




The Smoke Nusance

It is well known that coke or "smokeless coal" has been useful in combating the smoke evil of industrial cities. It is not generally known. however, that the first legal pronouncement against smoke as a public nuisance was made by Sir Edward Coke, Chief Justice of the King's Bench during the early part of the seventeenth century.

Chancellor Coke settled the question in Aldred case in 1616. This decision made smoke a nuisance against which a court might issue an inengine ignition, radio and all junction and an aggrieved person might recover damages. The word coke (says a writer in 'Combustion' was originally derived from an old English term, "coaks, meaning cin-

Our law is still consistent in calling the abatement of smoke a health measure and placing the enforce ment of the law in the hands of the health departments of various municipalities or parishes.



Largest Motor Ship in the World

LAUNCHED AT BELFAST FOR THE ROYAL MAIL STEAM PACKET CO.

BELFAST, July 8 .- A 22,000 ton notor ship, the largest and most owerful of its type in the world, was unched at Queen Island. Belfast terday and christened Asturias by the Duchess of Abercorn. The ship will trade with the Argentine and Brazil. It will accommodate 1,720 pas-

The Asturias is 630 feet in length and 72 feet abeam. She is a two funnel ship with cruiser stern, and has separate main and auxiliary engine oms. Electricity will be used almost exclusively for auxiliary purposes. The Asturias is a twin-screw ship, and each propelling engine is of larger size than any internal combustion motor that has yet been installed at sea. The total output of the machinery is 20,000 i.h.p., when the engines are running at 115 r.p.m., and it is anticipated that the vessel's speed will be in the neighborhood of 16 knots. It is estimated the daily consumption of oil fuel will not be more than 70 tons. It will be accommodated mainly in deep tanks, and there will be sufficient storage capacity for a complete round





The Anonymous Letter Sleuth

HOW THE TYPEWRITER DETEC-

An interesting calling is that of typewriter detective. His services are very necessary when it is wished to trace the authorship of a type-

At first glimpse you would be disposed to declare, with many oldfashioned lawyers, that beyond revealing the make of machine, from its characteristic type, the thing was

letter, the "Dear Sir" and the "Yours faithfully," the marginal width, the spacing, and so on, which blackmailers, putting their trust in the anonymity of their typed letters, seldom remember to change in each letter, every writer on the machine has his or her characteristic touch. Certain letters of the aphabet, in certain words, are tapped much hard-And he meant to do it every morning er than others, though quite uncon-

Type on typewriter keys, again, is by no means absolutely similar, much as it appears so to the casual glance. Look carefully into samples of the typing done on six different machines of the same make, by the same man, and the odds are that you will presently find some letter of the alphabet very slightly, but quite unmistakably, possessing a characteristic FATHER'S PRAYER FOR WIS- of its own. And once you use a powerful magnifying-glass, tiny flaws causing one M or B, or what not, to differ from its counterpart on a brother machine pop up right and left.

On most machines, again, there is at least one type bar that is either slightly loose or slightly bent. The result may not be perceptible to the casual reader, but the typewriter detective's patience reveals it. If in two letters or documents the letter "E" tilts now slightly forward, now slightly backward (from a loose key) in the first document, and keeps quite steady in the second, the presumption is that they emanated from

different machines. Serifs differ, too. They are the little straight lines at each end, for example, of the curved line that we all the letter "S." Often a serif will be ever so slightly curved, or atilt. The length of the tiny crossbar of the "T" is another potential clue on which the typewriter detective pounces. Enlarged ten times in a photograph, and then measured, the difference in two crossbars becomes ap-

Now and again, though not in this country, magazines and newspapers eproduce a highly confidential typewritten document that has come from Government archives. Usually it is not the original, but a copy made by someone in the department concerned. There have been some highly unpleasant awakenings for the copyists concerned, for typewriter detectives have promptly been able to prove to their chiefs, without the shadow of a doubt, who they were.

Spacing and punctuation vary a lot. One person invariably leaves three blank spaces after a full stop. Another two, another one. The forger's tricks with eraser and substituted letters and figures may deceive lawyers, but they don't get by the ypewriter detective

Are those figures really genuine? Was that clause really typed at the time, or has it been added or substituted since? He promptly enlarges that part of

the document photographically to fifty times its former size. A skilful handler of a typewriter can add a new clause so that it passes muster perfectly-until enlarged. When each line of type in the letter is five inches high, however, you spot the slight difference in alignment in a moment A million to one the added clause is slightly, but quite clearly, higher or ower than the rest of the wording. His enlarging camera, and his encyclopaedic knowledge of the ins-and outs of type, on every make of machine that has appeared, and been superseded by later patterns, for thirty years past are by no means all his stock in trade.
