

Men who with hope beating high in their hearts, left all that was near and dear to them in the Old Land, all those scenes of youth and childhood's happy days, and who by dint of industry and perseverance succeeded in hewing out for themselves and their families happy homes in the wild woods of America. May it ever be our aim to emulate their virtues, to follow in the paths of frugality and industry which they have trod before us, and though passed away from this changing scene, and no longer with us here, yet they will continue to live fresh and green in the liearts of those whom they have left behind, to take up their part in the great drama of life.

It goes far to show that the motters of Ontario are teaching their daughters those useful and domestic duties which alone can fit them for becoming useful wives and taking their part in life. Go on mothers of Ontario in the good work you have so nobly begun. Rest assured that is of more importance to culture the minds of your daughters than the adorning of their persons. Ever remember the lessons you are now teaching are of infinitely more importance than ballroom accomplishments. And now my friends in coming to a conclusion, and in looking over this grand display of agricultural, mechanical and manufacturing wealth, whilst in one sense it is work of our own hands, in a higher and nobler sense it is not, for we should ever remember that we are but the instruments in the hands of a higher power in the perfecting of such grand results as we have not witnessed. It is very encouraging to notice the great advancement that has been made in developing the different branches of industry in the Province, and in comparing the past with the present, surely there is good reason to believe that under the blessing of God a great future is before us. Let us go forward to the work, feeling that ours is the task under Divine Providence of raising our country to the level of the highest or sinking her to that of the lowest. Nature has endowed our country with all that is necessary. Let art step in and complete the picture of a happy, a contented, and a God-fearing people. And now, my friends, in one word, I wish you all good bye, and may God bless you all.
