Some of the features of the pro-posed world court have already been summarized from The Hague, but the draft given out today gives the exact terms of the entire project, consisting of 62 articles divided into three chapters on organization, competence of court and procedure. A preamble states the general purpose of the court as follows: "A permanent court of international

justice, to which parties shall have direct access, is hereby established, in accordance with article 140 of the covenant of the league of nations. This court shall be in addition to the court of arbitration, organized by The Hague convention of 1899 and 1907, and to the special tribunals of arbitration to which states are always at liberty to submit their disputes for
