(Paul Clay in Forbes Magazine, N. Y.) Overproduction is the well known cause of falling prices; but in this year 1920, especially in May and June, we witnessed a decline in commodity and goods prices brought on by It has come about that the less the

It has come about that the less the laborer does, the more pay he gets for it, and that the less the farmer and man-ufacturer produce, the higher are the prices they get for their output. Both producers and their employes discovered many months ago that the less they did the more they made. Cor-respondingly, the efficiency of both labor and capital diminished, and prices went sky-rocketing. The rule of capital was to raise prices enough to cover advances in wages, and fully maintain the margin of profit; the rule of labor was to ob-tain frequent advances; and the rule of the various governmental and semi-offi-rial labor and arbitration boards was to make the wage increases retroactive. make the wage increases retroactive. The men could well afford to strike often when they were paid to do so and the

1. "Section 30 of "The Public Health Act, 1918," being 8 George V., Chapter 36, is hereby amended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the following paragraph:

No person shall be employed in any camp, ship, factory or other wherein the employes come at frequent intervals into close and inged contact one with another, unless and until such person proplace wherein the employes come at frequent intervals into close and prolonged contact one with another, unless and until such person pro-duces to the employer or the employer's representative a certificate, signed by a regularly qualified medical practioner, of successful vaccination, or a like signed certificate that he is immune to vac-cinia as proven by three consecutive non-successful vaccinations, or that he is immune to small-pox by reason of having had, the disease and no employer shall employ any person in employment as set forth above, without such certificate being produced. When any per-son contracts small-pox, who is at the time of the inception of his sickness employed as set out in this section, or was so employed within fourteen days prior to the inception of his sickness, and who has not complied or been required to comply by said employer or employer's representative, with the foregoing provisions prior to his employment, then in such case the employer shall be primarily liable to pay all such costs, charges and expenses as the sub-district Board of Health concerned may have incurred in necessarily protecting the public health: provided such charges, costs and expenses were in-curred in or about the necessary precautions relative to, or immedi-ately appertaining to any such case of small-pox, and such costs, charges and expenses may be sued for and recovered with costs, in the name of the Chairman of the sub-district Board incurring the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction, within six months of the recovery or death of any such person. Such liability shall be in addition and without prejudice to any liability for any penalty provided for any violation of the provisions of this Act. "The terms and conditions of this section shall not become oper-

"The terms and conditions of this section shall not become oper-ative until the First day of July, A. D., 1920."
