the Plan upon which the Fishery should be carried on there, and that it should not be deviated from by either Party, the French Kilbermen building only their Scaffolds, confining them: felbes to the Repair of their fishing Uestels, and not wintering there; the Subjects of his Britannick Wajelty, on their Part, not moletting in any Wanner the French Kilhermen during their Kilhing, noz injuring their Scaffolds during their Absence: And whereas it is expedient, in Conformity to the Definitive Creaty of Peace and the Declaration afozelaid, that his Wajelly's Subjects thould be prevented from interrupting in any Wanner, by their Competition, the aforesaid Fishery of the Subjeds of his Wolt Chillian Wajelly, during the tempozary Exercise thereof which is granted to them on the Coast of Newfoundland; and that all permanent Establishments on that Part of the Coast allotted to the French fishermen should be removed; and that such fishermen should be in no Manner molested, contrary to the Tenoz of the faid Creaty, and the good Faith thereof: In order, therefore, that His Wajelly may be the better enabled to carry the faid several Treaties and Declarations into faithful and vundual Execution, and to make fuch Regulations as may be expedient, respecting the filberp, in the Wanner herein-after mentioned, be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Wajesty, and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Tempozal, and Commons, in this prefent Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That it half and may be lawful for his Wajesty, his beirs and Successors, by Advice of Council, from Time to Time, to aibe such Diders and Instructions to the Go-Governor of Newfoundland, or to any Officer or Officers on that Station, as he or they hall deem proper and necessary per to fulfil the Purpoles of the Definitive Creaty and Dethe Treaty of claration afozefaid; and, if it hall be necessary to that Versalies, and

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, Persons refusing to conform That if any Person of Persons thall refuse, upon Requisis to the Directions of the Gotion made by the Governoz, oz any Officer oz Officers afting vernor, to for-feit 2001. under him, in pursuance of his Wajesty's Diders of In-Arudions as aforesaid, to depart from within the Limits aforesaid, or otherwise to conform to such Requisition and Directions as such Governoz, or other Officer as aforesaid. thall make or give, for the Purpoles aforefaid, every such Person or Persons so refusing, or otherwise offending against the same, shall forfeit the Sum of Two hundred Pounds, to be recovered in the Court of Sellion, of Court How Penalties of Aice Admiralty in the said Juand of Newfoundland, or covered and by Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of his Wajeltp's Courts of Record at Westminster; One Woiety of such Penalty to belong to his Waielly, his beirs and Succeffors, and the other Woiety to fuch Person of Persons as thall fue or profecute for the same: Provided always, Limitation of Suits. that every such Suit or Prosecution, if the same be commenced in Newfoundland, thall be commenced within Three Months, and if commenced in any of Dis Wajesty's Courts of Becord at Westminster, within Twelve Wonths. from the Time of the Commission of such Offence.
