

Dear Sir,

We are anxious to acquire some information relative to the requirements for summer school purposes and, if possible, to make such adjustments in our amenities in Nassau as will permit us to place before the leaders of the educational field their availability for such a programme.

Nassau in the Bahamas is, as you doubtless know, accessible to the United States through New York, Jacksonville, and Miami. It has a rich historical background linked up to that of the Americas from the sixteenth century onwards. It has various scholastic and hotel properties which from July to September would be available for study groups.

Climatically it would permit outdoor class work in the tree and palm shaded courts and gardens and from an economical viewpoint to those undertaking extra mural work.

Your name was suggested to us as one likely to advise upon the matter and we take the liberty of writing to ask your opinion.

Your reply encourages me to place before you a few thoughts with the hope that you will be kind enough to give them consideration. As you are doubtless aware the Colony has had very considerable attention since as far back as 1780 from naturalists and botanists. It has also had from institutions such as the American Museum of Natural History and the Smithsonian Institute expeditions of various kinds.

This winter we are looking forward to welcoming a class of fifty from a Southern University to study marine life. We take particular pains to ensure that whatever is essential to their health and well-being is provided and that any facilities they may wish of an academic kind are forthcoming. In the past it would seem that these study groups left pleased with their reception.

It is our understanding that University Foundations and individual professors frequently lead such groups and the purpose of this letter is to determine whether our facilities in such a regards are of interest to your University. We could very well take care of the following types of study groups at rates which would have the sanction of the Government:-

- 1. Marine Research Expeditions
- 2. Botanical Summer Schools
- 3. Educational conferences
- 4. Specific Study groups

Particularly associated with our Colony of late years has been Dr. Waldo Miner of the American Museum of Natural History and I have no doubt that he would be pleased to give you a personal opinion as to the suitability of the Colony for such scholastic enterprise.

With renewed appreciation of your kindness and a hope that you further consider the matter and advise us.
