## Directions for Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Direetions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

$\$$AMBRO island and light house is in latitude 44 deg .30 min . N. and longitude 63 deg, 32 min . W.
Frorn the westward, tring the light to bear N, E.; if it bears more easterly, stretch to the soutbward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow ; give it inore than a mile and a halt birth, as much more as you please.
Note-The western ledges lie from the light $\mathbf{S} \mathbf{W}$ distant two riiles, the other W S W about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some abuve water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E N E.

When the light bears nerth, distant about 2 miles, run N E 4 miles; then north will carry yon to Chedabucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

Wheo a-breast of Chedabucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of (teorge's island.

When within $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile of George's island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.
In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's heach, run nearest the point, to shan a shoal which runs off S . W. from the beach.
There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.
Coming from the eastward, run for the light; and you cannot fail seeiog Chedabucto Head as yon open Halifax harbour; the ligtit being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

I NLE Parrsborough Packet sails regularly between Windsor and Parrsborouigh every week, from the 1st April to Christmas, viz. leaves Parrsborough on Monday, wind and weather permitting so as to be at Windsor on Tuesday ; and will sail from thence the first high water that happens at or after eight $o^{2}$ eloc) in the morning of that day: the Packet frequently goes twice or three times a week when business requires it.

## Time of going through the Falls.

## SIR ROBERT MAXWELL OF ORCHARDSTON.

Sir Robert Maxwell, of Orchardston, in the county of Galloway, was the descendaut of an ancient Roman catholic family of the South of Scotland. He was the only child of a religions and bigoted reeluse, who sent him, while yet very young, to a college of Jesuits in Flanders, for education, the patornal ratate bring, is the mean time, wholly managed by the boy's uncle, the brother of the devotee, to whom he resigned the guardianship of the property, in order that he might employ the remainder of his days exclusively in acts of devotion. In the family of Orchardston, as indeed, in nost great families of that day, the younger branchem were butill provided for, and looked to the inheritor of the family estate alone for the mearis of supporting their rank in society; the liberal professions, and the employments of trade, were still considered somewhat dishonourable; and the unfortunate junior, nursed with inflated ideas of his consequence apd rank, was doomed in after life to exercise the servility, and experience the mortification of a humble depeadant: In this case the culpable negligence of Hiefather had transferred the entire management of a Jarge estate to his younger brother, who was so delighted in the passession that he reselved to retain it to the exclasion of his nephew, the rightfut heir at law. He consequently cireulated a report that the boy was dead, and on the death of the old baronet, which took place about this period, helaid ciam to the title and estate. $c^{6}$ do the meaia time our young hero was siffering (but very reluctantly) the severediscipline of the Jesuit's college, his expences being defrayed by decasional supplies sent lim by his uncle, whith'were to him represented as the bounties of thie eollege, a story which he could not but discredit, as he had beem placedithore at an agét too young to khd distinetly either"who he was, or thence he came; he was Uintelligent and lecile, andowas deemed of sufficient capacity to be*
tome hereater one of their own learned body, with which view he was educated. When at the age of 16, be found the discipline and austerities of a monastic life so ill suited to his inclination, that on a trivial dispute with the superior of his college he ran away and enlisted himself in a French marching regiment. In this, situation he sustained all the hardships of hunger, long marches, and inces*ant alarns, and as it was in the hottest part of the war betweer Frauce and England, about the year 1743, it may easily be imagined that his situation was by no means enviable. He fought as a foot-soldier at the hattle of Dettingen; he was also at the battle Fontenoy; and landed as an ensign in the Freuch troops at Murray Frith during the rebellion of forty-five. He joined the rebels a little before the battle of Falkirk, marched with them to Derby, and retreated; with then into Scotland. He was wounded at the bittle of Culloden; and fled with a few frierds to the woods of Lochaber, where he remained the greatest part of the summer of 1746, liviug upon the roots of trees, goats' milk, and the oatmeal end water of such peasants ak he durst confide in. Knowing, however, that it would be impossible to continue this course of life in the wituter, he began to devise means of effecting his return to France, perfectly unconscions that in the country where he was suffering the miseries of an outcast criminal he was entitled to the posisession of am ample estate and a title. His scheme was to gain the coast of Galloway, where, he hoped to get on board some smuggling vessel to the Isle of Mau, and from thence to France. The hardships wbieh he suffered in the prosecution of this plan would require a volame in their description. He crept through bye ways by inght, and was forced to lie cobceatodamong rocks and woods during the day; he was reduced almost to a state of nudity, and his food was obtained from the charity of the poorest peasauts, in whom ouly he could confide. Of this scanty subsistence he was tombtimes for days deprived; and to complete his misfortunes, lee was, ufter having walked bare-fooiod over rocks, briars, and unfrequented places; at length discoversd, seized, and taken before a magistrate near Dumfries. His name was Maxwell, which he did not attempt to conceal; he would have suffered as a rebel, had not his commission as a French officer been found in the lining of his tattered coat, which entitled him to the treatment of a prisoner of war. This privilege, however, only extended to the preservation of his life; he was cunfined in a paved stone dungeon so long, that he had amused himself by giving name to each stone which composed the pavement, and which in after life he took great pleasure in repeating and pointing out to his friends. An old woman, who had been his nurse in childhood, was at this time living in Dumfries, where he was a prisoner, and having accidentally seen him, and becoming acquainted with his name, his age, \&c. felt an assurance that he was the rightful Sir Robert Maxwell. The indissoluble attachment of the lower orders in Scotland to their chiefs is well known; and impelled by this feeling, this old and faithful domestic attended him with the most maternal affection administering liberally to his distresses. After an interview of some weeks she made him acquainted with her suspicion, and begged leave to examine a mark which she remembered on his body. This proof also concurring, she became outrageous with joy, and ran
about the streets, proclaiming the discovery she had made! This rumour reaching the ears of the magistrates, enquiry was inade, the proofs were examined, and it soon became the general opinion that he was the soll of the old barouet of Orchardston. The estate lay bitt a few miles from Dumfries, and the unlawful possessop being a man of considcrable power and a most vindictive disposifion, most people, whatever might be their private opinion, were cautious in espousing the cause of this disiaherited and distressed orphan. One gentleman however, was found, who, to his eternal honour, took him by the hand. "A.Mr. Gondy procured his release from prison, took him to his own house, cloathed him agreeably to his rank, and enabled him to commence an actich against his uncle. The latter was not inactive in the defence of his crime, and took every pains to prove his nephew to be an imposter. Chagrin and a consciousness of guilt hewever put an end to his existence before the cause came to a hearing, and Sir Robert was at length put into the peaceable possession of an estate worth upwards of two thousand pounds a year. He now began to display those qualities and abilities which had been but faintly perceptible in his former station: he discovered a generous mind, an intellect at once vigorous and refired, and manners the most elegant and polished; bis society was courted by all the neighbouring gentry, and in the course of time he married a Miss Maclellan, a relation of the family of Lord Kirkcudbright ; with this lady he lived in the most perfect happiness for many years. He joined in the prevalent practice of farming his own estate, and built a very elegat house on an eminence overlooking the Frith. An imprudent speculation in the bank of Ayr, however, compelled him once more to abandon the seat of his ancestors. He had reserved a small pittance, on which he and his lady lived the latter part of their days : This calamity he bore as became a man familiar witis misfortune, and he continuel the same worthy open-hearted character that he had ever been. The reduction of his furtune served only to redouble the kiadness and cordiality of his friends. He died suddenly in Septenber 1786, whilst on the road to visit one of them-the Earl of Selkirk. He left behind him no issue, but his name is still remembered with ardent attachment.
