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

Sad Story of Two Starving Belgian Children.

Two little children lost in the pitiable throng of Belgian sufferers held each other tight by the hand. Two little boys, probably brothers, the elder who may have been five or six old, protecting the younger of about three. They were huddled together, their faces pale and their bodies shivering. Their clothes were clean, but their little stockings were thick and warm, clearly they belonged to a family of careful parents; they were doubtless the sons of one of those sublime Belgian soldiers who had fallen heroically on the battlefield, and whose last thought had perhaps been one of supreme tenderness for them. They were not even crying, so overcome were they by fatigue and sleepiness; they could scarcely stand, they could not answer when they were questioned, but they seemed intent, above all, upon keeping a tight hold of each other.

Finally the elder, clasping the little one's hand closely, as if fearing to lose him, seemed to awake to a sense of his duty as a protector, and half asleep already, found strength to say in a suppliant tone to the Red Cross lady bending over him, "Madame are they going to put us to bed now?" For the moment this was all they hoped for from human pity, to be put to bed.

They were put to bed at once together, of course, still holding each other tightly by the hand, and nestling one against the other, they fell at the same moment into the tranquil unconsciousness of childish slumber.

Alcohol in Extract of Malt.

At a recent meeting of the committee of the London (England) United Temperance Council it was reported that the excise authorities had objected to a certain form of selling a 'malt extract' without a magistrate's license. The committee, however, refused to give a license, which had been granted. The committee directed that an inquiry should be made into the matter. Ordinary malt extract, the committee points out, is an evaporated infusion of malt, and consists principally of dextrin and maltose, and possesses certain digestive properties. But it has become customary to make a liquid extract of malt, by a process of less evaporation of the infusion, and adding alcohol to prevent decomposition. These preparations are said to average 7 per cent, and upwards of alcohol. Those who object to alcoholic medicines should have an assurance that their purchase does not contain alcohol, and should not purchase any proprietary preparation from licensed chemists.—British Congregationalist.

Within two years 4,000 millionaires have been added to the 12,000 the U. S. boasted before the war in Europe. Fortunes of a million have been made overnight, of ten millions in a week or month of a hundred millions in a year or two. The 4,000 millionaires have been added to the 12,000 since the beginning of the European war.

Similar results have occurred in Canada in the same time, according to population, corn, combines and corporations.

The working classes and all sorts of day laborers and their wives and children have been suffering and starving from exorbitant prices for the necessities of life.

A New York paper describes the results as follows: All necessities of life are lifted beyond the reach of the laboring classes, and distress and misery is the result. Children are huddled around cold stoves, and their little stomachs are empty, wives are worn and wan. Christian churches surround the haunts and homes of the poor and famishing. Afternoon teas are not far distant where Mrs. Lavinia Pours, Mrs. Jabber rours, Mrs. Daller rours, Miss Rapsing rours and Miss Embonpoint rours.

From the days of Achan, Jacob and the killing of the fatted calf, selfishness has steadily sifted down through the ages, and stalks unhindered over Canada and the U. S. One writer says the difference between a twentieth century hog and a corporate individual, is the hog does not pretend to be a gentleman.

I close with a bit of history. In 1836-7, when stove coal was \$10.00 per ton, and flour \$12.00 per bbl., butter, eggs, ham, and all sorts of provisions at highest prices, and all the necessary articles of life were held by corners, and corporations in New York, a starving multitude marched out to City Hall Park, bearing banners, reading, "Bread, wheat be heard."

The crowd first marched to Eld Hart's warehouses, where 600,000 lbs. of flour were being held for higher prices. The mob attacked his storehouses, for he had refused to sell at the old prices. They carried away the barrels of flour to the starving wives and children. At Horrick & Co.'s the mob was so great the militia could do nothing with them; they opened the warehouses, carried off all the flour and everything that was stored, cleaned out everything and took all to their families.

Who will say that this act of the starving multitude was wrong? The only wonder the same thing is not occurring in America and Canada today; for the same selfishness is rampant in both countries. Men are fattening on the blood, death, misery and starvation of their fellowmen.

Dominant militarism, I believe, is the crushing out of corners and corporations, the freeing of the poor, the end of political corruption, and the age of humanity.

After Prussian militarism, political debilitation, commercial debasement and financial rascality, are the great crimes in the world. Christianity must prevail if Christianity is true.

The theft of a sword got between the spokes of one of the wheels. The son of the duchess, who was riding on horseback by the side of the carriage, fell with his horse. He sprang to the rescue, and saw if he could not render assistance but he was commended by the famous John Brown to "stand back, mon."

Editorial Brevities.

Germany continues to make enemies among the neutrals. China, a country of unlimited trade possibilities and prior to the war a centre of German activity, is now on the verge of war. Even if the creek is avoided the present strained relations will make it more difficult for Germany to re-establish trade relations. After the war the German trader who seeks a share of the world's business will learn things which should exercise a wholesome influence in making the Germans a better people.

An official Berlin despatch says that in a raid on the British coast on Feb. 25th, German warships steamed into the English Channel beyond the line from Dover to Calais and into the mouth of the Thames river, where they encountered British destroyers, which were dispersed and damaged, the German ships returning unharmed. The despatch does not explain why this wonderfully successful expedition was not carried to its logical conclusion, German warships after defeating and dispersing a British fleet in the mouth of the Thames missed the opportunity of the war. They should have proceeded up the river and blown London off the map.

Previous to the war, Germany and Austria reaped huge profits from the de-tinning and degalvanizing of our refuse metals, and fruit pulp tins, sardine tins, salmon tins and all kinds of discarded metals, which were returned to us from Germany after treatment in the shape of trays of all descriptions, match boxes, match strikers, letter racks, photograph stands and many other articles which were on exhibition. The Germans had taken from England, at the very lowest, 30,000 tons of old tins per annum, valued at five dollars per ton, and at pre-war prices for every 10,000 worth of old tins the Germans made \$7,500 worth of pure tin alone. Now it is proposed that England will deal with this waste by a new process.

Shipbuilding Revived.

While Germany's ruthless and lawless campaign against the world's shipping is not likely to prove any great factor in their favor as regards the ultimate result of the war, it has created an economic crisis that is receiving much attention from business interests.

In the United States some of the foremost writers of the day are warning the people that they must get marine insurance to meet the transportation problem.

Women and the Franchise.

Announcement by the Ontario government of an intention to confer the franchise on women, and the decision of Western legislatures to the same effect naturally creates interest in the status of women in relation to the Federal franchise. The old question as to whether or not a woman is a person in the meaning of the statute, conferring the franchise, is again raised in discussion of the right of those granted a provincial franchise to vote in Federal elections. The Dominion law gives to every provincial elector the right to vote for Federal representatives, but as that right was granted when males only voted there is room for a legal question as to the Federal right of women since granted provincial franchise rights. The Dominion authorities may get over the matter by letting the courts decide the point, or by passing a short act enfranchising or disenfranchising the women, or by again establishing a Federal registration. Past experience has made the latter course most unlikely, even as a means of escape from a difficult problem. Ontario's decision makes woman's suffrage throughout Canada a certainty of the near future. It may even determine Ottawa not to put obstacles in the way of the franchise by women who enjoy the right to vote in provincial affairs.

Evenly Starr's Third New York Recital.

Anolian Hall, New York, was the scene of another triumph for Evelyn Starr, the young violinist, who gave her third recital for the season there last Monday at a noon, February 10th. She began with Bach's E Major Concerto, which she played with great dash and vigor. Bach may never have heard his Allegro played as fast two hundred years ago in old Leipzig, but Evelyn Starr did not destroy the genial, old world spirit of the concerto by playing it in a manner acceptable to a modern public that is accustomed to performances the old world never dreamed of. She was recalled again and again for her brilliant, energetic and rhythmically strong performance.

Mendelssohn's E Minor Concerto with orchestral accompaniment condensed to a piano part, completed the program. Here again the violinist showed her technical mastery and her buoyant spirit of youth. She had plenty of breath when necessary, but it was evident she was temperamentally better suited with movements requiring dash and vivacity. She took the last movement at a great pace but her clean, neat, technical finish prevented any blur or confusion. The recital was emphatically a success.

The Bible Society and the War.

Since the war began the British and Foreign Bible Society has distributed among the soldiers and sailors and interned prisoners of the countries now at war, more than 5,500,000 copies of the Scriptures in fifty different languages, and the Canadian Bible Society and its auxiliaries have distributed more than 270,000 copies of the Soldier's Khaki Testament among our Canadian soldiers, and have promised to provide a free copy for every soldier going overseas. It has also provided a copy, in his own language, for every interned prisoner in Canada. For sick and wounded soldiers and sailors of all nations the Society undertakes to present as many Testaments, Gospels and Psalters as are needed for all the Red Cross organizations and field and base hospitals in Great Britain, France, Russia and any country engaged in the war. These books, bound in khaki, are also supplied free of charge and carriage paid, for prisoners of war, for interned aliens and for civilian refugees. For putting the Word of God into the hands of the combatants without distinction between friend and foe the Society has been in command of resources and machinery which belong to no other organization, and it has labored without ceasing to turn this great emergency into a great opportunity for spreading abroad the Gospel of God's redeeming love.

In addition to free distribution, the Society has granted to those in any country who give away books among soldiers and sailors, Pocket Testaments, Gospels and Psalters at a war discount—which means that they obtain such books at a mere fraction of what they cost. Also the Society's collectors have done splendid work in Belgium, France, Italy and many other countries where the war has raged, and many interesting and pathetic instances might be related. For example: A German army chaplain, to whom we sent Testaments for Protestant soldiers, replied:

"Although I am a Catholic priest, I am willing to undertake the circulation of the Testaments. In these hard times it is necessary that all Christians, whatever their confession, stand together to build the Kingdom of God." In a letter of thanks for a Bible one German soldier wrote: "It was the right food at the right time. May God reward you for it."

An application has been received in London from the depot of the Imperial Majesty in Odessa, through the wife of General Brusiloff, for fifty thousand copies of the four Gospels bound together, and fifty thousand Psalters for the needs of the South-western Army. These books will be given in response to this request, as far as money may be received for this special object.

Town Council.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening the mayor and all the members were present. The principal business was the passing of the estimates for the current year.

The Council and citizens are to be congratulated that it has been possible to keep the rate at 2 per cent. In view of the advance in prices of all articles citizens will be glad to know that their tax is not to be increased.

National Service Literature Kings-County Farmers Association

One of the most valuable of recent literary contributions to the great cause is a booklet by Professor Stephen Leacock, entitled "National Organization for War." In this booklet Dr. Leacock makes an urgent call for national thrift and national saving. He attacks in vigorous style the evils of extravagance at this crisis in Canada's history, and by trenchant phrase and apt illustration disposes of various common errors in regard to individual spending of money during war time.

This pamphlet was originally published by Dr. Leacock himself but the National Service Board were so convinced of its value in connection with their Thrift Campaign that they have had it republished and have undertaken its distribution. Copies may be obtained by writing to the Secretary of the National Service Board at Ottawa, or by applying to the National Service Director in any Province.

Military Hospital Lantern Slides.

An Ontario minister the other day borrowed from the Military Hospital Commission a set of Lantern Slides. These slides show what goes on at the hospitals and sanatoria. That is, they show a musing of how our injured soldiers are being restored to health and to power for self support, however serious their injuries may be. The minister exhibited the slides at three country churches under his charge. In returning the set he writes:

"My recording steward, who is also the post-master and chairman of the board, should be shown in every community. They meet the unrest in many families who have feared that the maimed who return will be forced to sell lead pencils or such like."

The "Buy-At-Home" Campaign.

"BUY AT HOME" IS THE SLOGAN—
CAMPAIGN EXTENDED TO
WOLFVILLE.

If the mail-order houses of Upper
Canada notice a phenomenal falling
off in orders from Kings county in the
next few months, they will have to
blame the "buy-at-home" campaign
which is to be started in this town
within a few days. The fight is about
to be launched. It is true that it is
somewhat late but it will be even
more strenuous than if waged at an
earlier period.

The mail-order firms have had
things too easy in the past. The local
merchant, like the British bull dog,
requires a lot to a one him but when
he gets started there is trouble ahead
for some one.

The "buy-at-home" campaign is a
co-operative effort on the part of the
business interest of the community to
encourage buying at home. Keep
your money in circulation at home. It
is the object, and through the local press
appeals will be made to the people to
give the home merchant the prefer-
ence.

The campaign is being started simul-
taneously in the leading towns and
cities of the province, a group of pro-
gressive merchants in each communi-
ty are backing the scheme, and since
it was announced in Wolfville some
weeks ago, that such a campaign was
to take place, much interest has been
manifested, and there is no question
but that the movement will be a big
success.

We have before us copies of several
of the "buy-at-home" articles, and
must say that they are of an intense-
ly human interest and should make
the public realize that its first duty is
to the home merchants. A particu-
larly striking paragraph in one of these
articles is as follows:

'Let us suppose you are a farmer.
You sell your produce in and about
your nearest town; you cannot sell it
if Montreal or Toronto, and there-
fore anything that makes the people
of your town wealthier or more pros-
perous naturally means more business
for you. Is it fair or just that you
take this money that you earn in
your home town and send it away for
goods that you know can be purchased
just as satisfactorily from your best
friend—the local merchant?'

And what is true of the farmer is
true of you, Mr. Clergyman, of you,
Mr. School Teacher, of you, Mr. Car-
penter, of you, Madam, and you, and
you, and you.

The management of the 'Buy-at-
Home' campaign received the follow-
ing flattering letter from a country
merchant:

'I wish to congratulate you upon
your articles upon buying at home.
They certainly strike the right key
and I hope they will prove power-
ful, both to yourself and in assisting
the object aimed at. This is the kind
of publicity and sort of patriotism
that I have always felt this county,
and especially this town, needs to
bring it to sound and genuine pros-
perity.'

We have no doubt that the response
in Wolfville to the 'Buy-at-Home'
campaign will be whole hearted and
generous. If the home merchant can
give the same value as the mail-order
houses, why a couldn't he have your
trade and we are prepared to say
that the merchants of Wolfville are most
anxious for you to compare prices
before ordering your goods from Tor-
onto and are ready to demonstrate
that you just as cheaply and advan-
tageously at home.

One of the largest retail Furniture

in upper Canada.

No doubt some Wolfville merchants
will come out with the same state-
ment in conjunction with the 'Buy-at-
Home' movement. All success to the
campaign.

Prevention of Coal Short-
age.

This winter we have had a coal
'famine' and that suffering has ac-
companied the shortage of this nec-
essary is undeniable. The average citi-
zen has a notoriously short memory,
but now is the time to impress upon
him that, in many cases, the suffer-
ing was due to lack of foresight. In
Canada—often only one ton. If for
any cause, there is a shortage of coal,
improvident householders demand
that the coal dealers do the impos-
sible, namely, that they supply fuel
that is unobtainable. Whereas, had

of the weather and the extraordinary
prosperity in the United States caused
an unprecedented congestion of
freight. A survey of conditions in the
United States demonstrates that in
the future there will be more coal
'famines' than in the past and that
they will occur at shorter intervals.
For this there is only one remedy.
Buy your coal in the summer. If you
have not sufficient storage, enlarge
your coal bin.

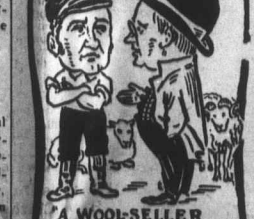
