LONDON. Sept. 29.

Latest reports from Afghanistan state that the wounded in the recent battle near Canaliar are comfor ably attended to, and are doing well. The total British casualties, killed and wounded, amount to 248. In all, 32 guns have been captured, including two lost at Maiwand. Ayoob fled to Khakrez without stop-Ayoob Khan personally responsible for Lieutenant MacLaine's murder. Lieutenant MacLaines's diary, which has been found, ending August 15th, says that he was badly treated until Sirteep arrived at Ayoob's camp.


