Q. How many forest fires have taken place in Canada this year? Approximately 3000 British A. Columbia had about 1400 and with Central Quebec passed through the worst fire experience in many years. For what purposes are aero-Q. planes and seaplanes used in fores try work?

A. In detection of fires for which they are admirably adapted, for carrying fire fighters to the point of danger, for carrying food and other supplies to rangers, for saving time in transporting fire inspectors and managers, for the survey of limits by photography, and the rapid and accurate examinations of terrain with a view to the most economical operation of timber limits. These are just a few of the day to day uses of aircraft in Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and British Columbia. Fire rangers in B. C. and Quebec this sum mer have transported fire fighting pumps within one hour where the journey by land and water formerly required from fifteen hours to two days.
