Daily Hints For the Cook

BROWN BREAD. One cup of rye meal, 1 cup of Graham, 1 cup of Indian meal, 2 1/2 tablespoons of soda, 1 teaspoon of salt, 2 1/2 cups of water, 2 cups of sour milk, steam three hours. BREAD PUDDING. One cup of bread crumbs, pint eggs, milk, rind of 1/2 lemon, yolk of 2 eggs, beaten and mixed with 1-2 cup of sugar. Bake half an hour, spread with jelly and frost with meringue made by adding two tablespoons of sugar to the whisked egg whites, brown in oven. BROILED HALIBUT. Broil one side of a slice of halibut until heated through, then turn and broil the other side with a paste of butter and flour, flavor with minced onion and tomato pulp. Cook till brown and serve with the crust side up. CELERY CROQUETTES. Cut the outer green stalks of a bunch of celery into small pieces, and boil in slightly salted water until very tender; drain and mash to a paste, adding a small cupful of grated bread crumbs, a high seasoning of salt and pepper, the yolk of one hard-boiled egg, blended with a quarter of a teaspoonful of French mustard, one tablespoonful of cream sauce and the beaten yolk of one egg; mix the ingredients thoroughly and with floured hands form into small pyramidal croquettes; fry in deep fat (any vegetable oil) to a golden brown; serve on a folded napkin, inserting in the top of each a sprig of parsley, attached to a small toothpick. NOVA SCOTIA DEFICIT

Halifax, N. S., March 19—Premier Murray, this afternoon in the house of assembly, brought down the financial returns.

The revenue account shows a deficit of \$179,710. The revenue in a good many cases fell short of the estimates and the expenditures in several instances outran the estimates and appropriations.

The premier said the deficit was mainly due to the falling off in royalties from mines and from succession duties. He held that he had been relying for revenue too much on those items, federal subsidies, mines and succession duties, and mentally he now before the house to supplement the revenues of the crown by taxes on certain financial and other corporations. Later in the afternoon he moved the second reading of this bill.

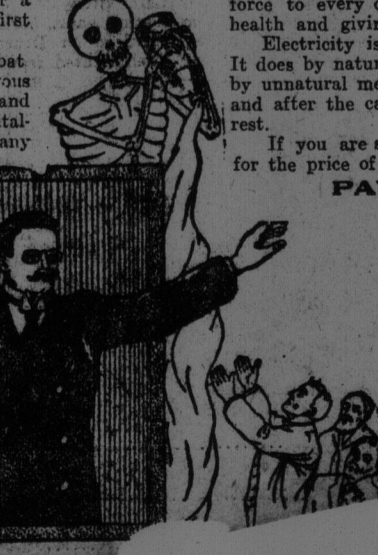

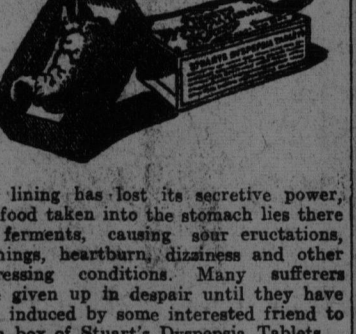

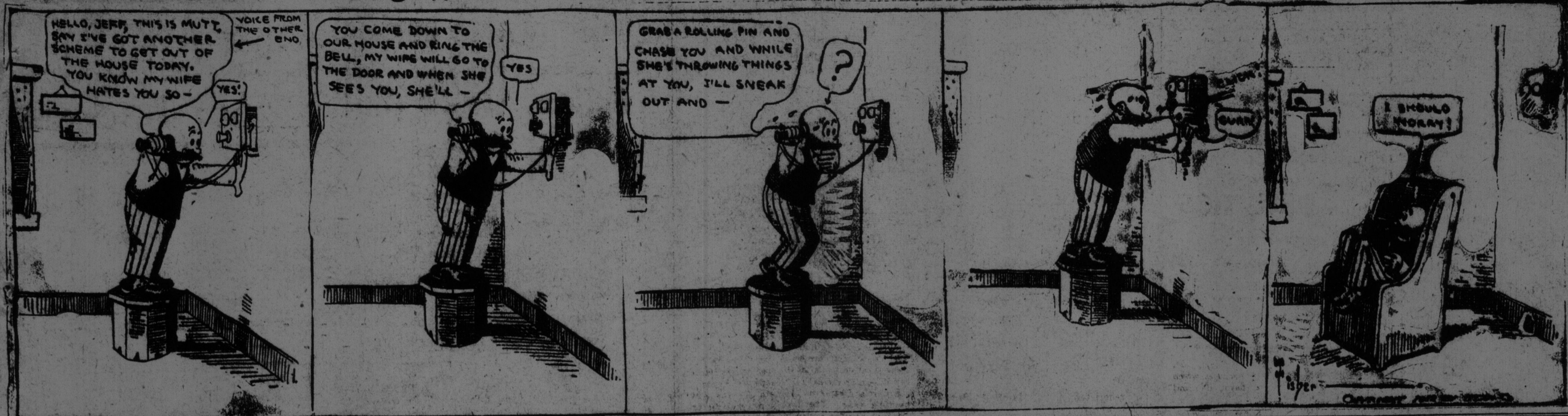

The winner is very clever, hits hard with either hand, and, unlike most Frenchmen, is very cool in action. He will go far and his friends predict he will yet win the heavy-weight championship, as he is still growing. England has a good middleweight in Jack Harrison, of Rushton, who is a boxer of the rugged order, and can take and give real hard knocks. With a bit more polish he may trouble the best in his class, and the writer expects to see him beat Sullivan, but Carpenter is another matter. The news that Bomb Billy Wells is going to America in May, and will meet Al Palmer in California on July 4, has not created much stir here. It is really surprising that the English champion shows such poor judgment in making this arrangement. No Englishman can hope to be at his best in America between May and August, the heat being too much of a change. The time to arrive is in September, fixing the important matches for the end of October or early November. Wells made a wretched showing against Starbuck, and even allowing for the fact that he was stale and overtrained, the writer does not expect him to get through many contests in America without meeting with a reverse. MISS LAURA PECK DEAD IN INDIA

Baptist Foreign Mission Board Laments Loss of Missionary

From far distant Vaisnagram, in India, there came this morning to Rev. Doctor McIntyre of the Baptist Foreign Mission Society, a cablegram announcing the death of a promising young missionary, Miss A. Laura Peck, a native of Hopewell, Albert county, who had been residing in Wolfville, N. S., and was in her thirty-fourth year. She had many friends in the maritime provinces who will deeply regret to learn of her death, and she will also be a distinct loss in the mission work.

After graduating from Acadia where she had secured her degree of B. A., Miss Peck spent some time in church work and went to India where she had been for the last seven years. She was to have returned next year on furlough and was looking forward to the visit to her family with keen expectancy. She became ill, however, early last month, while touring with another missionary, Miss Newcombe, of Nova Scotia, outside of Vaisnagram. She was placed in a native cart and given every comfort possible, but the roads were very rough and she was severely shaken while returning to the town. She suffered from hemorrhage of the lungs and after reaching the missionary quarters became gradually reduced in health and strength until her death occurred yesterday. The local members of the board heard the news of her death with sadness today. Doctor McIntyre said it would be difficult to fill her place.

CHATHAM HAS SCHOOL TROUBLE OVER A BOY

Matter of Discipline Involves Action by Trustees—Principal Then Resigns

Chatham, N. B., March 20.—(Special)—Today the pupils of grades ten and eleven were enjoying a holiday owing to a school difficulty, Joseph Pallen, a sixteen year old son of J. H. Pallen, had received word through one of the boys to appear before Principal Mercereau for a slight breach of discipline, of which he and two other boys had been guilty. Young Pallen did not obey, as he thought the other boy was trying to take a "rise" out of him, and subsequently the principal had to go after the boy himself. A tussle took place and it was alleged by the boy's parents that the principal had struck him. On their complaint the matter was taken up last Friday evening by the school board and witnesses were heard.

The board decided that it was best to have the pupil return to school and have nothing more done in the matter. On Monday young Pallen went back to school but when the principal told him he would have to receive corporal punishment for his actions he left and his parents said that if the trustees were to uphold the principal in this they would rather see the boy stay away from school for the rest of the term than receive punishment unjustly.

On Monday evening the school board again met and sent a note to Mr. Mercereau stating that he must take the pupil back under the conditions they had decided upon. Mr. Mercereau wrote a note to the trustees enclosing his resignation and then dismissed his own two grades, ten and eleven. A special meeting of the board is called for this afternoon to go in to the matter. Mr. Mercereau's contract will not expire until July, and the trustees may attempt to force him to continue his work.

Y. M. C. A. CONVENTION

The maritime convention of the Y. M. C. A. will open in Truro, N. S., tomorrow and it is expected there will be a large and representative attendance of delegates from various sections of the three provinces. G. K. Calhoun, of Montreal, national secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Canada, passed through the city at noon today on his way to attend the conference, and A. W. Robb, local secretary, with W. W. Lee, immigration secretary, will have tonight to be present.

One of the matters to come up will be the question of making the Y. M. C. A. in the dominion a national body. It is thought that this idea will be strongly approved of. The members of the local executive held a meeting this morning at which the matter was recommended for approval, and the delegates empowered to vote in approval of the scheme.
