LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Dundas has 3,539 souls.

It has been decided to place a marble statue of the late Prince Imperial in Westminster Abbey.

Edward O'Kelly, the last of the Fenian prisoners released from Spike Island, died at Newark, N. J., on Saturday.

In consequence of the increased military strength of France and Russia, Germany intends increasing her army.

Jacob Mears, Susan Mears, and Michael Flanagan have been committed for trial for the murder of Mrs. Conly, in Montreal.

The revision of the voters' list in Vercheres has resulted in a net loss of 36 to the Liberal party. The day fixed for the election poll is the 17th of July.

It is singular that the less a preacher does for his money, this warm weather, the more he is thought of. In all parts of the country are heard appeals to the clergymen to abbreviate their sermons.

Voters' Lists will prove valuable to business men hereafter. The law now requires the post office address of every elector to be given on the Voters' List, as well as to have the letter J opposite the name of every one qualified to act as a jurymen.

A bachelor on 10th line, Brooke, still holds all his wool since 1872. That year he refused 5+ cents per pound for it. He has it stored upstairs in his log house. He keeps 40 to 60 head, and this season sheared 56, the poorest fleece weighing 64 pounds. He hangs on for a better price and says the wool is as good to him as the money.

The report of the Commissioner of Fisheries for 1878 has just been issued, and, as usual, it is full of interesting matter. The value of the produce of the fisheries last year was \$13,215,000, as compared with \$12,030,000 in 1877. The increase is principally in the cod, mackerel, salmon and lobster fisheries. The value of the fish exported last year was \$11,775,000, the United States markets absorbing about one half of the total exports. The imports of fish during the same period were valued at \$2,151,000. Nearly all of these imports were from the United States.

IMPORTANT.—An exchange says: "A man drew a note promising to pay one hundred dollars. He used a printed form, and did not close up the blank devoted to dollars, and after passing as negotiable paper somebody inserted 'and fifty' after the one hundred and before the printed dollars. The note thus altered got into the hands of an innocent party, who presented it to the drawer, and the Supreme Court decided that the maker of the note was liable for its face, because through negligence he did not draw a line between the word 'hundred' and the printed word 'dollars.' Any testimony that the drawer might offer to establish the fact that he gave the note for one hundred dollars must go for nothing, as there was nothing on the face of the note showing that it had been altered, evidence of any alteration on the face of the note would have changed the case. Let this be a lesson to all drawers of promissory notes. No one can be too careful in such matters."

The Stratford *Beacon* has been talking nonsense about getting Mr. Mowat to retaliate for the dismissal of Grit office holders by the Dominion government. The *Times* points out that the registry office of North Perth is what the *Beacon* man is after, and calls his attention to the fact that while that is about the only office in Perth which is the gift of the local government and which is not already filled by a Grit, there are quite a number of Grit officials whose offices are in the control of the Dominion government. It would thus appear that retaliation is not a good kind of game for Perth Grits to play.—*Guelph Herald*.

The Indian producer is complaining of the duty imposed on Indian coffee at English ports. In both England and France, who are the largest consumers, Indian coffee is subject to very heavy duties, 14s. per cwt. in England, and 166f. the 100 kilogrammes in France when imported direct, an addition of 20f. being made when the importation is made indirectly. The duty of 156f. is equal to a rate of £3 5s. 5d. per cwt. which is, in fact, not much short of 100 per cent. on the value of Indian coffee. The English duty is at the rate of about 15 per cent. *ad valorem*. It is observed, as a singular anomaly, that the United States, with their immensely protective tariff, set a good example to free trade England in this matter, for they admit coffee in the berry free of duty.
