By authority of the Most Puissant Sovereign Grand Commander and in pursuance of a summons to that effect, THE MOST PUISSANT SUPREME COUNCIL OF THE ANCIENT AND ACCEPTED SCOTTISH RITE FOR THE DOMINION OF CANADA, assembled in the new and beautiful hall of the Montreal Sovereign Consistory in the city of Montreal, in the Province of Quebec, on Wednesday the Fourteenth day of the Hebrew month *Tisri*, A.: M.: 5636, corresponding with the Thirteenth day of October, V.: E.:, 1875.

The Supreme Council was opened in due form at 12 o'clock noon.

The roll was then called and the following members found to be absent, viz:

The Secy.: General read a letter from Ill.: Bro.: COL.: McLEOD MOORE, 33°, stating that illness prevented his attendance at this session.

The excuse being deemed sufficient, the Secy.: General was instructed to write Ill.: Bro.: MOORE, expressing regret for the cause which deprived the Supreme Council of his genial company and valuable advice.

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Ill.: Bro.: MARSHALL verbally stated that he had been commissioned by Ill.: Bros.: JAMES DOMVILLE and HUGH W. CHISHOLM, to say that business of importance alone was the cause of their being absent ; which excuse was accepted by the Supreme Council.

Ill.: Bro.: J. K. KERR not having been heard from, the Secretary General was instructed to write to him, and express regret at his non-attendance, and request him in future, should he be unable to be present at any session, to write the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Com.: stating the cause of his absence.

A very courteous and fraternal letter was read by the Secy.: Gen.: from Ill.: Bro.: J. H. DRUMMOND, 33° M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Com.: of the Northern Jurisdiction U. S., expressing his regret that business engagements prevented his attendance on this occasion. The Secy.: Gen.: was instructed to file the same.

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: HUTTON, the reading of the proceedings of the last session was dispensed with, the same having been printed and distributed.

The Sovereign Grand Commander then delivered his annual address, as follows :

To the Supreme Council 33° of the Dominion of Canada, and the Officers and Members thereof :

MY DEAR AND ILLUSTRIOUS BROTHERS 33° :—

It is with sincere pleasure that I meet and address you at this our first annual session. I can only of course be expected to lay before you simple facts and suggestions,—inasmuch as the past twelve months have been, what I may call our Year of Preparation, and a putting our house in order,—but such matters as principally strike me, I will state for the attention and consideration of the Supreme Council.

RECOGNITIONS.

These, I am happy to say, embrace *England, Scotland, Ireland, United States,—Northern and Southern Jurisdictions,—France, Belgium, Italy, Colon for West Indies, Peru and St. Domingo,*—and I may add, *Switzerland*, as that Supreme Council has sent an invitation to us to attend the Congress of Supreme Councils proposed to assemble there.—All the documents received by me I now transfer to the Illustrious Secretary General H. : E. : for your information. The Official Recognitions of other Supreme Councils will doubtless come to us ; as, independently of my addressing each, and sending copies of the Proceedings of

our Formation, our Illustrious Brother and Staunch Friend, ALBERT PIKE, mailed letters on our behalf to each and every Supreme Council,—for which we are and must be greatly indebted to him.

REPRESENTATIVES.

Of these several are appointed, viz. :

England—Ill. Bro. DR. HAMILTON, London ; and Ill. Bro. COLONEL MOORE, Canada.

United States, Southern Jurisdiction—Ill. Bro. DR. MACKEY, Washington ; and Ill. Bro. MURTON, Canada.

United States, Northern Jurisdiction—Ill. Bro. TRACY, Detroit ; and Ill. Bro. MACKAY, Canada, and this Jurisdiction has elected me an Honorary Member of its Supreme Council, and sent me a Diploma.

The following require settlement, viz. :

Scotland—Nominates Ill. Bro. ELLIS ; and I propose Ill. Bro. MACKERSY, Sec. Gen. Edinburgh.

Ireland—Nominates Ill. Bro. DOMVILLE ; and I propose Ill. Bro. CHATTERTON, Sec. Gen. Dublin.

France—Recommends Ill. Bro. EMMANUEL ARAGO, Paris, as our Representative.

Belgium—Recommends Ill. Bro. EDOUARD CLUYDTS, Brussels, as our Representative.

Italy—Recommends Ill. Bro. TIMOTHIE PRIBOLI, Turin, as our Representative.

Peru—Recommends Ill. Bro. RICARDO H. HARTLEY, Lima, and appoints Ill. Bro. MARSHALL, St. John, N.B., Canada, as its Representative.

Colon for West Indies, St. Domingo and Switzerland are willing to nominate Representatives.

CONSTITUTION.

Your Committee have drawn up and distributed a *Draft of a Constitution*, and have taken much pains with it, and well merit our thanks. As this will come regularly before the Supreme Council, I will only here make mention of a few matters therein that attract my special attention.

1. *Tenure of Office*.—If this Section is adopted by the Council as regards my Office of *Sov. Gr. Com.* I desire that the Incumbent be placed upon the same footing with my Illustrious Brethren, and that the Office be balloted for precisely as other Offices are. There is no reason why my "*ad vitam*"

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should be continued, and I would prefer, now that our organization is perfected, to have it abolished. If re-elected by the free will of my Brethren, I shall gladly serve, and if not, I shall serve equally content under Past Rank.

2. *No. of Members.*—Active members are now limited to 21. No provision is made for conferring the 33° with the Title of Ill.° Ins.° Gen.°, and there are several Ill.° Brothers 32° who should have the Degree conferred upon them—two residing in New Brunswick, I am in a manner pledged to the “Sup.° Gr.° Council of Scotland to thus promote—of course the number of active members can be increased.

3. *Provincial Deputies.*—No provision is made for their rank and precedence—they are “Officers” of the Council. In one place the Sov.° Gr.° Com.° is made to appoint, in another the Council.

4. *Time and Place of Meeting.*—It is considered better and more convenient to all parties to have our Meetings at “Montreal” instead of Ottawa, and on the “second” instead of the “first Wednesday,” in which changes I willingly concurred.

5. *Quorum.*—Will five S.° G.° Inspectors General allow the conferring of the 33°?

6. *Fees.*—My impression is that the Fee of \$100 for the 33° is too high. Many most worthy Brothers would not like, or would not be able, to spare such an amount. The Constitution of 1786 specifies Ten Louis D’or—or the equivalent in local funds. England makes the Fee Twelve Guineas only, with all her wealth—\$65 of Canada Currency covers the amount, and, in my individual opinion, is sufficient.

WORK.

This, I am given to understand, will be *exemplified* by the Committee, as far as time will permit.

FORMS.

The Secretary General has, I have reason to believe, Forms prepared for Warrants, Credentials for Representatives, Certificates, etc., and also a Seal for approval and adoption. As the cost must naturally be anything but light, I requested that excellent and painstaking officer to address a Circular to each Council Member, respecting the raising means of defraying the same, by an individual loan. The result he will make known to you.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Finding it a matter of importance I appointed Ill.° Bro.° HUTTON, *Deputy of the Sup.° Council for the Province of Quebec*, which, I trust, you will now confirm.

Our *Consistories, Rose Croix Chapters, and Lodges of Perfection* are in a satisfactory state, with the exception of the "London" *Rose Croix Chapter*, which I am sorry to say does not appear to be in a workable condition, and I had serious thoughts of suspending the Warrant, if not cancelling it altogether, with your concurrence.

You will be grieved to hear that Ill. Bro. PIKE, has been, to use his own words, "*seriously ill*," so much so as to quite preclude his attending the *Congress at Lausanne*, which he was most anxious to do. His absence there will be a material loss to that assemblage. He sent me a printed document, showing a difficulty with the "*Sup. Council of France*" on a matter of Jurisdiction at Honolulu, in the Sandwich Islands, which I lay before you. As far as the contents of the document reveal I agree with Ill. Bro. PIKE.

I have received documents conveying the sad intelligence of the *decease of distinguished and respected members* of the A. & A. Rite belonging to both Jurisdictions of the United States, and I was honored by a Fraternal Invitation to assist at a "*Lodge of Sorrow*" held at Philadelphia on the 29th March last, which my Public Duties prevented my accepting to my regret. I am sure that our United States Brethren have our earnest and heartfelt sympathy.

The only *unpleasant thing* I have to make known officially to the Council is the case of Brother LEBLANC, and sorry I am to have to allude thereto. He, as you are very likely aware, absconded from Montreal under discreditable circumstances, which were brought to my notice by a member of our Supreme Council, and were besides published in the newspapers. I had no alternative but to request the Secretary General to communicate with and warn the Chiefs of the A. and A. Rite in the United States and to report LEBLANC's suspension.

I have thus trespassed upon your time and patience, my Illustrious Brothers, for which I beg your indulgence, and as a conclusion I wish you all health and happiness, and to our Council continual increase of prosperity, and may the G. A. O. T. U. permit us all to meet together oftentimes and oftentimes ! so mote it be !

On motion of Ill. Bro. MURTON, seconded by Ill. Bro. MUNRO, it was resolved that the Gr. Commander's address be referred to a Committee to recommend what action shall be taken thereon.

The G. Com. then appointed Ill. Bros. ELLIS and HUTTON a Committee for that purpose.

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The following credentials of representatives near this Supreme Council were presented:—

From the Sup.: Council of Peru, appointing Ill.: Bro.: ROBERT MARSHALL.

From the Sup.: Council of the Northern Jurisdiction U. S., appointing Ill.: Bro.: HUGH ALEX. MACKAY.

From the Sup.: Council of the Southern Jurisdiction U. S., appointing Ill.: Bro.: JOHN W. MURTON.

From the Sup.: Council of Scotland, appointing Ill.: Bro.: JOHN V. ELLIS.

And Ill.: Bro.: ROBERT MARSHALL reported that the Sup.: Council of Ireland had sent credentials to Ill.: Bro.: JAMES DOMVILLE, as their representative.

Whereupon, on motion, they were severally received, and the four Ill.: Brethren present were duly welcomed.

The Committee appointed to prepare a Constitution for this Supreme Council, reported as follows:

The Committee appointed at the first Session of this Supreme Council to submit for consideration a draft of Constitution for the government of the Rite in Canada, have carefully and thoughtfully attended to that important duty. Some months since they had the result of their labours printed in pamphlet shape (as the Committee opined that this course would best advance the work), and a copy was forwarded to each of the Sov.: Gr.: Inspectors General in the Dominion, to which their special attention was invited, with the assurance that due consideration would be given to any suggestions made by the Ill.: Bros.: 33°. The Committee since then have further considered and completed their draft, and I now, on their behalf, present the same.

The Committee on the Gr.: Commander's address reported as follows:

The Committee to whom was referred the address of the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Commander, recommend as follows :—

That so much as refers to Foreign Relations be referred to a Committee, consisting of Ill.: Bro.: ELLIS, Ill.: Pro.: COPELAND, and Ill.: Bro.: MURTON.

That so much as refers to Constitutions be referred to the Committee appointed on Constitutions.

That so much as refers to work and Forms be referred to the Committee on Ritual.

The Supreme Council was called from labour.

The Supreme Council resumed labour at half-past two o'clock.

Ill.: Bro.: ISAAC HENRY STEARNS 32° on the nomination of Ill.: Bro HUTTON, was elected to receive the Degree of Sov.: Gr.: Ins.: General.

Ill.: Bro.: STEARNS being in waiting was introduced by the Ill.: Gr.: Master of Ceremonies, and had conferred upon him in full the Thirty-third and last Degree, and was duly proclaimed a Sov.: Gr.: Inspector General, and congratulated by all the members.

Supreme Council was then called off for 10 minutes, after which, on the Supreme Council resuming labour,

It was moved by Ill.: Bro.: MUNRO, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: STEARNS, and resolved, that the Secretary General be empowered to furnish each Member of this Supreme Council with a book, wherein to keep a proper Register of his doings, and in which he will have copied his Patent and Commission, and have entered all Patents and Dispensations granted by him, and all official acts done by him in his respective Jurisdiction, agreeably with the Statutes and Regulations of 1786.

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: MACKAY, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: MUNRO, "It was resolved that the Secretary General be empowered to procure a suitable safe for keeping the Books, Papers and Property of this Council."

The Committee on Ritual appointed by the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.:

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Com.: during the recess of the Council, reported that they had arranged the work as far as the degrees of the Lodge of Perfection, and now submitted the same for adoption by the Sup.: Council, asking at the same time that a further term be extended to them to complete their labours.

A communication from the Supreme Council of Peru was read, announcing the expulsion of Bro.: CHARLES LESLIE DEVINE. The Secretary General was instructed to file the same.

On motion, the above reports were ordered to be referred to the Committee on Audit and Finance.

The Secretary General made the following announcement :

That he had been instructed by the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Com.: during the recess of the Council to get up forms for Certificates, Warrants, and Credentials for Representatives.

That having drafted a certificate which met the approval of the Grand Commander, it was necessary to procure an engraved plate from which to print the same, but as this would involve a heavy expense, he by order of the Gr.: Com.: submitted the question in proper form, asking the vote of each member of this Council to authorize the getting up of a Plate at a cost of "Four hundred and fifty dollars" and requesting at the same time an advance to this Council as a loan to assist in defraying the expense. Replies having been received from nearly every member all voting YEA, he had accordingly obtained the Plate and now presented copies on vellum and paper of the Certificate ; also, forms for Warrants and Credentials for Representatives.

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The copies of the above mentioned documents were then submitted and the same having been fully examined, they were on motion of Ill.: Bro.: MACKAY, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: HUTTON, accepted and adopted as the forms to be used by this Council.

The following brethren were nominated to receive the 33d degree, viz: Ill.: Bro.: BENJAMIN LESTER PETERS 32° and Ill.: Bro.: ROBERT THOMSON CLINCH, 32° both of the city of St. John, by the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Com., and Ill.: Bro.: HUGH MURRAY, 32° of the city of Hamilton, by Ill.: Bro.: WM. REID.

The Supreme Council was then called from labour at half-past four o'clock to assemble again at Eleven o'clock A.: M.: next day.

THURSDAY, 14th October, 1875.

The Supreme Council resumed labour at Eleven o'clock.

The Committee on that portion of the Grand Commander's address referring to Constitutions, reported as follows:

"The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the address of the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Com.: relating to Constitutions, beg to say that they have given the well-timed remarks of the Gr.: Com.: upon this important subject, thoughtful attention, and would most respectfully submit the Draft prepared by the Committee upon Constitutions, and suggest, that as the consideration of these Constitutions advance the various subjects referred to by the Grand Commander, may, in their proper order, come before the Council for consideration."

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: MUNRO, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: STEARNS, the above report was received and adopted.

“ The Committee on Ritual” to whom was allotted that portion of the address of the M.: P.: Sov.: Gr.: Com.: on work, beg to report, that the subject mentioned has already received their most earnest attention, and the result of their labours will be found in their report upon Ritual.

The Draft of the Constitutions as presented by the “ Committee on Constitutions” was then taken up, and after a lengthened and critical examination, each clause was carefully considered and adopted. It was then moved by Ill.: Bro.: MARSHALL, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: MUNRO, that the Constitutions as a whole as now read be adopted.—Carried.

Ill.: Bros.: BENJAMIN LESTER PETERS, 32°, and Ill.: Bro.: ROBERT THOMSON CLINCH, 32° of St. John, N. B., were then elected to receive the “Thirty-third degree.”

It was then moved by Ill.: Bro.: MARSHALL, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: ELLIS, that the Sov.: Gr.: Com.: be requested to call a special meeting of this Council to be held at the city of St. John, N. B., in the month of July, 1876.—Carried.

On motion, the Secretary General was instructed to furnish new Warrants to all Bodies under this Sup.: Council, who were now working under the old Warrants received from the Supreme Councils of England and Scotland, and to charge these Bodies only the actual cost of preparing the same.

An application was read from a number of Brethren, members of Hochelaga Lodge of Perfection working under Hochelaga Chapter, Rose Croix, in the city of Montreal, praying for a Warrant to create them into a separate Lodge of Perfection ; the application was duly considered, and on motion the prayer of the applicants was granted, and the Secretary General was instructed to prepare a Warrant and

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transmit it to the Ill.: Deputy for the Province of Quebec, by him to be delivered and the new Lodge constituted.

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Grand Commander's address, which related to Foreign Bodies, presented the following report :

MONTREAL, 13th October, 1875.

To the M.: P.: Sup.: Council of the S.: G.: I.: G.: 33° for the Dominion of Canada.

The Committee on Foreign Relations report that they have had before them a number of papers and documents, submitted to the Supreme Council by the Sovereign Grand Commander through the Illustrious Secretary General. These are, for the most part, letters of kindly congratulation from Sister Supreme Councils to the Supreme Council of Canada, on its erection, and expressive of a desire of the closest brotherly relations. The Committee feel that the pleasant fraternal communication established so early in the history of this Supreme Council with the Councils of other Jurisdictions is largely due to the labors in our behalf, and to the interest taken in our welfare, by Illustrious Bro.: ALBERT PIKE, Most Puissant Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States of America. That Illustrious Brother on the 30th October, 1874, addressed to the Supreme Councils with which the Supreme Council over which he so ably presides is in communication, a balustre announcing the establishment and organization of this Supreme Council (See Appendix A.) The balustre was addressed by Ill.: Bro.: PIKE to the following Supreme bodies of the Rite :

17. The Supreme Council for Chil , at Valparaiso.
18. The Supreme Council for Mexico, at the city of Mexico.

19. The Supreme Council of Colon for the West Indies, at Santiago de Cuba.
20. The Supreme Council for Switzerland.
21. The Grand Lodge National (Sweden and Norway.)

Many of the Supreme Councils thus addressed responded very kindly, and some of them very promptly.

IRELAND.

On November 21st, 1874, Ill. Bro. CHATTERTON, Secretary General of the Supreme Council for Ireland, wrote (see Appendix B.) to Ill. Bro. HARINGTON, announcing that that Supreme Council had, at its sitting, on the 19th, fully recognized the Supreme Council for the Dominion of Canada. On the 16th of February, 1875, Ill. Bro. CHATTERTON wrote, announcing that Ill. Bro. JAMES DOMVILLE 33°, had been appointed the representative near this Supreme Council of the Supreme Council for Ireland (see Appendix C.) The M. P. Sov. Commander appointed Ill. Bro. CHATTERTON the representative of the Supreme Council of Canada near the Supreme Council of Ireland.

SCOTLAND.

On 12th December, 1874, the Ill. Secretary General of the Supreme Council for Scotland, Bro. L. MACKERSY announced (see Appendix D.) that that Supreme Council had resolved to acknowledge your Supreme Council as a lawfully Constituted Supreme body of the Rite, and to enter into a treaty of amity and correspondence. He also stated that Ill. Bro. JOHN V. ELLIS 33°, had been appointed as the Representative of the Supreme Council of Scotland at the Supreme Council of Canada. The Sovereign Grand Commander reciprocating the kind sentiments of the Supreme Council for Scotland made choice of Ill. Bro. MACKERSY as the Representative of this Supreme Council at Edinburgh.

NORTHERN JURISDICTION, U. S. A.

Although fully assured that the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States of America, would give to the Supreme Council of Canada a warm and an affectionate welcome, no official recognition could be had until quite recently, as the Supreme Council, N. J., did not meet in Annual Session until the 18th of August. At that Session held in Portland, Maine, in the fullest manner, as will be seen by the letter of M. P. Sov. Gr. Commander DRUMMOND (see Appendix E.), it was resolved to establish relations of amity with the Supreme Council of Canada, and Ill. Bro. HUGH A. MACKAY, our Treasurer General, was selected by the Supreme Council to be its Representative in this Dominion. The nomination of Ill. Bro. D. B. TRACY as our Representative to the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction had already been announced in this Supreme Council, and that nomination may now be confirmed. Our proximity to the Northern Jurisdiction U. S. A., and our intimate relations with the Freemasons of the neighboring country, make it highly important that

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the very best understanding should ever exist between us and our Illustrious Brethren of the Supreme Council of that Jurisdiction.

PERU.

Under date 27th April, the Secretary General of the Supreme Council of Peru expressed, on behalf of that Supreme Council, a desire for fraternal relations with the Supreme Council of Canada, and announced that Ill. Bro. ROBERT MARSHALL had been appointed Representative of that Jurisdiction at our Grand East. (See Appendix F.) The M. P. Sov. Grand Commander has nominated Ill. Bro. RICHARD H. HARTLEY to represent the Supreme Council of Canada at the Grand East of the Supreme Council of Peru.

ITALY—TURIN.

On the 1st day of July last, at its Annual Session, the Supreme Council of Canada was formally recognised by the Supreme Council of Italy (see Appendix G.), and an exchange of Representatives is asked for. Our M. P. Sov. Commander, acting under the advice of the Supreme Council for Italy has nominated as the Representative of the Supreme Council of Canada at that Grand East the Illustrious Lieutenant-General of the Supreme Council of Italy, Bro. TIMOTHY PRIBOLI.

BELGIUM.

The Supreme Council of Belgium has transmitted its Bulletin for 1874, and has informed our Sov. Grand Commander that at its sitting of the 9th April last, it formally recognised the Supreme Council for Canada (Appendix H.) It desires the closest fraternal relations with us, and seeks an exchange of Representatives. The nomination of Ill. Bro. EDWARD CLUYDTS, as our Representative to that Supreme Council will, it is quite certain, be productive of the best possible results.

FRANCE.

Writing on the 6th April last, the Ill. Secretary General of the Supreme Council of France (Appendix I,) Bro. G. GUIFFREYS, formally announces that that Supreme Council had "cordially and fraternally" recognised the Supreme Council of Canada as a legitimate governing body of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, and it invited an exchange of Representatives. The M. P. Sov. Grand Commander has nominated Ill. Bro. EMMANUEL ARAGO our Representative at that Grand East, and on the same date he addressed another letter (Appendix J.) announcing a convention of Supreme Councils to be held at Lausanne, Switzerland, and inviting us to send Representatives.

THE WEST INDIES—COLON.

No direct communication has been received from this Supreme Council, but its *Bulletins* have been sent us, and letters addressed to Ill. Bro. ALBERT PIKE (Appendixes K 1 and 2) show that it is animated by the kindest sentiments towards the Supreme Council for Canada.

SAN DOMINGO.

From the "Grand Orient National of the Republic of San Domingo," a communication has been addressed to the M. P. Sov. Grand Commander, inviting the establishment of intimate fraternal relations, but as your Committee have not before them sufficient information upon which to make any definite recommendation to the Supreme Council, they ask that the communication be left in their hands for the present.

SWITZERLAND.

From the Supreme Council of Switzerland, no formal announcement of recognition has been received; but as that Supreme Council extended to our Supreme Council, an invitation (Appendix L.), to be present at the Convention of Supreme Councils, held at Lausanne, in September last, its kindly disposition towards us needs no better manifestation.

BRAZIL.

The *Bulletin* of the Supreme Council of Brazil has been regularly forwarded, and we learn from that document that the Supreme Council of Canada has been fraternally recognized by that Supreme Council.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Committee, having regard to the facts stated above, cordially recommend to the Supreme Council that it approve of the following nominations made by the M. P. Sov. Grand Commander.

- Ill. Bro. GEORGE CHATTERTON 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council for Ireland.
- Ill. Bro. LINDSAY MACKERSY 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council for Scotland.
- Ill. Bro. D. BURNHAM TRACY 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council, N. J., United States America.
- Ill. Bro. RICHARD H. HARTLEY 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council for Peru.
- Ill. Bro. TIMOTHY PRIBOLI 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council of Italy.
- Ill. Bro. EDWARD CLUYDTS 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council for Belgium.
- Ill. Bro. EMMANUEL ARAGO 33°, Representative at the Supreme Council for France.

THE CONVENTION AT LAUSANNE.

In regard to this Congress, as the time for holding it has passed by, the Committee feel that it is not necessary to make any representation further than to say

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that the Supreme Council must await with much interest the receipt of a report of its proceedings. They are extremely sorry that the state of Ill. Bro. ALBERT PIKE's health prevented him from being present at the Congress. The interest that that Ill. Brother has taken in the project, and the vast and varied information that he could bring to bear upon all the subjects brought forward for consideration, make it a matter of deep importance that he should take part in the deliberations.

THE ILLUSTRIOUS DEAD.

The Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States of America lost during the year, by death, the Ill. Bro. RICHARD RUSH CAMPBELL, 33°, of Charleston, S. C., an Active Member of that Supreme Council. In the city of Louisville, State of Kentucky, in the same Jurisdiction, a Lodge of Sorrow was held in memory of the late Ill. Bros. JOHN McCORKLE, 33° and JOHN C. BRECKENRIDGE 33°, both of them distinguished as citizens and eminent Masons. Our Brethern of the Northern Jurisdiction have also sustained a great loss in the death of Ill. Bro. NATHANIEL BRADSTREET SHURTFLEFF, 33°, of Massachusetts, Past Grand Secretary General of the Sup. Council; a Mason distinguished for his Masonic zeal, his antiquarian knowledge, and his efforts for the advancement of learning in the State in which he lived; and a Lodge of Sorrow was held at Philadelphia, on 29th March last, in memory of several Ill. Brethren of the 32° and 33°, to which our M. P. Sov. Gr. Commander was invited. The Committee feel that it is hardly necessary to say that the Supreme Council of Canada deeply sympathises with our sister Supreme Councils on the loss they have sustained by the call of their Illustrious Brethren to their eternal rest.

CONCLUSION.

The Committee have almost confined their report to a sketch of matters relating to the recognition of the Supreme Council by its peers. Many events have occurred during the year of great interest to Masons of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, but the Committee have reluctantly refrained from dealing with general matters at the present time. They cannot close their report, however, without an expression of satisfaction at the fact, which all the papers submitted to them fully prove that the Rite is prosperous at home and abroad, and that the Genuine Spirit of Freemasonry appears to prevade the whole of its governing bodies.

The Committee on the Doings of Subordinate Bodies reported as follows :

Your Committee on the work and doings of Subordinate Bodies, beg to report that they have given their most careful attention to the returns submitted to them by the Secretary General, and that they find that the work done by Subordinate bodies and their present condition to be as follows:

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

"*Moore Sov. Consistory 32^o*" Hamilton, has during the past year conferred the 30^o upon 3 new members, and 31^o upon 2. Its present membership is 38. It has paid dues and fees to the Supreme Council amounting to \$24.50.

"*Hamilton Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*" has installed 12 new members. Present membership, 52. Dues and fees paid to the Sup. Co. \$38.25.

"*Murton Grand Lodge of Perfection*," Hamilton, has received 12 new members. Present membership, 62. Dues and fees paid Supreme Council, \$36.50.

In all these bodies the degrees appear to have been conferred at the proper intervals, and as far as your Committee are able to judge the work has been performed in a most satisfactory manner.

"*London Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*," covering a "*Grand Lodge of Perfection*" and "*Council of Princes of Jerusalem*." This body has apparently done no work since the year 1871. It consists of 15 members only, and has paid in dues and fees to the Supreme Council the insignificant sum of \$3.75.

"*McLeod Moore Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*," Maitland, covering a "*Grand Lodge of Perfection*" and "*Council of Princes of Jerusalem*," has conferred the degrees upon 2 new members and affiliated 1. Its present membership is 18. Dues and fees paid the Supreme Council, \$23.75.

"*Toronto Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*," covering a "*Grand Lodge of Perfection*" and "*Council of Princes of Jerusalem*," has received 23 new members. Present membership, 35. Its dues and fees have not yet been paid, but the returns show an amount owing the Supreme Co. of \$119.75, which your Committee trust will at once be forwarded to the Treasurer General.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

MONTREAL.

"*Hochelaga Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*," covering a "*Grand Lodge of Perfection*" and "*Council of Princes of Jerusalem*," has received 21 new members. Present membership, 37. Dues and fees paid the Supreme Council, \$121.25.

"*Montreal Sov. Consistory 32^o*" has only recently been organized, but is now ready for work. It consists of 13 members. Having as yet done no work, it has only paid in dues the amount of \$3.25.

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

ST. JOHN.

"*Harrington Sov. Consistory 32*" has added but one new member during the year, and appears to have conferred the 30°, 31° and 32° on the same day, showing that the degrees cannot have been worked in full but only communicated. Its present membership, 21. Dues and fees paid to the Supreme Council, \$15.25.

"*Moore Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*" covering "*Grand Lodge of Perfection*" and "*Council of Princes of Jerusalem*," has received 2 new members. Present membership, 37. Dues and fees paid Sup. Co. \$23.25. The returns of this body are not properly made, giving no details as to the rank of its members.

"*New Brunswick Council of Kadosh*" has a membership of 10, but appears to have conferred no degrees during the past year. Dues paid Sup. Co. \$4.50.

"*New Brunswick Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*" has a membership of 23. Has done no work during the past year. Dues paid Sup. Co. \$5.75.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

HALIFAX.

"*Keith Sov. Chapt. Rose Croix*," covering a "*Grand Lodge of Perfection*" and "*Council of Princes of Jerusalem*." Has not made any returns.

Upon the whole the returns are creditable to the Bodies making them, but the Committee would impress upon Secretaries the absolute necessity of filling in all the details of their returns in full, and so lessen the work of the already over-taxed Secretary General.

In the Maritime Provinces very little work appears to have been done during the past year. This, however, it is to be hoped, under the new order of things, will be remedied; and next year your Committee trust that the reports from these Provinces will rival those of Ontario and Quebec, both in the quantity and the style of the work.

Your Committee would call the attention of the Ill. Deputy for the Province to the necessity of bodies strictly conforming to the constitutional time required between the various degrees.

The question of work was then considered, and that recommended by the Committee on Ritual from the 4° to the 14° was examined, and on motion of Ill. Bro. MACKAY, seconded by Ill. Bro. STEARNS, was adopted.

On motion of Ill. Bro. ELLIS, seconded by Ill. Bro. REID, it was resolved, that the Secretary General be authorized to have 400 copies of the proceedings of the present session printed for the use of this Supreme Council.

Ill. Bro. HUTTON then informed the Council that he had been requested by members of the order living in the Village of Maitland to bring before it for consideration the question, "That as the Village of Maitland in the Province of Ontario, was much nearer the City of Montreal in the Province of Quebec, than the City of Hamilton in the Province of Ontario, in both of which cities there were established Consistories of S. P. R. S. 32°, and that in consequence it was easier for the members of McLeod Moore Chapter in that village (seeking the *higher* degrees) to go to Montreal than to Hamilton; whether, therefore, it would not be advisable to have that village placed under the jurisdiction of the Province of Quebec." The same question also as to the City of Ottawa (in which it was expected shortly to establish Bodies of the Rite) being nearer Montreal than Hamilton, was also brought forward.

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dial thanks of this Sup.: Council to the Montreal Sov.: Consistory S.: P.: R.: S.: and Hochelaga Sov.: Chapter Rose Croix, for the hospitable manner in which this Sup.: Council had been entertained by them, especially for the abundant refreshment so thoughtfully prepared for the members of the Council during the present session.

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: ELLIS, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: HUTTON, it was resolved that a vote of thanks from this Sup.: Council be conveyed by the Secretary General to Ill.: Bro.: ENOCH T. CARSON 33° P.: Lieut.: G.: Com.: N.: J.: U.: S.: for the very valuable assistance rendered by him to this Council by the loan of a large number of rare and valuable Masonic Works from his well-known library.

On motion of the Secy.: General, seconded by Ill.: Bro.: REID, the Secretary General was instructed to convey the thanks of this Sup.: Council to the Ill.: Brethren CLINTON F. PAIGE and A. P. 


CIRCULAR LETTER OF ILL. BRO. ALBERT PIKE.

*To the several Supreme Councils with which the Supreme Council for the Southern
Jurisdiction of the United States has relations of amity and correspondence.*

We do hereby make known unto you that on the 16th day of October instant, the

SUPREME COUNCIL FOR THE DOMINION OF CANADA

was duly established and organized, at the City of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario, in the Dominion of Canada, by virtue of a Warrant from the Supreme Council of England and Wales and the Dependencies of the British Crown, duly granted by it after consultation with the Supreme Councils of its correspondence.

That the Sov. Gr. Commander of our Supreme Council, Honorary Member of the Supreme Councils of England and Wales and of Scotland and Ireland, being present, did administer the oath of office to the Ill. Bro. THOMAS DOUGLAS HARRINGTON, 33d, Sov. Gr. Inspector General of the Sup. Council of England and Wales, named and appointed to be Sov. Gr. Commander *ad perpetuam vitam* of the Sup. Council of the Dominion of Canada; who did thereupon select the Ill. Bro. ROBERT MARSHALL, 33d, of Saint John, New Brunswick, to be Lieut. Grand Commander, and the other Dignitaries and Members of the Supreme Council were thereupon selected, in due order and succession, in strict accordance with the dispositions of the Grand Constitutions of 1786, and the oath of office was administered to each,

Whereupon our Sov. Grand Commander, sitting in the East, opened the said Supreme Council in due form, and declared the same to have been lawfully established and its labours in full vigor.

And the said Supreme Council for the Dominion of Canada being a lawful, regular and duly constituted Supreme Council of the 33d degree, and governed by the Grand Constitutions in Latin of the year 1786, the Sov. Gr. Commander thereof, with its consent, did appoint our Ill. Bro. ALBERT G. MACKEY to be its Gr. Representative near our Sup. Council, and elect our Sov. Gr. Commander and the Ill. Bro. JOSIAH H. DRUMMOND, Sov. Gr. Commander of the Sup. Council for the Northern Jurisdiction, to be Honorary Members of itself.

And we have appointed the Ill. Bro. JOHN W. MURTON, 33d, of Hamilton, Ontario, in the Dominion of Canada, Member of said Sup. Council for the said Dominion, to be our Gr. Representative near it.

Wherefore we unite in the request that will be made by the said new Sup. Council and by that for England and Wales and the dependencies of the British Crown, that you will recognize it as a regular and lawful Supreme Council, and offer to enter into relations of amity and correspondence with it, as we have done in other cases, when satisfied of the legitimacy of a new Council.

And may our Father who is in Heaven protect you and cause you in all things to prosper.

Persuaded that the Confederate Supreme Councils will approve this measure, which tends to assure the prosperity of the Rite and the development of our principles, we beseech you to accept, very Illustrious Brethren, the expression of our most devoted and fraternal sentiments.
