

Big Mining Strike

A strike of great importance has just been made on the Minnehaha property near Danville, Wash. It seems that while development work was going on, a three foot seam of high grade ore was encountered which runs as high as \$111 in gold alone. Immediately after making this strike J. C. Boyer, superintendent at the mine closed down all work. This property is owned by the Mineral Hill Mining company, which owns some twenty claims on the reservation. The chief ones being the Minnehaha Copper Bullion, Grey Eagle, Herculis and Madison Card.

It is generally believed that the closing down of this property is only temporary in order to get the management whether to continue work which materially changed owing to this rich find. It has been accertained that the Minnehaha property is a most novel claim, having on one portion of the claim free milling ore while on other portions of the property ledges of the base ore are distinctly visible. This rich strike and closing down of this mine is the chief topic here among mining men. Hand Walton, one of the owners of the White Bear group of five claims in Gloucester Camp known as the White Bear, Black Bear, Little Cub, Big Cub and Lucky Jack, says that a syndicate consisting of some eight Grand Forks citizens, who now own the claims propose to start developing this claim at once. Denmark's King Dead

Christian Passed Away Yesterday Afternoon of Heart Fallure.

Majesty Was Suddenly Taken III While at Luncheon,

Crown Prince Will Succeed With

the Title of King

Frederick VIII.

OPENHAGEN, Jan. 29.—King Christian IX, the aged king of Denmark, dean of the crowned heads of Europe, father of King George of Greece, of Queen Alexandra of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Dowager Empress Maria Feodorovnia of Russia, grandfather of King Haaken VII of Norway and related by blood or by marriage to most of the European rulers, died with startling suddenness in the Amalienborg palace this afternoon. The accession of his successor, Prince Frederick his eldest son, who will be known as Frederick VIII will be proclaimed tomorrow.

The following official bulletin was issued tonight: His Majesty died at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon. After his majesty had brought this morning's audience to a conclusion, he appeared to be quite well and proceeded to luncheon as usual. Towards the end of the meal he gave evidence of indisposition and was compelled to retire to bed at 2:30 p. m, His majesty passed away peacefully, the symptoms indicating heart failure."

This brief bulletin tells concisely the story of the death scene; which found everyone, even those who realized the increasing feebleness of the King unprepared for the sudden shock.

When any such licence shall be granted in respect of land situated within ten miles of an incorporated town or city, the same may be renewed only at the discretion of the chief commissioner.







HOT WATER BAG.

For Keeping the Contents of a Milk Bottle Hot Until Used.

A California inventor has discovered a new use for a hot water bag. His idea is to construct a hot water bag of the kind generally used in sick-rooms for the heating of the body, so that a milk bottle can be placed inside the bag for the purpose of maintaining the contents of the bottle in a heated condition until such time as required for use. In this way the contents of a nursing bottle can be quickly heated without the necessity during the night of having to heat the milk or child's food over a lamp stove whenever the child requires to be fed. Many control of the property o NATURAL GAS IN HUNGARY. At a recent meeting in Vienna some interesting information about natural gas was given by a Hungarian engineer who had made a special study of this question. The central part of Hungary consists of two basin-shaped plains, and many of the sand-layers from the tertial period contain vast deposits of peat and other evidences of vegitation, generally at a depth of a 1000 feet to 1500 feet below the surface. On account of the natural formation of these plains, the water in these layers is subjected to a considerable pressure, and in boreholes it often rises above the surface. Citizens Demand **Quick Action**

Meeting at City Hall Urges Goverment to Provide Life Saving Stations,

Series of Resolutions Passed Outlining Scheme For Better Protection.

In response to the summons or his sworship the mayor about 800 of the citizens of Victoria literally packed the council chamber of the city hall last night to discuss the lamentable wreck of the S. S. Valencia and to pass a series of resolutions with reference thereto. In one respect it was certainly one of the most unique meetings ever held in the city, as the whole series of resolutions were passed without a dissentient voice. This was due to the fact that every parson present was dearly that every person present was deeply impressed with the gravity of the situimpressed with the gravity of the situation and more anxious to arrive at some conclusion which would prevent the recurrence of similar catastrophes than to indulge in speech-making. As a result the meeting took more of a conversational turn in which scafaring men were to the fore, giving important information as to the dangers of the coast and the best means of meeting the situation. The resolutions carried embodied all the practical suggestions made and before being forwarded to the government are to be revised by Joseph Peirson, J. P., who acted as secretary.

Mayor Morley's Address Mayor Morley in opening the meeting referred in sympathetic terms to the celling of deep sadness felt by every nember of the community in contemilating the loss of more than 100 precous lives sacrificed in the wreck of the valencia. He said that there had been meeting of the Merchants Service fulld to discuss from a scafaring point Guild to discuss from a scafaring point of view the situation on the coast. He had also called a meeting yesterday afternoon of shipping men at which there were present the following: Capts. Parry, (H. M. S. Egeria,) John Irving, Grant; McKeit, Richards, Macauley, C. E. Clark and Bucknam, Alderman Vincent, H. B. Thompson, H. J. Marsh, Joseph Peirson and Phillips. These gentlemen had gone carefully into the whole situation and had outlined a set of resolutions which he would submit.

whole situation and had outlined a set of resolutions which he would submit. He referred to Captain Parry's heartfelt interest (applause) and the valuable assistance which he had rendered. He said:

"As a result of these meetings resolutions were drafted by the Merchants Service Guild and completed at the preliminary afternoon meeting. I take pleasure in laying these resolutions before you for consideration."
