## Art Association of Montreal.

## ANNUAL REPORT, 1897.

The past year may be said to have marked another stage in the progress of the Association, inasmuch as the Council, after a period of only seven years, finds itself again face to face with the question of more accommodation.

The steady growth of the Association, in every way, has this year become so pronounced as to leave no doubt of its usefulness and popularity, and to encourage its friends and patrons to further exertions.

The membership has increased from 475 in 1890 to 750 to-day, and there is every reason to believe it will continue in like proportion, but any further increase at once necessitates some provision for greater accommodation. The space available for class work is entirely too restricted, and the Galleries are quite inadequate for exhibitions and lectures for even the present membership.

The financial results of the year, as shown by the Treasurer's statements, are satisfactory, there being a surplus of revenue over expenditure; but the usefulness of the Association is still restricted by the very heavy interest charge, which absorbs too great a proportion of the revenue. Were it freed from this incumbrance, a sum of about \$1600 would be at the disposal of the Council, which would materially increase the active work of the Association. To effect this, a sum of \$35,000 would require to be raised and applied to the payment of the existing mortgages.

The Council is prepared to recommend to the Association the desirability of changing the termination of the business year from 31st December to the 31st May, in order to secure a more consecutive report of the classes, exhibitions and general work which is concentrated into the winter months.

#### 17TH ANNUAL SPRING EXHIBITION.

The 17th Annual Spring Exhibition of the works of Canadian artists was held during the four weeks of April.

It was opened with the usual evening assembly, at which the attendance of members and exhibitors was large.

The portraits, chiefly in oil, were a notable feature of the exhibition, which, however, was hardly equal in other respects to the standard of the last few years, and in consequence the public attendance and sales were below the average.

The works exhibited were as follows: 132 oil paintings, 34 water colours and pastels, with a few architectural studies, sculptures and miniatures on ivory, and also a quantity of decorated china.

The attendance, inclusive of the private view, was: of members, 2,992; of non-members, 627; total, 3,619.

#### LOAN EXHIBITION OF WATER COLOURS.

Early in the year the Association made a new departure for Montreal by holding a loan exhibition of water-colours.

The experiment was eminently successful. The exhibition proved to be of great interest, and was much appreciated by members and the general public.

Numerous examples were shown of both American and European artists, but the feature of the collection was the

extraordinary exhibit of choice examples of work by masters of the modern Dutch and British schools.

The exhibition consisted of 184 subjects, representing 86 artists.

The attendance was: of members, 2,653; of visitors, 668; total, 3,331.

#### ART CLASSES.

The seventeenth session of the advanced Art Classes commenced on October 14th, in charge of Mr. WILLIAM BRYMNER, R.C.A., who reports as follows:—

"The number of pupils attending the Art Classes this year has been very much increased, and the quality of work keeps up to a fair standard.

The usual scholarships were awarded last Spring, after a good competition. These two annual scholarships are found to be of much benefit in securing the continued attendance in the school of those pupils who have made the greatest progress in their work.

If more room was available, it would be well to add an Elementary Drawing Class to the school, and also a class in Design; but with the present accommodation no such additions are possible.

More good casts are urgently required. Two life-sized casts from the large figures of the Elgin Marbles, and some masks and busts, would make a sufficient addition for the present. These could be procured for about one hundred dollars. The constant repetition of work from the same cast is so monotonous as to discourage the pupils. This would be avoided by the addition from time to time of a few good copies such as those now suggested."

The number of pupils who attended during the Session 1896-'97 was 37, and up to the present date this Session, 35.

There were fourteen competitors for the Association Scholarships at the Annual Competition, the successful ones being:

In the 1st Section, (Life) Robt. H. Montgomery.

In the 2nd Section, (Antique) Helen G. McNicoll and Janet May Powell, equal.

A scholarship for one year was awarded to each, with the privilege of competing again for another year.

#### WATER COLOUR CLASS.

The ninth Session of the classes in Water Colour Drawing was conducted by Mr. Charles E. Moss from the 13th September to the 30th October: the attendance was up to the average, and the work satisfactory.

#### LECTURES.

The Committee on Lectures and Entertainments arranged for the following, all of which were very largely attended:

- 1. Mr. Joseph Gould organized and directed a most successful Musical Evening, February 16th.
- 2. Professor S. H. Capper lectured, March 12th, on the attractive topic "The Egypt of the Pharaohs."
- 3. Mr. William Brymner, R.C.A., delivered a carefully prepared and instructive Lecture, April 13th, on "Impressionism."

Each lecture was fully illustrated by a series of lantern slides.

Our cordial thanks are due to these gentlemen for their valuable contributions to the life of the Association in the past year.

In the last report reference was made to the increased interest in our Lectures and Entertainments, and to the growing disproportion, in consequence, between the seating capacity of the Gallery and the membership of the Association. With the gratifying increase of the membership for 1898, it will be necessary to consider whether the time has not come to meet the convenience of the members by the securing of a larger and more commodious lecture-room for the next season.

#### ARCHITECTURAL LECTURES.

An interesting course of lectures under the auspices of the Province of Quebec Association of Architects was given during last winter in the old Gallery, to which the members of the Association were invited, and the large attendance throughout was particularly gratifying. The lectures were as follows, and were illustrated by diagrams and stereopticon views:

January 22nd, "The Egyptian Pyramids and their Builders," Prof. S. H. Capper, M.A.

February 23rd, "The Gothic of Northern Italy," A. C. Hutcheson, R.C.A.

March 23rd, "The Monuments of Athens," Principal Peterson, LL.D.

April 20th, "The Story of an Illustrious Abbey," A. T. Taylor, R.C.A., F.R.I.B.A.

#### DONATIONS.

No better appreciation of the estimate in which the Council holds the donation of the late W. G. Murray can be evinced than the formal report of the committee appointed to inspect and judge of the fitness of the gift for the purposes of the Association.

"The Advisory Committee, appointed in accordance with by-law 33 to examine the paintings, eight in number, bequeathed by the late W. G. Murray to the Art Association, beg to report that they are worthy of acceptance and suitable for the Gallery, viz:

Besides these eight paintings, a cash bequest of \$500, less succession duty, was received from the late Mr. Murray, and a legacy for a similar amount from the late Miss Grace Murray; both sums have been placed to the credit of the Endowment Fund.

#### GENERAL.

A most interesting collection of Butterflies and Moths, owned by Mr. W. Denton, of Wellesley, Mass., was on exhibition in the new Gallery from November 15th to 27th, at which the attendance of members was 2,049 and of non-members 1,194. The collection was afterwards acquired for the Museum of McGill University.

In response to the request of the Mayor of Montreal for a general illumination and decoration of the city, in celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, the building of the Association was decorated and illuminated on the 22nd and 23rd of June, 1897.

The thanks of the Association are due to the proprietors of the Gazette and Herald newspapers for free copies throughout the year for the Reading Room.

### Proceedings of Annual Meeting.

The Annual General Meeting of the Members of the Association, duly summoned, was held in the old Gallery, on Friday, March 4th, at 5 P.M.

#### SEVENTEETH YEAR OF THE ADVANCED ART CLASSES.

The Session for 1897-'98 commenced on Friday, October 15th, and will close on Friday, May 13th, under the direction of Mr. Wm. Brymner, R.C.A. The Studios are open for work every week-day, and the regular instruction is given from 9.30 to 12.30 on the mornings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday,

The Course is, as far as possible, that adopted in the French Studios, which assumes the fact until one step is well taken it is useless to proceed to the next. A thorough study of form being of first importance, the student will draw from the cast in light and shade, proceeding from simple objects, parts of the figure, etc., to the entire figure from the antique.

Such Students as, in the opinion of Mr. Brymner, may benefit thereby, will paint from the cast or still-life, and if sufficiently advanced will work from the living model.

Subjects for composition will be given out occasionally during the Session.

The Session for 1897-'98 will extend over two terms, the first term being from the 15th of October to the 1st of February, and the second term from the 3rd of February to the 13th of May. It will be optional to Students to attend by the session, term or month.

Fees, in all cases payable in advance, have been fixed for the full session at \$40; for the term at \$25; and for the month at \$10.

The classes are held in the Studios of the Association, and Students are allowed the use of the Reading Room and Library, and free admission to the Galleries during the continuance of their studies.

Two Association Scholarships will be offered for competition at the end of the Session, each entitling the winner to two years free tuition.
