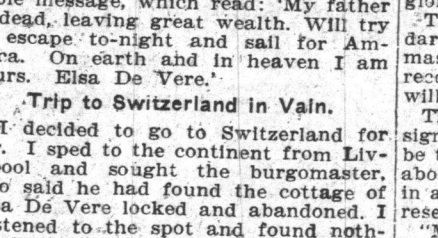

MARKET IS SOLD OUT.

Broker Heron Looks for an Improving Tendency.

Heron & Co. in their weekly letter say: The market throat the week has been very narrow, with the tone irregular, but much less pressure to sell has been apparent, in fact the buying in several issues, notably Foster, Treshway and Silver Leaf, toward the week end particularly has been much better than the selling. Business has been on a somewhat smaller scale, and a small decline in the average price of 20 leading stocks is shown.

Further efforts to depress "Foster" were not successful and it would seem that it has at last seen bottom. The report about to be issued by the board of directors is likely to be a bullish affair and renewed activity in the stock at sharply advancing prices should be seen right away. The market as a whole has a very "sold out" appearance, and it does not seem likely that efforts to depress prices further will succeed. We expect, however, a continuance of trading conditions with a strong tendency to improvement from this time forward, as stocks generally are at a level where they can be purchased on all reactions are surely in order.

POSTOFFICE FOR COBALT.

McCool, M.P., arrived in town to-day to look over Cobalt with a view to selecting a site for a new postoffice and giving Cobalt the much needed improved postal service, which the demand of the camp and of the entire north country calls for. The party came in the minister's private car and is being chartered by Mayor Finlan, Ald. Renning and Milton Carr, ex-M.L.A. A customs office will be opened in Cobalt within two weeks. At present business has to be done in North Bay.

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MOHONK CONFERENCE BROUGHT TO A CLOSE

Does Not Mention Disarmament or Limitation in Recommendations to Hague.

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., May 24.—The Lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration to-day decided not to mention the subject of disarmament or limitation of armaments in its recommendations to The Hague conference.

The sessions will close to-night. The platform adopted to-day recognizes with profound gratitude the development of those forces which are making for international peace through international justice. The promotion of intercourse, friendship and amity among the nations, the organization of international bodies in commerce, science and philanthropy, the demand for higher standards of international morality are but preludes to greater harmony and unity among the peoples of the world.

Satisfaction Expressed. It mentions with satisfaction, among the events of the last twelve months, the increasing disposition of nations to assist each other in time of famine and disaster, and the holding in New York of international arbitration and peace congresses of far-reaching importance. The meeting of the second Hague conference next month marks another epoch in the history of international development.

Measures Urged. The platform urges, as the most immediate and important action to be taken by this second Hague conference, the following measures: 1. A provision for stated meetings of the Hague conference. 2. Such changes in The Hague code as may be necessary to establish a definite judicial tribunal always open for the adjudication of international questions.

3. A general arbitration treaty for the settlement of international disputes. 4. A declaration in favor of the inviolability of private property at sea in time of war. 5. A declaration to the effect that there should be no armed intervention for the collection of private claims when the debtor nation is willing to submit such claims to arbitration.

A singularly buoyant "Joie de vivre," a never-falling assurance, a suggestion of provincialism, and a certain grasp of politics and economics quite foreign to the Englishwoman, says The By-stander, are the outstanding characteristics of the colonial ladies now honoring us with their visit. One feels, they do their best to hide the fact under the femininity of frocks and frills, that these ladies (those from Australia and New Zealand, at any rate) are of that advanced type—the possessors of the suffrage—which we in England still look on with a species of nervous dread. Lady Laurier, of course, is rather one of our old-fashioned selves. The daughter of an old French-Canadian family, white-haired, artistic, and with beautiful old-world manners, Lady Laurier brings with her none of those younger, more strenuous mannerisms which surround the ladies from the Antipodes. Lady Ward, the wife of the Premier of New Zealand, is her exact opposite. Tall, decided in manner and opinion, and firm in politics, she is just the wife one would expect to find at the side of a great, self-made statesman. Mrs. Deakin is also the typical colonial woman, ultra-Australian, yet cosmopolitan, and with wide interests and sympathies. Neither lady, of course, finds much to learn in poor, slow, old England.

CURZON WANTED IN MANY CONSTITUENCIES.

LONDON, May 24.—The Unionists of Jarrow division of Durham have entered into competition with Rutland for the parliamentary services of Lord Curzon of Kedleston. This morning they forwarded him an invitation to contest Jarrow on the approaching retirement of Sir Charles Palmer, Liberal, who was born in 1822.

LARGER LAKE DISTRICT ONE OF WORLD'S RICHEST

Recent Find Shows Values Estimated at \$5000 A Ton - Camp Gossip.

Temiskaming Herald: "I expect to see Larder Lake and the adjoining districts develop into one of the richest mining fields in the world," such is the deliberate statement of a civil and mining engineer of this town, J. S. Handley. The professional man is usually pretty careful in his statements. Men who make their living as consultants and who have besides a wide personal professional experience are prone to give downright opinions which may prove wrong. But in this instance Mr. Handley is not to be doubted. He is a bush like a book, who has helped to plow the first furrow for the Trans-continental and who has besides a wide personal professional experience in the Larder Lake country, as is indicated in the fact that he has mapped the country, says he expects the gold fields to develop into possibly THE richest in the world.

The article from his pen is as follows: "What do you think of it?" This is the question that one is asked daily. Now the editor of The Herald comes to me with the same question. "Once, long ago, I owed a partial allegiance to an editor and the habit of youthful obedience has not left me, and so it is that I find myself obeying The Herald's behest. In seeking a solution of the Larder problem one is prone to turn to one's fellows. This is merely shifting the responsibility, and even when the burden has been transferred to other shoulders there is no lasting satisfaction. This questions means a good deal to the residents of Temiskaming and, after all, each must face it for himself. The Indians called the lake their storehouse of fish—Larder. What if it should prove to be the white man's storehouse of gold?"

Rich in Gold. There is no longer any doubt on this point. The country is rich in gold, but how rich is a problem that time alone can solve. Before long a diamond drill will be at work in the rock exposed, and its exploratory labor will be followed by those who appreciate its value with more than an interest. The recent find on the Reddick property is one of the vast possibilities. An expert has placed a conservative estimate on the value of the property as \$5000 to the ton. This particular property is advancing rapidly from the prospect stage to that of a mine and its shipments are confidently looked for in the near future. Last week a sample was received in town from the Big Lake, a property which is being worked gold visible to the naked eye. In Toronto last week many rich samples were exhibited from the Larder fields and the doubt as to whether it would be possible for the writer to quote actual figures which he has in his possession, showing much higher values than already named. It is also certain that the wisdom of the Canadian Mining Journal, which figures would come as a considerable surprise.

Larder a Prospect Only.

At present the same thing is to be said of Larder as of a prospect only. The general public may easily be misled by figures, which, true in themselves, may be misapplied without their context. Mining is a business which calls for the exercise of judgment, and the tests that mathematics require are not either applicable or even just.

The situation might fittingly be summed up in five words, which are probably more familiar with the country than residents. He was not talking about Larder, yet I do not hesitate to quote him here: "It's a gamble—but it's the best gamble I know."

Time the Only Proof.

The next few months will reveal much. In the meantime I take this opportunity of removing myself from the class of wobbles by saying, that my personal belief is all in favor of the new field and that I expect to see Larder and its adjoining district develop into one of the richest mining fields of the world, probably the richest. The statement carries with it responsibilities and of these I am fully aware. The risk enters into every kind of business, but it has been recognized in mining more than other occupations.

"BLACK HAND" CASE-OVER.

One of Accused Suicides and the Other Admits.

NEW YORK, May 24.—The trial of three alleged "black hand" men on the charge of murdering Gaetano Costa, a Brooklyn butcher, was abruptly today. Rocco Panaggio, one of the men, committed suicide at the Raymond Street Jail by hanging himself after the opening of the supreme court. Genaro Esposito, another of the trio, withdrew his plea of guilty and pleaded guilty to murder in the second degree. Then, upon recommendation of District Attorney Clark, Francesco Costa, on trial jointly with the other two, was discharged for want of evidence.

Railway Fireman Killed.

BELLEVILLE, May 24.—Jacob Hennessy, a fireman on the C. O. Railway, was cut in two by a train near Bancroft. The train broke apart, and the shock is supposed to have thrown him under the wheels. Hennessy was 39 years old and unmarried. His home was in Trenton.

PORT COLBORNE, May 24.—Mrs. James Schofield, a lifelong resident of this place, died this morning at the age of 85 years.

EDITOR'S DEATH.

PORT HURON, Mich., May 24.—Two hours after being seized with a severe pain in the region of his heart, John Murray, editor of The Daily Herald, died.

He was born in St. Mary's Ont., 59 years ago. While a young man he taught school for some time at Tillsonburg, Ont. He was appointed postmaster of this city by President Cleveland in 1886, and served four years.
