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


The full dignity of the appropriate design of the new home of the ART ASSOCIATION OF MONTREAL is becoming increasingly apparent to all who have occasion to pass the site in Sherbrooke Street. If some Montrealers have been in the habit of regarding the Art Association as a private preserve they will have to modify their view; there is no charge of narrowness or exclusiveness to be brought against a society which, without a cent of support from the civic purse, endows the City with such a monumental building as that which is now to be seen rising to completion. Whatever may have been the impression in the past, the very stones of the new edifice cry aloud that its designers are building for the benefit of the whole population of the City of Montreal.

HE exterior is of white marble, the style being "Classical," adapted to suit the requirements of a modern, fireproof Art Building.

The Sherbrooke Street front (and main entrance) has a recessed portico of stately aspect. The monolithic columns are of the Ionic order, and said to be the largest shafts of marble in America. A complete Art Building — it is worthy of the importance of its destined use, and worthy of a great city.

This building, of such imposing proportions, and so well constructed and equipped, will be a magnificent monument to those who may contribute towards its erection and so to the advancement of Art, and will be a source of pride to all entitled to the privileges of membership in the Association.

Donors of money or property to the value of \$5,000 and upwards, are enrolled as Benefactors, and have their names inscribed on the walls of the Art Gallery and printed in every Annual Report. They are entitled to 5 Votes at General Meetings.

Governors.

A donation of \$500 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) \$1,000, shall be a qualification for nomination to the office of Governor and entitle the donor 5 Votes at General Meetings.

Life Members.

A donation of \$200 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) \$400, is a qualification for nomination to the office of Life Member and entitles the donor to 5 Votes at General Meetings.

Terms of payment to the Benefactors, Life Governors and Life Membership funds can be arranged to suit the convenience of the Subscriber covering a period of four or five years if desired.

Family Members.

The yearly subscription from January 1st to December 31st for a family membership, entitling the holder, the ladies of the family, and all sons under twenty, living at home, to the privileges of the Association, \$10. Supplementary tickets for sons from twenty to twenty-five years of age may be issued in connection with a family ticket at \$2 each. Holder of family ticket entitled to 1 Vote.

The Subscription for individual members \$5, entitled to 1 Vote at General Meeting. The annual fees of members are due on the 1st January in each year, payable in advance. An Annual Report, containing a full list of members is issued.
