A.A.A. Athletic Meet. 5 MILE RACE PROVES A THRILLER HALLEY WINS VICTOR LUDORUM

STATUS. A record attendance and well contested events marked the 1st Annual Newfoundland Indoor Championships Meet, conducted by the National Sports Committee at the Prince's Rink last night. Despite the many other attractions, sporting enthusiasts turned up in their thousands, and were all well repaid by the display of athletic skill witnessed. Promptly on time the first event was run off, and from then on there was not the slightest delay, a feature that evoked considerable complimentary comment The Mt. Cashel Band was present and supplied delightful music throughout the evening. Gerald Halley, who made a great impression in sporting circles in the various sports held the past summer, won the Victor Ludorum, having 18 points to his credit, carrying off the 50, 100, and 220 yard events in fine style, while he finished a very close second to Stan Jackson who won the 1/4 mile. Jackson, who is a brother of Laurie, made his first appearance on the track last night, and his performance in winning the quarter mile dash in 62 seconds, on a track entirely new to him, is worthy of note, and he is upholding his Haltfax record. Although he lost out in the half mile event, the showing made was a most creditable one. Burnell the walker, hung up a new record for the 1 mile walk, doing it in 8.04. He gave one of the finest exhibitions of walking witnessed in this country, while Burgess who beat out Muir by a spectacular finish, gives promise of becoming an athlete of repute in a few years. The junior events proved quite popular. O'C. Lynch won out from Maher in the 100 yards, and 1/4 mile dashes, by a very narrow margin; while Collins just managed to nose out the plucky little runner "Gus" Bailey in the half mile. 'The time of 2min. 45sec. for a junior under 15 years, on a board track with so many corners to contend with, compares very favorably with the time made by several of the seniors. The 1 mile race proved to be one of the chief events of the evening, as Laurie Jackson appeared on the list of entries. Three competitors started viz C. Stone, C.L.B.; W. Thorburn and L. Jackson. At the crack of the pistol C Stone took the lead, travelling at a fast clip, followed by Thorburn, while the Halifax wonder was contented with third place. After the third lap Jackson cut loose, overhauled his rivals, and set up a fast pace as he went out to front position. At the half way mark the Haligonian increased his lead to half a lap with Thorburn running second in hot pursuit, but Jackson whoman a brilliant race crossed over with a scant thirt yards to spare in 4 minutes 55% sec Thorburn in a well timed sprint cut down the winners lead in the third lap. Jackson's time established a new indoor record. The crack tug-of-war team, the Guards Old Comrades, won their event by default, the T.P.U. team, failing to appear. It was regrettable that this event did not take place as it gave every promise of being the most interesting item on the programme. The Cadet team, who gave the Champions such a hard pull for the honors in the Dominion Sports were satisfied to take the place of the Truckmen's Protective Union, but as they did not enter before the list had closed, the Guards would not compete against them other than an Exhibition. which the Cadets, of course, refused to do. The Basket Ball finals also went to the Guards Old Comrades by default, the Cadet team refusing to

participate. THE DOPE ALMOST UPSET.

The last event on the programme, the 5 mile race, proved to be the greatest racing event, by two aspirants for the honors, ever witnessed in this country. Laurie Jackson, who made such a name for himself on Monday night in the 10 mile race against Bell, almost had his honors wrested from him by the plucky young Ron O'Toole, the lone competitor who started against him. Jack Bell who has been confined to his home, suffering from the after effects of a cramp in the stomach, was ordered to stay out of the race by his physician, which proved a disappointment to all. But without Bell, the youngster chased the Halifax marvel to the very last lap and was only defeated by 40 yards in a race that shook the building from end to end with applause and such as never was heard in that enclosure before, and it was a fitting conclusion to a successful sports programme.

At the crack of the pistol O'Toole took the lead with Jackson on his heels. After the first round they exchanged positions, and lap after lap they went at a terrific speed. O'-Foole ran close to his man, and running into the same stride as the Haligonian, was determined not to give an inch. It was not until the 11th lap that Jackson made slight gains, when he pulled away with a forty yard lead, while O'Toole was still running strong in the rear. Jackson crossed over in 5.06 at the first mile mark, which was considered exceptionally quick time for a long race, while O'Toole, not many yards in the rear, after Jackson had made des-
