GIVEN IN CHARGE

Communists Campaign in All Towns and Villages, is Reported.

Moscow, Jan. 24.—An anti-religious campaign in towns and villages all over Russia has been inaugurated by the Communist party in connection with the reformation movement in the orthodox church, and the numerous trials of churchmen which are still going on in many districts.

"Religion darkens the mind," is the keynote of most of the speeches and anti-religious lectures. While unofficial support and official recognition of the various clerical groups who broke away from the former patriarch, Tikhon, has been afforded by the Soviet government, the Communist party expresses itself against any reforms in the church, which, it says, is trying to adopt Sovietism in order to live. It demands the entire liquidation of the church.

Anti-religious propaganda by lectures and otherwise is also being carried on among the Red army recruits in barracks.

Washington, Jan. 24—A note protesting against the French and Belgian attempt "to force with terrorizing measures German officials to render assistance in the execution of illegal measures aimed against their own country," through explusion of officials who refuse to co-operate with the forces of occupation in the Ruhr, was made public by the German embassy last night after it had been handed to the French, British and Belgian Governments by the German representatives at Paris, London and Brussels.

The embassy also made public another note sent yesterday to those governments and to Italy, defining the German position as to the ordinances issued by the inter-allied Rhineland commission covering the occupation which, it contends, "are in contradiction with the Rhineland convention," and have no legal value and are not to be complied with, by the local German officials.

In radiotelephony the continuous wave of radio-frequency is voice modulated by an audio-frequency wave form of speech or music. The resultant wave is so molded that when it is impressed upon a receiver the sounds which originated at the transmitting station are accurately reproduced. The boundary of this voice modulated wave is known as the en-

When it is desired to transmit a wave having directional properties, it as been experimentally determined that this may be accomplished by using or a transmitter two similar coils which are mounted perpendicular to ach other on the same axis. Coil transmitters of this type, which radiate wave in a particular direction, have been used for assisting airplanes of determine their position with regard to the transmitting station.

When the flament of a vacuum tube is heated by the passage through of an electric current, electrons or negative charges of electricity are vaporated from the flament. If a source of positive potential is conected to the plate of the tube, the electrons are attracted and flow in a tream from the filament to the plate. The direction of electron flow is soom negative to positive while the current flow has an opposite direction om the plate to the filament, that is from the positive or higher voltage of the negative or lower voltage. SELF-HETERODYNE.

In heterodyne reception the original radio wave is combined with a local oscillation, differing slightly in frequency, with the result that "beats" are produced at an audio-frequency and the signal is rendered audible in the receiving telephone. If the vacuum tube serves simultaneously as a detector and as a local oscillator for producing "beats" in combination with the incoming signal this is known as the "self-heterodyne" method of reception.



KILOWATT.

The employment of several stages of amplification may result in "howling" due to the amplified energy being fed back into the input circuit. This may be practically eliminated by surrounding the tube and the transformer of each stage of amplification with a grounded metallic compartment, this method of preventing interfering noises being known as "shielding."

Lady Cook, who was formerly Miss Tennessee Claffin of New York, widow of Sir Francis Cook, died in London last week.

Tennessee Claffin, with her sister, Victoria, was one of the most widely known women in the U. S. 50 years ago. They dabbled in Spiritualism, took up finance and with the supposed aid of Commodore Vanderbilt founded a brokerage house in Broad street, New York, sponsored eugenics and equal rights, were arrested and generally impressed themselves on the public. Then they both went to England and married men with large fortunes.

Tennessee was born on Oct. 26, 1845, at Homer, O. Her father was a well known lawyer in that part of the state. The early history of the sisters—there were six, but these two were the best krown—is little known at the present time. Before going to New York, however, Miss Claffin, then known as Tennie C. Claffin, settled in Chicago, where she became known as a medium and clairyoyant. She was also an ardent advocate of woman's rights and suffrage, but her sister, Victoria, achieved greater fame in this way.





Commodore Vanderbilt was generally credited with having been their backer.





Keenly questioned by the judge, Miss Saunders defended her action on two grounds—that she was entitled to recover the money she had spent on her trouseau and that, even though Tuckrer had said he had ceased to care for her, she had hoped to win his affection back, again. Tucker himself did not testify.

The jury, which awarded Miss Saunders \$200 damages, did not take long to reach its verdict, in spite of the views expressed by the judge as to the wisdom of breach of promise suits. It was the opinion Justice McCardie delivered in his summing up of the case, however, that elicited the subsequent discussion.





# WAS FAITHFUL TO

German-Born Mining Magnate Emphatically Repudiated War-time Infamies-

Dead in 71st Year.

London, Dec. 19.—(By mail.)—Sir Carl Meyer, Bt., died yesterday at his residence in Park Crescent, Portland Place, of heart failure, having nearly completed his seventy-first year. Sir Carl was particularly known for his interests in important mining enterprises, and also for his support of the scheme for a Shakespeare National Memorial Theatre.

Sir Carl was born at Hamburg on December 23, 1851, the second son of Siegmund Meyer of that city and Elise Rosa, daughter of Reuben Hahn. He was educated abroad, and was naturalized a British subject in November, 1877. He was on the boards of the Burma Ruby Mines (chairman), De Beers Consolidated Mines (deputy chairman), Cape Explosives Works. Consolidated Company, Bultfontein Mine, Griqualand West Diamond Mining Company, Dutoitspan Mine, National Bank of Egypt (London Committee), and Union Corporation. He was one of the lieutenants for the City of London, and had qualified as a magistrate for Essex, where is his country house, Shortgrove, Newport. In the summer of 1910 he was created a baronet, being described in the official note accompanying the announcement as "a leading supporter of the Shakespeare National Memorial Theatre," Afterwards it became known that he was the donor of the £70,000 towards this object, which had been acknowledged as an anonymous gift by the committee in 1909. He was also known as a man of musical taste and a constant supporter of the opera and concerts.
