HE CANNOT AFFORD TO GIVE UP TAX

Lloyd George Says He Must Continue Impost On Sugar

BRINGS IN \$15,000,000

Duty Oppressive But Needed For Revenue—Queen Mother To Sandringham Until After Coronation—Women's Suffrage Movement is Given Another Boost

London, May 12.—Representatives of those who are urging upon the government the reduction of the sugar tax, had an interview with Mr. Lloyd George today and asked him to abolish this provision for revenue from the forthcoming budget.

The chancellor was sympathetic, saying that he agreed that the sugar duty was oppressive to the poor and interfered with a valuable industry. It was most desirable that it should be remitted if he could extract the same amount of taxes from some other source.

However, as he would not afford to surrender a tax that was bringing in \$15,000,000, Queen Mother Alexandra, who returns a week ago after a cruise to the Mediterranean has taken up a residence at Sandringham Palace where she will remain until after the coronation.

During the cruise and since her return the queen mother has enjoyed good general health. She reached here just in time to be present at the memorial service on the anniversary of the death of King Edward and her distress during the service was marked. As yet she has scarcely recovered from the strain but otherwise the royal widow is in excellent health.

The advocates of woman's suffrage gave their cause another boost in the House of Commons today when Lord Maynard, John J. Farrell, at the head of a deputation from the Corporation of Dublin presented at the bar of the house a petition urging the passage of a female suffrage bill at the present session of parliament.

The members of the deputation appeared in full regalia of their society, and the ceremony was attended with picturesque details.

TEN STOWAWAYS ON THE ROYAL EDWARD

Montreal, Que., May 12.—Ten stowaways were turned over to the police by the officers of the Royal Edward on the arrival of that vessel yesterday. They were discovered in the coal hole twenty-four hours out from Bristol. The men declare they went on board in search of work. It is likely they will have to return on the Royal Edward.

Quiet Again in Niagaraga

Managaga, Niagaraga, May 12.—(Canadian Press)—The resignation of President Edouard Diaz in favor of Vice-President Alford Diaz has cleared the atmosphere for the time being, and disorders have ceased in the capital. Estrada has left the city and a new cabinet has been formed with Gen. Diaz remaining minister of war. It is understood that Estrada has left the country.

LIVED TWELVE YEARS THOUGH NECK BROKEN

Millionaire's Son Had Been The Wonder of Surgeons—Two Lumbermen Lose Lives in Jam in Quebec Stream

(Canadian Press) Montreal, N. J., May 12.—Walter E. Duryea who astonished surgeons by living twelve years with a broken neck, died at his home last night. Duryea, who was a son of the late millionaire starch manufacturer, broke his neck by jumping into a shallow pool of water. He had been paralyzed from the head down ever since, and the spinal cord had been held in position and his head supported by an elaborate system of braces.

Quebec, May 12.—An accident which caused the loss of two lives occurred in the Saguenay River which empties into the St. Lawrence, Saguenay region yesterday. Five men were on a jam, one of them, Art Boule, fell off and was not seen again. A second, Thomas Louis Tremblay, after trying hard to remain on, disappeared. The remaining three had much difficulty to save themselves.

THREE ARRESTED

Ten Men and Colored Girl Surprised By The Police

Violet Jones aged 23, Edward McGay and Thomas Waindew, were arrested this morning by Sergeant Kilpatrick and Police-man Smith in a field at the back of Fort Howe about 11 o'clock. The police came suddenly upon a party in which there were ten men and the Jones girl, very suddenly. They caught McGay and the girl but the others managed to get away. After taking to the lock-up they returned and caught Waindew but none of the others was in sight. It is likely that more arrests will be made this afternoon. Drunkenness in one charge.

TWO DEAD IN FIGHT OVER PAIR OF SHOES

Charleston, W. Va., May 12.—Using shot-guns as weapons, John Warner and a Washington Pennington, coal miners, yesterday terminated a controversy over a pair of shoes by shooting each other to death. After engaging in a fist fight, each man went to his home and got a gun. They began firing simultaneously. Warner was killed instantly, and Pennington died soon afterwards.

THE SIGNAL CORPS

Capt. Thos. E. Powers, of No. 8 Signaling Section, has received the certificate of the members of his corps who tried the examinations at the close of the recent school of signaling, and will distribute them this week. Sgt. Henderson has qualified for assistant instructor, while Corp. A. L. Ballantyne and Private Fred O'Leary, qualified for grade B.

Capt. Powers has also received instructions regarding the arrangements for Camp, Sussex. He is instructed to take charge of the signaling instruction at the camp for the period of both campments, and to command the latter section beginning on July 4, while Lieut. Allen Leavitt will command the first section starting on June 20.

Further Expulsion of Jews

Yekaterinoslov, Russia, May 13.—(Canadian Press)—The provincial governor of Yekaterinoslov has given orders for expelling from the villages of the province all Jews who are not possessed of permits of residence. He has also threatened the police with severe punishment if they fail to discover those subject to expulsion.

The Pope's Health

Rome, May 12.—(Canadian Press)—Pope Pius X is still feeling the effects of his recent attack of gout and the public audience planned for this morning were suspended. The general condition of His Holiness is, however, giving little alarm to his physicians who permitted the private audience set for today.

LIFE SAVING STATION

Acting on instructions from the Marine Department, Albert Long is making preparations to establish a life saving station on North Beach, at the entrance to Richibucto River. A building will be provided for the men, and in addition to the life boat now there, a large gasoline boat will be added. Probably eight men will comprise the crew, an increase of two over the number of the present volunteers crew. Albert Long will be coxswain, the other members being Fred Hannal, Jr., Russell Long, Ernest Farrell, Daniel O'Leary, Fred McNeill, John Curwin, with two others to be selected. The men will be paid at the rate of \$40 a month.

American schooner Emma S. Lord, Captain Anderson, arrived from Portland, Me., this morning to load lumber for the Maritime Lumber Company for New York.



GUilty OF MURDER; MERCY RECOMMENDED

Wm. Carroll, Aged 65, Had Killed Fellow Workman in a Lumber Camp

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., May 12.—(Canadian Press)—Wm. Carroll, aged 65, who in 1902 escaped from the London asylum upon the eve of his discharge as fully cured, was yesterday afternoon convicted of the murder of Joseph Tallon. The jury returned a verdict of guilty with a recommendation of mercy.

Both men were employed at a Redoubt Camp, Blind River, last November. Carroll entered a shanty and struck Tallon on the head with a double bladed axe, afterwards admitting that he had mistaken Tallon for another man against whom he had a grudge.

The defense entered a plea of insanity which was not considered by the jury after the evidence of the doctors, who claimed that the man was in a condition to realize what he was doing.

THE LATE ARCHBISHOP McEAY OF TORONTO

London, Last of the Old Times, Shot Leader in Futile Attempt to Avert Disaster

London, May 12.—(Canadian Press)—London, one of the last of the old-time stage drivers, was fatally injured yesterday at Haze Hill, fifteen miles from Great Ouse, while driving a four-horse team, which had become frightened.

Knowing that he was approaching a high cliff and heavy curves, London drew his revolver and shot one of the leaders dead. This fall he drove the team, however, which dragged the dead horse several yards and over the embankment.

London was thrown down the precipice, and his skull fractured. Two passengers jumped from the stage and escaped with slight injury.

Observance General and a Special Performance in The High School

Those taking part were: Irene Ginter, piano solo; Elsie Wilson, essay, "Love of Nature"; Edwin Davis, reading; Ralph Nobles, chorused solo; Edna Brunner, recitation; George Lindsey, essay, "Arror Day"; James McCarrie, recitation; Valde Fenton, vocal solo; Chris Armstrong, essay, "Pleasures of Nature"; Edna Cunningham, recitation; John O'Regan, violin solo; God Save the King; W. J. S. Myles presided, and made a few appropriate remarks in connection with Arror Day, and urging the scholars to improve themselves by the study of botany, particularly on Arror Day.

KING AND QUEEN TO OPEN GREAT FESTIVAL OF EMPIRE TODAY

London, May 12.—(Canadian Press)—King George and Queen Mary will make their first processionary ride through London today as a prelude to the coronation of their young son, King Edward VIII, at the Crystal Palace. They will be welcomed by many thousands, a chorus of 40,000 and the band of the King's Own Scottish Borderers.

This was the first public ceremony of their majesties since the court mourning for King Edward VII. The coronation will be held at the Crystal Palace on June 23. The king and queen drove in a semi state carriage drawn by four horses with outriders from Buckingham Palace to College Road opposite which a new entrance to the Crystal Palace had been made for their use. Enormous crowds lined the route. In Canterbury Green the royal party was greeted by 40,000 school children.

MORE CANADIAN GOAL IN BUT NO TROUBLE

Cordova, Alaska, May 12.—(Canadian Press)—The steamer Edith, with 3,000 tons of Canadian coal, arrived last night and was berthed without any demonstration being made by the large crowd of citizens on the wharf to greet the collier.

Many threats were made that a demonstration similar to that of last week would occur when the Edith arrived but the authorities posted deputies at the wharf and announced that any riotous conduct would be met with immediate arrest.

SWELTER IN HEAT ACROSS THE BORDER

Prostrations in Two Cities—Washington Has Temperature of 94—Dogs Go Wild and Bite Three People

Washington, May 12.—Washington last night was the hottest place in the United States, the weather bureau recording 94 degrees with much higher temperatures shown by the street thermometers. All over the middle Atlantic states a hot wave stretched and the weather experts held out little hope of any material relief for the summer.

Baltimore, Md., May 12.—Baltimore had the hottest May day in its history yesterday with a temperature of 91 degrees. There was reported, Philadelphia had several prostrations with a temperature of 90, a point reached only three times previously in the history of the city at this date.

New York, May 12.—In Brooklyn three people were killed by dogs, which had evidently been affected by the heat. While the temperature was only 80, the humidity was 44, a crushing combination.

McMANIGAL WILL NOT BE A WITNESS

Carry on Trial of the McNamara Brothers Without Him

(Canadian Press)

New York, May 12.—A Los Angeles dispatch to the Tribune, says that Orin E. McManigal will not be called as a witness for the prosecution when the two McNamara brothers are brought to trial on the grand jury indictments, charging them with murder in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times.

NEW EVIDENCE

At a conference between District Attorney John D. Frederick and three of his associates yesterday this procedure was definitely decided upon. McManigal will not even be brought into court during the trial, and it is said that the various confessions which he has made will not be used against either of the two McNamara on the murder charge.

The county prosecuting officers believe it will not be necessary to call McManigal as a witness. It is said that within the last two days Mr. Frederick has obtained new information which will be used for corroborating the statements made by McManigal.

It was ascertained by E. H. Mills, manager of the Los Angeles Times, that McManigal was photographed while here last December, prior to the explosion at the Lewellen Works. The photograph was taken at the mission in San Gabriel, while McManigal was on a trolley trip. About thirty men and women appear in the group picture with McManigal, and it is believed that some of the members of the Lewellen Works. The picture is considered to be of importance in its relation to the charge against McManigal, and will be used when McManigal is tried for manufacturing the Lewellen Works.

HAZEN GOVERNMENT ORGAN BITTERLY ATTACKS THE POWER SCHEME

(St. Croix Courier) The promoters of The New Brunswick Electric Power Company, Limited, possess a good deal of courage and audacity in this evidently an unlimited amount of assurance. They were before the legislature at its last session seeking incorporation for their company, and one of the modest provisions of their bill was that they should be given authority to acquire the water powers of the Magalloway and Annapolis rivers.

On the face of it and under proper restrictions, this might be permissible, but the promoters are accompanied by an avowed intention of carrying all the power that could be developed on these streams to St. John for sale and for development purposes, it did not appeal to the representatives of this county and of the other counties, which might be injuriously affected.

In addition to this many of the members of the legislature regarded this as a purely speculative operation, the object being to secure a valuable franchise and to utilize it thereafter for the financial advantage of those who happened to be on the ground floor. The result was that after hearing all the arguments that could be advanced in favor of the bill, and after careful consideration, the committee on corporations refused to recommend it.

Now the enterprising gentlemen who under the matter in charge are applying for a charter substantially embodying the same provisions which were contained in the bill they were unable to secure at Fredericton.

This action is direct and apparently a studied insult to the legislature, and it is inconceivable in view of all the facts, that the executive will lend its aid to any such barefaced attempt to defeat the will of the representatives of the people. The matter is of pecuniary interest to the people of Charlotte county and particularly to those in the eastern section. While there may not be any particular demand in this county at present for the power which the electric people are attempting to secure, developments which are anticipated may soon be undertaken and these powers may be required for the benefit of the people for whose benefit they should be utilized.

The effect of the grant of the charter now sought would be to remove all possibility of future industrial development in that part of the county most affected by the proposed scheme, and the effort to bring about the construction of the power plant by every person fully familiar with the facts.

TRAINMEN'S WAGES INCREASED \$37,000,000 IN LAST YEAR

Pittsburg, Pa., May 12.—(Canadian Press)—In his annual report to the convention of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen yesterday, President W. G. Lee announced that the wages of trainmen in Canada and the United States had been increased by \$37,000,000 in the last year.

He urged more safety devices and called attention to the importance of workmen's compensation acts pending before various legislatures in both countries or before others to test their constitutionality.

The Evening Chit-Chat

Of course you know that almost everybody has some favorite word or expression which he works overtime with no respect for union rules.

Very well. Now did you ever try the interesting experiment in character study of "figuring" people by that favorite expression?

Do you see what I mean? No? Then perhaps an example will explain better than any further explanation. "I know a man who constantly uses the expression, 'to a certain extent.'" Does he think reciprocity will accomplish a certain thing? You ask him. "Yes, to a certain extent," he answers. "Has he found his new home more conveniently located?" "Yes, to a certain extent," etc., etc.

Now it seems to me that the constant use of that expression is an index to the man's habit of careful thought, his practice of weighing and balancing considerations, of looking thoroughly at all sides of any question.

I know another man who in his writing constantly uses the expression "good people" and again the word "splendid." I consider his almost wearying repetition of these words simply a result of his marvelous optimism. They are his conscious expression of the attitude which I happen to know he has towards the world, as a kindly and beautiful place, stocked with people who, if you understand them rightly, are all astonishingly kind and good, even those who temporarily seem to have lost sight of that fact themselves.

Everyone knows the girl who continually uses the word "interesting" and everyone ought to be able to know her at once as the young person of exclusiveness who is extremely proud of her aesthetic sensibilities, and who is constantly shuddering at the surprising conditions of life in the rest of the world.

Then there is the girl to whom everything is so "interesting," for whom the final criterion of desirability is "is it interesting," and the final word of condemnation, "but I can't see anything interesting about him."

She, of course, is afflicted with congestion of the intellect. She thinks that character and physical outfit are mere appendages to brains. She may get over it in time, and then again she may not. Listen for the creation of the word "interesting" and when you find its use waning, congratulate her. You will have reason to.

And there are—why multiply examples? If you are interested in character study you can hunt up some for yourself. You will find them much more amusing than mine.

If you are not, why are you doubtless more than ready to have me cease, anyhow.

GREAT EXPANSION OF UNITED KINGDOM'S EXTERNAL TRADE

The great expansion of the external trade of the United Kingdom, which was the prominent feature of the returns for the year 1910, continued during the three months ended March 31, the values of the imports and exports being greater during the quarter being greater than in the first quarter of any previous year, the totals were as follows:—

The increase under the head of imports was chiefly due to the resumed importation of raw cotton, the supply of this commodity available in 1910 having been reduced by the failure of the crops, greatly restricted. Exports of cotton manufactures account for nearly half the increase under the head of exports of the United Kingdom produce, and there were also large increases in the value of exports of steel manufactures, woolen tissues, apparel, coal and chemicals, drugs, dyes and colors.

The total values of the merchandise imported into the United Kingdom from Canada and exported from the United Kingdom to Canada, during the first quarter of 1911, were as follows:—

Exports to Canada (United Kingdom produce) were valued at £37,000, and included iron and steel manufactures, woolen tissues, apparel, and other goods. The value of exports to Canada, during the first quarter of 1911, was £37,000, compared with £28,000 in the first quarter of 1910.

CONFERENCE AND CORONATION

Sir Wilfrid Laurier leaves the shores of Canada today to attend the fourth imperial conference since he became prime minister of Canada, and to represent this country at the coronation of King George. The Canadian premier will be one of the important figures in the conference and at the coronation, since he became premier Canada has made remarkable progress, until today the eyes of the world are turned upon her, and the great part she is destined to play in imperial and world history is universally recognized. Sir Wilfrid has been a singularly fortunate statesman, but he has also been a great leader and a true imperialist. Were there less of partisan bitterness in Canada, his splendid services would be freely acknowledged by his opponents, but even at the time some of them are ringing the charges on the old cry of disloyalty. In the other countries they know better, and no man will be received with higher honors, as an imperialist, than the man who has guided the destinies of Canada during a period of unparalleled development and prosperity. He is a practical statesman, and his presence at the imperial conference will ensure a plain and practical discussion of matters affecting the relations of the mother country and the overseas states.

With Sir Wilfrid go Sir Frederick Borden and Hon. Mr. Borden, to consult with the war office and the admiralty on matters relating to imperial defence. Canada has adopted a forward policy in relation to military and naval affairs, and these conferences may be expected to have important results.

It may be hoped that the imperial conference will suggest in securing a uniform naturalization law, so that a person naturalized in any portion of the empire will have his citizenship recognized in any other. This is a matter that has been much discussed in Canada during the last year or two, and it should be settled without delay.

Never in the world's history has there been a more significant event than this of the imperial conference and coronation. Subjects of the King are coming up from the ends of the earth to do homage to the representative of an authority that binds together a vast area and an enormous population, of different races, and to take counsel together concerning the affairs of the world's greatest empire. Canada, which ranks first among the overseas states, is also represented by the foremost statesmen of those states.

NOT AFRAID OF THIS LASH

A gentleman named Lash, of Toronto, has been winning high praise from Conservatives for his denunciation of reciprocity. He is one of that group who believe in protection for the farmers and the combine, leaving the farmers to worry along in any old way. The Toronto Globe has this reference to Mr. Lash and the government: "It is only a few weeks since one of the most prominent of the C. N. R. group of financiers, Mr. Lash, stood on a platform in Toronto and denounced the government for its adoption of a policy that would cut the dominion in the north of the great lakes. He was followed by others, notably Mr. W. T. White, who pressed home the same argument with the utmost insistence. Now, unheeding these denunciations, undeterred by the knowledge that they are strengthening the financial credit of men who have been most active political foes in the past and are not unlikely to be as active foes in the future, the government and the Liberal party take the decisive step that will result in the completion, before many years have passed, of a third great railway on Canadian soil from ocean to ocean."

THE TRUTH OF IT

This local Conservative organ, in its Ottawa correspondence, has re-stated Hon. Mr. Fielding to be on the verge of handing in his resignation, and sought to convey the impression that there was bitter division in the cabinet over the question of the adjournment of parliament for a few weeks. The following Ottawa despatch to the Montreal Herald is therefore of interest: "Hon. W. S. Fielding has no thought of resigning. There is no foundation for the report that he is opposing the parliamentary adjournment. While he expressed his own willingness and anxiety to lead the house in the absence of Sir Wilfrid, he recognizes that there would be nothing gained by keeping the house going as the opposition would obstruct. He also believes that an educational campaign on reciprocity conducted by the Liberal members will do the position of the party some good. Finally, he knows that an adjournment for two months will enable redistribution to be made and an election held before Christmas."

TRADE RELATIONS

The Ottawa Citizen (Conservative) reminds its readers that it is not the fact of Canada that closer trade relations with the mother country have not been secured. It says: "Canada has been waiting, for these numerous years, for some sort of reciprocity from that direction, but matters are more vague and indefinite than ever." "The Citizen goes a step farther and gives the ultra-loyalists of its own party and the tariff reformers in Britain this thrust:— "There is no sentiment in business, or if there is it is expected to be all on our side."

Will Mr. Borden regard this as heresy? The Citizen's remarks are made in an article entitled "Whether we are drifting," and which was suggested by the statement that Germany wants reciprocity with Canada.

"Germany," says the Citizen, "is a wide-awake commercial nation, and has had for a number of years past a growing desire for closer relations with Canada. Like another nation we could mention, she went the wrong way about it, when some six or seven years ago she endeavored to bulldoze Canada into allowing her to share the British preference. The result was that she received the surtax called off, and now the Germans are frankly anxious for closer relations on a mutually profitable basis. Canada has a tariff; so has Germany. Canada has a tariff; so has the United States. If the latter can make a mutually profitable deal with this country, no doubt the Germans see no reason why they might not be able to offer inducements which would prove acceptable to the youngest of the great nations."

Following this statement of the case, the Citizen made the remarks first quoted in

THE CANADIAN NORTHERN AND THE I. C. R.—Sir Wilfrid Personal Guest of King During Coronation Ceremonies

Ottawa, May 11.—"Canada's present prospects and future greatness are largely dependent upon the development of her transportation facilities," said Hon. Geo. P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, in submitting his resolution to the commons today providing for the guarantee of Canadian Northern bonds, as previously outlined by her correspondent.

Hon. Mr. Graham outlined the proposed route of the projected line, illustrating his comment by a large map which was placed upon the table of the house. The line would connect the 4,000 miles of Canadian Northern Railway west of the Great Lakes with the ports of the east. It would give eastern Canada, generally, another through route to the west, and would open up the southern portion of the clay belt of northern Ontario.

Mr. Graham said it was his belief that the eastern portion of Canada—the maritime provinces—were about to enter upon a period of unexampled prosperity and development, while the west was already in its stride. Canada could not obtain lines of construction too rapidly.

"Before the session closes," concluded Mr. Graham, "I hope to communicate to parliament plans for getting under the wing of the state-owned railway other lines which will assist in feeding that railway, and I may state that the Canadian Northern is building a line from Georgian Bay to its main line which will serve another part of the country."



WAS SAILORS' BENEFACTOR

As the cables announced at the end of April there passed away in London, in his 80th year, Passmore Edwards, philanthropist and journalist, who gave away nearly all he had to benefit his fellowmen. Although he donated several two institutions, such as libraries, etc. His last great gift was the presentation of the Passmore Edwards Sailors' Palace to the British & Foreign Sailors' Society in London, for international headquarters, at a cost of \$70,000, which he regarded as the most satisfactory deed of his whole life.

When our present King (then Prince of Wales), opened the palace in 1903, King Edward offered Mr. Edwards a knighthood, as did Queen Victoria before, but he did not feel that he could accept the honor. Had he sought honors, no doubt a peerage would have been his. No Canadian and no Englishman of our day more deserved recognition from the crown. Our honor he should have appreciated, whether accepted or not, namely, the offer of the citizenship of London, but so high did feeling run during the Boer war, that the vote in the council went against him.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES

The monthly meeting of the Associated Charities was held in the Y. M. C. A. on Wednesday, 10th. Rev. G. F. Scoville in the chair. The principal business was the presentation of the report of the secretary, Mrs. C. H. Hall. It showed that 180 applications had been received, as follows:—For employment, 75; for meals, 30; women by day, 40; requests from outside the city for help, 15; in the city for girls (nurses made), 40; for plain sewing, 12; housekeepers, four; nurses, five; boys, eight; young girls to go to country, ten; asking relief, twelve; relief provided for five, coal provided for ten families; received employment, 29; visits made, 25; cases investigated, eight. These latter refer to requests from societies in other places and include two requests from Fredericton, one from England and three from Boston. Mrs. Hall reported that the season showed improvement, and at the present time there were not many seeking employment, as apparently there was work for all. The matter of provision for children was taken up, and a committee was appointed with a view to preparing a bill to be presented at the next session of the local legislature along the lines of the Ontario law. Mrs. Hall pointed out that St. John was the only city of any size that had not a law looking to the care of unprotected children.
