The Times today is printing the map shown on this page so that the public will be able to see at a glance where the St. John Valley Railway, recently opened for traffic, runs, and its important relation to the Transcontinental system. The Valley road is indicated by the heavy red line from Westfield to Centreville. The intersected line from Centreville to Grand Falls shows the proposed extension of the road as originally planned, and the intersected line from Allandale on the Valley Railway to Bancroft, Maine, on the Maine Central, shows the proposed link between these two railways for the purpose of providing a short route to New England. It will be quickly seen how important it is to St. John, the province of New Brunswick, and the whole Dominion that the government should bring the twenty-eight miles of the Canada Eastern Division, now a part of the Canadian National Railways, up to Transcontinental and Valley Railway standard in the matter of grades, curves and roadbeds generally, so that through freight from Upper Canada and the West may be carried to the nearest port on the Atlantic seaboard-St. John-by way of McGivney Junction to Fredericton and down the Valley line. The railway bridge at Fredericton will need to be greatly strengthened, or a new one built, before the heaviest engines can be taken across it, but in the meantime there is not the slightest

di la

reason why the bridge should hold up this traffic, as lighter engines can be used in hauling the trains across the bridge, as is done at different points on the C. P. R. and many other important railway systems.

The distance from McGivney to St. John is 166 miles shorter than the route from McGivney to Halifax. It is the same distance from McGivney to St. John as it is from McGivney to Dorchester. This will show how necessary it is in the interests of all Canada that the connecting link between McGivney and the Valley Railway should be improved without delay so that heavy through traffic will not have to be sent 166 miles farther than is necessary to a port of outlet.

Traffic experts are enthusiastic over the proposed extension from Allandale on the Valley road to Bancroft on the Maine Central. From Allandale to the boundary line is twenty-four miles; from the boundary to Bancroft is sixteen miles, a total of forty miles. The Maine Central has already surveyed the route from Bancroft to the border and, it is understood, would be willing to construct that extension to meet an extension from Allandale to the border. This would not only provide a short route of high standard from New Brunswick to New England centres, but it would ensure a tremendous increase in traffic for the Valley road and for the Canada Eastern branch of the Canadi-

an National Railways. The pulp mill output from B a t h u r s t and Chatham alone provides a large revenue to the railway and the advantage to shippers in that section of the province who are sending their products to the American markets would be tremendous, as it would mean a short haul across the country to the Valley Railway and then on to the United States by way of Allandale and Bancroft, instead of the long haul by way of Moneton and St. John. A similar advantage would be afforded the shippers at Edmundston, St. Leonards, Grand Falls, Andover and other important districts in this section of the province, so soon as the road is constructed from Centreville to Grand Falls, and meanwhile, the short route—via Allandale and Bancroft—would be available to the pulp mill and other interests in the Edmundston district who could send their freight down the Transcontinental to McGivney and on by way of Fredericton, Allandale and Bancroft to the United States markets.

At present the output of the Bathurst mills is about 100 tons a day, and of the Chatham mills about fifty tons a day. From this it will be seen that the cross country traffic to McGivney and then on to the Valley Railway which would immediately follow the connection between the Valley road and the Maine Central would be great and profitable.



Every City and District Will Win My Flag"

When Edward, Prince of Wales-eager, bright eyed, smiling and sincere-arrived in Canada in August, and when he voiced his great admiration of the wonderful achievements of Canadians, on the fields of battle and at home, once again we were thrilled with joyous pride.

He asked concerning Canada's reconstruction programme, and when he was told of the Victory Loan 1919, he graciously consented to the use of his Coat of Arms on a flag, which is to be the prize of honour for districts achieving their quota in the loan.

In dedicating "The Prince's Flag" at Ottawa on Labor Day, His Royal Highness said in part:-

"It is a great joy to me to be associated with the loan, which is the bridge between war and

peace, and which is finishing off the job." "I hope every city and district will win my

flag."

Striking, and beautiful in design, this flag will form not only an unique memento of Victory Year, but a lasting and outstanding souvenir of the visit of His Royal Highness-a visit which will remain as one of the most memorable events in Canada's history.

The reproduction above shows the design of the flag. The body is white, the edge red; in the upper left hand corner is the Union Jack, and in the lower right hand corner the Prince of Wales' Coat of Arms.

The flag is made in two sizes, 4 feet 6 inches by 9 feet for small cities, towns and villages, and 7 feet by 13 feet 6 inches for cities of over 10,000 population.

Canada has been divided into canvassing districts by the Victory Loan Organization. Each city forms one district. Other districts have been determined according to population.

Each of these canvassing districts has been allotted a certain amount in Victory Bonds to sell. To win the Prince's Flag, therefore, a district has to sell its allotment. That is the one and simple condition.

Anticipating that many districts will buy far beyond their allotment, the organization decided that for each



twenty-five per cent. excess of the quota one Prince of Wales' Crest be awarded. Thus the workers in a district doubling its quota will be the proud winners of four small crests for their Honour Flag. These crests will be sewn to the flag. The Prince's Crest—the three ostrich plumes—is shown at the top of the coat of arms.

To every organization with fifty or more employees, where seventy-five per cent. of the enrollment invests a total of ten per cent. of the annual payroll in Victory Bonds, a supplementary Prince of Wales Flag in smaller form-48 inches by 34 inches-will be awarded.

The allotment for each district has been carefully considered, and is based on a conservative estimate of the purchasing power of the district.

Your district can sell its allotment and thus win the Prince's Flag, provided each person does his or her share. You will gladly do your part and encourage your neighbour to do his.

AFR STED ON CHARGE OF EMBEZZLEMENT, PUTS ENJ TO LIFE ON TRAIN


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General Manager Feast of Mount Carmel Iron Works, Pennsylvania

Mt. Carmel, Penn., Oct. 23-Sixty thousand dollars is believed to be the extent of the shortage in the funds of the Mount Carmel Iron Works, as the result of which George E. Feast, general result of which George E. Feast, general manager of the company, under arrest for embezzlement, committed suicide. Feast ended his life with a revolver while being brought here on a train Sunday night by William Bayler, a Sun-bury constable. He had been arrested Saturday night in the Manufacturers' Club ,Philadelphia, after having been missing from Mount Carmel for three missing from Mount Carmel for weeks.

At the time of the discovery of the shortage in Feast's account some di-rectors urged his immediate arrest, while others favored giving him an op-portunity to make remuneration, which he is said to have promised to do. An expert accountant was employed and when shortages exceeding \$20,000 were found officials of the company swore out warrants for Feast's arrest.

Bastress, president of the Guarantee Trust Bank and a Brooklyn real estate promoter; to officials of the iron works and to friends and a Brooklyn real estate promoter; to officials of the iron works and to friends. As the train neared Mahanoy City the constable gave Feast permission to go to the rear of the coach. A few minutes later he heard what he believed was a shot. He investigated and found Feast dead. 


