

THE EXCHANGE PROBLEM.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11. Foreign Exchange rates went down again to-day, in face of the successful flotation of the \$500,000,000 credit loan, to the lowest point since September 15th. So disquieting was it deemed that a three-hour meeting, attended by Wall Street bankers and Sir Edward Holden, member of the Anglo-French financial commission, was held late this afternoon for the reported purpose of devising some new method to bolster the value of the English pound sterling. To-day sterling sold down to \$4.671/4, altogether too far below par to make continued buying of American exoorts desirable from the British point of view, in the opinion of some New York fianciers. The meeting held tolay, it is reported, was primarily to reach an understanding as to the best available method of using the \$500,-000,000 to stabilize exchange; also with a view to arranging a private agreement between New York bankers, on the one hand, and London bankers on the other, for credits which would tend to send the value of sterling up in this foreign exchange market. A supplemental credit of \$250,000,000, it is said, was discussed.





The Greek chamber was informed by the Premier at the meeting yesterlay that in order to better assure the vital interests of Greece, her neutrality will for the present be armed, says a despatch from Athens. 

There are many eminent Americans There are many eminent Americans who unreservedly express their sympathy with the Allies and their hope that German militarism will be crushed but few are so outspoken as Col. Henry Watterson, the veteran Kentucky journalist, who recently, when interviewed by The Globe, declared that he was no clammy neutral, and added a few observations about the Kaiser that would make the Colonel distinctly persona non grato were he to visit Berlin. Col. Watterson not only believes the Allies ought to win, but he is quite convinced they will win.

"Marse Henry" has a well-established reputation as a prophet. One of the best bits of forecasting to which he lished in his paper, The Louisville Courier-Journal, sixteen years ago, on the outbreak of the Boer War. On that occasion he wrote:

"Whether in the frigid zone or in the tropics, the British Government has adapted itself to the wants and even the foibles of the people, and made them feel the inestimable value of the British birthright. What it once was to be a Roman citizen it is to be a British subject in the nineteenth century. The feeling that the termined efforts to envelop Dvinsk, majesty and power of England are which is costing them severe losses, extended over every one of her hunextended over every one of her hundreds of millions of subjects, and the adds, the Rusians are well supplied assurance thus given them of all the with ammunition of all calibres and rights and privileges of life, are sweep things that Americans, who have been in the habit of looking upon themselves as a little better than Britons, have not thoroughly realized. It is fully understood elsewhere, as is shown by the enthusiasm with which ROUMANIA WILL CHOOSE HER Britons, have not thoroughly realized. the colonists are hastening to help their titanic mother strike down the puny forces of the Boers. The lesson is an impressive one. It teaches not only that the Boers must inevitably be overcome but that it will be infinitely better for them as well as for the remainder of South Africa. Civilization has a great deal of work to do in the Dark Continent, and the best workers should do it. The English stand head and shoulders as colonizers above Germans, French and Portuguese, who divide the territory with her. Under them not only the natives will receive the largest possible liberty, but the Dutch themselves will feel the quickening influence of a higher and better civilization. The Boers may be conquered, but they still will be permitted to rule themselves, though they will not be allowed to rule other people. Their unprogressive, wasteful, tyrannical and corrupt government that will give way to an enlightenment that will lift them into a higher plane of life. They are fighting now against their better desfighting now against their better destiny, but it is not conceivable that they will fight long, and it is to be

hoped they will not." The Boers to-day realize that to be part of the British Empire is something worth fighting and dying for, although it is only sixteen years since they battled stubbornly to prevent incorporation in that Empire. Not since the Highlanders who fought at Culloden for the Stuarts, scaled the Heights of Abraham for the Hanoverians fourteen years later has three been so sudden and so complete a reconciliation as that of Briton and Boer. The plans of Germany to detach South Africa from the Empire have utterly collapsed, and the man who, above all others, brought about Germany's undoing is General Botha, a Boer. "Marse Henrry" never said a truer word than when he told the readers of The Courier-Journal in 1899 that under British rule "the Dutch themselves will feel the quickening impulse of a higher and better

Facts About Machine-Guns.

Against machine-guns the rifleman s helpless, a military expert remarked recently; and he was right. Actual tests of machine-guns have shown them to be superior to picked marksmen. At a test in this country some time ago, forty-two first-class shots were pitted against one Maxim, each side firing for one minute at a target representing infantry in line at a disance which was unknown, but which was actually 1,000 yards. These were the results: forty-two men, 408 rounds 72 hits; machine-gun, 228 rounds, 69 hits; although the Maxim spent some time in getting the range.

Machine-guns are really rifles with mechanical feed, which supplies them rapidly with cartridges. In all nodern patterns they are automatic in action. The gas produced by the explosion or shock of the recoil opens the breach, ejects the spent cartridge. loads the rifle, closes the breach, and fires the charge. These complicated operations are carried out with extraordinary speed.

To give an example. The Maxim can fire at least 450 rounds a minute, or more than seven shots per second. and if in exceptionally good order and cleverly operated can discharge 600 ounds a minute.

In the British Army at the beginning of the war the number of machine-guns was two to each battalion or cavalry regiment. In the German army there was an extraordinary levelopment of the machine-gun secions shortly before the war. Indeed, the enemy is stated to have taken the field with 50,000 of these weapons, so that each German battalion must have had ten, if not more, which gave them an enormous advantage above the Allies at the outset.—Tit-Bits.

to the enemy. 2 No person shall, without the permission of the competent naval or military authority, make any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation of any of the forces or ships of His Majesty of any of His Majesty's Allies, or of any naval or nilitary work, or of any dock or harbor work in connection with any place in this Colony, and no person n the vicinity of such forces, ships r work, shall, without such permisgraphic or other apparatus, or other material or things suitable for use in making any such representation. For the purpose of this regulation, the ex-"Harbour work" includes ights, buoys, beacons, marks, and otner things for the purpose of facilitating navigation in or into a harbour.

3, No person shall, by word of mouth or in writing, spread reports likely to create disaffection or alarm among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the civilian population. 4. Any person who attempts to com-

nit, or procures, aids or abets, the commission of any act prohibited by the foregoing special regulations, or harbors any person whom he knows. posing, to have acted in contravention of such regulations in like manner as if he had committed the act.

5. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or perof any newspaper, tract, or pamphlet or any information which is forbidden to be published or communicated unand Regulations,

7. Any person contravening any of the provisions of the foregoing Orders and Regulations shall be liable, upon summary conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding five thousand dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years, or to both fine and im



For the mother who objects to elaborate touches of color upon baby's frock there is a simple little English frock that is beautifully smocked and, while it is not embroidered in color, still has a bit of color, in the smocking. The smocking is usually very fine for the small baby's frock, and . pink, red or blue thread is used in the smocking itself.

This makes a tiny little needle point of the color at each diamond point of the smocking. Upon such a front should be a little lay-down collar, severed both ta the back and front. This collar should be briar stitched about the edges with the same color as in the smocking. Turned back sleeves are also briar stitched as in the collar. There should be a smocked yolk back and front, or the smocking should come in a tiny oblong over each shoulder, making a plain pianafore effect at the center of the yolk.


