"My life grows more like a fairy-tale every day," she said to herself; and from the depths of her heart came a great sigh that she could not share her treasure with Hettie.

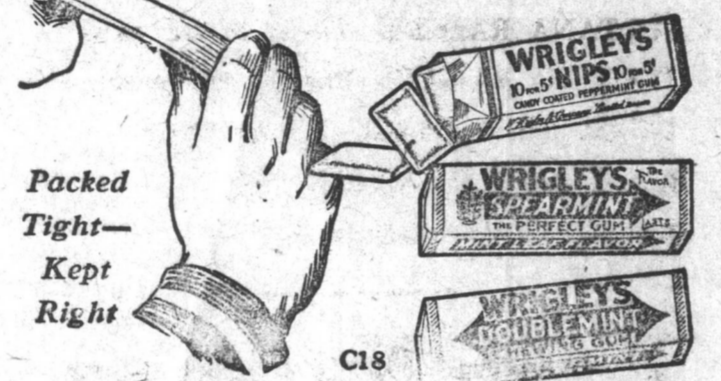

Pope's Crown of Gems.

The wonderful Pope's Tiara, or crown, which the Pope, Pius XI, wears, is a magnificent ornament. It is formed on a basis of very fine felt covered with silver mesh, on which there are three crowns. Each of these consists of a gold band, set with jewels and edged with two rows of pearls. There are thirty pearls in each row.

In addition, the crown is decorated with sixteen rubies, three emeralds, a hyacinth, an aquamarine, three rubies, a sapphire, and eight gold points.

The second crown has ten emeralds, eight balas rubies, one chrysolite, two aquamarines, six small rubies, and three sapphires.

Nineteen small rubies, four sapphires, three hyacinths, three aquamarines, one garnet, eight gold floral ornaments—each set with two emeralds, one balas ruby, and a chrysolite—and eight gold points each trimmed with a garnet, adorn the third crown.

The top of the crown is covered with a thin layer of gold in which eight rubies and eight emeralds are set. This covering is surmounted by a golden globe, on top of which is a cross composed of eleven brilliants.

Meeting of Northern and Southern Delegates.

I.R.A. Revolutionists Urge Military Dictatorship—Armed Men Raid Police Barracks—Famous Quebec Shrine Destroyed by Fire.

NO HOPE FOR CHARLES.
LISBON, March 29. Advice from Madeira hold little hope of the recovery of former Emperor Charles of Austria Hungary from his illness. He has pneumonia with cerebral complications.

NORTH AND SOUTH MEET TO-DAY.
LONDON, March 29. At the conclusion of this afternoon's session of the Conference on the Irish situation, Arthur Griffith said the Southern delegates would meet Sir James Craig and Colleagues to-morrow.

THE LATEST PHASE.
DUBLIN, March 29. At the Convention on Sunday the revolting members of the Irish Republican Army debated the question of declaring military dictatorship, but decided against it, says the correspondent here of the London Star in a despatch to that paper. He gives as authority a statement issued from Beggar's Bush Barracks this morning which says the proposal before the Convention was to overthrow all Governments in Ireland opposed to a Republic, namely the Dail Eireann Provisional, British and Northern Governments.

REFUSE TO APPOINT COMMISSION.
OTTAWA, March 29. The Canadian Government has refused to appoint a Royal Commission to enquire into the trouble between the British Empire Steel Corp. and the Nova Scotia miners. To a delegation of C. B. Mayors, Minister of Labor Murdoch said the Government was influenced in its decision by the fact that the appointment of the Commission would seem to countenance the policy of striking on the job advocated by some of the miners' leaders.

NATIONALISTS OBJECT.
LONDON, March 29. The latest Angora news indicates a strong majority against acceptance of the Allies' proposals for a Near Eastern settlement, says a despatch. The Turkish Nationalists object to the award of Adfianope and the Gallipoli Peninsula to Greece.

THE CONFIDENCE RESOLUTION.
LONDON, March 29. The confidence resolution to be introduced by Premier Lloyd George Monday, reads, "Resolved that this House approves the resolution passed by the Supreme Council at Cannes as a basis of the Genoa Conference, and

ASSASSINATION PLOT.
RIGA, March 29. Among the principals were several Russians said to belong to the Monarchist movement, making its headquarters in Germany.

ETNA IN ERUPTION.
LONDON, March 29. Mt. Etna is in violent eruption.

TEX RICKARD ACQUITTED.
NEW YORK, March 29. Tex Rickard, sport promoter, who was acquitted of charges of assault and abduction in the Supreme Court here to-day, will probably not be called to answer three similar indictments found against him by the Grand Jury.

Royal Wedding Secrets.
THE PRINCESS'S TROUSSEAU.
(By A COURT MODISTE.)
I think I may write advisedly that a great deal of nonsense has been written around the fact that, like every other bride, the Princess has a trousseau.

I have just seen an American paper which purports to give some details. It is foolishness almost from beginning to end. For this trousseau is, I suppose, unlike any other gathered by a Royal lady in anticipation of her wedding. I may call it a sensible one as contrasted with a fantastic collection of garments that fifty people could not wear out in a lifetime. I give one item—one thousand five hundred pairs of pure silk stockings. Other items are on an equally gargantuan scale.

A PRACTICAL TROUSSEAU.
First of all this is by no means a traditional trousseau. I am quite certain that Queen Victoria would not have "approved" of it for the reason that it does not conform to certain ideas that for almost untold generations have prevailed with regard to what a bride who is a daughter of a King should gather for her wedding.

When Queen Victoria married, for instance, there was collected together such an array of garments as could never have been worn out in her long life. I may say that after the death of Her Majesty there were still hoarded up many relics of that trousseau—hundreds of garments collected according to "Royal etiquette" that decreed numbers without discretion.

Everybody knows that Queen Mary is a very practical lady. For one thing, her childhood was not remarkable for unlimited means; for the Duke and Duchess of Teck were by no means rich. When the Princess "May" became the bride of our King she wanted a "sensible" trousseau. But Queen Victoria was "horrified," and with characteristic energy threw herself into the task of modelling it upon "Royal" lines. It was magnificent—and hopelessly impracticable.

Therefore one of the secrets of the Princess Mary's trousseau is that it is designed on severely practical lines—articles bought with the knowledge that fashions change and to overstock is folly.

PERSONAL TOUCHES.
But it would be by no means right to assume that the Queen has (so to speak) dominated the selection. The Princess has her own mind on cer-

tain points, colour, it may be whispered, with diffidence, by the influence of Queen Alexandra. The venerable Queen Mother is pathetically interested in every item connected with the wedding, and she has personally selected several of the articles that figured in the trousseau. Particularly she has chosen some exquisite table-centres—needlework in which she herself particularly delights, although her fading sight is fast forbidding even this recreation.

It is the personal touches in the trousseau that will redeem it from the charge of too Spartan simplicity and severe effectiveness.

The afternoon dresses, coat and skirt, and tea gowns, have been made by a famous Bond Street firm who have enjoyed royal patronage for some years. The Princess has favored simplicity in style, but rather more artistic than was selected by the Queen. For most of the selections have been made in concert with the "last word" left to the bride.

Wonderful Dresses.
The many dresses are wonderful but wearable, a needful comment when it is remembered that a Royal "tradition" has it that the trousseau shall contain many absurd and ornate garments that could never be worn.

The wedding dress is beautiful, and comes from Hanover Square, but, contrary to all that has been said about it, it will not differ in many respects from those worn by ladies of the Peerage. So many people have a vague idea that rivers of money must be needlessly squandered upon garments worn by Royalty. The going-away dress is by Madame Handley-Seymour, a lady who has achieved a reputation for ideas in garments designed to suit the personality of the wearer. It will be found that in this going-away dress she has achieved a triumph.

There are many jumpers, for, it may be whispered without offence that the Princess has an extraordinary affection for them. They are the work of the Officers' Families Industries, and are wonderful in colouring.

Many other articles could be mentioned, but it would be unfair to describe a few only. But the keynote is originality and real feminine utility without slavish adherence to the bad old rule that the Royal trousseau must be costly and almost useless.

Queen Alexandra said once that her wedding trousseau was so wonderful that the first thing she did when she came to London was to "buy some clothes to wear."

Royalty to-day cannot afford to be extravagant even if they desired it. The trousseau of the Princess strikes a new and far more sensible note.—Glasgow Weekly Herald.

SECRET COMPACT OF Italy and Spain.
The negotiation of a secret Italo-Spanish naval agreement was revealed in Paris by the royal military newspaper L'Action Francaise, which asserts the alliance is directed against France.

"Italy and Spain are reported to be on the verge of concluding a secret agreement concerning the use of naval forces in the Mediterranean," said the paper, "following the difficulties the English are raising regarding Tangiers. The adoption at Washington of Franco-Italian equality in tonnage leaves the French fleet inferior to Italian, because France has three seas to defend and its fleet must pass under the guns of Gibraltar."

The newspaper points out that the Balearic Islands and Sardinia are invaluable as submarine bases as they cut off France from its African colonies.

"France would be forced to detail at least two battle-ships to the Atlantic, while Italy would be enabled to concentrate its navy in territorial waters, where Spain would reinforce it."

The newspaper states that M. Sarraut at the Washington conference promised that the Chamber of Deputies would not be given the question

until the American Senate ratified the treaty.

Don't Shake Hands!
Before very long it will be impossible to greet our friends without incurring the wrath of our doctors!

MR. W. G. GOESLING ON THE ECONOMIC SITUATION.

Mr. W. G. Goesling was the principal speaker at Tuesday's luncheon of the Rotary Club. He addressed the gathering on the Economic situation and quotations from his speech are published below.

While Newfoundland is a very important and obscure; the very conditions affect us directly and immediately, more so than any of us would suppose until the matter is closely studied.

As a consequence of the Great War and more directly, as a consequence of the detronement of gold as the general standard of value and the printing of acres of paper money, the commerce and finances of the nations are in a state of chaos.

The problems are extremely complicated and obscure; the very conditions are difficult to ascertain; and yet the science of economics is an exact one, and cause and effect follow one another with logical certainty.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S PROBLEM.

The problem of Newfoundland is comparatively simple. It was pointed out long ago that we neither consume what we produce nor produce what we consume, and therefore our circumstances as a community are very easily comparable to those of an individual. We have a certain income, certain requirements, and certain expenses, and they must be made to balance, or ruin and starvation await us.

We find ourselves in the extraordinary position of requiring nearly the whole value of our exports to pay the expense of our Government, leaving nothing or very little to pay for our imports. It takes practically the whole value of our dried fish exports to pay our customs revenue. Looked at from another angle, it takes the labour of over one-third of our fishermen for a whole year to pay the interest on our debt.

FICTITIOUS PROSPERITY.

All money borrowed by the Government, except such portions of it as may be used to pay foreign liabilities, comes here in the shape of imports upon which duty is paid; therefore every loan negotiated creates a fictitious increase in revenue.

Only the most heroic measures can save the Colony, and all in it, from bankruptcy.

Unfortunately our chief customers are amongst the most impoverished of the nations and the fear are likely to be amongst the last to recover.

We can not continue expenditure on the scale of the last two years without bringing ruin to our people.

Whatever is to be done must be done at once if the situation is to be saved this year. I have always contended that Newfoundland can put dried codfish in the market cheaper than any other country, but with a tax of 60 to 70 per cent. on the cost of marketing, to which must be added 10 per cent. tax on fish whether valued at \$1.00 or \$2.00, I fear our rivals will easily be able to undersell us.

This camouflage of a tariff revision commission to report next year in uncertainty. It is a commission to reduce expenditure we want to sit at once, and to report to this Legislature whether that action may be taken immediately.

Supplies for the fishery will be cut to a minimum.

The end will come when we are no longer able to borrow money.

Russia Threatens Afghanistan.

The movements of the Russians towards Afghanistan excited intense alarm in England in 1884 and engineers were despatched to place lines in a state of defence. Arms and ammunition were poured into the Afghan arsenals, and an army under General Sir Frederick — afterwards Lord Roberts was massed on the north western frontier of India, the Meer being invited by Lord Dufferin to a durbar at Rawal Pind, where he received with great ceremony, Lieutenant-General Komaroff with a force of twelve hundred men — four companies of Transcaspian Chasseurs, three squadrons of Kuban Cossaks, one of Turkoman militia, and six guns — backed and defeated an Afghan force of four thousand men with six guns, at Fendjib, capturing their guns, and forcing them to retire to Mambak. This stratagem — such it was — raised a storm in England, and war was considered inevitable. Parliament voted unanimously a credit of eleven millions for military preparations; while Russia fled into existence a Volunteer set with the object of preying upon commerce. Happily for the tranquility of Asia, the two greatest powers were led to pause ere they decided to the awful arbitration of a gun, and diplomacy won a peaceful triumph.

It was announced in orders that there would be no parade on April 6th as the Armoury will be used that night for the indoor sports meet. Lieut. P. B. Rendell is orderly officer for the week and Lieut. A. B. Perlin is next for duty. Capt. F. Miles, of F Co. who has been on a lengthy leave of absence, returned to duty Tuesday night. The Adjutant, Major Tait, M.C. is unfortunately confined to his home with a severe cold and was not able to appear on parade. The work of the Brigade has been steadily progressing and will be given further impetus during the spring.

Food of Former Days.

Perhaps we are too conservative in regard to our food how-a-days, but reading of dishes of long ago we find them fearsome mixtures. Everything with anything in every possible way was apparently the motto of the cook of ancient times. Meats and fruits, fish and sugars, jam and oil; all were thrown together in what seemed to be a haphazard fashion, which resulted in hundreds of fantastic recipes. Vitamins, calories and proteinoids did not worry the ancient cook. The Roman epicure rejoiced in meat that had ripened to decay. A valued combination in old England was the "marras" of fish, cut into small pieces, mixed with wine, and pounded; the resultant sauce being used to boil with the fish itself.

Shorn of its bewildering spelling the following is a specimen recipe of a dish the epicure of yesterday had to sit down to: "Purée of sorrowful oils" Eels skinned, cut up, fried in oil with onions and parsley; to which was added cloves, powdered ginger, cinnamon, saffron and bread beaten up into a puree, with water, and passed through a strainer. Boiled up and flavored with claret. Whether it was the eel who was sorrowful or the person who ate it is not stated. Truly, "God may send a man good meat, but the Devil may send an evil eel to destroy it."

Surprises "Burglar's College" Graduate at Work.

A diploma from a San Francisco "college of burglars," signifying that he was a graduate thereof, was among the possessions of Charles Benson, 39, who was arrested here while at work drilling holes in a vestry of St. Patrick's Catholic Church, Providence, R.I.

Th Rev. Martin F. Reddy, pastor of the church, was awakened by the sound at a window opening in the church vestry and watched the intruder, with a full set of burglar tools, start drilling the door of the safe which held a portion of the parish funds. Officers were summoned and surrounded Benson, who hid behind the altar. When captured he said he had entered the church to get warm.

Among the possessions which the police secured from a checking room in a railway station were a full line of burglar's tools, flashlights and the diploma which showed him to be expert in his profession.

A DUBLIN OUTRAGE.
DUBLIN, March 30.—A large party of armed men held up the staff of the Freeman's Journal, smashed the printing presses, and throwing gasoline on the floor, set fire to the building.

SPECIAL CONSTABLES AMBUSHED.
BELFAST, March 30.—Fighting lasting twenty minutes took place yesterday on the South Armagh-Monaghan border, when a patrol of special constables ran into an ambush of Irish Republican Army men. Two were killed at once and one was so badly wounded that he died later, and a fourth was badly wounded. The Republicans had no casualties.

WANTS ROYAL COMMISSION.
OTTAWA, March 30.—The Dominion command of Great War Veterans, acting in interest of 3,000 former service men in the Nova Scotia coal fields, has petitioned the Federal Government to appoint a Royal Commission to investigate conditions in Cape Breton.

ORDERED THEM OUT.
GALWAY, March 30.—The Republican section of the Irish Republican army at Benmore Barracks, yesterday, ordered the Free State section of the army to quit the barracks within ten minutes. The Free Staters, numbering about two hundred, complied, taking their baggage, but not their arms. The barracks was then declared a training centre for the Irish Republican army. The incident was without any display of ill feeling.

REPRESENTATIVES MEET.
LONDON, March 30.—Leading representatives of the British Provisional Irish Free state and Ulster Governments, gathered this morning to consider proposals advanced yesterday at the initial session of the Conference called to consider means of pacifying Ireland. Those meeting were Winston Churchill, Sir Laming Worthington Evans, Michael Collins, Arthur Griffiths, Sir James Craig and the Marquis of Londonderry.

BY EASY STAGES.
LISBON, March 30.—An attempted flight from Lisbon to Pernambuco, Brazil, started this morning, naval captains Sacadura and Coutinho taking the air at seven o'clock. They hope to make a transatlantic passage of more than four thousand miles in sixty hours, actual flying time, and expect to arrive at Brazil by April 13. The first stop is the Canary Islands from there to Cape Verde Islands, and thence to Fernando Noronha, a short distance northeast of Pernambuco.

THE REASON WHY.
DUBLIN, March 30.—The Freeman's Journal plant and supply of newspaper print suffered principally from the fire. The raid is believed to be a sequel to the publication of a report of the proceedings of the secret convention of the De Valera section of the Irish Republican Army on Sunday.

LENINE REPORTED DEAD.
LONDON, March 30.—A Central News despatch from Paris says the report that Nikolai Lenin, Russian Soviet Premier, is dead, is published by Rome newspapers, who treat it with reserve.

How to See Nature's Wonderful Coloring.

Next time you go for a walk in the country, bend forward and downward until you can see the sky behind you, or, if you prefer it, bend your head and body over to one side as far as possible.

Trees, hills, and clouds will seem to lose their form, but their colours will stand out as you have never seen them before. Simply by altering your head you can make the tints of the sky and the colours of the landscape much more beautiful and pronounced. If you look at a sheet of water in this way it will seem as different from its ordinary aspect as the new half of a restored picture is from the old. The colours of trees and shrubs will be especially accentuated, and if you happen to be on the sea-shore you will see every possible shade of the same colour—provided that the variety of shades is present at the time in the sky.

The strange thing about this fact is that no one can explain it. One scientist, who has made many experiments in this direction, suggests that when your head is in this upside-down position the form of objects is less sharply indicated, while the hues of all things are brought nearer.

Footwear Reduction.

Reduction in the price of shoes has been announced by the manufacturers of Boston and, the old colony district generally, comprising one of the largest men's shoe making centers in the United States, according to an A.P. Mail bulletin. Although authoritative announcement of the amount of the cut is lacking, it is understood to be between 25 and 30 cents a pair, wholesale price. The price reduction follows the recent award of a wage cut of ten per cent, made by the State board of conciliation & arbitration. This wage cut, it is said, amounted to from 12 to 15 cents reduction in the factory costs of Brockton grade welt shoes and from 11 to 19 cents a pair in adjoining towns.

Retributive Justice.

Geneva.—Justice has at last overtaken the man who borrows books and "forgets" to return them. A book-borrower of Babikon, a suburb of Zurich, has been sentenced to two days imprisonment and a fine of 40 francs plus the value of the book he failed to return. The magistrate in passing sentence said, "A book is a family utensil like furniture, and is necessary for the welfare of the family." The defendant has lodged an appeal.

Sweden Regaining Gold Standard.

Stockholm.—Sweden is now far from having regained the gold standard of currency. Bankers and business men have believed that steps will soon be taken toward complete restoration of the pre-war parity. The dollar which is considered in par with gold, has declined in its exchange rate from 4.60 in August to very near its par value in February.

One hundred years ago—in 1822—the first permanent photographs were secured on a compound of sensitive bitumen of Judea by a Frenchman named Niepce. As early as 1822 a process by which records could be made by the action of light was discovered by a certain Tom Wedgwood, but no method of fixing the print was then known, and it was not until Niepce came along with his process that this was made possible. In 1859 Niepce entered into a partnership with Daguerre, another Frenchman, whose name is remembered in Daguerrotypes, the earliest photographic records that remain at the present day. A monument was erected in France (near Chalon) upon which an inscription definitely names the year of 1822 as that in which Niepce "discovered photography."

Mexico City.—Four representatives of Belgian manufacturers are touring Mexico to arrange for exchange of Mexican raw materials for Belgian finished products. Professor Rouma, of Brussels heads the party, and is accompanied by Marcel Jottard, representing iron and steel manufacturers; Engineer Leduc, who represents metal goods manufacturers, and Felix Guillon representing textile factories.

Huts Constructed of Coral Rock.

A Faithful Shepherd.

Last fall a rancher drove his flocks of sheep down from the grazing lands in the Mount Adams forest reserve, Washington, to winter quarters near White Salmon. In a fog he lost forty head and a dog. No trace of the wanderers was found in a week's diligent search. The other day the dog turned up with thirty-nine sheep, all but one having watered somewhere under the guidance of the watchful dumb shepherd. The rancher declares the dog must have lived on rabbits, as at all his herders the one only had an aptitude in leaping upon sleeping hares. The sheep if properly guarded would easily have found pasture in the sheltered valleys of Mount Adams slopes. Shepherds are at a loss to account for the fact that the dog was able to keep off predatory animals, for during the winter wolves, cougars and coyotes prey continually on sheep.

New Hebrides Discovered in 1606.

The first white man to see the rugged outline of the coast of the New Hebrides, which rise abruptly out of the deep sea in the hurricane zone of the tropics, was Quiros, the Portuguese navigator in 1606. Believing he had discovered the great Southern Continent which was at that time the dream of navigators, Quiros may be compared to Columbus, who thought he had found a route to India when he sighted the palm-fringed shores of the West Indies. He called his discovery Australia del Espíritu Santo, which has been shortened by traders to Santo, and is applied to the largest island of the group. Some of the other large mountainous and partly volcanic islands are Ambrym, Anatanam, Aurora, Apl, Pentecost, Eronanga, Mallicolo, and Tanna, the home of the "great lighthouse of the southern Isles," Tanna Volcano, which bursts forth brilliantly every three or four minutes.

Court Martialling An Elephant.

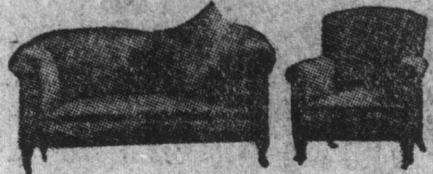
While in Hyderabad, India, on a visit to his brother, who was on the staff of the British Resident, a London correspondent witnessed some wonderful sights.
Not the best of them was the court-martialing of an elephant, which he described in the following manner: "To-day," said my brother, "I am going to show you something that you have never seen before and probably will never see again."
We set off and soon reached the elephant battery lines. This section of the State "gunners" is composed of 12 guns, each drawn by a single elephant in place of the usual team of three or mules.
Upon the call of a shrill trumpet summoned the elephants, some eighty in number, whose mahouts (drivers) busily marshalled them to form the sides of a large square.
After a few minutes of tense expectation, an elephant was marched into the square. He was riderless and obviously in disgrace, being securely fastened to two large elephants, who walked on either side of him. He looked the greatest uneasiness, seeming to realize that he was "in for it." A battery officer now stepped forward with a charge-sheet and, to my amazement, proceeded to read in a loud voice to the trembling delinquent. A translation would run something like this:
No. 37, Military Elephant, Sulichan, you have, in a moment of weakness and uncontrolled temper, cruelly manhandled your estimable and kind mahout, named All, thus causing grief to the mahout and his family, loss to the State, disgrace to the battery, and vexation to our August Ruler, whose name be named."

The "prisoner's" distress.
The "prisoner" now began to evince signs of more and more nervousness, being about to enter, and giving the shrill trumpeting of distress. He would have thought he had understood every word of the charge and sentence, and was shaken with remorse and terror.
The sentence was carried out immediately. The culprit was led unflinchingly to the whipping-post, or rather four whipping-posts, of enormous thickness and strength, to which was firmly fastened by his legs. The two "police" elephants took up position a little to the rear, facing each other, and each holding by his tail one of the ends of a long iron rod. This they swung simultaneously while the Mahout's counted: "Do, Then, Maro!" (Strike). Then the chain was brought with a sounding thrack against the hindquarters of the offender, who shook his square with his screams and heavy sighs. However, there was no effect for him and he had to go through for the best." He was then led to looking very dejected and sorry himself.
My brother told me that the loss of track (a very potent liquor distilled from rice) would hit poor old man very hard, as every elephant loves his evening tot of grog. It was very rarely that an elephant had been court-martialled and it had been known to repeat his crime, even under the greatest provocation.

Origin of "Pot Luck."

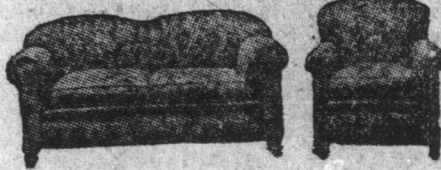
Everyone is familiar with the expression "pot luck" which means that special preparation is made for the special guest. There was a time, however, when "pot luck" meant dishing food out of a pot, and when the really took chances of getting a meal or a very slim one. In the days—and the practice is still in some parts of Europe—nothing came to the family cooking pot, except from the pot-hook in the side of the fireplace. Everything was thrown in it, and "to keep the pot boiling" the fire was seldom allowed to go out. When the meal came every one fished in the pot himself, and whatever he happened to find was "pot luck."

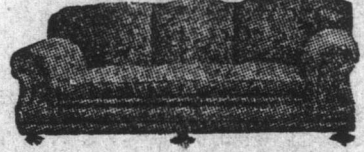

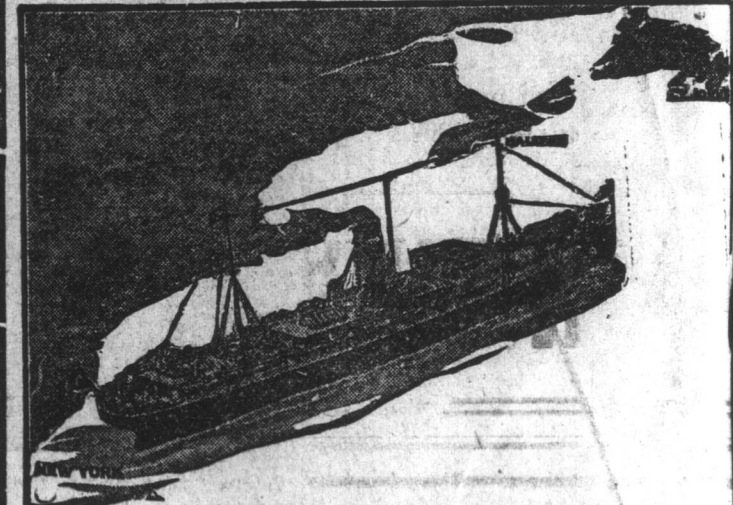
