IMPORTANT DISCOVERY MADE IN MANUFACTURE OF TOOL STEEL

NEW PROCESS WILL TURN BOILERPLATE INTO HIGH GRADE STEEL.

Canada's Biggest Capitalists Interested in Scheme-Discovery Means Better Tool Steel for Less Money.

Some particulars were given out resterday concerning one of the most important discoveries made in recent years in the industrial world. A process has at last been perfected for converting ordinary bolierplate steel—the lowest grade—into steel of the highest quality known to manufacturers of tools. Knives, chisels, plow points, and a hundred other steel tools of a temper hitherto unattainable can now be made from ordinary boilerplate in a word, this process means a better tool for less money.

In a word, this process means a better tool for less money.

Some of the biggest capitalists in Canada have acquired control of the patent, the secret of which was developed by R. I. Henderson, proprietor of the Canadian Malicable Iron and Steel Co., of this city. Mr. Henderson has sold all his rights to Toronto capitalists, the names of whom will not be made public for a day or so. It is known, however, that Mr. J. J. Main, former vice-president and general manager of the Polson Iron Works, is now the manager for the new owners.

The experimental stage has long been passed. For two years now, the Canadian Malicable Iron and Steel Company have been turning out at their plant at 32 Alphine Avenue, West Toronto, steel treated by this new process—steel of the best quality known to tool manufacturers. Recently the plant was enlarged and a new furnace installed. Mr. Henderson says this is but the beginning of a new large industry for Toronto and Canada.

The fame of steel thus treated has spread beyond Canada. The United States Government is interested. Its ordnance department is desirous of making a test as to the usefulness of the steel as armor plating for their warships. Again such Canadian firms as the Steel and Radiation Company and the Street Raliway Company of Toronto, William Kennedy & Sons of Owen Sound and many others have all endorsed the product. It is understood that the Morgan interests also are investigating with a view to acquiring the patent in the United

cription of the plant may be of interest. The furnace, which constitutes the biggest portion of the of an entirely new design and the only one of its kind in the world. Rectangular in shape, and cominly of fire brick, it has two steel doors which a winch opens and closes to admit of the entrance or posed mainly of fire brick, it has two steel doors which a winch opens and closes to admit of the entrance or exit of the fiat cars on which the charge of steel rests when in the heating chamber. First of all, the steel to be treated is loaded on a flat car bedded with fire brick. This bed, when the flat car is wheeled into the heating chamber, makes the base of the furnace. The steel doors are lifted and the charge is drawn in by means of a winch. The doors then close and the heat is turned on. A current of air driven into the heating chamber at a pressure of 14 ounces to the square inch and mingling with the carbonic acid gas arising from the oil fuel used, supplies the heat. In from four to five hours the process is completed and the car withdrawn. Another one is immediately hauled in and so on thruout the day, one car in the heating chamber and one being loaded up outside. The present capacity of the plant is 25 to 30 tons per day, tho in a short period an enlarged plant will turn out possibly about 200 tons.

The wonderful quality of the steel thus produced was demonstrated yesterday to a party of newspaper men and other interested spectators. First of all, a piece of bolierplate which had undergone treatment was forged into a cold chisel. It was then hammered deep into a file of the finest Sheffield steel. No severer test is known was continuous all the way through, the chisel end was again heated white, turned back for about two inches and welded to the main portion without the use of borax, flux or welding compound of any kind, not even using the ordinary sand. In other words, this steel may be forged and welded just as if it were ordinary iron without impairing its quality as tool steel. A new edge was then put on and tempered so as to cut into the file without injury to its own bit.

Next an ordinary railway spike, which had been treated by the process for about four hours, was forged into a cold chisel and made to cut a hard steel file. It was then forged into a wood-cutting chisel about one-quarter inch in thickness and a dry hemlock knot was chipped out of a block of wood held in a vise. Of such a temper was the chisel that after this test it shaved the hairs off a man's arm as clean as a razor.

Letters have been received from those who have tried the steel, thus treated, declaring that the quality is better than the best tool steel on the market, and what is of equal interest, the market price is lower. Altogether, a revolution in the tool steel manufacturing industry appears to be in sight.







HIGHER PRICES PREVAIL FOR STEEL PRODUCTS

NEW YORK, June 19.—Contracts placed for steel bridges and buildings since the first of January have called for 690,000 tons of fabricated shapes, of which 50,000 tons have been placed since June 1. At the moment there is a slackening in the trade, but it 4s expected that orders for the half year will reach 725,000 tons of fabricated shapes. Recent small sales have been booked at an advance of from \$1 to \$2 per ton on the fabricated prices and from \$2 to \$2 per ton on the plain structural steel prices prevailing early in this year. Contracts have been placed since June 1 for 140,000 tons of rails for domestic roads and for export.

The Iron Age, the official organ of the steel trade, says: Markets for finished steel show the effect of the postponement of action on some pending matters, particularly by railroads, and important buying is not expected until the presidential conventions are out of the rest.
