



Twenty-one companies, whose capital two years ago represented a market value of 444,000,000 marks (\$111,000,000) are worth on the basis of to-day's Boersé quotations only 271,000,000 marks (\$67,750,000), a decrease of 61 per cent. The Chucker Company heads the list, with a loss of 53,000,000 marks (\$13,250,000), followed by the Allegemeine Company, with 50,000,000 marks (\$12,500,000), the Stemens & Halske, 18,000,000 marks (\$4,500,000). The Union, which is the German connection of the General Electric Company of America, has depreciated 14,000,000 marks (\$3,500,000).




