

In view of the exceptional importance which at present attaches to a favourable balance of trade, the unique position of our fishing industry is worthy of note. No other branch of Canadian industry ontributes to our exports so large a pro contributes to our exports so large a pro-portion of its total output as the fisheries. During 1914-1915, out of a production valued at \$31,000,000 in round numbers, Canada exported fish products valued at \$19,000,000, or nearly 63 per cent of the total.
