He acted upon the idea that the masses coald be most easily governed by being kept in ignorance, and that he could best retain authority by surrounding him sonal favors. He opposed education granted large concessions to military favorites, sold franchises and kept th ommon people in poverty and subjection to his will, and elected person ally the governors of the States and territories, the members of the national congress, the judges of the Suprem Court, and the most important judges friends suggested a plan for the education of the common people, he facetiously remarked that "education wa the only right which the people left for themselves, and he was not going

y dynamite. A stump puller of the drum and ong lever type was employed, giving lifting power of 25 tons with an ordinary team. With one hundred and twenty stumped in inches and over, to the acre, and seventy-two smaller stumps, it required an average of wenty minutes with a team and driver and two men to remove each of the large stumps and 5 minutes to remove each of the smaller ones. The Office in Royal Bank Building 120 stumps required 40 hours, and the smaller ones 6 hours.

When making changes in the feed given to the stock make them slowly. Two weeks is not too long to take to make any very radical change in the ration. Many animals have received serious set back by sudden changes BRIDGETOWN, NOVA SCOTIA n food, and in many cases the ne ation has been blamed, when if a litle trouble had been taken in making the change gradually no ill results woud have occurred.

Cotton seed meal is the cheapest concentrate we have at the present time. If you are short of grain or feed for your cattle it will pay you to buy some, but don't let the dealer palm off on you some old musty stuff Good cotton seed meal has a bright yellow color and a rather pleasant taste.

If you are short of fodder or rough age, remember that a pound of good oat straw is equal in feeding value to a pound of poor hay. Never feed wheat straw. Wheat straw is excellent for bedding and preferable to oat straw for this purpose.
