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RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. For membership \$1 up to the day of show.
2. Parties not claiming their prize money before Dec. 31st, forfeit the same for benefit of Society. Parties receiving a prize or prizes, will be paid the full amount.
3. Animals exhibited must have been the bonafide property of exhibitor for at least one month, previous to the show.
4. All produce must have been grown by the exhibitor during the current year. Potatoes to be exhibited in boxes or baskets, and apples upon plates.
5. Brood Mares, Cows, Ewes and Sows must have borne young during the present year. Mares must have raised a foal, and Cows must be giving milk at the time of Exhibition or give evidence of having been far gone with calf.
6. Each animal must be provided with a chain or rope, and be placed on the show grounds amongst those of its class, and exhibitors of THOROUGHBRED STOCK must be prepared to produce the certificate of registration.
7. All Manufactures to be of Canadian make, the property of the Manufacturer or his agent. Articles shown under the head of Manufactures and Ladies' Work, must have been made by the exhibitor or their family, AND NEVER BEEN EXHIBITED PREVIOUS TO 1890, exhibitors in all cases to be the producers and bonafide owners. Upon the discovery of any fraud, or deception, either in the production or ownership, concerning any article exhibited, the Directors will have power to withhold any prize awarded and may prohibit any such party from exhibiting in any class for two or three years, and may publish the names of such persons or not, as may be deemed expedient.
8. Exhibitors are requested to enter such articles only as they intend to exhibit, which will greatly facilitate the work of the Secretary, and save unnecessary waste of time.
9. While the Directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of the articles sent to the Exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting, and, should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery, but they will not make any payment for the value thereof.
10. It does not follow that because a prize is offered for any particular animal or article that it must be awarded, unless there is proper competition, or unless the exhibit is really of sufficient merit to warrant the award being made. The Judges are particularly requested to note this fact.
11. Articles entered for exhibition must be in their assigned places by 11 o'clock on the morning of the first day of the Show, 30th September, otherwise they may be refused.
12. All Live Stock and Implements, &c., &c., must be on the Show Grounds at 11 o'clock a. m. sharp on the second day of the Show, 1st October; and all Grain, Roots, Fruit, Dairy Produce, Ladies' Work, Fine Arts, Horticulture, in the Hall by 11 o'clock on the first day of the Show, 30th September.
13. Ladies are particularly requested to have articles for competition in Class 20 properly entered, so as to correspond with the Prize List.
14. No articles shall be removed from the hall until 4:30 o'clock p. m. on the second day of the Show, AND ANY PERSON DETECTED TAKING FRUIT OR OTHER ARTICLES WILL BE POSITIVELY PUNISHED ACCORDING TO LAW. This year, two Constables will be placed in the Hall.

15. No person shall be a Judge in any class, in which he is an exhibitor or interested in or has any relations exhibiting.

16. Heavy Draught Teams must be attached to a Lumber Waggon and General Purpose, Carriage and Roadster Teams attached to a Democrat or Buggy. No SULKIES ALLOWED. Saddle Horses with their proper equipments.

17. Exhibitors or others, will not be allowed to handle or interfere with articles on exhibition. When entered they must be considered in the hands and under the entire control of the Society.

18. No animal or article entitled to more than one prize, except in special prizes, and no article exhibited in the hall is to have the owner's name thereon. No more than one premium in any class will be awarded to any exhibitor or paid if awarded.

19. In all cases of doubt or difficulty that may arise before making their awards, the Judges shall submit the matter to one of the Directors; and the President and two or more Directors shall finally settle the same.

20. 1st prize ticket, Red; 2nd, Blue; 3rd, Yellow; Highly Commended, Green.

21. No entire horse allowed to compete, except yearlings in their respective classes by themselves.

22. Membership tickets will admit two if presented to the gate keeper. To others, a charge of fifteen cents each will be made, (and please have the right change). Tickets must be purchased before going to the gate, as no money will be taken there. Twenty-five cents for a one horse buggy, and twenty cents for a saddle horse (if not entered for competition).

23. Judges are requested to report themselves to the Secretary on their arrival and proceed to their duty at 11.45 a. m., on the first day (30th Sept.) and at 10 o'clock sharp on the second day of the Show, (1st October).

24. Those exhibiting Fruit or Flowers are requested to have the proper name attached to the article when available.

25. Parties exhibiting new kinds of grains are requested to give the name, and exhibit samples in ear.

26. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing and it must be delivered to the Secretary within one week of the cause of protest; it must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$1 which sum shall be forfeited to the Society if the said protest is not sustained. The Board of Directors, however, earnestly hope that exhibitors will not enter protests without the strongest grounds for so doing, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.

27. The Judges are expected, in the execution of their duties, to be careful to act with the most rigid impartiality, and make their entries in a clear and conspicuous manner; in all cases of doubt or difficulty referring freely to the Secretary.

28. No animal or article exhibited shall have about it any prize colors or cards until the awards have been made in their respective classes.

29. No person shall be permitted in the Horse or Cattle Rings during the time of judging except the Judges, the grooms, or persons in charge of the animals, or Directors.

30. All prize cards which have been affixed by the Judges must be displayed during the Exhibition. Any infraction of this rule will incur the forfeiture of any premium awarded.

31. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with or influence the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall at any time, on the premises of the Society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge in consequence of any award made by him, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled, and shall be excluded from exhibiting for

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two years thereafter. Judges are particularly requested to immediately report any breach of this rule.

32. At the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon, or as soon as all prizes are awarded on the second day of the Show, ALL PRIZE HORSES AND CATTLE shall be paraded in the ring in their respected classes, and if any are absent, the prize, or prizes, awarded for such shall be forfeited.

33. All entries must be made with the Secretary either personally, or by letter (prepaid) FOUR DAYS PREVIOUS TO THE DAY OF THE SHOW by paying twenty-five cents to be applied to the General Fund.

34. Exhibitors making their entries are particularly requested to make out a list, before leaving home, of the articles they intend to enter, with their name and address clearly and legibly written. This will greatly facilitate and expedite the making of entries as well as prevent mistakes, which frequently occur in filling blanks hastily from verbal instructions.

35. The Treasurer will commence payment of prizes SIX DAYS AFTER THE SHOW, and persons having prizes awarded them, may call on that day, or leave a written order for the money. The inside hall will be open to the public at 6.30 p. m. on the first day of the Show, and kept open until 10.30 p. m., and opened at 8 o'clock a. m. on the second day.

36. Efficient constables will be engaged to see that no person be allowed to meddle or interfere with the fruit or other articles exhibited, and special arrangements will be made for the protection of these articles, and to prevent any annoyance from dust or otherwise.

37. No dealer in candies or fruits, hucksters or petty traders, shall be allowed to traffic on the Show Grounds on fair day except upon previous payment to the Treasurer of a fee of \$20, and that no such dealer shall be permitted to traffic in such wares or goods within 300 yards of the Show Grounds on such days without paying the said fee; and that no gambling be allowed ON ANY PRETENCE WHATEVER, EITHER UPON THE GROUNDS OR WITHIN SAID 300 YARDS THEREOF.

The Directors wish to call particular attention to Rules 7, 10, 29, 31, 32, 33 and 34, as the non-observance of these Rules heretofore has given considerable annoyance and dissatisfaction.

A large number of horse buyers, and other parties, wanting Colts, Sheep and Pigs, have promised to attend our Show on the second day. This is a good opportunity for farmers, who want to sell.

Central Society will not accept of ANY SPECIAL DONATION prizes.

Every one must walk the one way around in the Inside Hall.

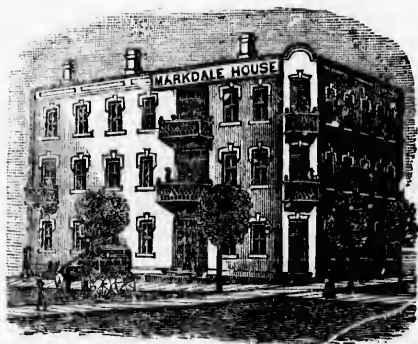

RULES.

Canadian Turf Rules to govern. In all cases the Judge's decision to be final. Entries must be made with the Secretary not later than Tuesday, Sept. 30th, at 12 o'clock, noon. The entrance fee must in every case accompany the entry, or it will not be accepted. Pacers will not be allowed to compete, and sulkies to be used. In the Running race the jockeys to be weighed before starting.

The Track is in first-class order.

The winning horses must appear on the Show Grounds the second day of the Show at 2 o'clock.
