

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—  
 1. From and after the first day of June, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, no person in Newfoundland shall engage in the business of refining Cod Liver Oil without having first obtained a License from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, under a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for same.  
 2. Such Licenses shall be issued by the said Department subject to such rules and regulations as may be made by the Governor in Council in that behalf.  
 3. Any person who after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, shall export from Newfoundland any refined Cod Liver Oil without having the same first inspected and branded in accordance with the provisions of Chapter one hundred and four of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Second Series) shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars to be recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice by any person who shall sue for same.  
 4. One-half of all penalties recovered under the provisions of this Act shall be paid to the party giving the information, and the other half to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony.  
 The foregoing is published for the information and guidance of those interested, and they are required to govern themselves accordingly and apply for a License to the Department of Marine and Fisheries immediately.

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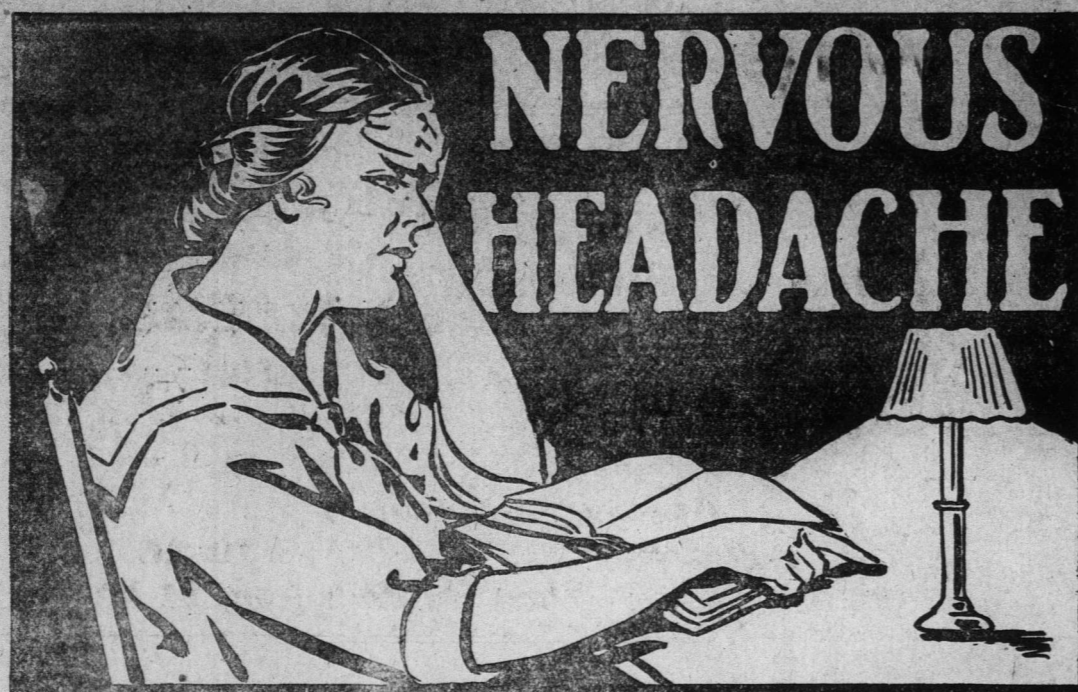

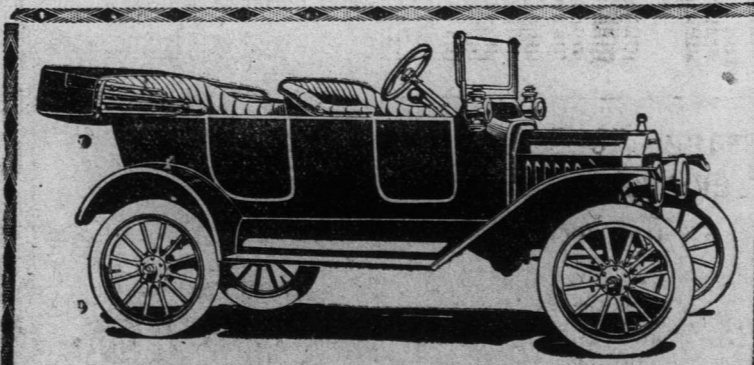

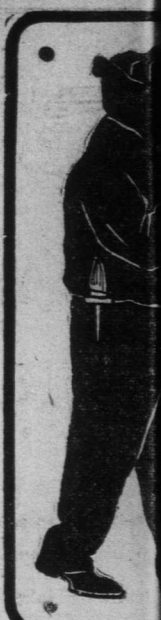

TRIALS STILL PROCEEDING.

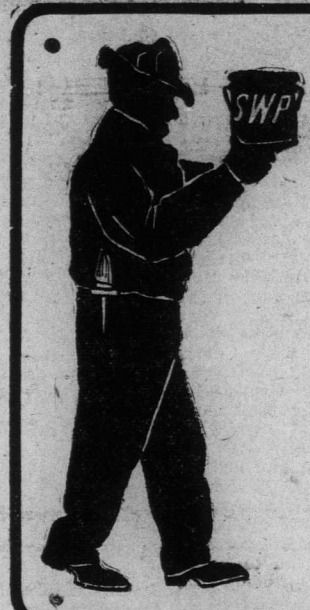

### SIR BADEN POWELL.

NEW YORK, May 16. A London despatch to the News Agency here to-day says that Lieut. General Sir Robert Baden Powell, founder of the Boy Scouts, wrote to-day denying the rumors in circulation in the United States that he was a prisoner in the Tower of London charged with being a spy. "I regret the report that I am sojourning in the Tower of London on the charge of espionage. It cannot be correct," he wrote, "as I was taken out and shot over a month ago, according to a Chicago newspaper. I am not clear which country I was spying for, but at the moment I am fairly busy on work for Great Britain."

### RUSSIANS ADVANCING.

LONDON, May 16. The Russian official statement announces that the advance on Mosul continues, and probably veils important news. Russian communications are generally a day or two late in announcing actual attainments, and it is considered not unlikely that the Bagdad railway, which runs along the left bank of the Tigris, has been for the last couple of days within cavalry ride of the Russian advance guard, is already cut. The Russian advances in this direction have been swift and silent towards the easy road which leads to Mosul, where the German Bagdad railway joins the Tigris. Germany has despatched large forces, it is believed, to aid the Turkish centre at Erzingan and try and stem the Russian advance, but apparently these efforts have come too late.

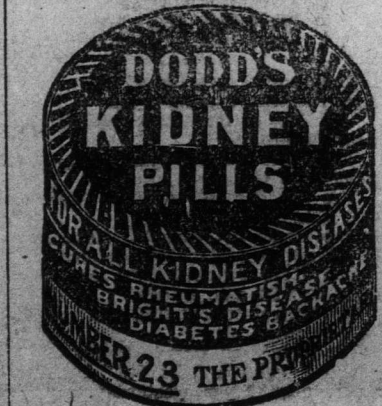

### OFFENDERS IMPRISONED.

LONDON, May 16. Many conscientious objectors, whose



objections to military service have been overruled by the military tribunal, will be given late to-morrow to the military tribunal, to-day for different prisons to undergo varying degrees of punishment on their court martial charges for refusing to obey military orders. Several were sentenced for two years with hard labor. Some of them refused to put on khaki, or shave. Several speakers in Parliament, in the course of the discussion on the Military Service Bill, expressed the opinion that scruples of genuine and conscientious objectors often fail to receive proper consideration from those empowered to pass upon these cases. But thus far the only concession which they have been able to obtain from the Government is that none of them will have the death penalty imposed by court martial for refusing to obey military orders.

### TURKISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, May 16. A Turkish official statement received here to-day says: An enemy monitor, which attempted to enter the harbor northwest of the Island of Kesten, came under surprise fire of our artillery, burst into flames and foundered. Several explosions were heard. Regarding this report the British Admiralty says: There is no truth in the statement that one of our monitors had explosions on board her,

Sir John Nixon Tells of the Mesopotamia Operations

General Townshend Found 13,000 Turks Strongly Entrenched Astride the Tigris; Gave Battle, With Some Success, But Turkish Reinforcements Arriving He Had to Retire to Kut-el-Amara. London, May 11.—The official London Gazette publishes an official report from Sir John Nixon regarding the operations in Mesopotamia in October, November and December last. The report contains a striking account of the battle of Ctesiphon. General Townshend found 13,000 Turks, with thirty-eight guns, strongly entrenched astride the Tigris, with reinforcements expected.

low and Chinese seas, passing Shanghai and Hong Kong, and then reaching Singapore, where the transports entered the Indian Ocean by the Straits of Malacca. Here they got a glimpse of Southern India at Ceylon, and so made their way by Aden and the Red Sea to the Suez Canal and Port Said. The arrival of the Russians was a great surprise to the general public in France, their coming being known only to officials and to a few journalists in Paris. On the other hand, the sending of the contingent was in all probability perfectly well known to the German authorities. Indeed it is practically certain, since, as the Russian general commanding the contingent, General Lochwitzky, said, two attempts were made by the Germans to attack the transports while on their way by sea from Dalny to Marseilles.

Two Attempts Frustrated

The first of the attempts was made while the transports were in the neighborhood of Shanghai, but failed, it was said, owing to the non-arrival of the German heavy gun ammunition. The second was intended to take place near Singapore, but warning of the fact reached the Russians by wireless from the British admiral in the Straits, and the Russians avoided the attack by changing their itinerary. An interesting feature of the contingent is the fact that it arrives without arms, or indeed military equipment of any kind, thus proving that the French are in a position to supply them with what they need. The incident of the Russians, as they stepped off the transports, being handed French rifles with removable bayonets, in contrast to the Russian fixed bayonet, is, if only a detail, enough to suggest to the Germans that the French have a surplus of munitions. The sending of a Russian contingent to France is more than a demonstration of friendship it is official and doubtless quite truly declared to be. Its ultimate object is to try out the question of further military aid to the French. The war, it is

Supreme Court

HEAVY SENTENCE FOR PRISONERS IN BARRATRY CASE. At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the prisoners in the case of the King vs. John Mahoney, sr., Patrick Hyde and William Day were arraigned before the Court, all three pleading guilty to the charge of barratry in connection with the casting away of the schooner Birch Hill in October last, and were sentenced to two years' imprisonment. One of the prisoners is an old man, but many years below the allotted span. Mr. Gibbs, K.C., who represented the prisoners, made a strong plea for leniency. Mr. W. J. Higgins appeared for the Crown. This morning the case of Walter Crooble vs. The Downing Cook Co. was continued before Mr. Justice Johnson. Mr. F. A. Mewell, for defendant and Mr. W. J. Higgins for plaintiff. The Court takes time to consider.

Electric Smelter in Operation

The electric smelting plant at the station is now turning out three to four hundred pounds daily of a very high grade of copper. The flowing metal is allowed to cool in proper casting moulds that makes it easy for transportation, each slab weighing from 21 to 35 lbs. Some of the ore is taken from the mines at Little Bay and also from the dumps that have laid there for many years. Copper is also secured by casting in the water near the mines old tin cans, wire netting, etc., which in a very short time is converted into real copper. The mud at the bottom of this water contains a high percentage of the much desired metal and is put through a drying process before it is placed in the smelter.

LONDON, To-day. According to a statement published here, Baron Lyautey, former viceroy of India, will shortly succeed Sir Arthur Nicholson, Under Secretary of the Foreign Office, who is retiring on account of ill health. Lord Hard-

inge would thus resume the post he occupied before becoming Viceroy.

PRESIDENT WILSON UNBOSOMS HIMSELF.

WASHINGTON, To-day. President Wilson last night made public a frank and intimate review of his three years at the White House and his impressions of foreign and domestic problems, delivered confidentially last night before Washington correspondents gathered at the National Press Club.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

LONDON, To-day. On the greater portion of the line in Belgium and France, artillery of both Germans and the Entente Allies continues active, being especially vigorous in Belgium, in the regions of Dixmude and St. George's and in France, around Avocourt Wood, Hill 304, and Le Mort Homme, northwest of Verdun, the Germans directed another infantry attack against the French position, west of Hill 304, for possession of which there has been much sanguinary fighting, but the advance of the Russians near Lake Dolje. The Russians, however, in a counter attack, expelled the invaders and drove them back to their former positions.

GUN TESTING AT PANAMA.

PANAMA, To-day. Guns on the heavy batteries in Colon Harbor were tested to-day. It is announced the test was in every way satisfactory. A test is still to be made of the 14-inch guns.

GUARDING THE LOCKS.

PANAMA, To-day. The Canal authorities are taking special precautions to safeguard the canal locks, owing to rumors of attempts that might be made to dynamite them. The American steamer San Ramon, bound from San Francisco and Mazatlan, Mexico, for New York was subjected to a search prior to passing through waterways. All the crew of the San Ramon were Americans. There were no aliens aboard. The vessel carried a cargo of dyewoods. She arrived at Cristobal to-day.

KELVIN SAFE IN PORT.

QUEENSTOWN, To-day. The British steamer Kelvin Brae had a large hole stove in her starboard amidships to-day as a result of a collision during a fog off Cork Harbour. The steamer which was outward bound was able to make her way back to the harbor where she anchored.

LANCASHIRE FUSILIERS TO THE FORE.

LONDON, To-day. A British official communication issued last night says there was activity on both sides and minor enterprises last night. Three parties of the enemy attempted to enter our trenches southward of Hebatre. Two of these parties failed to enter, but the third succeeded in entering our trenches for a brief period. On the Vimy ridge troops of the Lancashire Fusiliers, after an explosion of some mines seized and occupied the enemy's forward line on a front of some 250 yards, and inflicted considerable casualties to the enemy. Opposite Archy a patrol raid was made by the Lancashire Fusiliers, and penetrated towards their second line, where bombs were exploded and the enemy was killed and changed with the enemy. The Vimy ridge patrol which attempted to approach the lines was dispersed by our fire. To-day there has been activity by artillery on both sides about Fougereville, Angres, Fauquissart and Witschaete.

COMPENSATION FOR PROPERTY DESTROYED IN REBELLION.

DUBLIN, To-day. The Government scheme of compensation for property damaged during the recent outbreak is outlined in a statement by Sir Robert Chalmers, Under Secretary for Ireland, in connection with the destruction both in Dublin and elsewhere of buildings and their contents. He says the State will assume a maximum liability as would have fallen on insurance companies if the risk had been covered by ordinary marine insurance policies in force at the time of recent disturbances. The Lord-Lieutenant will appoint a committee to ascertain what sums are covered by insurance policies in force and advise what part of such sums would have been paid by the companies. Sooty articles will be deemed similar to other acts of destruction. In no case will any grant be made to persons in complicity with the outbreak.

ENNISBROOKE ASHORE.

SYDNEY, To-day. The latest report from the steamer Ennisbrooke states she is aground at Table Head, Glace Bay. It is believed she can be easily pulled on when the ice admits a free working of the tugs.

VENICE BOMBED.

VENICE, To-day. Austrian aeroplanes raided Venice and Mestre last night but the Italian batteries shelled them so hotly that they were forced to keep at a great height and the bombs dropped by them had little effect. There were no casualties in Venice. Two were killed in Mestre. The material damage was slight.

GIVE GERMANY NINE MONTHS.

NEW YORK, To-day. A man just arrived from Germany furnishes first hand information regarding conditions in that country. He is an American citizen, but resident in most of his life in Dresden, in describing the situation in Germany, he says, the consensus of opinion among the more enlightened classes is that Germany can hold out no longer than nine months.

Senate of France Addressed by a Woman.

Rumanian Poet First of Six to Appear Before Committee.

Paris, April 13.—The French Senate or rather its Foreign Committee, has taken this week an unprecedented step by inviting a woman to take part in its deliberations. The woman thus distinguished was Mile. Helene Vacaresco, the Rumanian prose writer and poet the friend of Carmen Sylva, late Queen of Rumania.

Always a friend of France in whose language she writes, Mile. Vacaresco when the great conflict began, had no hesitation about neutrality, but proclaimed her adhesion to the French cause, thereby incurring the wrath of the German propagandists at work in her country.

The Senate committee, hearing that she was coming to Paris, invited her to address its members. Three Senators received her at the door, and ushered her into the reception room, where many of the conscript fathers were presented to her. Then she entered the room where the committee was sitting. All the members arose and were introduced.

M. Clemenceau was presiding and doubtless laid aside those attributes which have earned him the nickname of Tiger. The proceedings in French parliamentary committees are strictly private, so it is not known which Senator made a courting speech thanking her for her efforts for France or what she said about the political situation in Rumania. It is known that certain Senators asked for fuller information on certain points and that she answered their questions and described the desperate efforts made by Germanophiles to prevent Rumania intervening in the war.

There are few things more pathetic to me than the mother who wants to know about her children's good times, what they are doing, whom they see, what interesting bits of news they pick up, and who is shut out from this normal sharing of interests by the children's indifference or selfishness.

One such mother of whom I know goes about the neighborhood furtively picking up bits of information about her children's doings. She doesn't want people to know that they do not tell her things, and yet she is so eager for the information that she often betrays herself. And then some people smile and others feel much nearer to tears than laughter.

She Has Lost Her Place in the Procession

In this case the mother is a meager little old lady who has worked so hard all her life giving her children a chance that she has lost her place in the procession and consequently they are a little ashamed of her and selfishly blind to her eagerness for their companionship. Heaven forgive them! I'm afraid I couldn't.

In another case the children dutifully tell their mother where they are going and give her the bare skeleton of their experiences, but they never fill it out with the flesh and color which the little intimate descriptive details alone can give.

"I can't seem to get anything out of them," she said to me wistfully

once. "If I ask them questions they answer me, but they don't seem to know how to tell me about things the way Ruth (an elder daughter who has married and gone away) used to. I guess they can't help it."

They Can Talk to Other People All Right

I should think that, too, if I hadn't heard them telling other people just the sort of vivid, intimate things she wants to know.

In this case the barrier between mother and daughters seems to be more due to lack of understanding than to selfishness.

The "Ruth" of whom the mother speaks was the eldest daughter, and she and her mother always had more common interests.

Which brings me to the point I wished to make. There is sometimes another side to the medal.

How the Mother Sometimes Shuts the Door

The confidence and comradeship which the mother craves from her grown-up sons and daughters she has not always encouraged in them when they were younger.

Again and again I have seen young children checked in their excited attempts to tell mother all about it, by admonitions of one sort or another, or by a rude lack of interest. Just the other day I heard little Roger, a small friend of mine, try to tell his mother about the telephone boys had been building.

"And mother, we sent messages—"

"Roger, don't talk with your mouth full."

Again, "It's all the way from Philip's house to John's. I guess it must be three hundred feet, anyway."

"Do you want some more meat, Roger?"

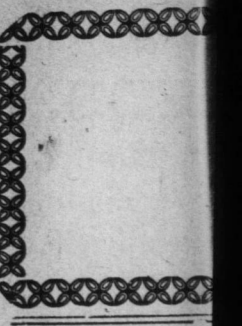
