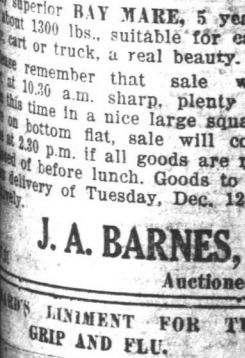

Anglo-French Agreement Hangs in Balance.

Best Effort of Entente on German Reparations -- Allies Reach Understanding on Turkish Affairs -- Ulster Remains Outside Free State -- Sir Richard Squires is Optimistic.

A MOMENTOUS MEETING.
PARIS, Dec. 7. Premier Poincaré leaves at noon for London to attend the conference of Allied Premiers, which is expected to reach an agreement on Germany's Reparations before France sets out independently to collect in her own way. The meeting is looked upon in many quarters as the most important since the armistice, involving, as it does, the maintenance of friendly co-operation between France and Britain.

ULSTER CONTRACTS OUT.
BELFAST, Dec. 7. Both Houses of the Ulster Parliament voted unanimously today to contract out of the Irish Free State, as permitted under the Anglo-Irish Treaty. Premier Sir James Craig stated in the Commons that Ulster would not appoint representation on the proposed commission to fix the boundary between Ulster and the Free State, nor would she be interested in the commission in any way.

IRISH DEPUTY KILLED.
DUBLIN, Dec. 7. President Cosgrave announced tonight to Italian correspondents: "What we propose to the Turks is perfectly reasonable. I hope the negotiations are successful, otherwise there will be war."

TURKISH PROTESTS.
ANGORA, Dec. 7. The Turkish Nationalist Government has announced today, has decided that it cannot accept a Conference in Turkey of Consulates, or Post Offices of any Power at war with Turkey.

TO PROROGUE NEXT FRIDAY.
LONDON, Dec. 7. Prorogation of the British Parliament will occur on December 15th, Bonar Law told the Commons today.

THE SPANISH DUTIES.
MONTREAL, Dec. 7. Under an arrangement recently concluded with Spanish importers of fish from Newfoundland, exporters of the Island will have one hundred and fifty thousand dollars annually as the result of lowered duties, according to Sir Richard Squires, now in Montreal. Recently England and Spain entered into a treaty concerning duties on fish, and it is the benefit of this treaty which Newfoundland will derive he said.

Goss Trial at Harbor Grace.
VERDICT "NOT GUILTY."
The case of the King vs. Josiah Goss was heard before Judge Johnson and a special jury at H. Grace yesterday. The charge arises out of some fish transactions on Labrador, during the Fall of 1921, and much interest was centred in the case. The trial lasted all day, many witnesses being examined. Mr. E. Leo Carter was the Prosecuting Attorney, while W. J. Higgins, K.C., appeared for the defendant. The address of Mr. Higgins to the jury was one of the best in his career, and he was complimented by Mr. Justice Johnson. The jury retired at 10 o'clock last night to consider a verdict, and after one and a half hours deliberation they filed back into the court room and reported their finding as "Not Guilty." Mr. Higgins returned to the city by the noon train today.

PARLIAMENT THIS AFTERNOON.
Deputy Sean Hales had been shot and killed, and Deputy Patrick O'Malley, the Deputy Speaker, seriously wounded, while on their way to the Parliamentary session. They were attacked when leaving Orman's Hotel. A lorry load of British soldiers arrived on the scene, opened fire on the assailants, who were scattered, and pursued them. When the shooting began, Hales and O'Malley entered a cart and ordered the driver to move on, which he did, taking them to hospital. Hales died almost at the moment of entering the Hospital. O'Malley, who holds the rank of Brigadier General in the Free State Army, was wounded in the head and one arm. He has a brother who is a strong Republican. Shooting of the Deputies is the fulfillment of a constant threat. Not only Ministers, who ordered the recent executions, but all members of Dail Eireann, who voted in favor of repressive measures had their names published in a black list and were warned that they would be held responsible.

SIR RICHARD SQUIRES AND THE HUMBER PROPOSAL.
MONTREAL, Dec. 7. Sir Richard Squires said here today that a plan will be laid before the Government of Newfoundland early in the New Year for the construction of a mammoth newspaper plant capable of producing approximately four hundred tons of newspaper daily on a property which will cost about 18 million dollars. Should this scheme be adopted, declared Sir Richard, it will revolutionize industrial Newfoundland. He explained that half the capital necessary for the construction of the mills has been promised by the Imperial Government, the balance to be carried by two issues of twenty-five year bonds in Britain or the United States. At present, he said, two hundred and fifty thousand horsepower, lying idle in water resources, were planned to utilize eighty to one hundred thousand for a newspaper plant, while the remainder will be devoted to other industries, one of which will be ore smelting. Providing Legislature approves the plan, Sir W. G. Armstrong Whitworth Coy. will attend to the hydro electric development and to construction of the mills, the output of which, Sir Richard stated, "can be sold to England or the United States without the slightest trouble."

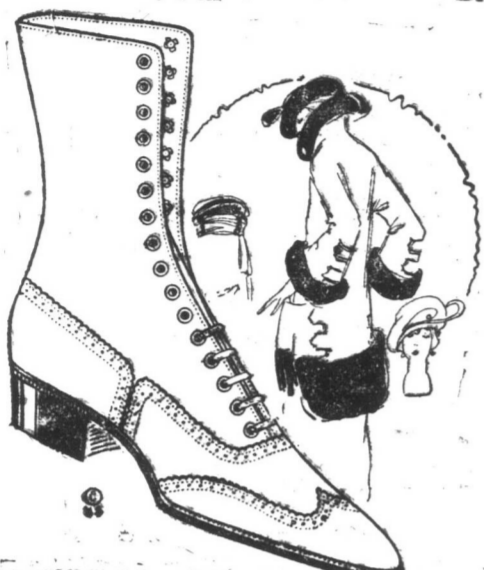

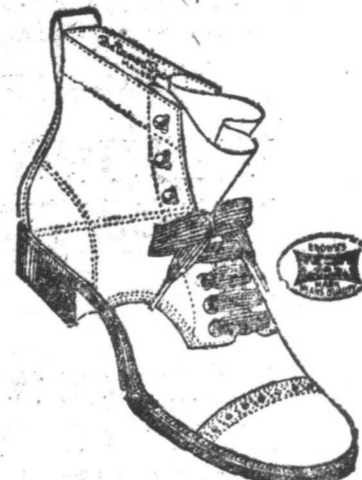

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

RINGLEADERS EXECUTED.
DUBLIN, Dec. 8. Rory O'Connor and Liam Mellows were the two Irish rebels who were executed at Mountjoy Prison this morning. It was officially announced. These two were leaders of the insurrection who held Four Courts building

against Free State troops last June, and were taken prisoners after three days' siege.

FREE STATE STANDING NO NON-SENSE.
DUBLIN, Dec. 8. Two other men executed, it was learned later, were named Joseph McKelvey and Richard Barrett, both prominent Republicans. An official

army report states that four men were executed as a reprisal for the assassination of Sean Hailes, Deputy, shot yesterday, and as a solemn warning to those associated with them in a conspiracy of assassination against representatives of the Irish people.

BOMB THROWING.
DUBLIN, Dec. 8. Three civilians were wounded when a bomb was thrown at a lorry full of Nationalist troops in August Street last evening. The troops were uninjured.

NEW ZEALAND VOTES WET.
LONDON, Dec. 8. New Zealand gives a big vote against prohibition in the referendum taken concurrently with the Parliamentary elections, according to a despatch to the Daily Express.

NOT IN FAVOR.
MEXICO CITY, Dec. 8. A despatch from Guatemala City says the British Minister to Guatemala has been recalled on a charge of having mixed in the politics of the Republic.

CONTRARY TO AGREEMENT.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 8. Reports from Angora indicate that Kemalists will deport Greek and Armenian inhabitants on Mediterranean and Black Sea coast lines, and in the vilayets of Konia, Angora, Brada, Sivas, Diarbeck and Adana, to Van Erserum and Bitlis.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.
PORTLAND, OREGON, Dec. 8. Fire raging at Astoria port, near mouth of Columbia River had destroyed six business blocks early today, and threatened to wipe out the town. Buildings are being dynamited to check progress, and firefighters are rushing from neighboring towns. The fire started at three this morning, and at daybreak had done four millions

worth of damage, according to police estimates.

DENOUNCING HEALY.
LONDON, Dec. 8. Irish Republicans, according to a Dublin despatch to the Evening Standard, issued a manifesto describing Governor General Timothy Healy as "the life long enemy of the nation, adding "the fight will go on as long as there is a man in Ireland. It is war to the death."

Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon in the absence of the Mayor. Councillor Collier presided. Present: Councillors Outerbridge, Vianicombe, and Dowden were also present. The minutes of previous meetings were read and confirmed. The following business was disposed of: The Blackwood, Emerson & Co. Solicitors for Dr. McLaughlin, had a decision had been arrived at with regard to the opening up of streets through the property of the said Dr. McLaughlin. It was proposed some five feet be given. They stated that up to the present time, many applications had been received for building leases, and they were awaiting the Council's decision before acting in the matter. The matter of the property had been referred to the Council's decision, and it was decided to co-operate with the Council in every possible way. It was decided that consideration of this matter be left over to a meeting of the Council on the 10th inst.

A. O. Kneale wrote a pony, which was impounded during the early part of October, and asked, under the provisions of the Act, that he be exempted from the payment of the fee imposed. The City Clerk was instructed to ascertain from the Registrar the facts of the case. The question of clearing Water Side walks was the subject of considerable discussion. It was ordered that the Inspectors report immediately the names of all persons who are delaying the Law by throwing snow on the main thoroughfares. The Council intends to strictly enforce the provisions of the Municipal Act in this regard. It was decided that all persons who do well to take themselves accordingly. Considerable inconvenience was caused to the public last year by the negligence of property owners on this subject in failing to remove the snow. Notices were ordered placed on the daily papers and notice is to be given to all the occupants of this street.

A. F. Whittle applied for permission to erect a signboard at his Water Street premises. His application was referred to the approval of the City Engineer. The application of Mr. J. J. Quigley to erect a slaughter-house at the rear of the Mundy Pond was referred to the Medical Officer of Health, for his opinion as to whether or not the permission should be granted.

The matter of snow removal along the Street Railway was brought to the attention of the Board. The City Engineer was instructed to communicate with the Street Railway Company, and ascertain their views with regard to entering into a contract for 1923. The City Engineer called attention to the inadequate fire fighting apparatus at H.M. Penitentiary, and suggested that the authorities be communicated with a view to installing up-to-date service for the protection of this institution.

The report of the City Health Officer for the week ended on the 1st inst. was read. It reported one case of Diphtheria, eight of Scarlet Fever, and one of Typhoid. The application of Mr. R. J. Cole for the erection of a garage on Water Street was not approved. The City Clerk reported that during the week many payments had been made at the Office on account of tax; that a list of Delinquents had been prepared and legal proceedings would be taken next week.

Reports of the City Engineer, Sanitation Supervisor, etc., were tabled, accounts presented were ordered paid, and the meeting adjourned.

De Quincey the Opium Eater. Thomas De Quincey, who died at Edinburgh on Dec. 8, 1859, was born Aug. 15, 1785, in a house still standing at Greenheys, then a rural suburb of Manchester, but now incorporated in bricks and mortar. In 1801 he was sent to the Manchester Grammar School and lived in the school precincts. There he became ill owing to not being allowed sufficient exercise. He therefore resolved to escape, and ran away in July, 1802. He walked over a great part of Wales and ultimately got to London, where he entered into negotiations with money-lenders, but they were very dilatory, and meanwhile his own money became exhausted. While waiting for them to finance him an advance he was allowed to live in a large empty house in Greek Street, Soho, along with a neglected child and vast numbers of rats. A chance meeting with a relative led to his restoration to his family, who then sent him to Oxford, where he became a student of Worcester College. On a visit to London he had a violent toothache for which he bought some laudanum from a druggist in Oxford Street. This was his introduction to opium, of which he became inordinately fond. Though he afterwards wrote a book, "Confessions of an English Opium Eater," he did not eat opium, nor did he smoke it as is the usual practice, but he drank it in the form of laudanum continuously for many years till he could drink with impunity many glasses daily. After leaving Oxford he made the acquaintance of Coleridge, who also took opium, and then of Wordsworth and Southey. He took a cottage at Grasmere, became one of the Lake school of authors, and married in 1816 Margaret Simpson, a native of those parts. To provide for his family he wrote for the magazines, and his connection with "Blackwood" led to his removal to Edinburgh in 1830, where he lived for the rest of his life. The chief result of his laudanum drinking was tremendous dreams, some of which he has recorded in his book of confessions. He was of diminutive size and appearance, but in conversation he was charming, his mind being stored with knowledge which he clothed in the most gorgeous language. He collected words in 15 vols., mainly appeared first as magazine articles. They contain many splendid passages of impassioned prose, for he was one of the very greatest masters of the English language.

SIDE TALKS.

WE LOVE TO BE REMEMBERED.

How it does matter people to be remembered! I had occasion to observe the pleasant effect of this expert once in myself recently. I checked a suitcase at a station and lost the check. Identifying the suitcase I got it. The next time I went to the station I wanted to check a fur. As she checked out the check the girl in charge smiled and said: "Now don't check the fur. You remember want anything to happen to that?"

Of course my vanity was tickled in places by her evident admiration of the fur and by her remembrance of me. Like a Cat. I knew it was a silly vanity and yet had that pleasant feeling in my mind we have when our ego has been pleased the right way. It always strokes anyone the right way to be remembered. Anyone who has a good success should cultivate the habit of being able to place people and call them by name. For if a person forgets a name that is to be reminded who you are each time he meets you it will be a great many other good qualities and gifts to outweigh that of being remembered. I suppose it is less anxious to have a person say "I remember your face but I can't quite remember your name" than to be completely forgotten. But not very much less. It is the person who can say "Oh yes, Mr. Roth of Seattle, I remember you perfectly," and then go on to prove that claim by some reference to a previous meeting and to


some subject in which the mythical Mr. Roth was interested at that time, who has the key to unlock human hearts. Yet We Didn't Choose Them. In spite of the fact that there are a few things about us for which we deserve less praise or blame, most people seem to take a peculiar pride in their names. They are almost as offended if a newspaper spells them wrong or gets in a wrong initial as if it had said something slanderous about themselves. They like to have people use their names in conversation. "But Mrs. B., do you really think—and so on," has a more arresting, more personal note to it than the same sentence without the name. If I owned a shop, or a restaurant, or anything of that sort, I should impress it upon all my clerks to try to remember the names of as many customers as possible and to call them by name when they come in. Nothing delights a customer more than this attention.

Just Before Sleeping. A man I knew who particularly needed to be able to remember people he had met, used to make it a habit to recall, just before he went to sleep, anyone whom he had met during the day, repeat the name, call to mind anything connected with the person, and visualize the face. He said that helped him a great deal. One thing I always try to do myself and that is be sure I get the name and get it right at the time of introduction even if I have to have it repeated. In the confusion of a general introduction it is very easy not to get a name, and it is a little embarrassing later when you have to introduce your new acquaintance to someone else and don't know what his name is, and must either confess your ignorance or mumble something in the hope of getting by.

Household Notes. To make delightful "fairy" dolls for the Christmas tree, trace on stiff material paper figures cut from magazines. Paint them and dress in organdie or tissue paper. A large box of assorted nails, tacks, screws and tools with screwdriver and hammer, is a useful gift for the woman who likes to do odd jobs of carpentry about the house. If you find that the sugar is lumpy when making uncooked icing, use hot liquid—cream, milk, or coffee—then add butter and flavoring as usual. The lumps will quickly disappear.



5 MILE RACE PROVES A THRILLER

HALLEY WINS VICTOR LUDORUM STATUS.

A record attendance and well-attended events marked the 1st Annual Newfoundland Indoor Championships Meet, conducted by the National Sports Committee at the Prince's Rink last night. Despite the many other attractions, sporting enthusiasts turned up in their thousands, and were all well repaid by the display of athletic skill witnessed. Promptly on time the first event was run off, and from then on there was not the slightest delay, a feature that evoked considerable complimentary comment. The Mt. Cashel Band was present and supplied delightful music throughout the evening. Gerald Halley, who made a great impression in sporting circles in the various sports held the past summer, won the Victor Ludorum, having 18 points to his credit, carrying off the 50, 100, and 250 yard events in fine style, while he finished a very close second to Stan Jackson who won the ¼ mile. Jackson, who is a brother of Laurie, made his first appearance on the track last night, and his performance in winning the quarter mile dash in 62 seconds, on a track entirely new to him, is worthy of note, and he is upholding his Halifax record. Although he lost out in the half mile event, the showing made was a most creditable one. Burnett the walker, hung up a new record for the 1 mile walk, doing it in 8.04. He gave one of the finest exhibitions of walking witnessed in this country, while Burgess who beat out Blair by a spectacular finish, gives promise of becoming an athlete of repute in a few years. The junior events proved quite popular. O.C. Lynch won out from Maher in the 100 yards, and ¼ mile dashes, by a very narrow margin; while Collins just managed to nose out the plucky little runner "Gus" Bailey in the half mile. The time of 2min. 45sec. for a junior under 15 years, on a board track with so many corners to contend with, compares very favorably with the time made by several of the seniors. The 1 mile race proved to be one of the chief events of the evening, as Laurie Jackson appeared on the list of entries. Three competitors started: C. Stone, C.L.B.; W. Thorburn and L. Jackson. At the crack of the pistol C. Stone took the lead, travelling at a fast clip, followed by Thorburn, while the Halifax wonder was contented with third place. After the third lap Jackson cut loose, overhauled his rivals, and set up a fast pace as he went out to front position. At the half way mark the Haligonian increased his lead to half a lap with Thorburn running second in hot pursuit, but Jackson who ran a brilliant race crossed over with 4 scant thirty yards to spare in 4 minutes 55 sec. Thorburn in a well timed sprint cut down the winners lead in the third lap. Jackson's time established a new indoor record. The crack tug-of-war team, the Guards Old Comrades, won their event by default, the T.P.U. team, failing to appear. It was regrettable that this event did not take place as it gave every promise of being the most interesting item on the programme. The Cadet team, who gave the Champions such a hard pull for the honors in the Dominion Sports were satisfied to take the place of the Truckmen's Protective Union, but as they did not enter before the list had closed, the Guards would not compete against them other than an Exhibition, which the Cadets, of course, refused to do. The Basket Ball finale also went to the Guards Old Comrades by default, the Cadet team refusing to participate.

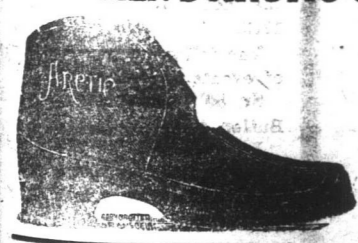

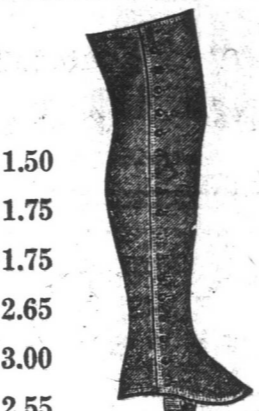

The Seven Wonders of The World.

There are three distinct sets of wonders—ancient, mediæval and modern.

The ancient wonders were generally accepted to be—

1. The Pyramids, some 75 in number, really built as the tombs of the Kings of Egypt.
2. The Hanging Gardens of Babylon. These were really artificial hills laid out in a series of high terraces, the topmost 300 feet high, and the plants and turf on them were watered by an elaborate system of artificial rivers.
3. The Mausoleum, a gigantic tomb 140 feet high, erected to King Mausolus by his widow.
4. The Colossus of Rhodes, a huge brazen image of an ancient god. The statue, about 100 feet high, stood astride two towers on either side of a harbour, so that ships entering passed between its legs.
5. The "Pharos," or Lighthouse of Alexandria, 500 feet high.
6. The famous statue of Jupiter, all covered with ivory and gold.
7. The Temple of Diana at Ephesus, the largest and most venerated "church" of the old pagan world.

In imitation of this list, scholars have compiled other lists. The Seven wonders of the Mediæval World were supposed to be St. Sophia's Church at Constantinople, the Porcelain Tower at Nankein in China, the Leaning Tower in Pisa, the Great Wall of China, the Catacombs, Stonehenge, and the Coliseum of Rome.

Modern wonders have been catalogued as Cologne Cathedral, the Elberty Statue in New York Harbour, the Panama Canal, St. Gothard Tunnel, Quebec Bridge, Assouan Dam on the Nile, and the monster telescope at the Lick Observatory in U.S.A.

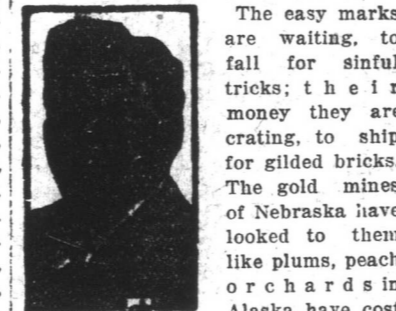

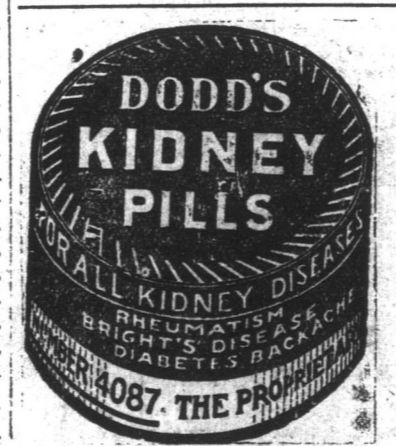
