OTTAWA, Ont., June 27.—(Special)—Reports to the labor department show that the number of trade disputes during May was 49, an increase of 12 over the corresponding month of 1906.

During May there were 287 work people injured in industrial accidents, of these 91 were fatal and 196 resulted in serious injuries.

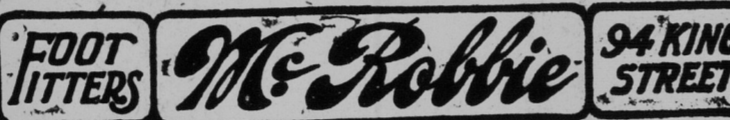

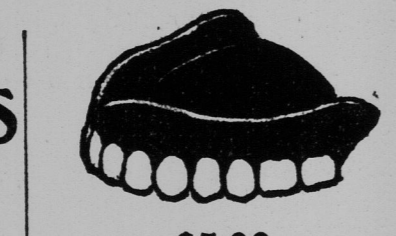
