The Canine Curse.

Observing men are of the opinion that any ordinary dog - and he is always hungry - will eat and destroy in a twelve month, the equivalent of that which, if given to a well-bred pig, would make him at the expiration of that time 300 pounds, gross; 286,000 such pigs would aggregate 84,000,000 pounds of pork, now worth at the home shipping station, more than \$4,700,000; requiring to transport them more than 2,860 cars, carrying fifteen tons each, or a train more than sixteen miles long. This would represent nearly \$1,500,000 more than the entire amount paid in the country in 1880, for school, township, and county taxes combined: it would build 9,400 school houses and churches worth \$500 each, or would pay the average wages of 14,000 school teachers, twice the number now employed. A condition of which the above is a poor outline, is at the bottom of what is each year becoming a greater irrepressible conflict between the wool growers and the savage brutes and keep in jeopardy, or destroy the flocks that, protected, would enlarge and increase to the extent of producing the wool for which we now send so many millions across the sea. If the dogs are maintained as a luxury, they are a luxury we cannot afford, and should give way to something less expensive, and less productive of loss and misery.

The rearing of better classes of sheep, always indicates a high state of civilization, whose intelligence, comfort and competence abound, and no more un-failing sign of ignorance, squalor and poverty, can be manifested, than the presence of a varied and increasing assortment of flea-bitten curs, unclean and of low degree. It should not be difficult to choose between raising sheep and growing dogs.

The Tariff and Free Trade.

Owing to increased expenditure which, as I have said these gentlemen imposed upon you - that being so in Mr. McKenzie's time, in the time of those who preceded him and in the present time - taxes have been imposed to a considerable extent upon articles capable of being produced in this country; and no one doubts, although questions may be raised as to what is called the adequacy or inadequacy of the system, that to impose such taxation as according to this measure you are imposing, as the tax is greater or smaller, so is the advantage accordingly greater or smaller; and as according to this measure the advantage is in favor of the manufacturer who proceeds to manufacture the article for the home market; therefore it is what I say that those who have contended that the practical issue before the people of this country on the tariff question was an issue between absolute free trade and this tariff, are trying to raise a false issue together. (Hear, hear) I say that no part of this country has ever raised the standard that would practically apply to our affairs the system of absolute free trade, or the advocated raising of our chief taxes upon a few articles only, not capable of being produced here, and all that we differ upon at this time - but these differences are to my mind serious and important - but still all that we differ upon is, whether the present tariff, which raises the taxes upon articles upon which taxes are raised in perfect, or whether it is defective and unjust, and improper. I maintain, and the Liberal party maintain, that this tariff is defective and unjust, in several respects, and with the view of laying fairly before the country what we deem to be its clear and serious defects, we laid before Parliament this session motions which pointed out where we thought that it was markedly wrong and where we desired that it should be corrected. - [Mr. Blake.]

Poultry Notes.

The Poultry Adviser, published at Zanesville, Ohio, says cholera among chickens need no longer be feared when they are fed with Siberian corn, which is pronounced a great cholera preventive. This corn should be planted about July 1st, in rows like ordinary corn. It matures early, yields abundantly, and makes the best poultry feed there is. To introduce this corn among our farmers the publishers of the Adviser will send a package of seed to all applicants upon the following conditions: In applying for the seed write your name, p. o., address and state on a separate sheet of paper. Write as plain as possible because this address you write will be pasted upon the package sent you. Also enclose 10c. to pay for wrapping, postage, etc. The last condition which those receiving packages of this corn are asked to comply with is that they will return a similar quantity of seed to the Adviser, to be returned by them to the owners who have loaned the seed. The publishers say that if everyone fed this corn their poultry, thousands of dollars would be saved, millions of poultry, from the ravages of cholera alone, in each state. Address "Poultry Adviser, Zanesville, Ohio."

For grapes in poultry give them water to drink which is strongly impregnated with camphor. It is the vapor that kills the worms in the windpipe.

Bones, when fed to fowls, induce them to lay a liberal quantity of fine flavored eggs, as well as maintain healthfulness and vigor. The bones crush best when dry, and should be reduced to the size of small peas.

Give your poultry freely on the perches in your hen houses, at least once a week, to keep your poultry free from vermin.

Give your fowls soft feed in the morning, and the whole grain at night, except a little wheat or cracked corn placed in the scratching place to give them exercise.

Cure for Heaves.

Heaves is a complicated disease of the respiratory organs, and is frequently the result of imprudent feeding, both as regards quantity and quality. Musty hay and oats and damaged grain of any kind is particularly injurious. Some horses, especially ravenous feeders, are liable to become habitual glutons, if allowed free access to provender, and the horses that are fed in such a careless manner are the usual victims of heaves. The proper way to prevent horses from having the heaves, is to select the very best food, free from dust and all other impurities, and to feed it regularly three times a day. Horses should not be allowed to overload their stomach and bowels with hay, it should be fed at night in limited quantities only. The greatest care should be exercised in selecting food for horses. The hay, when at all dusty, should be well shaken and sprinkled with salt water, previous to being fed. The treatment of heaves consist of proper restriction in dieting, theselection of healthy, nutritious and easily digested food. Attention should be given to the watering. Horses should not be watered immediately after or before feeding, especially the latter; the better way being to water a little and often during the day. It is well to commence the medical treatment by giving a cathartic, after which much benefit will be derived from the following powder mixed in the feed morning and evening: - arsenic, four grains; powdered nuxvomica, twenty grains; powdered gentian root, one drachm powdered Jamaica ginger, one half drachm mix for one dose.

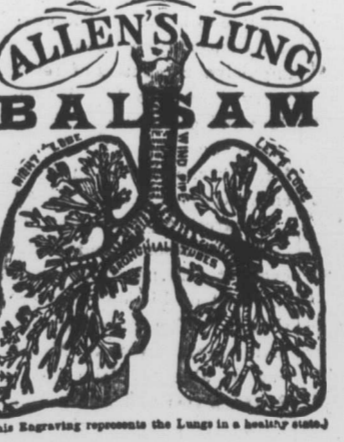

FIGHTING HEAVY ODDS.

M. C. Cameron has carried West Huron. True, the majority is not a large one, but as the Hon. William Macdougall once remarked on a similar occasion, "It is sufficiently large for all practical purposes."

In the fight in West Huron—which has been one of the fiercest ever held in this section—Mr. Cameron's friends have had to fight "a soldier's battle."

Other things, too, besides the adverse majority had to be overcome, and not the least of these were the slanders and vilifications of the Tory riding press, which in some instances outrivalled all previous blackguardism.

But there were other obstacles to fight against. Cases have been discovered where open bribery was the order of the day on the Conservative side; dead men's votes were polled, absentees in Manitoba and Dakota were perorated at the polls; boys and young men were brought to the polling booths and swore they were duly qualified electors although their names did not appear on the voters' list.

From the above it will be seen that good work and thorough work was needed to regain West Huron. Good work and thorough work was done, however, and to-day we have the pleasure of knowing that our riding is represented by a man who will stand side by side with Hon. Edward Blake in advocating the best interests of the Dominion of Canada.

THE REASON WHY.

It seems strange, after all is said and done, that notwithstanding the fact that there was in West Huron a given majority in favor of Sir John Macdonald's party; that Mr. Robert Porter was the Demosthenes of the stump; that every meeting held throughout the riding was according to the Conservative plan; some 2 to 1 or 3 to 1 in favor of Mr. Porter; that Mr. Cameron, Col. Ross and Messrs. Garrow and McGillicuddy were as "tinkling cymbals and sounding brass" on the platform when compared with Mr. Porter; that despite all these circumstances in favor of Sir John's nominee, the riding was wrested from Mr. Porter. The reason is not far to seek. The solid common sense of the people of West Huron revolted against the iniquitous legislation of the Government, and the vote cast was a censure upon the candidacy of Sir John's candidate.

A good result has followed the election. The bombast has been taken out of the wire-pullers of the Tory party, and they have been taught that blackguarding their opponents has rather the tendency to alienate the respectable men who formerly lent to their side. It has been shown that British fair play and justice is admired by honest-minded people in the conduct of elections, as in all other branches of business; and it has been fully demonstrated that the best way to gain votes at meetings is not to have a wire-pulling ward politician give forth the slogan, "When I tap you on the shoulder, yell like h—l," so that free speech be not tolerated.

It is now understood that the iron bridge will be open for traffic on the 1st of July. On that day it will be formally opened by the County Council of Huron in a body.

During the day, but little interest was taken in anything beside the election. Both parties worked with a will, each anticipating a majority for their candidate. The number counted on by the Reformers of town for Mr. Cameron was 20, and the result shows that they were not over-optimistic. The majority of 28 given him would have been increased by several votes had not a few ballots, marked for Cameron, been counted as spoiled, and the Reformers of town have every reason to feel well pleased with the result, so far as this place is concerned.

The personation of voters, living and dead, was one of the modes adopted by the Tories in West Huron to win the election. However, although the votes were counted, the "graveyard" candidate was defeated. It was not sufficient to "resurrect" Mr. Porter from the political grave of South Huron, but voters who died last winter were also raised to vote for him.

Now that the battle at the polls has been fought, and won and lost, business will begin to assume its wonted shape. It has frequently been observed that an election is almost as had a thing for the country as a shortness in the crop. Whether this be so or not, there is no disguising the fact that great derangement is caused in business circles by an election, and that even the most ardent politician experiences relief when the "heat and burden of the day" is over.

MR. ROBERT PORTER was elected for a couple of hours on Tuesday evening at the Conservative room. SOUTH HURON.

We are pleased to state that Mr. John McMillan, the nominee for South Huron has been elected by a majority of over 600. A diligent effort was made to take the "infidel" cry against Mr. McMillan, but it entirely failed of effect. It is astonishing how plus some of the Conservative party become at election time and with what holy horror they elevate their eyes skyward and inveigh against far better men, simply because the latter do not see fit to worship at the same sanctuary. Mr. McMillan is a man of probity and worth—entirely free from religious intolerance, it is true, but none the worse for this—and the people of South Huron in electing him, have given a severe rebuff to the impious wretches who scruple not to drag religion and the worship of God into the mire of political dissension.

Mr. Porter may be the man for Galway, but Cameron is the man for West Huron.

Goderich turned a Conservative majority of 68 in the riding majority of 1, and that in the face of the most unscrupulous efforts to defeat Mr. Cameron in his own town. The "graveyard" politicians are badly trounced in West Huron, and the filthy scandals spread by some of the "immaculate"outers for Porter have been forced in vain.

Cameron did nobly for Cameron. Had the two rejected ballots for the Liberal candidate been counted, it would have given him 30. This, notwithstanding Mr. Porter's promise to remove to that town and aid in its progress, is splendid proof. But it may have been the prospect of having the man from Kirkton continually in their midst made the shrewd Clintonians vote so heavily against him!

A peculiarity of the recent election has been that in most of the gerrymandered constituencies where attempt was made to legislate prominent Reformers out of political existence, the attempt has proved a failure. Paterson, who was handicapped in South Brant, retains his constituency, and so it is with G. W. Ross in West Middlesex, with Mackenzie in East York, with Mills in Bothwell, with Trow in South Perth, and many others. The result shows that Ontario does not sympathize with "cut-throat" legislation.

THE personation of voters, living and dead, was one of the modes adopted by the Tories in West Huron to win the election. However, although the votes were counted, the "graveyard" candidate was defeated. It was not sufficient to "resurrect" Mr. Porter from the political grave of South Huron, but voters who died last winter were also raised to vote for him. We hope that such an example will be made of the fellows who personate absent and dead voters as will prevent such dastardly doings on the part of the Tories in the future.

PARCELS SENT BY EXPRESS OR MAIL.

Amor de Ocampo, an influential member of the Canadian parliament and a strong advocate of Canadian independence, is now travelling in the United States, his native country. His original name was Alexander Smith, which was changed to the one he now bears at his request by the California legislature, years ago. Before the formation of the Victoria parliament, and in a hopeless minority, he opposed an iniquitous bill designed to rob many settlers of their land. The majority, sure of success, delayed passing the bill until near the close of the session. At 10 o'clock one morning De Ocampo rose to speak against it; at noon he had reached "In the first place," and sunset found him at "thirly." The alarmed majority tried to shout him down, but with no success, and finally settled down to watch his desperate struggle. Without moment's respite to catch his breath, he kept on talking all through the weary night and the following morning, until, just as the clock struck the hour of noon, exhausted nature gave way, and with blood streaming from smoked lips and with staring eyes, he fainted in the arms of his friends. But his triumph was complete, for at that moment the parliament was by law adjourned sine die, and the offensive measure was dead.

Arctic Perils.
The Herald correspondent telegraphs from Lena Delta, April 12th, that Melville has found the bodies of Delong's party in two places, 200 and 1,000 yards from the wreck of the snow. Melville's party stopped at the place Nindermann and Norve passed the first day after leaving Delong, feeling sure that the others had not got much further. There they found the wreck, and following along the bank came upon a rifle barrel hung up on four sticks. Two bodies were found here under eight feet of snow. Melville went along the bank and saw a camp kettle and the remains of a fire about 1,000 yards from the tent and approaching nearly straight on Delong's hand sticking out of the snow. Here under about a foot of snow they found the bodies of Delong, Amler, and Ah Niam, all partially covered by pieces of seal skin. All the others except Ah Niam they found at the place where the tent was pitched. Two boxes of provisions, a musket, and a bag on the staff were beside the tent. None of the dead had boots. Their feet were covered with mats tied on. In the pockets of all were pieces of burnt seal skin clothing which they had been eating. The hands of all were burned, and looked as if when dying they had crawled into the fire. Boyd was lying on his back, his clothing being burned to the skin. Collins' face was covered with cloth. All the bodies were carried to a hill three hundred feet high, forty yards to the north-west from where they were found, and interred in a mausoleum constructed of wood from the snow, surrounded by a cross. The mausoleum was covered with stones, and will be sodded in spring. The cross is inscribed with the record and names of the dead. Melville's party then separated to search the Delta for traces of Chipp's people. Nindermann and Bartlett found nothing. Melville is not returned. The search will be extended.

Revolving Murder.
Two Swedish immigrants named Oloffen and Jacobson were stopping at the California Hotel, Montreal. Jacobson had no money and all his expenses were paid by his companion. On the evening of the 26th the landlord observing Jacobson leaving with a bag belonging to Oloffen, stopped him, and demanded payment for his board, and also requested an explanation as to how he obtained possession of his companion's bag. The man being unable to speak English was taken to the room which they occupied when a shocking sight presented itself. The landlord noticing the form of a man reclining upon the bed, with a pillow under his head. Pulling back the coverlet he uttered a cry of horror. There lay Oloffen upon his back, with his head, face and body covered with blood. Jacobson met the startled look of the hotel keeper with pantomimic protestations that he knew nothing of the manner in which his friend had come to his death. He then tried again to depart but was held until the police were sent for. Sergeant Richard was on duty, and was soon on the spot with a posse of men who took charge of the house. A doctor was also called in, on the presumption that there might be some life in the poor victim. This hope proved to be groundless, however, and there was nothing left but to take Jacobson into custody and notify the coroner. The body presented a woful spectacle. There was contused wounds on the head, one of them on the left eyebrow and temple, and one on the top of the head. A gaping wound had cut into the neck. A knife wound in the breast also let the life current out in copious streams, and the bedclothes were deeply stained. The clothes of the prisoner were spotted and smeared with blood. His tobacco, papers and hands were also covered with it. The knife or dirk that had done the deed was not to be found. In the prisoner's possession were found two silver watches, a large quantity of money in gold, and some Canadian bills and other money besides the note book and papers of the deceased.

He was blown fifteen feet into the air by the sudden discharge of a boiler in the midst of a boiler explosion on the Hudson, met with three other accidents, from each of which he was brought home half dead; recovered from two almost mortal sicknesses in which the doctors gave him up and finally passed into a quiet and uneventful old age.

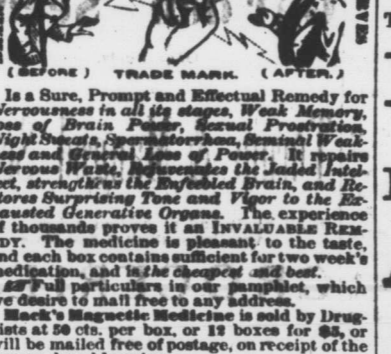
Mr. Feing Howland, a well-known Toronto merchant, and brother of Sir Wm. Howland, died at his residence, Lambton Mills, on Saturday night.

Baking a Bird in Clay. The most approved method of baking a bird is to use a brick in condition, the process is as follows: Make a pliable cake of moist clay large enough to envelop the bird. Let it be about two inches thick. Smooth and flatten it on the sides, but do not pull a feather or draw the bird. Push it tightly in the clay envelope and it takes the shape of, as it were, a smooth oblong clay ball.

Do this about 10 p. m. just before you turn in for the night. If you are a genuine woodman, you are supposed to keep a lively fire all night, and to stir up before daylight in the morning. Turn up the fire, start your coffee or tea, and potatoes, if you have any; go down to the ice spring, give your face and hands a cold rinse, dig into outer covering for that three-inch bit of broken horn comb, unsnarl your hair and whiskers some, finish off by concluding with the white lint towel that came in around a large lump of bread and a supply of killinikins, and then go back to camp and "haul" your bird. You will find him represented by a lump of cracked, hard baked clay, which pulled off piecemeal, takes feathers and skin clear away leaving the well-cooked body of the bird in its native beauty, with all his gamy flavor and native aroma held in and preserved. Lay the body tenderly on the fragrant section of fresh-purged bark which serves you for a plate, get out your potatoes, bread, butter, coffee, etc., and then settle down to a breakfast that you will remember long after you have left camp and gone back to the yoke and short tug-of-war of civilization.

You eat this with your pocket-knife and a birch fork as table implements, and the salt, black, white, or cayenne pepper for seasoning. When you have finished, throw the "krang" to your dog. You have eaten but have not drawn the bird. There are no "knarnds," but you have not seen them. You don't want them anyway. You have found the true flavor of grouse or duck, and you could find in no other way, and you will come at last to cook all fish of over two pounds weight, and all game birds as large as a grouse or teal, in this same way.—when you are not too lazy.

There are other issues in the present campaign, the discussion of which cannot be avoided. One is the great question, particularly dear to the people of Ontario, regarding our Federal constitution and the maintenance of our provincial rights under the same. (Cheers). Remember that the difficulties which arose under the legislative union, between the two Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada were the largest factor in leading up to confederation of the Provinces that now form the Dominion. It was the desire of Ontario to obtain local control of local affairs, and the unwillingness to submit to the dictation of a people remote from us, who could not be expected to see eye to eye with us, that promoted the departure from the old condition. The people of Ontario do value their liberties. They enjoy their self-government. They know that their local affairs are better conducted than they would be if everything was managed from Ottawa. With our own Legislature at our own doors; with its full sense of responsibility; with the voice of Ontario at hand to speak out in time to arrest unpopular legislation, or to undo it if it was carried through in spite of the popular will, those rights which are most valuable to us can be easily preserved. The keystone of our rights in effective local legislation on exclusively local affairs. If by your verdict at the polls you allow the Dominion Parliament to meddle with the laws of the Assembly, because the members of the House of Commons think the laws are such as should not be passed, under the form of Federal Union you have practically a Legislative Union. You might better have the real than the sham thing. You think you have a good form of Government for local purposes in Ontario, with your single Legislative Chamber in which you can listen to the debates, or read the reports of them in the papers, and bring the members to account if they do wrong. But, gentlemen under the system the Conservatives ask you to sustain, you have a second chamber. It is in Ottawa. It is not one that you have appointed, or one that you have elected. It is not responsible to you, for it consists of thirteen gentlemen, members of the House of Commons and of Senate, who have been chosen by the Governor-General. The Upper House takes an Act of your Legislature and says that it is not a proper law. I say that if you want an Upper House you had better make one of your own, which shall in some way be responsible to you. Mind, I don't recommend another House, but one of your own will be better for you than the Privy Council at Ottawa.—Mr. Blake.

RENOVATING SOAP.—Volatile soap removing spots, grass, etc.

SOFT GREYER BREAD.—One cup of sour milk, one cup of molasses, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one teaspoonful of ginger, one teaspoonful of soda, two eggs well beaten, at the last, flour to make a thick batter.

TO COOK ABRAMAGUS.—Cut the asparagus in small pieces, wash, and boil in sufficient water to cover it, in which has been put salt to season it for the fable; boil about twenty minutes or until tender; add pepper, butter and a little cream thickened with flour.

RENEWING OLD KID GLOVES.—Make a thick mucilage by boiling a handful of flax seed; add a little dissolved toilet soap; then when the mixture cools, put the gloves on the hand and rub them with a piece of white flannel wet with the mixture. Do not wet the gloves through.

TO CRISP PARLEY.—Wash young bunches very clean in cold water, drain them, and swing them about in a clean cloth until they are quite dry. Place them on a sheet of writing paper and lay on the hearth before a brisk fire keeping the sprigs frequently turned until they are quite crisp. They will be ready in from six to eight minutes.

ANTIDOTE FOR POISON.—If anyone is unfortunate enough to swallow poison of any kind through mistake or otherwise, give immediately two gills of sweet oil. It is an effective antidote to any poison. Anyone with a strong constitution should take twice the quantity. In liquid measure one teaspoonful is one gill.

It will be ready for use after standing forty-eight hours. It must be kept in a cool place.
