3. How you sought to persuade him to go with you to the house of God? A few gentle words might win him a ray from some place of pleasure or vanity, to the prayer-meeting. A kind invitation might induce him to enter with you into the place where the gospel is proclaimed. There the Spirit of God may meet him, and renew him. There, at least, Jesus can be held up before him, and the cross meet his view. Do you delight to separate from him without an attempt to lead him with you?

4. How you show him in your life what it is to be a Christian? How many persons might be preached every day, and with irresistible point and force, by simple consistency! How many souls might be won by the attractive power of a holy life. Have you tried its virtues with the one whom you wish to win? Have you been a "living epistle," to be constantly "known and read of him." Can he see the grace of God working in you, and daily restraining, guiding, and purifying you? What self-denial do you daily show, proving to him that you are a Christian?

Reader! what do you do to make your friend, brother, husband, a Christian? Do something—do every thing that God commands you, and patiently, calmly, confidently, await the blessing. "It is good that a man should both hope and quietly wait for the salvation of the Lord."

State of Religion in Europe.

Last week we made a few remarks on the state of religion in some countries of Europe. We shall now endeavor to consider the religious condition of some European countries not then noticed. Beginning with Spain, we find no real evidence of prosperity. Its religious advancement has been similar to its national movement, and that is retrogression. The almost forty millions of inhabitants which it contained, when the Spanish Armada was preparing to overthrow Protestantism, are now dwindled down to fifteen millions. That which blasted Spain's temporal prosperity, has also blighted its spiritual progress. Her treatment of *Ecce Homo* is a strong proof that religion is now in a low state in that unhappy country. A good man, and engaged in a noble work—circulating the sacred Scriptures, and seeking the spiritual and moral elevation of the people, he has been arrested, imprisoned, and condemned, and is now enduring severe and protracted penal servitude. But how does this prove that religion is in a low state? If he has been arrested in his efforts to circulate the Bible, then we may certainly infer that the Spaniards do not wish to come to the light that they derive from the Christian Scriptures, and that they are in a wretchedly low state among them. But some perhaps will reply, the priests may impart religious instruction to the people. Possibly they may; but judging from what they accomplish in countries better known to us, we are fully warranted in drawing the inference that the Christian instruction which they impart, is of the most meagre description, and scarcely contains the elements of saving knowledge.

As regards France, the prospects are somewhat more encouraging. If true religion cannot be said to be in a prosperous state, the mass of spiritual enlightenment and improvement are at least much more within the reach of the people than in Spain. The French, though not generally much under the influence of divine truth, are still not the willing and unquestioning subjects of the Pope of Rome. They appear disposed to exercise their own judgment in religious as well as political matters; and the result has been the growth of some Christian programs. The Emperor is resisting Papal authority, and a breach has been made which threatens to widen, with weakening influence to Popery, but affording increased advantages to Protestantism. It is said that Protestantism now enjoys unusual privileges in France. The Holy Scriptures are freely circulated in almost every part of the extensive empire; and increased facilities are afforded for conducting Protestant worship. Deputations from Protestant communities or societies have been kindly received by the Emperor; and their religious liberties have been fully and handsomely acknowledged. These are gratifying facts, and well adapted to stimulate the friends of Bible truth in their distressed efforts to advance the interests of Christ's kingdom. They also furnish indications that a better day is dawning on that country, too well deserving the appellation "infidel France." When the laborers are going forth to the harvest, and the plowmen are plowing, we may fondly hope that they will soon see the fruit of their labor, in a revived state of pure and undiluted religion, and a great increase of vital godliness. The Protestant Churches of France appear to be united in a generous state, active in the service of their Great Head, and successful in lifting up a standard for the truth; and that too amidst abundant iniquity, ungodliness, and error.

Regarding Great Britain and Ireland we do not require to say much. Our readers are all aware that a glorious revival of religion has lately been witnessed in that part of Europe. By the last accounts, the good work appears to be progressing in some parts, while in other parts are manifesting themselves in the diminution of crime—almost the entire absence of it in some districts—the decrease of intemperance, and most gratifying signs of the means of grace. Morally the improved condition has increased, a missionary spirit abounds. When the fruit is thus out of holiness, we may justly hope that the end will be overruling life. Casting our eyes, then, over the wide extent of Europe, we think that sufficient and satisfactory evidence is afforded for believing that religion is on the whole in a prosperous condition.

LITERARY NOTICE.

A FEW REMAINS OF THE REV. JAMES MACGREGOR, D. D.; Edited by his Grandson, the Rev. George Paterson. Philadelphia: Joseph M. Wilson, Charleston: George T. Howard.

This work, and we to review by the Editor, has now been published before the public. In the case of many of our readers, an opinion, doubtless, has already been formed of its merits; but though late, we shall endeavor briefly to indicate the author's treatment of some of the subjects discussed. The first and principal production is "A Defense of the religious in-

positions and denunciations of God's wrath, contained in the Book of Psalms, against the enemies of the Gospel." The author discusses this important and difficult subject in a logical and able manner. After an appropriate introduction, containing a general statement of his views, he proceeds to the vindication of these Psalms as David's. Here he considers first, what sort of men the impressions were directed against, and, secondly, from what spirit and disposition they were uttered. The individuals in view were the enemies of God's peculiar people, that is, in essence, deists; and the impressions were uttered, not out of revenge, but in faith—divinely inspired, and typical of Christ's. This part of the discussion appears satisfactory. But we cannot see any use in entering with the author's arguments in the second part, which contains a vindication of the use of the imprecatory Psalms by Christians. He attempts to accomplish this by showing, from several considerations, that imprecations are a permanent Christian duty. He then considers the objects of imprecations—namely, those who are guilty of any of the sins of men. Some valuable thoughts are offered on this topic, also afterwards, when he indicates the spirit with which we should imprecate. The author concludes the whole by answering some objections which might be raised by the views advanced. We have merely noticed the line argument, hoping that those who wish to investigate it, will study thoughtfully, will procure the work for themselves.

The second production is an Essay on the duration and character of the Millennium of the Church. Unlike many writers on the Millennium, the author does not attempt to fix dates, or to determine the commencement of this happy period. He first considers its duration, endeavoring to prove from Scripture and the analogy of nature, that it shall last three hundred thousand years at least. On the character of the Millennium, he expatiates freely and beautifully on the improved climate, the fruitfulness of the earth, the increased population, the wise and equitable administration of civil government, the reign of universal peace, the high perfection of the state of learning and religion—all during the Millennium age. The Essay is, on the whole, well written, and is pervaded by a fine Christian spirit.

The next Essay is entitled "A Guide to Baptism," being an attempt to guide the plain Christian into the scripture doctrine and practice of baptism. In executing his office as a guide to baptism, the author endeavors to show, first, that baptism belonged to the Old Testament as well as to the New; secondly, that God directed it to be administered by priests, both adults and infants with water; thirdly, that this baptism is continued under the New Testament, with some circumstantial alterations; and fourthly he reviews the principal passages of Scripture supposed to favor the opposite side. He discusses each of these topics briefly, yet systematically, and in a clear and plain manner, arriving at conclusions which he considers fully established by the prophecies which he enunciates. The author's views on this subject deserve consideration from the fact that he once hesitated respecting baptism; and then searched anew the New Testament as impartially as he could, and with a fair test his early prejudice melted away.

The other remains are of minor importance, consisting of an able Letter on Slavery, a Synod Sermon, and other pieces, all written in the author's usual clear and logical style. The work contains 274 pages, and is well got up. The Editor has fully justified the opinion expressed by the editor in the Memoir, respecting the intellectual abilities of Doctor Macgregor. We have good reason for stating that almost all who read the Memoir were pleased with them; and we trust they will not be disappointed if they procure the remains, thus possessing a monument of a minister of the Gospel who was highly esteemed, and eminently useful in his generation.

FRANCE.

Paris, February 18, 1866.

"For some time past there have been not a few political and religious earthquakes. In one of the latter, a crack, at first almost imperceptible, but daily widening, has been produced between the temporal and the spiritual powers of the Pope. The Emperor, who is a man with his wits, England introduces a solitary Bible, then two, then three, and she will have thus placed a million of Bibles between the spiritual and the temporal powers of the Pope. He has had a million of Bibles introduced into the hands of his Italian."

Your readers will forgive the light authority from which I quote these words, for it proves the spirit of the Emperor's move was to suppress the sacred Scriptures, without, on his very, meeting the frigate *Terride* with its cargo of Bibles—a cargo, says our dramatist, much more offensive than gun and ammunition!

The contest between the Pope and Napoleon III. is still the one absorbing topic. I need but to allude to the midst of the hall-stories of pamphlets mentioned in my last, and still falling thick around us, to show the spirit of the Pope's encyclical letter, in which he makes common cause with the petty princes who find themselves in the hands of the Emperor, whom he declares Peter's patrimony (rather a shadowy thing) with obsolete grasp, and calls upon all who bow to his spiritual authority to bear with and for his temporalities, against all theory, and against the Emperor, whom he regards as the instrument of his will. This was published in all the papers, sold at all bookellers', and read in all the houses, with some exceptions, which were enough to alarm from bringing parties into their quarrel. It is impossible for any one to read the reports of the state and progress of the work in Great Britain, given in such excellent papers as the *London Temperance Star*, the *British Temperance Herald*, and the *Manchester Alliance Weekly News*, without feelings of joy and gratitude. Joy to think of the amount of happiness that will result to the human family in consequence of this great effort, and gratitude to that great and generous being who is blessing the efforts of his people for the promotion of the only real cure for the evils of intemperance, namely, Total Abstinence and Prohibition. As long as intoxicating liquors are manufactured and sold in the common way as beverages, the evils of intemperance will continue to scourge and mangle society, and all who are in any way instrumental in keeping up in the world the drinking trade, and the liquor traffic will do well to make the matter a subject of reflection and prayer. If they do so, taking the never-failing Bible for their guide, there is no fear, but that their duty will be made very plain. Indeed it is always a matter of grief and astonishment to me, when I see those who profess faith in the Bible and the Christian religion, who follow the examples and warnings of the great and good man, who is the author of the Law and Testimony declares—see Isaiah 5th chapter, Proverbs 23rd and 31st chapters; Romans 14th chapter, the Book of Habakkuk 2d chapter, and St. Matthew 23rd chapter. How any one can so fully and so profitably read over these portions of Holy Writ, and yet continue in the manufacture, sale, or consumption of intoxicating liquors, is a mystery that I can see you, Mr. I cannot fathom. Does Paul in his second Epistle to Timothy, 3d and 4th chapters, not speak of such characters? 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
