

TT E lived in the simple way of the olden time; a farmer upon


the banks of the Ohio, who tilled his own acres, pruned his own vineyard, gathered the fruit from his own orchard, listened to the music of the birds in the trees planted by his father and by himself, and heard the rippling of the waters of the Ohio as they hurried along by the foot of the bluff, upon the brow of which his roof-tree stood.

There, in the simple grandeur of an American citizen, an American statesman, an American patriot, after the manner of the early days of the republic, the manner of the Jeffersons, and Madi-well-known resons, and Jacksons, he lived the plain life of one of the people. When here in Washington, in the discharge of his public duties as a legislator, he was fresh from the people, from the country, from the farm, from the scenes of every-day rural life, and it was no wonder that his mind and heart should be animated and stirred in the support of the rights and against the wrongs of the people of his own district, a district which honored him as perhaps no other man ever was honored; not only the people of his own party, who for 40 years nominated him, and him only, for representative in congress; but the whole people found in him the watchdog of their treasury, the great objector when their tax-money was a new money.

It is hard to tell in what greatness consists. Men differ about it. Men often err in attempting to draw the line between mediocrity and greatness. But it does seem to me that this man, who They had the steadiness of intellect, the firmness of purpose, the virtuous ney Disease aggressiveness to stand and to battle through a generation for a principle, and that a correct principle, upon which rest the rights of the masses of the people; and who had the ability upon all occasions, as well as we may judge, to do that which was best to be done under the circumstances to promote the interests which be done under the circumstances, to promote the interests which he had at heart, well may be ranked as a great man.

When it is said truthfully that through his long life this man's character and conduct came out stainless and unblemished; that he ended poor as he began; that he gathered justly the glory of a well-spent career and the esteem of the people—who do esteem and who always are grateful to those who devote themselves to the public service honestly, efficiently and courageously—what need be added? The Money Power and the Jews
The Money Power is a big, blind, foot less, thoughtless thing, but it exists. The System, which it denies, is being thrown up, like a reef, by tiny, innocent polypi that have no more notion of wrecking a ship than they have of the beauty of coral. The prophetic Populists who foresaw the Money Power were right, but they had a clearer vision of it from the prairies 'way back in the early nineties than Wall street has today. ## FORMER ST. JOHN MAN MISSING

Robert N. Venning of the Fisheries Department Who Was **Attending Hague Conference** Cannot Be Found

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The police and state officials of Belgium, Holland and England are searching for Robert N. Venning, superintendent of fisheries for Canada and one of the more valued men in the service of the dominion, who went to the Hague as an expert to advise with Hon. A. B. Aylesworth in the fisheries arbitration which was recently concluded.

After the decision was given Mr. Venning left the hotel at which he had been staying at the Hague on Sept. 3 and a day or two afterwards was seen at the Canadian pavillion at the Brussels exhibition. Since that time the most anxious search has failed to reveal any trace of him.

It is known that when he left the Hague on Sept. 3 he had \$600 in his pocket. He was in good health and had been throughout the arbitration proceedings, which he had attended daily. He was an experienced traveler, having been in Russia, Japan and many other parts of the world on negotiations affecting Canada's fishery interests and was thoroughly well qualified to look after himself in foreign environments. His disappearance is an absolute mystery for which his many warm friends at Ottawa have been unable to conjecture any explanation.







## MONTREAL HAS ONE OF THE FINEST HARBORS IN WORLD

The History of its Growth and Devolopment-The Work Now Going on Along the Harbor Front and on the St. Lawrence River

The visit of the Toronto city council and board of trade to Montreal for the purpose of inspecting the harbor facilities in this city, calls attention anew to the whole problem of transportation, one of the most vital questions confronting the people of Canada tolay. 





this fall, and will undoubtedly be operated when spring opens.

The remainder of the road, from McGivney's to the Quebec line, will be ready for operation early next fall.

At the close of this season all the steel will be laid except for a gap of six miles, from ten to sixteen miles east of Grand Falls, where there was no-way to get material on the ground until other sections on both sides of the gap had been completed.

The average cost of the road in New Brunswick is \$60,000 a

cent. or twenty-one feet in the mile, and going west it is six-tenths, or thirty-one feet in the mile. These grades, and the fact that the curves are easy, and the road bed, bridges and rails, all of the most substantial character, mean that the Transcontinental will be able to haul its freight and passengers more rapidly and more economically than any long railroad on this continent.

From Monoton to the Quebec line its length is 256 1-2 miles. It is forty-two miles shorter than the I. C. R., from Moncton to the Quebec bridge in actual mileage, but when it is remembered grades mean that the new line is something like two hundred miles shorter than the old one from the traffic standpoint.

Because of the level road bed, and the thoroughness and solidity of construction, this railway, though the initial cost is necessarily high, is from the economic and transportation standpoints without a peer on this continent.



The city of Ghent, in Belgium introduced this system in 1994. It worked so successfully that below it is universally recognized as the most efficient measure against unemployment, and many states and municipalities have already introduced "The System of Ghent," or are discussing its immediate realization.

In France more than forty municipalities and several departments have adopted the System of Ghent. Since the law of 1905 the French State is authorized to aid the unions financially in case of unemployment.

The cities in Holland have lately introduced Varlez's scheme. The Norwegian state, conforming to the law of 1906, reimburses one-fourth and Denmark one-third of the sum paid out by the unions in unemployment benefits.
