





### HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

#### WILL ASK FOR WIDENING OF BURLINGTON CANAL

Influential Deputation to Visit Ottawa—I. O. F. High Court—Moir Escape Aftermath.

HAMILTON, Aug. 23.—(Special.)—A joint meeting of the city council, board of trade and Manufacturers' Association was held this evening to consider the feasibility of widening and deepening the Burlington Canal. A number of suggestions were made. A committee, consisting of W. O. Seely, M.P., T. J. Stewart, M.P., Samuel Barker, M.P., Mayor McLaren, Adam Zimmerman, Arthur Hatch and W. J. Southam, will wait upon the minister of canals at Ottawa, and urge upon him the desirability of widening the canal in conformity with the proposed extension of the Welland Canal.

At the meeting of the high court of the I. O. F. this evening, a resolution in favor of the holding of biennial sessions was voted down. Supreme Chief Ranger Stevenson addressed the delegates at some length on fraternalism and the advisability of providing funds for the support of the orphans of members.

Woman is Innocent. A London despatch to-night says: A London woman, against whom the suspicions of the detectives working on the escape of Private Moir from Hamilton Asylum, appear to have been directed, seems entirely innocent of any wrong doing. Her sympathy having led her to write to the soldier after his sentence had been passed. She has held one position for the past 20 or 25 years with much acceptance. Her duties have placed her in touch with soldiers and many others, but never have the authorities had the least reason to believe that she was actuated by any but the most creditable motives.

Another Death. Another death from infantile paralysis, so prevalent among children of the city, occurred last night, when Robert and Mrs. Haygarth, 24 Kayser street, were called on to mourn the loss of their son, Walter, aged 6.

The board of control intends to reconsider in the near future the old question of arranging a different insurance system for the civic buildings, and it is likely that the ratepayers will be given the opportunity of voting on a bylaw to raise \$10,000 as a starter for a civic insurance fund.

Lord Alhermarle, now in Toronto, is a grandson of the late Sir Allan Macnab of this city. When Lord Alhermarle was in camp to Sir Edmund Head, former governor-general of Canada, he married Sir Allan Macnab's daughter. He afterwards became Lord Alhermarle and at his death his son, who is now visiting Canada, succeeded to the title.

Automobile Identified. The story of the automobile that Moir is supposed to have escaped in has been squashed by the announcement that the automobile seen leaving the grounds around the time Moir and Tessert are supposed to have escaped belonged to Mr. Allan of the Toronto Electric Light Company, who was returning home after spending Sunday with friends in Brantford.

The news that Moir's hands were handcuffed behind his back, and if he had not been able to twist them to the front would have remained that way all Saturday night, has excited a great deal of adverse comment. Evidently Dr. Bruce Smith was aware of this feeling when he came here yesterday, for not only did he stop the procession of breaking up Moir's window, but he ordered that he must not have his hands manacled behind his back in the future during the night, but must be allowed a fair chance to sleep.

Marino Blankin, 35 years of age, an Italian laborer, working with a gang near Waterdown, was struck by a Grand Trunk train and instantly killed this morning. He became confused by trains approaching from both directions, and stepped in front of a fast express, which hurled him fifty feet.

#### GOOD WORDS FOR HAMILTON.

Editor World: James reflecting on Hamilton has always bored me, and a visit to that city to the other day failed to show the point of these alleged funny quips. Should there be occasion, however, to read the motto outlined in electric light on the city

hall. "Welcome to Hamilton." It should make one feel too warmly disposed towards the city to poke fun at it. This much can be said for Hamilton: It is not a beautiful waterfront. Toronto's is worse. The number of ugly wharves is fewer and the vision is spared the sight of dirty box cars, smoke and other unpleasantnesses of a railway yard. The waterfront is easy to reach, as trams run down within seventy yards of the dock, five minutes' ride taking one from the centre of the city to the water edge.

The intersection of King and James streets forms the centre of the town, and the former is Hamilton's pride. It is a fine wide street and contains many imposing buildings, including the post-office, the Waldorf Hotel, the Bank of Hamilton and the terminal station of the rural electric car lines, where large waiting rooms are provided. A miniature park, about 100 yards long, running on King street to James, gives the street at this point the appearance of a square.

To see these wide streets, the modern buildings and yet to be in a city free from dust and noise, is well worth a trip to Hamilton.

**AUTO UNDER A FLAT CAR THREE KILLED, 12 HURT**

Meter Dashed Into Moving Construction Train at Level Crossing That Hadn't Been Noticed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Three persons were killed and eight, including the train conductor, were hurt this afternoon when an automobile crashed into the side of a construction train on the Long Island Railroad, at the Merrick-road crossing at Springfield, Queensborough. Four others were less seriously injured.

The automobile, which belonged to Adolph Hirsch of Far Rockaway, encountered closed gates at the crossing, which had been lowered by the gateman because of a passing freight train, on the other side of the freight train was the construction train, in which the gateman or the automobile party. So when he raised the gates, just as the freight went by, the automobile shot forward and jammed itself under the flat car of the construction train. Pinned in this fashion and with the flat car careened on its trucks, the automobile was dragged fore and aft 200 feet, finally rolling down the embankment with one of the flat cars.

The piece created one of the greatest sensations the French metropolis has ever known, and ran for more than 1000 nights. It was originally written by Anthony Mars, that past master in the art of intrigue. The American adaptation was made by Stanislaus Stange. The locale has been changed from Paris to New York, but the play retains all the humor and atmosphere which made it so popular abroad.

"The Shepherd King" is the religious drama strongly told and its playing is adequate—almost inspired in the case of Miss Emma Dunn in the title role. The sale of seats begins to-morrow morning. Matinees will be given on Wednesday and Saturday.

HOW FARMERS FARED WITH AUTUMN SOWINGS

Thirty-five Counties Report Interesting Results of Last Fall's Experiment

Four hundred and thirty-eight farmers throughout Ontario, conducted experiments with autumn sown crops during the past year. Reports have been received from thirty-five of the counties of the province. The experimenters deserve much credit for the good work which they have done, not only for themselves, but for the farmers generally. Average results of the carefully conducted co-operative experiments with autumn sown crops are here presented in a concise form.

Winter wheat—Four varieties of winter wheat were distributed last autumn to those farmers who wished to test some of the leading varieties on their own farms. The average yields per acre for the four varieties are as follows: American Wonder, 2.2 tons, 31.0 bus.; Tasmania Red, 2.4 tons, 32.4 bus.; Imperial Amber, 2.4 tons, 32.4 bus.; Crisp, 2.4 tons, 32.4 bus.

The American Wonder performs very closely the Dawson's Golden Churn, both in appearance of the growing crop and in the quality and the appearance of the grain. The Tasmania Red is a bearded, red chaffed, winter wheat of fair strength of straw and of good average quality for bread production. The Imperial Amber is a bearded, red chaffed, winter wheat, rather weak in the straw, but excellent for bread production.

Results From Rye. Winter rye—Three varieties of winter rye were distributed in the autumn of 1909. The results show that the Mammoth White variety came at the head of the list in the autumn of 1909. Warren & Gzowski, in a market letter, relative to the Porcupine camp, say: "We are informed that Mr. John Hollinger stated regarding the Hollinger claim, No. 1 shaft is now down 125 feet. The drift toward No. 3 shaft is in 125 feet. 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Cobalt--Mining Stocks Experience--Cobalt Trading Brokers Attack Market Which Holds Up Fairly Well

Small Declines Registered by Cobalts When Pressure is Put on List by Professional Operators.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, August 23. After the protracted advance in Cobalt mining stocks, which extended for about a week without a break, it was only natural to look for an easier tendency to develop when the buying power became exhausted. This latter condition was to a certain extent in evidence to-day, and under a much lessened volume of transactions, prices in one or two special cases were below those of the previous session.

Some long stock came out to-day, but offerings were well taken care of and the absorbent power of the market was maintained at a level sufficient to prevent any material declines. There were few price changes of any consequence in any section of the list. The following were again the most active stocks, these shares selling around 72, while the low price reached 72 1/4, the closing bid being at that figure.

Small losses from yesterday's high point were recorded by Beaver, Rochester and Little Nip. Hargraves was the only strong point, selling up to 24 1/2. Feebles, a three-year-old dog, was killed, and he had his hand badly lacerated.

CHARLES NURSE TO LEAVE TORONTO

Charles Nurse, who has lived at Humber Bay since 1876, will go into the hotel business at Lindsay. He came to Toronto with his parents in 1874, when he was 7 years old. At the time of the bolt works train disaster January 2, 1884, he crawled between the spokes of the wheels of the wrecked engines, and threw snow upon the fires, that death by burning might not be the fate of the wounded. In this way the life of the wounded was saved. He was imprisoned in the wreck. He was saved the lives of two men, and he was presented with a medal. He has also saved many from drowning in the Humber.

MARKET GARDENERS ESCAPE

# New York Stocks Recover After an Early Decline

## MARKET CAN ONLY BE PUT DOWN BY ACTUAL STOCK.

World Office,  
Tuesday Evening, Aug. 23.

Traders played for a further reaction at the local exchange today. This was apparently successful in the calls of Rio and Sao Paulo, but offering down other securities did not meet with much success. The market in speculative stocks is highly professional, and an active bear campaign is only debarred because of the small amount of margined shares and the recognized presence of real investment purchases. It will require the selling of actual stock to put prices down, and for the time being this is not occurring.

## Wall St. Holds Dull and Heavy With Public Little Interested

### New York Stocks Have Sharp Reaction Early, But Firm Up Later—Domestic Issues Quiet With Small Price Changes.

The Toronto Stock Exchange today adopted its usual state of torpidity, the transaction being exceedingly slim in the active securities.

While there was no outstanding feature to the market, reading between the dealings it would appear that the present is against prices at present is purely tentative, not being backed up by a substantial ground-work.

For speculative purposes floor traders are taking the New York market as the index for day to day movement, but are exercising extreme caution in putting out short contracts because of the small amount of stock which is at present coming into the market.

The action of the Maple Leaf securities was somewhat of a relief to the general dealings of the exchange. The preferred shares of this security were again in excellent demand and sold up at the close as high as 97 1/2, a further rise of one and a half points. The common shares were not in quite as good a demand but the price for this was held above yesterday's quotation.

There was some selling of Rio and Sao Paulo during the day, mainly on the presumption that London is immediately bearish on American securities, but here again the selling was conducted in a methodical way and care was exercised not to invade prices too far.

The announcement of the declaration of the regular dividend on the Mackay securities had upset the calculations of those who were looking for a bigger return on the common shares, but notwithstanding this there were few shares dealt in and few on really active terms.

Most of the buying to-day, as for several days previous, came from those who will be able to take care of the securities and can scarcely be considered as speculative purchases.

In the meantime dealings on this exchange seem to have reached a dead-end, and it is not likely to be forced out, there is no reason to expect lower prices, and in case the investment demand keeps up and there should be a growth in the speculative demand, a return to higher prices will be easily brought about.

No disposition upon the part of banking interests to make fresh commitments on the long side is shown, and with the advent of any unfavorable news, the market will be found to be in a very vulnerable position.—Town Topics.
