## THE LATE REV. JOHN CAMPBELL.

The Synod unanimously agree to express their sense of the great loss which this Church has sustained, since their last annual meeting, by the death of the Rev. John Campbell, M.A., Minister of Nottawasaga. He had commended himself to the warm regard of his brethren in the Ministry by his earnest and zealous labours in maintaining the cause of our Zion—by the independence and manliness of his character—and by the energy with which he discharged the duties devolving upon him as a Minister; while he had earned the confidence and gratitude of his congregation, and of the members and adherents of our Church in other quarters, by his untiring efforts to supply their religious wants and to confirm them in their attachment to the Church of their fathers. While our lamented brother was diligent and useful in his own congregation, and in the general work of the Presbytery, in whose proceedings he always took a lively interest and bore a conspicuous part; by the force of his character and the respectability of his attainments he commended himself to the Synod, by whom he was two years ago elected to the office of Moderator, the duties of which he discharged with peculiar efficiency. His sudden death in the midst of his usefulness and of his increasing influence has inflicted no small loss upon our Church, and especially upon the section of the country which enjoyed the benefit of his indefatigable labours. While lamenting the loss which, by this dispensation of Divine Providence, they have sustained, the Synod desire to learn from it the salutary lesson it is fitted to convey, that it behoves us all to "work while it is called to-day." The Synod hereby instruct their Clerk to transmit an Extract of this Minute to Mrs. Campbell.

## THE LATE COL. EDWARD W. THOMSON.

Colonel Edward W. Thomson, who has repeatedly sat in this Court as the Representative Elder of the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, having recently been removed by death, the Synod feel called upon to record their high sense of his public spirit and private worth; and of the zeal, activity, and tried attachment to the cause of our Zion, with which for a long term of years he laboured in his own sphere to promote its interests. In the business of this Court, and in that of its several Boards and Committees, on which from time to time he had

been appointed, he took a deep interest. Eminently useful in his day and generation—enjoying the high esteem of a wide circle of friends, and of the community at large, he has passed away in the midst of his labours; but he has left behind him an example, that might well stimulate others to be, like him, “diligent in business, and fervent in spirit.” The Synod hereby instruct their Clerk to transmit an Extract of this Minute to Mrs. Thomson.

THE LATE COL. ARCHIBALD PETRIE.

The Synod record their sense of loss in the death of Colonel Archibald Petrie, of Cumberland, an Elder of our Church, and for many years a Member of this Court. Exemplary in his conduct as the head of a family, an Elder, and a public man, he was noted for his kindness and hospitality, as well as for an earnest interest in the advancement of our Church. The Synod further desire to record their sympathy with his bereaved family, and instruct their Clerk to transmit an Extract of this Minute to Mrs. Petrie.

ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

It was moved by Rev. Alexander Mann, seconded by Rev. Dr. Urquhart, and passed unanimously, That the Rev. George Thomson, M.A., Minister of Macnab and Horton, be Moderator for the year;—and he, being present, took the chair.

THANKS TO THE RETIRING MODERATOR.

On motion of Dr. Urquhart, seconded by Dr. Mathieson, and passed unanimously, the Moderator tendered to the Rev. Archibald Walker the thanks of the Synod for his most satisfactory conduct while in the Moderator's chair, and for the appropriate sermon preached by him this day.

REPORT ON BUSINESS.

The Report of the Committee on Business was called for and read. The Synod agreed to follow the recommendations contained therein.

RESIGNATION OF CLERK.

A letter was read from the Very Rev. Principal Snodgrass, resigning the office of Clerk of Synod. The Synod, though regretting the loss of his valuable services, agreed to accept his resignation, and at the same time to record their high sense of the admirable zeal, ability, and efficiency with which he had discharged the duties of the Clerkship during the last eight years.

The Synod deferred until to-morrow the appointment of a Clerk; and, in the meantime, the Moderator named Mr. George Bell to act as Clerk until such appointment be made.

## REPLIES TO ADDRESSES.

There was received a copy of a despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor General, intimating that the Synod's Address of last year had "been laid before Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously, and was much gratified by the expressions which it contained of loyalty and attachment to Her Throne and Person." There was also read an acknowledgment of receipt of the Synod's Address of last year to His Excellency the Governor General. The minutes of Commission of Synod were read and sustained.

## REPORT OF CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE SYNODS OF THE LOWER PROVINCES.

Principal Snodgrass reported verbally, on behalf of Professor Mowat, that he had been unable to attend the meetings of the Synods of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; and that a Commission had not been furnished to any other member of Synod.

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

The Synod proceeded to the election of three Trustees of Queen's University in room of Dr. Spence, Dr. Barclay, and Dr. Muir, who retired according to the requirements of the Charter. Dr. Spence and Dr. Barclay were re-elected, and the Rev. Kenneth MacLennan was elected in room of Dr. Muir, who declined re-election.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

DIET II.

*At Ottawa, and within St. Andrew's Church there;—Thursday, the Eighth Day of June, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-Five Years:—*

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with prayer.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. James Carmichael.

The minutes of yesterday's Diet were read and sustained. The Roll was called.

The Rev. Messrs. Cochrane, Neil McDougall, Spencer, Borthwick, and Joshua Fraser, Ordained Missionaries, being present, were invited to sit and deliberate with the Court.

ELECTION OF A CLERK.

The Synod proceeded to elect a successor to Principal Snodgrass as Clerk, when it was moved by Mr. Mann, and seconded by Mr. Livingstone, That Mr. George Bell be appointed Clerk. To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Urquhart, and seconded by Mr. Peter Watson, That Mr. John H. Mackerras be appointed to the office. It was further moved in amendment by Dr. Mathieson, and seconded by Mr. Macpherson, That Mr. Dobie be appointed. It was also moved in amendment by Dr. Cook, and seconded by Mr. Walker, That Mr. George Bell and Mr. John H. Mackerras be appointed Joint Clerks of this Court; Mr. Mackerras to continue to act as Convener of the Finance Committee, and the salary of each to be Thirty Pounds (£30) per annum. It was agreed that the vote should first be taken as to the appointment of one or two Clerks. The roll having been called, and the votes marked, it was carried by a majority of voices that the office should be held by one person. Dr. Mathieson having withdrawn his amendment in consequence of Mr. Dobie's absence in Scotland, the Synod proceeded to take a vote on the names of Mr. Bell and Mr. Mackerras, when Mr. Mackerras was elected by a majority of voices. Mr. Mackerras, being present, thanked the Court, and took his seat at the Clerk's table.

Dr. Mathieson, Dr. Barclay, and Dr. Snodgrass were appointed a Committee to search the Records for precedents as to the form of declaration with reference to the discharge of the duties of his office required to be signed by the Synod Clerk.

SERVICES FOR SABBATH.

The Moderator nominated the Rev. Dr. Jenkins to officiate in this church on the forenoon, Mr. Neil Macdougall in Gaelic on the afternoon at four o'clock, and Mr. W. M. Inglis on the evening of Sabbath next.

MISSIONARY MEETING.

It was agreed to hold a Missionary Meeting, under the auspices of the Synod, in this church, on Monday Evening next at seven o'clock; and Dr. Spence and Mr. Mackinnon were appointed a Committee to make the necessary arrangements in connection therewith.

APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSE.

Application was made by the Presbytery of Toronto for leave to take Messrs. John McMillan, B.D., and John Reid Ross, B.A., Students of Divinity, on trials for License. A similar application was made by the Presbytery of Ottawa in behalf of Mr. Alexander Macdonald, B.A., and by the Presbytery of Quebec in behalf of Mr. Alexander Neil McQuarrie, B.A. The Synod, having ascertained that Circular Letters had been duly issued, intimating the intention of these Presbyteries to make said application, instructed these Students to appear before the Examining Committee.

RECEPTION OF REV. DR. JENKINS.

There was read an application from the Rev. John Jenkins, D.D., for admission as a Minister into this Church, together with an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Montreal conveying an unanimous and most favourable recommendation of the same, and accompanying Presbyterial Certificates from the Third Presbytery of Philadelphia, and from the Presbytery of London in connection with the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in England, the latter bearing date December 13, 1864. It was moved by Dr. Cook, seconded by Dr. Urquhart, and unanimously resolved, That in view of the high standing of Dr. Jenkins, and his well-approved character as a Minister of the Gospel, the Synod do in his case suspend the Standing Order of Procedure in regard to the admission of Ministers from other Churches, and admit him forthwith as an Ordained Minister of this Church with all the rights and privileges belonging to that *status*, and he is hereby admitted as such. It was further agreed to grant leave to any Presbytery of the Church to induct Dr. Jenkins to any charge within its bounds, without requiring a year's probation. Dr. Jenkins, being present, was invited to sit and deliberate with the Court, and was introduced to the Moderator by Principal Snodgrass.

ELECTION OF GOVERNORS OF MORRIN COLLEGE.

The Synod re-elected Rev. Duncan Anderson and Rev. T. G. Smith as Governors of Morrin College; and it was agreed to request the Governors of that Institution to furnish annually to the Synod a Report of its state and prospects.

TEMPORALITIES FUND.\*

The Annual Report and accompanying Financial Statements of the Managers of the Temporalities Fund were laid upon the table and read. It was unanimously agreed to refer these for consideration to a Committee, consisting of Principal Snodgrass, Dr. Macmorine, Messrs. Mann, Walker, Hunter, Neilson, and Mackinnon, with instructions to report to-morrow evening; Mr. Walker to be *Convener*.

OVERTURES ANENT FINANCIAL AFFAIRS OF THE CHURCH.

There were read Overtures from the Presbyteries of Guelph and Renfrew, craving the Synod to devise and adopt some scheme which may secure to all non-privileged Ministers on the Roll an equal payment from the balance remaining in the hands of the Managers of the Temporalities Fund after paying to the privileged Ministers the full amount of their annual allowances. It was, on motion to that effect, resolved to refer these Overtures to a Committee, consisting of Dr. Cook, *Convener*, Dr. Barclay, Messrs. Macdonnell, Lindsay, Mair, and Robert Campbell, with instructions to consider the same, and to report at a subsequent diet as to the best mode of dealing with the suggestions which they contain. To this Committee was also referred an Overture from the Presbytery of Glengary, anent the appointment of a General Agent to take charge of the Schemes of the Church.

APPLICATION OF MR. DONALD STRACHAN.

There was produced and read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Toronto, making application to have the law of the Church, which requires Students preparing for the Holy Ministry to pursue a curriculum

of study of three sessions in the Faculty of Arts preparatory to admission into the Divinity Hall, relaxed in favour of Mr. Donald Strachan, Gaelic Catechist. It was moved by Mr. John Campbell, and seconded by Mr. Nicol, That in consideration of the scarcity of Gaelic-speaking preachers within the bounds of our Church, and also of the proved fitness of Mr. Strachan to build up the cause of Christ among our Highland population, the law of the Church, which requires all our Students of Divinity to go through a three-years' course of study in Arts previous to their entering the Divinity Hall, be in his case, and the same is hereby relaxed, so as to allow him to enter the Divinity Hall at once, and that the Senatus of the University be earnestly requested so to direct all his studies as that the end contemplated by this resolution may be secured. To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. Mann, and seconded by Dr. Mathieson, That the application of Mr. Strachan be not granted. The question having been put, motion or amendment, the motion was carried by a vote of 44 to 13, and the Moderator intimated accordingly.

OVERTURE ANENT APPLICATIONS TO THE COLONIAL COMMITTEE.

There was read an Overture from the Presbytery of Guelph, anent applying to the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland for aid in the maintenance of Licentiatees of this Church, acting as Missionaries in destitute localities. Said Overture was supported by Messrs. Macdonnell and Cadenhead. It was moved by Mr. Clarke, seconded by Mr. Lindsay, and carried, That the Overture be rejected.

ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Synod then proceeded to the election of three Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, when it was unanimously agreed to re-elect James S. Hunter, Esq., and to elect Rev. William Masson in room of Principal Snodgrass, removed to Kingston, and Alexander Cross, Esq., in room of William Edmonstone, Esq., removed to Scotland.

OVERTURE ANENT RE-UNITING PRESBYTERIES OF HAMILTON AND NIAGARA.

The Overture anent re-uniting the Presbyteries of Hamilton and Niagara, laid over from last meeting of Synod, was then taken up and considered. After discussion, said Overture was withdrawn by the parties who had sent it up.

Permission was given to the Presbytery of Montreal to meet during this Session of Synod, with power to adjourn from time to time during the interval elapsing between this date and the period of their next ordinary meeting on the first Wednesday in August, for the purpose of moderating in a Call to, and completing the Induction of, the Rev. Dr. Jenkins to any charge within the bounds of that Presbytery, which may be desirous to secure his services as Pastor.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

the Treasurer, Archibald Ferguson, Esq., and the other members of the Committee for their services; congratulate the friends of the Mission on the re-engagement of the Rev. Louis Baridon; record satisfaction with the zealous labours of M. Geoffroy and Mademoiselle Vernier, and with the cordial and valuable co-operation of the Montreal Ladies' Auxiliary and the Dorcas Societies of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's churches, Montreal; deeply regret the continued ill-health of the Rev. John E. Tanner; approve of the intention of the Committee to direct their efforts towards some new arrangement for the pastorate of the congregation in the city of Montreal; renew the expression of their opinion that the congregations of the Church might manifest a greater liberality in behalf of the Scheme; earnestly solicit a larger support during the ensuing year; and appoint the Committee of Management until next meeting of Synod, as follows, viz.:—The Minister of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, *Convener*; Rev. ## MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.\*

The Seventeenth Annual Report of the Board of Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund was called for, and the Treasurer's Report was read. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Livingstone, seconded by Mr. Mann, and passed unanimously, That the Synod receive and adopt the Report; rejoice to learn that the Fund is in so prosperous a state; approve of the diligence of the Managers in codifying the various By-laws of the Board; and return cordial thanks to them, and especially to the Treasurer, Archibald Ferguson, Esq., for their valuable services in connection with this Fund.

## DISSENT AND COMPLAINT: THE REV. WILLIAM MILLER VS. THE PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

The Synod entered upon a Dissent and Complaint of the Rev. William Miller against a finding of the Presbytery of London, declining to permit him to withdraw his resignation of the charge of West Zorra. Papers having been read, parties were called, when Mr. Miller appeared for himself, and Mr. Nicol for the Presbytery. Parties having been heard were removed. The adjudication of this case was deferred until to-morrow forenoon.

### MISSIONARY FOR THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS.

There was produced and read a Memorial from the Presbytery of Quebec, craving the Synod to use their influence with the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland to obtain the services of an additional Missionary to labour in the Eastern Townships. Whereupon, after due deliberation upon the wants and prospects of that mission field, it was moved by Principal Snodgrass, seconded by Mr. Morris, and passed unanimously, That the Synod have heard with the greatest satisfaction that the Colonial Committee promptly responded to the representations forwarded to them last year respecting the spiritual destitution in the Eastern Townships, by designating a Missionary to the Presbytery of Quebec with a special view to that field. Being convinced that there is still in that part of the Province a clamant demand for Missionary aid, which the Colonial Committee can most advantageously supply, the Synod transmit the Memorial of the Presbytery of Quebec for an additional Missionary, with the earnest hope that the Committee may have it in their power to grant the prayer of the Memorial.

### TEMPORALITIES FUND.

Mr. Walker presented a Report from the Committee appointed to consider the Report and Financial Statements of the Temporalities Board. Said Report was read, and is as follows:—

The Committee, having carefully examined the papers submitted for their consideration, beg to observe:

1. That the Board, and especially the Chairman, Thomas Paton, Esq., are entitled, as hitherto, to the confidence and thanks of the Synod for their management of the important trust committed to them.
2. That the entire gain to the permanent Fund of thirteen thousand six hundred and forty dollars (\$13,640) by the Home Mission effort, commenced in 1859, is an important addition, but, in the opinion of the Committee, falls far short of the liberality which the Church is capable of manifesting and ought to manifest, and that it is one of the most urgent questions which can engage the deliberation of the Synod, how such liberality may be most advantageously drawn forth.
3. That it is matter of great regret that the contributions to the Contingent Fund from congregations enjoying the services of commuting Ministers and Ministers receiving four hundred dollars (\$400) per annum are so small, amounting only to two thousand nine hundred and ninety-two dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$2,992.38), nearly one third of that amount being credited to one congregation, viz., that of St. Andrew's Church, Quebec.
4. That the payment of one thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550) to the Treasurer of Queen's College, while the By-law of the Board, numbered 13, makes it the duty of the officers of the Board to pay Two thousand Dollars (\$2000.), calls for some explanation which,

your Committee have no doubt, members of the Board are ready to give.

5. That seventeen Ministers of the Church receive no allowance from the Fund; and this is a fact which, in the opinion of your Committee, demands special consideration.

It was moved by Mr. Bell (Pittsburgh), seconded by Mr. Hugh Cameron, and passed unanimously, That the Synod decern in terms of this Report.

APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE TO MANAGE SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee, to whom had been referred the Overtures from the Presbyteries of Guelph, Renfrew, and Glengary, gave in a Report. Said Report was read and discussed. Whereupon it was moved by Dr. Cook, seconded by Mr. Neilson, and passed unanimously, That the Synod respectfully request the following gentlemen, Thomas Paton, John Greenshields, William Darling, James Johnston, Alexander Buntin, John Rankin, James S. Hunter, and John L. Morris, Esquires, to be a Committee under the appointment of the Synod to devise and to carry into execution such measures as to them seem expedient for aiding and advancing the Schemes of the Church, and more particularly the Home Mission Fund in both its branches,—with authority to appoint an Agent and to direct him in the discharge of his duties. And the Synod do hereby recommend Mr. James Croil, an elder of the Church, to be appointed Agent, if he is willing to undertake the office; and enjoin all Ministers, Sessions, and Presbyteries of the Church to co-operate with and encourage whatever Agent may be appointed in the discharge of his arduous duties. And the Synod, having full confidence in the zeal and judgment of said Committee, do only recommend further that they confer with the Temporalities Board, with the view of having the offices of Agent and Secretary of the Board combined—with a view also of ascertaining the sum necessary to enable the Temporalities Board to give to every Minister the regular allowance for the current year, which, together with the sum necessary to complete the original grant to Queen's College, it is the desire of the Synod that the members of the Committee should regard as the first object to be attained by the exertions of the Agent. The Synod do also wish that the Committee should add to their numbers any member of the Church, whose co-operation they desire to obtain; and that John Greenshields, Esq., be the Convener of the Committee.

Mr. Walker and Mr. Walter R. Ross were appointed Assessors with the Presbytery of Hamilton, to enable that Presbytery to meet during the session of Synod for the despatch of necessary business.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with prayer.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Hugh Cameron. The minutes of yesterday's Diet were read and sustained.

REPORT OF EXAMINING COMMITTEE.

The Report of the Examining Committee was read by Mr. Nicol, bearing that the Committee have been much gratified with the appearances made in both written and oral examinations by Messrs. John McMillan, John R. Ross, Alexander Macdonald, and Alexander N. McQuarrie ; and that they recommend that leave be granted to the Presbyteries of Toronto, Ottawa, and Quebec to take them on trials for License. Leave was granted ; and these Presbyteries were authorized, when met by permission of Synod, to adjourn from time to time, should they see meet, and proceed to license their Students without delaying for an ordinary meeting.

ADJUDICATION OF COMPLAINT : MILLER VS. PRESBYTERY ON LONDON.

The Synod proceeded to adjudicate upon the Dissent and Complaint of the Rev. William Miller against the Presbytery of London, deferred from yesterday's Diet. It was moved by Mr. H. Cameron, and seconded by Mr. J. B. Mullen, That the Synod dismiss the Complaint ; sustain the action of the Presbytery in accepting the resignation of Mr. Miller ; and enjoin the Presbytery to use their influence with the people of West Zorra to secure to Mr. Miller the balance of stipend due to him. To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. Burnet, and seconded by Mr. Davidson, That the Synod sustain the Complaint. The question having been put, motion or amendment, the former carried by a majority of 26 to 12, and the Moderator intimated accordingly.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.\*

The Synod called for the Report of the Foreign Mission Committee, which was given in by Mr. Kenneth MacLennan, Convener, and read. It was moved by Mr. Jas. Gordon, seconded by Mr. Cadenhead, and passed

unanimously, That the Report now read be received and adopted; that the congregations of the Church be urged, as they are hereby urged, to contribute to the funds of this Mission; and that the following be appointed as the Committee to manage the Scheme during the ensuing year, viz.; Dr. Macmorine, Revs. George Bell, Kenneth MacLennan, Prof. Mowat, Macdonnell, Nicol, Mackerras, William Bain, and Messrs. John Paton, Robert Dennistoun, and Alexander Morris; with Mr. Bell as Convener, and Mr. Morris as Treasurer of the Scheme.

Mr. Livingstone and Mr. Mann were appointed Assessors with the Presbytery of London, to enable that Presbytery to meet during the session of Synod for the despatch of competent business.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE.\*

The Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of Queen's University was presented by Principal Snodgrass, and read. Whereupon, after due deliberation, it was moved by Mr. Mackinnon, seconded by Mr. John Campbell, and passed unanimously, That the Synod receive the Report; cordially unite with the Trustees in their expressions of gratitude to the friends of the College for the many valuable services they have rendered during the past year; record their special satisfaction at the large increase of scholarships; approve of the change made in the Curriculum in Arts by adding a fourth Session, and as regards Students for the Ministry in this Church, require them to conform to the amended Curriculum, subject to the payment of fees in the Arts class, agreeably to the principle stated in the Report; indulge the hope that the Trustees may be enabled to meet not only all their existing obligations, but also to undertake such improvements as may conduce to the usefulness of the College; and instruct the Clerk to forward to Mr. C. J. Cameron an official communication in the terms of the report referring to him.

REPORT ON PRESBYTERY RECORDS.

The Report of the Committee appointed to revise Presbytery Records was given in by Mr. Mackid, Convener, and read, bearing that the Records of the Presbyteries of Kingston, Perth, Renfrew, Hamilton, Niagara, Guelph, London, and Toronto are carefully and correctly kept; and that the Records of the Presbyteries of Ottawa, Montreal, Glengary, and Quebec are carefully and correctly kept, *cum his notis*;—it is not recorded in the minutes of the Presbytery of Ottawa that its meetings were closed with prayer; the Record of the Presbytery of Montreal shows that a Probationer was admitted without a Presbyterial Certificate from the Presbytery in Scotland, within whose bounds he had last resided, and that the pulpit of Dundee was declared vacant in an irregular manner; in the Record of the Presbytery of Glengary no notice is

taken of any inquiries having been made in regard to Synodical Collections; and the Record of the Presbytery of Quebec bears that that Presbytery appointed one of their number to induct Mr. Evans, instead of appointing a meeting of Presbytery for that purpose.

The Synod, having heard the Report, adopted the same, and the Moderator having asked if any member had any other observations to make on any of these Records, none were offered, and the Synod instructed their Clerk to attest them accordingly, and ordered the Moderators of the Presbyteries of Toronto and Montreal to sign their respective Records for the Rev. John Campbell (Nottawasaga), deceased, and for the Rev. John Cameron (Dundee), removed to Scotland, with a note of the cause.

A discussion having arisen on the note in the Report on the Record of the Presbytery of Montreal, anent the admission of a Probationer without a Presbyterial Certificate from the Presbytery in Scotland, within whose bounds he had last resided, it was moved by Dr. Cook, and seconded by Mr. Morris, That the action of the Presbytery of Montreal in receiving a Probationer on the 1st February, 1865, without a Presbyterial Certificate from the Presbytery in Scotland, within whose bounds he had continuously resided for a considerable period prior to his departure, was contrary to the law of the Church, and the said reception is hereby declared null and void. To this it was moved in amendment by Principal Snodgrass, and seconded by Mr. Mann, That the Synod instruct the Presbytery of Montreal to observe and apply the law of the Church in regard to the production of a Presbyterial Certificate in the case of the Probationer referred to, and in the meanwhile hold the reception in abeyance. The question having been put, motion or amendment, the motion was carried by a majority of 24 to 16, and the Moderator intimated accordingly.

Permission, having been asked, was granted to the Presbytery of Perth to meet by adjournment from the meeting held during the Session of Synod, for the purpose of completing the Induction of Mr. McLean to the charge of Middleville, without waiting until the next ordinary meeting for that object.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place on Monday morning next at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

REPORT ON SYNOD RECORDS.

The Synod heard and adopted the Report of their Committee appointed to revise the Synod and Commission Records, bearing that the same are carefully and correctly kept, and instructed their Moderator to attest them accordingly.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.\*

The Treasurer's Statement of the Synod Fund and the Annual Report of the Finance Committee were read by Mr. Mackerras, Convener. It was moved by Mr. John Campbell, seconded by Mr. Peter Watson, and passed unanimously, that the Synod receive the Report with accompanying Financial Statement; adopt its recommendations; thank the Treasurer and Committee; and add to it Mr. Kenneth MacLennan, Mr. MacLennan to be Convener in room of Mr. Mackerras, appointed Synod Clerk.

BURSARY SCHEME.†

The Report of the Bursary Committee, having been called for, was presented by Principal Snodgrass, and read. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. G. D. Ferguson, seconded by Mr. Mackinnon, and passed unanimously, That the Synod receive the Report; record their satisfaction with the management of the scheme, and their thanks to Dr. Williamson, Convener, and the other members of the Committee; approve of the principles on which the Bursary Committee proceed in the distribution of the Fund; take encouragement from the fact that an increase both in the number and amount of the contributions is this year reported; earnestly solicit from individuals and congregations continued prayerful support in behalf of a scheme, the benefits of which are very great; and re-appoint the Committee, with Dr. Williamson as Convener, and Professor Mowat as Vice-Convener.

FORM OF JUDICIAL PROCESS.

Dr. Barclay reported, on behalf of the Committee, on the preparation of a Form of Judicial Procedure. The Committee were re-appointed, with instructions to give attention to this subject at the earliest period, that they may be in a position to report fully to the next meeting of Synod.

FORMULA FOR NON-THEOLOGICAL PROFESSORS.

There was produced and read an Extract Minute of the Board of Trustees of Queen's University, applying to the Synod to prepare and adopt

a Formula to be subscribed by Professors not in the Theological Department. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. James Gordon, seconded by Mr. Livingstone, and passed unanimously, That the following members be appointed a Committee to consider the application of the Trustees of Queen's College, and report to the next meeting of Synod, viz., Dr. Barclay, *Convener*; Dr. Urquhart, Dr. Spence, and Mr. Morris.  
Mr. William Bain, and Mr. Bell (Pittsburgh), were appointed Assessors with the Presbytery of Niagara, to enable that Presbytery to meet for the purpose of granting leave of absence from his pastoral charge to the Rev. James Herald, of Dundas.

SALE OF GLEBE AT CAMDEN.

There was read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Kingston, making application for leave to sell the Glebe at Camden, which is disadvantageously situated for the interests of the congregation. Mr. Inglis was heard in support of the application. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Livingstone, seconded by Mr. Clarke, and passed unanimously, That the Synod agree to grant the application of the Presbytery of Kingston, with the understanding that the proceeds of sale be invested in the purchase of land for the benefit of the church at Camden.

DEBT ON CHURCHES AT THREE RIVERS AND BRANTFORD.

The Synod heard a Memorial from the congregation of Three Rivers, stating that a heavy and pressing debt remains on their place of worship, and craving leave to solicit contributions throughout the Church in aid of the liquidation of this debt. A similar Memorial from the Rev. J. S. Burnet, in favour of the congregation of Brantford, was presented. There were read Extract Minutes from the Presbyteries of Quebec and Hamilton, bearing on these cases. After explanations made by Messrs. MacLaren and Burnet in support of these applications, it was agreed to grant the permission craved; and the Synod accordingly authorized the congregations of Three Rivers and Brantford to obtain subscriptions and collections throughout the Church, with a view to the liquidation of the debt on their respective places of worship; attention being duly paid to the law of the Church respecting such collections, which requires the consent of those Presbyteries, within whose bounds subscriptions are solicited.

POSITION OF THE CHURCH AS AFFECTED BY CERTAIN CASES.

Mr. Nicol, on behalf of the Committee appointed at last meeting of Synod to consider the position of the Church as affected by particular cases, reported that owing to certain circumstances the Committee had not been able to meet. The Committee were discharged.

HYMN BOOK.\*

Mr. Nicol, *Convener* of the Committee on the preparation of a Hymn

Book, gave in a Report, which was read. The Synod unanimously resolved to receive the Report; to express satisfaction with the progress of the work imposed upon the Committee, and request them to continue their important labours; to recommend the Committee to confine their selection to Hymns of acknowledged soundness and purity, as well as of appropriateness for public worship; to suggest, in consideration of the admirable Psalmody which the Church has inherited from her fathers in the version of the Psalms, Scripture Paraphrases and Hymns, the desirableness of limiting the number of new hymns to one hundred; to suggest, further, that caution be exercised in the adoption of modern alterations of well-known hymns; and to recommend Kirk Sessions to accept the offer of the Committee to distribute among Sabbath Schools, at a cheap rate, the remaining edition of one thousand of the Book of Hymns, selected and published by them.

APPLICATION TO THE COLONIAL COMMITTEE FOR AID.

The Committee appointed to consider applications to the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland for aid, gave in a Report, bearing that they have had before them applications from the congregations of Johnson, Bayfield, and Westmeath; but they cannot recommend these applications for transmission to the Colonial Committee, without reference to the Commission of Synod, before which Court the Presbyteries transmitting the applications should, in the opinion of your Committee, be instructed to lay their recommendations, if they have any, together with the deeds of the several properties, and registry certificates showing the state of the titles thereto, or abstracts of title prepared by a Solicitor. The Synod decerned in terms of the Report.

RETURNS ON FORM OF PROCESS.

The Committee appointed at last meeting of Synod to consider the returns of Presbyteries on the Form of Process for the Induction of Ministers, gave in a Report, which was read. The Synod resolved to send down this Form of Process anew to Presbyteries; enjoin those Presbyteries, who have not sent up returns, to do so without fail to next meeting of Synod,—special attention being drawn to Paragraph iii, clause 1; and ordain the same to be in force as an Interim Act.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.\*

The Report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools, having been called for, was given in and read by Mr. Inglis, Convener. It was moved by Mr. Mair, seconded by Dr. Spence, and passed unanimously, That the Synod sustain the Report; thank the Committee for the interest they have displayed in the Sabbath Schools of the Church; recommend them

It was agreed to insert Dugald Stewart's "Outlines of Moral Philosophy," edited by Dr. McCosh, in room of "Alexander's Moral Philosophy," in the list of subjects for Examination prescribed to Candidates for License; and the Clerk was instructed to intimate this change to the Senatus of Queen's University.

ADDRESSES TO THE QUEEN\* AND GOVERNOR GENERAL.†

Draft Addresses to the Queen and Governor General were read, adopted, and ordered to be transmitted in the usual way.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Mr. Bain, Convener, on behalf of the Committee on Sabbath Observance, reported verbally as to what the Committee had done during the past year. It was agreed to thank the Committee, and re-appoint them, with the addition of Revs. Peter Lindsay and Hugh Cameron, and Mr. A. H. Dowswell.

MEMORIAL FROM PARTIES IN SALT FLEET AND BINBROOK.

A Memorial from Messrs. Peter Dickson and Alexander Warrack, of Saltfleet and Binbrook, was read. As no one was present to support said Memorial, no action was taken thereon.

Gaelic Scholarship at Queen's University.

On motion of Mr. John Darroch, seconded by Dr. Mathieson, it was unanimously agreed, in view of the desirableness of encouraging the study of the Gaelic language, so as the more efficiently to promote the

spiritual interests of a large portion of our members and adherents who speak that language, to establish at Queen's College a Gaelic Scholarship, amounting to sixty dollars (\$60) per annum; and, in order to raise this sum, the Synod hereby recommend to all the Gaelic congregations of the Church annually to take up a collection or subscription for this purpose. The Synod further appointed Mr. Darroch to take charge of the measures requisite to give effect to this proposal.

OVERTURE ANENT LAW AGENTS IN CHURCH COURTS.

There was produced and read an overture, subscribed by certain members of Synod, craving the Synod to transmit to Presbyteries the Act of Synod 1843, prohibiting Law Agents, as such, from acting in any of the Church Courts, that they may consider whether or not it would be for the interests of parties, and the wise determination of judicial causes, to modify the said Act, so that the assistance of Law Agents may be allowed. It was agreed to adopt the recommendation contained in the Overture, and the Synod hereby transmit the aforesaid Act of Synod to Presbyteries for their consideration, and enjoin them to send up their opinions thereanent to the next meeting of this Court.

ACT FOR SPECIAL COLLECTIONS.

The Synod renewed the Act for regulating Public Collections as follows:—

THE Synod appoint the following public collections to be made in all the Churches during the ensuing year, namely:—

- I. For the Home Mission—on the First Sabbath in July.
- II. For the French Mission—on the First Sabbath in October.
- III. For the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund—on the First Sabbath in January.
- IV. For the Bursary Scheme—on the First Sabbath in March.

And recommend congregations to contribute for Foreign Missions on some convenient Sabbath.

Provided always, that when the Lord's Supper shall be observed on any of the said Sabbaths, or when any of the said Sabbaths shall be deemed unsuitable, then another day may be selected by the Session within three months thereafter; Provided also, that congregations preferring to raise their contributions in any other way, as by subscriptions and donations, or to furnish them out of any fund under their control, shall be at liberty to do so.

All Ministers of the Church are appointed at least to exhort their Congregations to contribute towards the maintenance and spread of the Gospel of Christ on all the days above specified; and, on a Sabbath preceding that on which a collection is to be made, to give due intimation from the pulpit, together with such information on the object of it as he may have been able to acquire. The Conveners of the several

Committees and Boards for the management of the Schemes herein specified, are required to forward, in good time, to all the ministers, notices of these appointments as they become due, together with such statements as it may be of use and interest to read along with their intimations; And in particular the Synod enjoin the several Presbyteries, at their meetings next after the times specified, to inquire into the diligence of all their Ministers and Congregations in this matter and record reports thereof in their Books, and likewise instruct the Committee of Synod for revising Presbytery Books to notice how far Presbyteries attend to this injunction; And the Synod while rejoicing at the increased fruits of Christian effort in this Church, yet considering that the means hitherto supplied are quite inadequate to the extent of the field daily opening up to the operations of the Church, and far within what might be expected from the gratitude and love due to a crucified Saviour, earnestly urge on all the people seriously to consider the duty of contributing liberally for the advancement of Christ's cause, according to the ability wherewith God has blessed them. This Act shall be annually renewed, with such amendments as the Synod may deem called for, and the expense of printing it for distribution among ministers shall be borne equally by the several Schemes, and the funds of each Scheme shall be charged with all the expenses of its own management.\*

COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS FOR 1866.

The Synod appointed the Moderator, the Clerk, Presbytery Clerks, Dr. Mathieson, Dr. Cook, Dr. Spence, Rev. Duncan Morrison, Rev. Robt. Campbell, and the representative Elders from Montreal (St. Andrew's and St. Paul's), Toronto, and Brockville, their Committee on Business for next Session.

COMMISSION OF SYNOD.

The Synod appointed their Commission to meet in St. Andrew's Church, Montreal, on the first Thursday after the first Wednesday in November next, at noon; in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, on the first Wednesday after the third Tuesday in January next, at noon; and oftener by adjournment when and where the Commission may choose. Nine Commissioners shall be a quorum, of whom five must be Ministers. In all their actings, the Commissioners shall proceed according to the Act of Synod, 1859, anent the nature, powers, and duties of the Commission of the Supreme Court of this Church.

It was moved by Mr. Livingstone, seconded by Dr. Mathieson, and carried by acclamation, That the Synod record their hearty thanks to the friends of the Church in Ottawa for their great kindness and hospitality to the members in attendance at this present meeting, and especially to Dr. Spence and his Session for their great attention in making the necessary arrangements; and that the Synod further record their thanks to the Railway and Steamboat Companies that have granted reductions

in the rates of travel, and instruct the Clerk to give intimation thereof to these Companies.

The Minutes of this Diet were read and sustained.

## APPENDIX A.

## REPORT OF MANAGERS OF THE TEMPORALITIES FUND.

The Board for the management of the Temporalities Fund beg leave to lay before the Synod the Balance Sheet, and other accounts of the Board for the past year. These accounts may be classed under three heads. They relate to the Temporalities account proper, the Home Mission Fund, and the Contingent account. The Board transmit, in addition to these, the list of Payments to Ministers during the year, and a statement of the Investments of the Trust.

It will be seen that little change has taken place in the investments during the year. One Bond of the City of Montreal for two thousand dollars has been added to the Investments of the Board.

It has caused the Board much pain to be obliged to cut off some ministers of the Church from its list of recipients. A large diminution in the dividends paid on some of the stock in charge of the Board, and also a diminution in some of the largest contributions to the Contingent Fund, especially in that of St. Andrew's Church, Quebec, which this year sent nearly seven hundred dollars less than on former years to the Fund, prevented the Board, notwithstanding the deaths of several commuted ministers and its own earnest wishes, from being able to pay several of the recently inducted ministers. The Board call the attention of the Synod to this circumstance with a hope that, if possible, some means may be devised to remedy it.

APPENDIX B.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee beg leave to submit their Report, together with the Treasurer's Statement for the past Synodical year. Your Committee have received during the period embraced in the accompanying statement \$558 89. Of this sum \$407 were for the year 1864, \$74 34 for arrears, \$28 in advance for 1865, and \$49 55 from the sale of printed Minutes and Model Deeds, together with the costs of Extracts from the Minutes of Synod. The arrears still due amount to \$552. Of this sum \$201 are due for 1864, and \$351 for previous years.

In their Report of last year your Committee stated that they would be prepared at this meeting to recommend that a large part of these arrears should be written off as bad debts. In accordance with this intimation, your Committee now recommend, after due investigation into the state and circumstances of these congregations, that the indebtedness to the Synod Fund of the following charges on the Roll be cancelled to the extent herewith specified, inasmuch as most of these charges have been vacant for many years, and are now, from various causes, little better than Mission Stations. The arrears thus recommended to be written off amount to \$228, and are as follows, viz.:

Your Committee have, for some time, been impressed with the desirableness of the Synod's either possessing or having at its command a vault, in which may be kept and preserved the Records and valuable documents belonging to this Church. They have felt that every possible precaution should be taken to preserve from the ravages of fire the archives of the Synod which, besides being of direct advantage in many respects, may furnish materials to the future historian of this Church. During the past Session the authorities of Queen's College have built a substantial and secure vault, and have intimated their willingness to grant to the Synod in perpetuity, the desired accommodation, provided a part of the expense of constructing the same be contributed by the Synod. Your Committee, impressed with the favourable terms of the proposed arrangement, would therefore recommend the payment of \$100 towards this object.

The estimated expenditure for the present year amounts to \$550, distributed as follows:

MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Treasurer of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund begs respectfully to report the following:—

That the Fund is in a prosperous state, as all the Securities are considered perfectly good except a small sum of about \$400, which is rather doubtful.

Four debtors to the Fund have been backward in paying their interest, each owing nearly three years; and steps have been taken to enforce payment of principal and interest. Two of those mortgages, amounting to \$4200, will shortly be recovered through the hand of the Sheriff, as the property is amply sufficient to pay the debt, and a third mortgage is in the hand of an Attorney in London, C. W., with instructions to have it foreclosed.

The sum of \$172.41 has been received from Congregational collections, being arrears due last year; and \$1313.67½ have been received since 1st January, 1865, which is \$37.39 less than last year.

The interest collected amounts to \$2321.60, being \$51.22 more than last year.

The Ministers' contributions amount to \$1271.09, being \$108.90 less than last year.

The charges amount to \$121.18, being \$156.17 less than last year.

The sum of \$1741.50 has been received from sale of Bank Stock and returned investments, and \$5900 have been invested on good securities.

The annuities paid to widows amount to \$2451.24, being \$301.24 more than last year.

The death of Mrs. McGill reduced the number, but two have been added to the list, Mrs. Evans, of Kitley, and Mrs. Campbell, of Nottawasaga. Mrs. McGill's annuity, however, exceeded the allowance to be given to the two last.

The balance in the hands of the Treasurer amounts to \$456.69½, being \$1324.64 less than last year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE.

During the past Session the number of Students in attendance was 115: in Arts, 34; Theology, 16; and Medicine, 65. Of the 34 in Arts, 15 have declared their intention of studying for the Ministry, so that there are in all 31 young men under training for the public service of the Church. Three of the Theological Students, having completed the required Curriculum, intend to appear before the present meeting of Synod as Candidates for License. Mr. Charles I. Cameron, who has taken his Third Session in the Theological Hall of Glasgow University, has resolved to proceed to India as a Missionary from the Church of Scotland. He has forwarded for the consideration of the Synod a communication declaring his intention and giving his reasons. The Church in Canada can ill afford to lose the services of so promising a man as Mr. Cameron, but the importance of the work upon which he has determined to enter will, it is believed, be regarded with great interest by the Synod, the members of which may feel thankful that they are by him, in a manner, represented in the enlarging Missionary operations of the Parent Church. It is recommended that Mr. Cameron be relieved of all pecuniary obligations occasioned by this change of purpose on his part, and that an official communication be sent him from the Synod intimating their approval of this recommendation and wishing success in his endeavours to advance the Redeemer's kingdom in the East.

There were 15 Graduates in Arts and 16 in Medicine.

In noticing a few particulars connected with the Teaching Department, a special acknowledgment of the services rendered by John M. Machar, Esq., M. A., Barrister, is in the first place called for. That gentleman has continued, without any emolument whatever, to lecture twice a week on the important subject of Modern History to the students of the third year in Arts, who chose to take advantage of his prelections. Attendance is optional, but all the Students showed their interest in the subject by being very regularly present in the class. The Trustees regret that this is the only way in which they can express their obligations to Mr. Machar.

Professors Bell and MacLean, recently appointed to the chairs of Natural History and Chemistry, and the Institutes of Medicine respectively, were publicly inducted at a meeting of Convocation held on the tenth day of January.

The Professor of Anatomy, Dr. Kennedy, who resides at Bath, some eighteen miles from Kingston, and who has during the whole period of his appointment found it impossible, except at great inconvenience, to lecture daily, having expressed his willingness to agree to any arrangement of which his colleagues might approve, provided he would not require to meet his class more than twice a week, the Medical Faculty

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requested the sanction of the Trustees to the proposal that Michael Sullivan, Esq., M.D., who had been for four years Demonstrator in Anatomy, should lecture on the days when Dr. Kennedy could not be present. The Trustees complied with the request on the express conditions recorded in their minutes, that the students would continue to receive the same amount of instruction as formerly, and that the arrangement would be in force only until the close of the Session. At the Annual Meeting of the Board on the last day of the Session, a recommendation from the Medical Faculty that Dr. Sullivan should be appointed Assistant Professor of Anatomy was considered and agreed to. Richard A. Reeve, B.A., M.D., has been appointed Demonstrator in Anatomy with the superintendence of the dissecting room four hours daily. It is hoped that these arrangements will add materially to the facilities afforded by the University for instruction in Medicine.

The Trustees refer with much satisfaction to the Calendar for 1865-6, for a notice of valuable additions to the Library, and record their warmest thanks to those friends of the University, who have so liberally contributed to this most important institution. 1740 volumes were added during the year ending 27th April, and excepting a very few by purchase, the whole number was acquired by donation. This addition contains many rare and standard works in every department of literature. The Library is still a very small one for a University to have. The revenue available for enlargement is quite inadequate. A good Library is as indispensable to the Professor as to the Student. Strong reasons are thus suggested for soliciting other friends to follow, during the present year, the example which has been set in the past.

In the Calendar will also be found notices of important additions to the Museum and the Astronomical Observatory. Both of these institutions have been greatly indebted to the consideration of persons interested in their efficiency, and it will be seen that there is still room for the assistance of such as are disposed to contribute to their improvement.

The list of Scholarships has been carefully revised by the Senatus, and full information respecting them is given on pages 37-39, of the Calendar. The whole number is twenty-two, fourteen being connected with the Faculty of Arts, and eight with the Faculty of Theology. Only three are permanently endowed. For the others, the Trustees desire to tender their grateful acknowledgments to the several parties who have offered or continued them for the ensuing year. Twelve appear in the list for the first time. Special mention may be made of two, of the value of \$60 each, from the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Montreal. The Scholarship, value \$60, offered by the Presbytery of Kingston, suggests an example which might be followed, with advantage by other Presbyteries. The effect of it should be a careful selection of young men to enter the University as Students for the Ministry, and a lively interest in their progress from year to year. It is submitted, as a question for the consideration of Presbyteries, whether or not this mode of encouraging Church students would be more efficient than a collection for the Bursary Fund from the congregations within their bounds—a collection which, under the present system, is oftentimes small and irregularly made. It will be observed that several Scholarships are given by the Bursary Committee of the Synod; especially that the grant from the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland is almost entirely applied in this way, the Scholarships thus instituted being placed in connection with the Theological Faculty in accordance with the design for which the grant is made. It is the opinion of the Senatus that all moneys, placed at their disposal for the assistance of Students, should be devoted to the formation of Scholarships—that is, pecuniary encourage-

ments awarded exclusively by competitive examinations; and the members of the Bursary Committee, believing that the object for which the Bursary Scheme was established, may be attained with the greatest benefit to the Church by adopting that view, are disposed to convert the collections received from congregations into Scholarships. Acting upon this principle, merit is the only ground upon which Scholarships are assigned by the Senatus; and by referring to page 40 of the Calendar, the Synod will find that, besides undergoing the examination by which a Scholarship is awarded, competitors must be in good standing as regards the University Examination immediately preceding. Difficulties are always unavoidably connected with the distribution of money, whether exclusively or partially on the ground of need; and for the officers of a University in particular, the wisest course seems to be to recognize merit as the only claim. The disposition, therefore, of the Bursary Committee to convert into Scholarships the money placed at their disposal by the congregations of the Church, seems deserving of approbation. At the same time, need is a claim which is entitled to Christian consideration. The only question with regard to it in the present instance is, From what quarter should the assistance come? This question is easily answered. Let there be a sufficient number of Scholarships so that no Student, such as the Church would desire to encourage, may be without a reasonable expectation of obtaining one; and if, after this, assistance be required, let individuals, or Sessions, or Presbyteries, that persuade young men to come up to the University, make the necessary provision. There is no difficulty whatever connected with the reception of moneys to be given on the ground of need, when the Students for whom they are intended are named by the contributors.

While a large addition has been made to the number of Scholarships, it is gratifying to notice that there is a corresponding increase in the number of *open* Scholarships, more than half of those connected with the Faculty of Arts being of that character. These Scholarships are competed for by all students of the years for which they are offered, so that both the advantage of competition and the honour of success are much greater in their case than in the case of close Scholarships, which are competed for only by Church Students. The Synod will, therefore, be prepared to hear that open Scholarships are regarded by the Senatus with greater favour than close Scholarships.

A new feature in the encouragements offered to industrious and deserving Students, is the institution of valuable prizes for competitive essays to be written during the Summer vacation. By referring to page 41 of the Calendar, it will be seen that four such prizes, amounting in value to \$160, are to be awarded next Session. The thanks of the Trustees are tendered to the friends of the University who have kindly contributed these munificent rewards; and it is hoped that their liberality will be the means of inducing a large and vigorous competition.

Appended to this Report is an extract of the proceedings of the General Meeting of the Board, held on the 27th of April, with reference to the addition of a Fourth Session to the Curriculum in Arts. The recommendations embodied therein were unanimously agreed to by the Senatus; and the various changes proposed were on its behalf earnestly urged by the Principal on the acceptance of the Board. By sanctioning these recommendations, the Trustees have assimilated the Curriculum in Queen's University to that which is in force in other Universities in the Province, as well as in the Universities of Scotland. In the opinion of the Senatus, justice cannot be done to the various subjects of study in fewer than four Sessions; while an additional year will relieve the students of a pressure of work, which is adverse to their progress in a

sound and thorough education. According to the recommendation numbered 5, the course may still be completed in three years, provided intrant students pass an examination showing themselves qualified to commence with the studies of the second Session. To those who will rank next session as second or third year's students, a fourth session is made optional, because when they entered upon the course they expected to complete it in three years; but it is believed that a number of them will conform to the extended Curriculum.

As requested by the Senatus, the Trustees memorialize the Synod to require all students for the Ministry to take the new course prescribed for intending Graduates. In former years, the Synod required an attendance of four Sessions; and as an opinion in favour of the change now proposed has been frequently and strongly, if not generally, expressed by members of Synod, it seems unnecessary to advance any arguments in support of a Curriculum, in better accordance than the existing one, with the views regarding an educated Ministry which the Synod has always maintained.

In consequence of the increased expense of attending a fourth session, the Senatus recommended, and the Board have sanctioned, a reduction in the class fees to Students in Arts. The resolution of the Board anent the recommendation of the Senatus, solicits information as to the views of the Synod respecting the proposal to exact the same fees of all Students in Arts, whether they be Students for the Ministry or not, with this difference—that the fees received from students preparing for the Church shall be returned to them under certain conditions. The following reasons in support of the recommendation of the Senatus seems to be worthy of consideration. Its adoption will remove an invidious distinction between Students during their Arts course. It will abolish the present system of exacting a written obligation from those who declare their intention of studying for the Ministry—a system which is objectionable on several grounds, but chiefly because the obligation is in most cases not legally binding, and has been too frequently dishonoured by Students, who, after obtaining a liberal education under exemption from fees, have turned aside from the Ministry without paying the charges remitted. The returning of fees to Students in the Theological Hall, or upon taking License, will be equivalent to Bursaries given to them as *bona fide* Theological Students; and as they will enjoy the use of them by right, they will have all the satisfaction of that feeling of independence which accompanies the possession of what one earns for himself. This will be the case, especially if the fees be returned subject to the same conditions on which Bursaries are now granted, namely—the passing of the regular University Examination immediately preceding the application for them. It is recommended, however, that one year be allowed to elapse before the charging of fees from Students for the Ministry come into force, should the proposal meet with the approval of the Synod.

Herewith is submitted as usual an audited financial statement from the Treasurer. Attention is requested to the remarks and explanations which accompany it.

The Senatus met and was constituted.

INTER ALIA.

The Senatus agreed to recommend to the Trustees :

1.—That in conformity with the course now prescribed by the other Universities of Upper and Lower Canada, the Trustees enact that four years shall be required to complete the undergraduate course in Arts, the Session in each year to commence on the first Wednesday of October, and to close on the last Thursday of April thereafter.

2.—That the order of attendance on the classes in each session shall be according to the following scheme :—

Attendance at the classes marked \* is optional, except for those who intend to compete for honours in those departments of study with which these classes are connected.

3.—That the above arrangement shall come into force at the commencement of next session with regard to all Students who have not hitherto attended College, and that it be recommended to the first and second year's Students of the present session to fall in with the same arrangement, and that, to encourage them to do so, the Trustees dispense with fees for the fourth session.

4.—That the fee for each session be a net sum of Twenty-five Dollars, including the Matriculation fee of Four Dollars and the charge of One Dollar for apparatus.

5.—That intransit Students passing with perfect satisfaction the entrance examination required of second year's Students be allowed to proceed to the second year's course.

6.—That the Trustees, in the event of their approval being given to the above Curriculum, memorialise the Synod to accept the course required from Students proceeding to Degrees in Arts, as the course to be

required from Students for the Ministry, and to sanction the payment by such Students of the class fees in each year, these fees, exclusive of matriculation and apparatus fees, to be returned with interest, one third at the commencement of each of the first two sessions in the Hall, and the remaining third on the Student obtaining License, but the claim for each payment to cease after the lapse of three years from the time at which it is here declared to be payable.

The recommendation of the Senatus, with regard to the Undergraduate course, was duly considered, and thereafter it was resolved, That the Board approve of the recommendations of the Senatus numbered 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, and adopt the same in conformity with the terms thereof as the Regulation of this Board with regard to the Undergraduate course of study in Arts—and that the Board transmit the same to the Synod for their approval, in so far as regards Students of Divinity in the College—and the Board further request to be informed as to the views of the Synod respecting that portion of Section No. 6 of the said recommendations which proposes to regulate the fees payable by Students purposing to study with a view to entering the Divinity Hall.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

KINGSTON, 29th May, 1865.

*The Hon. John Hamilton, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.*  
 SIR,—I have pleasure in handing you herewith the Annual Accounts, Statements, and Balance Sheet of Queen's College, at Kingston—duly audited as usual.

The Financial year of the College ends with the close of each Session, but many of the payments are not made until a few days after. I was therefore quite unable to close the accounts in time for last Meeting without presenting an imperfect and incorrect statement of the year's expenditure. Permit me respectfully to recommend that for the future the Treasurer's Accounts be closed on the 15th or 21st May, which would meet the difficulty in question.

In explanation of the apparent surplus of Income over expenditure, I beg to state that owing to a change in the Financial year of the Province we received a grant and a half, or \$7,500, instead of \$5000, as formerly. Deducting the apparent surplus from this excess of Income there is a deficiency of \$810.51, or less than the surplus of last year, which was \$1,005.45.

The expenditure of this year exceeds that of last year by \$1,184.36, partly because the salary of the Principal was only charged for six months in 1864, and also because some of the General Expenses, such as Stationery and Printing, are heavier this year than last. No Law expenses are included in this statement of the Annual Expenditure of the year.

The annual Income is at present affected by reduction in the Commercial Bank Dividend, and also by a deduction from the Temporalities Fund Allowance, the deficiency from these two sources of Revenue being \$1,090—or rather more than the amount of excess of Expenditure over

the Income. I beg respectfully to report that the College expenditure at present is as nearly as possible equal to the Income, and that there would be a considerable surplus of Revenue were the Board able to convert into productive Capital the large amount now locked up in Lands yielding no return.

I beg further to report that the old College Building is much in need of repairs, especially to the roof, and that considerable outlay must be made before next autumn, otherwise the building will sustain damage.

The sale of Lands proceeds very slowly, chiefly owing to the scarcity of money throughout the Province, and also to want of demand for Real Estate. Very great difficulty is also experienced from the provision in the Charter that no sale is valid until approved of at a meeting of thirteen Trustees.

I trust the statements herewith submitted may be found satisfactory and sufficiently explicit, and will have pleasure in affording any further information which the Board may desire.

APPENDIX E.

REPORT OF THE FRENCH MISSION SCHEME.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 23RD MAY, 1865.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland.

The Committee for managing the Synod's French Mission Scheme report as follows:—

The very general expression of opinion at last meeting of Synod in favour of re-engaging Mr. Baridon induced your Committee to offer that missionary a salary of \$300 per annum commencing with the first day of August. This allowance, though quite as much as the Committee thought they could afford, is very much less than what was paid under the previous arrangement. It was not to be expected that Mr. Baridon would give his whole time as before to the interests of the Scheme. The terms of the re-engagement were therefore made to bear that, in addition to his sabbath-day labours, he should devote his attention as much as possible during the week to the work of the Mission. The offer was accepted, and your Committee have reason to believe that Mr. Baridon's faithfulness is as much as ever to be commended. His quarterly reports have given proof of his undiminished solicitude and zeal.

Mr. Baridon officiates regularly at three stations in turn. Two of these are in Moer's Parish—the one eight, the other four miles distant from his house. The congregations there "are looking well," he says in his last report, "not by the large number of attendants, but by their anxious desire to go forward in the way of the Bible's teachings." Writing of his people at the more distant station he says, "some of them have left the Romish Church not long ago. They are happy to have been brought under the peaceful influence of the Gospel's light. I have a good deal of delight with them." At the nearer station some of the people have been Protestants for many years. "They receive me,"

he says, "with great pleasure, and are able to appreciate the good office of the ministry." Besides those who are "of regular standing," there are others "who come to the meetings and can be considered friends of the gospel."

Mr. Baridon's principal station is Sciota. Here there is a chapel built expressly for the use of French Canadians. Formerly there was a Baptist missionary at this point, but during the last year he has been withdrawn, and Mr. Baridon has now the field entirely to himself. He describes his hearers as being very attentive, showing no signs of impatience even when he addresses them for an hour at a time. A sabbath-school has been organized, he reports, "under the guidance of a few American gentlemen." Alluding to the attendance on the last sabbath he was present, he says, "there were above thirty scholars and many adults." "Few of the children are able to read. Some of the families who used to belong to this station removed last year, but there are still over twenty, the members of which are more or less faithful to the Lord's gospel."

"At other points there are many Protestant families who are visited by our missionary on week days as often as possible. Though they have no regular worship they continue firm in the faith, "none of them failing to hold fast the ground of the Bible's doctrines."

In former reports allusion was made to the frequent opportunities which Mr. Baridon has, in the performance of burial services, of addressing Roman Catholics, who, on these occasions, are almost always present in large numbers. Many such opportunities occurred during the last winter, and it is hoped that the truth spoken may, with the divine blessing, be productive of some good effect. The services are generally performed in school-houses, which, writes our missionary, "are often crowded with people who in these mournful circumstances are unusually predisposed to hear what the Bible says of the final end of man."

Towards the close of his last report Mr. Baridon writes as follows:—"By looking at large through our evangelical field I see that little has been done compared with what there is to do. Of the four or five hundred families living in this part of the country, near the Provincial lines, lying under the dark atmosphere of the system of Popery, about only sixty or more, to me known, are out of it, and are walking more or less heartily under the benevolent influence of the word of God. However, if we have not harvested as we would have desired, we are nevertheless happy and grateful to the Lord of all mercy, to have enlightened to salvation a few persons during the year, who are for us like drops of fresh water, by which we can understand that God regards with favour our feeble labours in his vineyard."

The state of the Mission in the city of Montreal is now to be adverted to. In last report the engagement of Mr. Geoffroy to act as an evangelist was intimated. The labours of that missionary have been very zealous, and, your Committee believe, not without considerable success. Owing to the continued ill-health of the Rev. J. E. Tanner, his position was not so favourable as it would have been had there been some one to direct and encourage him. It is due, however, to Mr. Geoffroy that he be well spoken of for his assiduity and earnestness. He has given stated reports of his work during the year. His services have consisted chiefly of visits from house to house, distribution of the scriptures and religious tracts, and conversations with persons to whom he was directed or who called upon him of their own accord in their anxiety to know the way of salvation. A brief statement of three months' work will convey an idea of the extent and variety of his labours.

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them several times, besides all the individual members of Mr. Tanner's congregation, and distributed fourteen copies of the scriptures and 140 tracts. He also held fortnightly meetings at Côte St. Paul, in the neighbourhood of the city, where are a few Protestant families. In his monthly reports occur such passages as the following:—"A respectable young tradesman in St. Lawrence street has received the Gospel. He often goes to English churches for fear of it being known by his friends. I know several people inclined to follow the Bible, but afraid of persecution. I have had many good conversations, the result of which it is impossible to report." "Two young men have left the Church of Rome. One already gives testimony to the truth by reading and explaining it in the house where he works. He has been persecuted. The other has left Rome, but is in fear. He has doubts but is sincere." "I rejoice to report another individual who has come to the knowledge of the Gospel." This person came to our missionary, asking, "What shall we do that we may work the works of God?" His own answer was, "Pencances, confession." Mr. Geoffroy having conversed with him for a little directed him to read the tenth chapter of the Epistle to the Hebrews, where it is said that the priests present themselves every day before God sacrificing and offering several times the same sacrifices which can never take away sin. Having heard this he said, "I am done with the Romish religion."

Your Committee regret exceedingly to report that in consequence of continued ill-health the Rev. John E. Tanner has, during the past year, been almost entirely laid aside from his ministerial duties. This dispensation, which is very trying to Mr. Tanner himself, has not, however, been so adverse to the interests of his people as might have been apprehended. Divine service has been regularly performed by his friend the Rev. M. Doudiet morning and evening upon Sabbath, and a weekly prayer-meeting has also been kept up without interruption. It was, however, not to be expected that in these circumstances the congregation would increase in number. But your Committee deem it very satisfactory to report that, with the exception of a slight diminution caused by removals from the city, the strength of the congregation as regards the number of communicants and adherents, is about the same as at the date of last report, while those most interested in the welfare of the Church testify that there is a manifest improvement in respect of the Christian spirit which unites and animates them. It is now painfully necessary to state that Mr. Doudiet, who, without the expectation of pecuniary remuneration, took the place of Mr. Tanner, will be obliged very shortly to discontinue his services on account of disease in his eyes, by which his sight has become very much impaired. This untoward circumstance, together with the little apparent improvement in Mr. Tanner's health, has led your committee to the conviction that some new arrangement for the pastorate of the congregation must be made during the ensuing year, and to this they propose immediately to direct their attention and efforts.

The week-day school has been conducted during the greater part of the year by Mademoiselle Vernier, who was placed in charge of it on the resignation of M. Frereault. To the fidelity and zeal of M. Vernier your committee desire to bear a favorable testimony. The attendance of children has been very steadily maintained at between fifteen and twenty during the time she has had the superintendence of the school.

Assistance of the most valuable kind has been rendered to your committee by the Montreal Ladies' Auxiliary. This important Association, consisting of 134 members, assumed the responsibility of supporting M.

Geoffroy and M. Vernier, and what they undertook they have faithfully done. They have contributed, since the formation of the Society in March, 1864, the sum of \$350.97, in behalf of the scheme, and besides this material help have, in a variety of ways, strengthened the hands and encouraged the hearts of all directly connected with the operations of the mission.

To the Ladies of the St. Andrew's and St. Paul's Dorcas Societies your committee have been much indebted for their kind attention to the wants of the poor during the winter season.

From the Treasurer's financial statement herewith submitted it appears that the contributions to the ordinary revenue of the scheme during the year have been \$48 less than the amount received during the previous year, although from the extraordinary interest expressed at last meeting of Synod, it was very confidently hoped that the amount would have been much greater. 64 Congregations have sent \$825.18. The last report showed that 61 congregations sent \$873.77. It is apparent that in some of our churches there is a cordial interest in favour of the scheme. It is obvious, however, that without increased liberality the Mission cannot be placed on a right footing.

It is with the greatest pleasure your committee mention the collection of \$90 received from Melbourne, in proof of what may be done by even a country congregation.

Some reduction in the debt upon the Mission church in this city has been effected, and it now stands at \$400.

It is not the part of your Committee to remark on the foregoing report. They submit it as a simple narrative of facts. These facts are only *indications* of the kind of work carried on under their management. The Synod must determine how far the statements now presented warrant the belief that God's glory and the good of immortal souls are promoted by this Mission.

The whole is respectfully submitted in the name and by the appointment of the Committee.

APPENDIX F.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee on the Foreign Mission Scheme beg leave to Report :  
 That the Treasurer of the Scheme is the custodian of certain funds deposited with him by the Rev. Dr. Aiton on the condition of these monies being applied to a Mission to Palestine.  
 Shortly before the death of Dr. Aiton, an agreement was come to between the Jewish Committee of the Church of Scotland and the Rev. Dr. Aiton (as the Committee have been informed) that the monies collected by that gentleman should be applied to the support of the Mission to Beyrout, on condition of the Missionary steadily visiting Palestine.  
 The Committee of the Church of Scotland have placed a Missionary in that city, and the Committee suggest that they be authorized to communicate with that Committee, and to grant from out of the funds, as well those of Dr. Aiton, as also of those in the hands of the Treasurer and collected for a Jewish Mission, such amount per annum for a term

of years as may be agreed upon, on condition of the Missionary reporting stately to this Committee.

The Committee further state, that there is now in their custody a sum of about \$300 collected for a Mission to British Columbia, and the Committee ask that they be authorized to transmit to the Colonial Committee as well this sum, as any funds which have been received this year, and as may be received during the ensuing year. The Parent Church has now a Minister in Victoria, and the Committee think that it would only be fitting that this Church should testify their gratitude to the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland for the liberal support of Missionary efforts in Canada, by transmitting such sums as any of the churches may feel disposed to contribute, with the view of planting a branch of the Church in the Pacific Territory of British North America.

The Committee deeply regret that the contributions from the Church in aid of the efforts of the Parent Church hitherto received have been so insignificant, but they trust that a considerable sum may yet be contributed.

The state of the Fund is as it was reported last year, with the addition of an amount of annual interest and the collections already referred to.

## APPENDIX G.

### REPORT ON BURSARY SCHEME.

The Committee on the Bursary Scheme beg leave to submit to the Synod the following Report:

During the University Session 1864-65 aid was given to eight Students of Divinity, and to six Students of Arts who have the Ministry in view. To some of these it was awarded after competitive examinations, and in other cases it was granted by the Senatus, after due enquiry, to deserving Students whose circumstances rendered a little assistance necessary to their continuance at College. No Bursary, however, is granted except to Students who have passed the regular University Examination immediately preceding. At the same time any conditions accompanying particular contributions to the Fund are duly observed.

A full statement by the Treasurer of the income and expenditure of the Bursary Fund for the year ending 30th April, 1865, is appended to this Report. The whole sum received is \$700.43, including \$274.33 from the Colonial Committee and private subscriptions. The whole sum disbursed is \$606.43, leaving, after reduction of debt incurred in former years to the amount of \$129.13, a balance of \$93.40 at the debit of the Fund.

Last year collections were made by twenty-three congregations. This year there has been an increase of twelve to the list, and of \$70.38 to the amount received. Apart, however, from the grant from the Colonial Committee, the income still falls short of the expenditure required.

Your Committee again take the liberty of suggesting that an early day be fixed for the collection for the Scheme, as it is desirable that, if possible, the Bursaries be paid, in part at least, about the middle of the College Session.

Your Committee trust that the Synod will again commend this important scheme to the sympathy and support of the Church, and will renew its recommendation that, on the day appointed for the collection, special

prayer be offered up for Queen's College in all the churches, and the attention of congregations be directed to the claims of the Gospel ministry upon young men of piety and talent.

## APPENDIX H.

### REPORT ON THE INDIAN ORPHANAGE SCHEME AND JUVENILE MISSION.

During another year of activity and usefulness this humble scheme has been maintained by the children of the Church. Collected in small sums, and generally from the free-will offerings of the Sabbath scholars themselves, the revenue neither presses hardly upon the liberality of members of the Church, nor does it attract funds which would be devoted to other important objects. In this, as well as on its own merits, the Juvenile Mission has special claims on the sympathy and aid of the Church.

As shown by the annexed financial statement, the revenue for the past year has been as follows :

This sum is a noble gift from the children of the Church, but its importance cannot be estimated by the amount. At the Orphanages of Calcutta, Bombay, Madras, and Sealkote over thirty girls are annually receiving an admirable Christian education, which will fit them for teachers, and render their future lives marked exceptions to those of the long neglected and down-trodden females of India. In addition to the orphans thus being trained, a Day School is maintained in Calcutta, at which from 35 to 50 children are daily taught by an excellent Christian native and his wife. Nor are the benefits of the Scheme in India confined to those actually receiving instruction. During ten years of operation, not a few young women have been sent out as teachers and as the wives of catechists and others engaged in similar labours. From many of these the accounts occasionally received are most cheering, and their consistent Christian lives, as well as the respect in which they

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are held by their Heathen neighbours, prove that the plan pursued is eminently adapted to elevate and Christianize the female population of India.

## ORPHANAGES.

These continue to be maintained at Calcutta, Madras, Bombay, and Sealkote, by the Ladies' Association of the Church of Scotland, and are under the care of the Chaplains and Missionaries of the Church at the above places. The orphans are received at an early age, and assigned to Sabbath Schools and others who may assume their support. Between the Orphans and their supporters a most interesting connection is maintained not less profitable, it is believed, to the little Indian girl, than to her many friends in distant Canada. Letters, photographs, presents, and little specimens of work are constantly passing through the Treasurer's hands, and affording evidence that the mere contribution of money to support these orphans is but a small part of the good which is being accomplished.

## CANADIAN SCHOOL.

Last year it was necessary to appeal for increased aid, otherwise this useful School would need to be abandoned; and the Treasurer has great satisfaction in stating that a liberal response has been received. The Teacher—Boyhonto—continues to be most favourably reported of by those who have visited the school, and his letters, received from time to time, manifest deep interest in his work.

## LADIES' ASSOCIATION FOR FEMALE EDUCATION IN INDIA.

The last Annual Report of this widely extended association (a copy of which is enclosed), shows how deep an interest is taken by the Church at home in the work of educating and evangelizing the females of India. In all the principal cities and towns of Scotland branches are established, and from numerous country parishes liberal contributions are remitted. Our Canadian Orphanage scheme is regarded with much interest by this Association, and the kindest assistance is rendered in carrying out the objects of the former. To Miss Sanders, the Secretary, and to the ladies in charge of Orphanages in India, the Treasurer takes this opportunity of stating his deep obligations for never varying courtesy and attention.

## WOMEN'S UNION MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF AMERICA.

During the last two years the importance of efforts for the religious and moral improvement of the female population of Heathen countries, and especially of India, has been much felt in the States, and an interesting Society has been formed there, somewhat similar in its objects to the Ladies' Association of our own Church. The American Association is composed of members of all evangelical churches, and chiefly devotes its efforts to the sending out of ladies from the States, who labour among the females of India, and especially among those belonging to the higher classes hitherto removed from all Christian influences. By Providential

circumstances, very many of the secluded jenasas and harems of the wealthy natives are now open to the visits of such teachers, and eager desires for instruction are expressed by their neglected inmates. It has often been said that India can never be Christianized until her female population is elevated; and who can estimate the blessed effects of such labours as are now directed to this end? One of the ladies sent out by the American Society, is now in temporary charge of our Orphanage at Calcutta; and the kindest offers of co-operation and aid have been received by our Juvenile Mission from the secretary in New York.

In conclusion, the Treasurer begs most respectfully and earnestly to commend this scheme to the sympathy and aid of the Church. Through its humble instrumentality a large number of the youth of the Church are now receiving impressions which will never be effaced from their hearts, and which, under the Divine blessing, may bear abundant fruit to the glory of God and the good of our Zion. The young early learn to take an interest in the cause of missions; and those who thus join the ranks of the supporters of this scheme, will not in after years be the least active or liberal members of the Church.

The increasing labours and responsibilities of business-life, oblige the Treasurer again to ask the Synod to appoint a successor, who may have more time at his command to devote to the heavy correspondence of the Scheme.

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and in six schools the teachers give to each of their scholars the gift of a book at the close of the year. One superintendent reports that his school is closed during the winter months. Three superintendents report that formerly their schools were closed during the winter months, but that now they keep them open throughout the year. To their doing this, they attribute the most beneficial results.

As the leading features of Sabbath-school management have been touched upon in the reports submitted by the Conveners of former years, your Committee deem it unnecessary to make a longer statement on this occasion. They cannot, however, before concluding, refrain from expressing their satisfaction, that this year so many ministers and superintendents have promptly rendered them assistance by returning answers to the questions proposed; but at the same time they regret that still upwards of forty ministers have refused to comply with the instructions of the Synod, and by their refusal have rendered it impossible for your Committee to present a full report. A fact in connection with this of special importance is, that in no single case has a missionary within the bounds of the Synod attended to the circulars addressed to them by your Committee. In case this should have arisen from their having no Sabbath-schools of which to report, your Committee would suggest to Presbyteries that, as from Sabbath-schools as a nucleus most of our churches have sprung, it would be of advantage to the Church were they to enjoin that in every case in which it was practicable, Sabbath-schools be established by the missionaries under their jurisdiction; and further, that they should impress upon such missionaries the propriety of their attending to the Synod's injunction in regard to their sending in to the accredited Committees such information as they may deem it for the Church's benefit to ask from them.

NOTES FROM THE RETURNS.

1. In this Sabbath-school five dollars were collected for missionary purposes.
2. Twenty-one dollars were collected for the support of an orphan in India.
3. The superintendent of this school observes that not only has the conduct of the young people attending the school been improved, but that there has been also a marked change for the better upon many of the parents.
4. In connection with this Sabbath-school there is a Bible class numbering twelve, conducted by the minister.
7. Prizes are given to the scholars in this Sabbath-school for accuracy in repeating the shorter catechism.
8. Prizes are given for general proficiency. In this school twenty-four dollars have been collected for the support of an orphan in India.
9. The senior scholars are occasionally required to give in to their teacher a short sketch, written in their own words, of the life of some prominent character mentioned in Scripture. The author of the best production receives a small book from the teacher.
10. Ten dollars have been contributed by this school towards the support of an orphan in India.
11. In this school a Juvenile Mission is conducted by the children. The sums collected are as follows: ten dollars for Clifton class, Calcutta—six dollars for Bursary scheme, Queen's College—six dollars for tracts

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—twelve dollars for children's paper. In addition to raising these sums, the children distribute over two thousand tracts in the year.

13. The small average attendance as returned for this school is owing to a disease having broken out among the children, of a nature which caused even the day common school to be closed for a time.

14. A present of a book is given to each scholar at the beginning of the year. The school supports an orphan in Madras.

22. This school supports two orphans in India.

25-28. These schools are in connection with St. Andrew's Church, Kingston. School 25 supports an orphan in India, and has supported one for the last nine years. In it prizes are given for perfect repetition of the shorter catechism. The superintendent examines the children at the close of the exercises each Sabbath. The first Sabbath of the month is specially devoted to the conveying of missionary intelligence. In the summer the children have a pic-nic—in the winter a social meeting. 26 is superintended in the winter months by a divinity student from Queen's College, and in the summer by a member of St. Andrew's congregation. 27 is a Union Sabbath-school. The children in it belonging to St. Andrew's Church only are returned. 28 supports two orphans in India. In this school the first Sabbath of each month is devoted to the subject of missions. Teachers' meetings are occasionally held for prayer, and for the concerting of plans as to the best method of conducting that school. A visitor is appointed monthly whose duty it is to visit absentee scholars, and report to the superintendent.

29. Tracts are distributed among the scholars in this school every month, and a book is given to each of them in October. The school is then closed for five or six months.

34. The superintendent of this school suggests that it would be of great advantage to have a central depot from which good cheap publications could be conveniently procured, and also to have an affiliated society in connection with the Sunday-school Union, Old Bailey, London, England.

35. About eighty of the scholars returned as attending this school also attend a singing and bible class conducted on Wednesday evening by the minister.

36. After a certain number of tickets has been received by a pupil as evidence of good conduct and correct recitation of lessons, small reward books are given to such pupil. Nothing has as yet been done by this school for missions, on account of expenses incurred in the establishing and enlarging of a library.

39. This school supports an orphan in India. The minister attends whenever it is possible, and examines the children on the lesson.

40. Prizes are given for regular attendance, diligence, and good conduct. Twenty dollars have been raised yearly for the last five years for the support of an orphan.

42. A monthly concert is held for the recitation of the shorter catechism, singing of hymns, &c. Twenty dollars were last year collected for missionary purposes.

45. The system of giving each class its own missionary box, and of telling the sum found in it at the end of the quarter, has been found to be advantageous. Sixty dollars were contributed last year by this school for missionary purposes.

46. The contribution of this school in behalf of missions amounted last year to sixty-four dollars.

47. Thirty-five dollars were last year voted by this school for the promotion of various missions.

49. This is a Union School. The children returned as attending it, belong to the congregation of the Rev. J. H. Mackerras.

50. A book is given to each scholar on the first Sabbath of the year. The school supports an orphan in India.

51. Two Bible classes in connection with St. Andrew's congregation, Ottawa.

56. There are several Union Sabbath-schools, at which children connected with the Pakenham congregation attend. The exact number of the children is not stated in the return.

57. The children of this Sabbath-school contributed for the support of an orphan in Madras, and for other missionary purposes, the sum of thirty-one dollars.

58. The superintendent of this school finds much advantage attending the weekly registration of the names of those pupils who repeat the whole lessons, including the proofs in the catechism, with perfect correctness, and their revising, on the first Sabbath of each month, the lessons of the previous month. A short address of a missionary character is given on the first Sabbath of each month, and a collection taken up.

60-61. These schools are both in the country, and are kept open during the entire year. The superintendent is convinced that the practice of closing Sabbath-schools during the winter months (a practice which, he observes, is very prevalent among country congregations) is most detrimental to their interests and progress.

62-63. Eight dollars were raised for missionary purposes in these schools during the last summer.

63-64. Prizes are given to the children for punctual attendance and careful preparation of the lessons prescribed; also for bringing others to the school, under some prudent restrictions. One or two judiciously selected anecdotes are read each Sabbath, and such instructions given during the week in vocal music as to fit the scholars for singing the Sabbath-school Hymns. The superintendent accounts for the smallness of the attendance at these schools on the ground of the congregation with which they are in connection having been only very recently organized; but he expects soon to have a large attendance, as there are many in the town and surrounding country for whom no one is caring.

65-66-67. These schools assist in the support of a class in India, and contribute to the French Mission, &c. The attendance at one of them has been more than doubled during the past six years.

75. This school contributes annually twenty-five dollars to the Juvenile Indian Mission.

76. Prizes are occasionally given in this school for recitations in subjects prescribed for the purpose. An entertainment for the scholars once a year—the occasional distribution of gift books (not prizes) to classes by the teachers, or to the whole school by the superintendent—but especially the careful visitation of the pupils, when absent from school, by their teachers, have largely tended to promote the success of the school.

79-80. After the school is opened with prayer, two questions of the Assembly's Catechism are repeated and explained. A chapter from the gospels—selected so as to give a consecutive view of the events in the life of our Lord—is then read. The personal superintendence of the clergyman is considered essential to the progress of the school.

## APPENDIX J.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON A HYMN BOOK.

Your Committee beg to report, that the important matter entrusted to them has been under careful consideration, and that satisfactory progress has been made.

It will be remembered that the conclusion to which the Synod came at its last meeting, by the hearty and unanimous adoption of the Committee's report, was, that there was no occasion in the whole circumstances of the Church for hurrying the preparation of a Hymn Book; but that the time had come to take the matter into intelligent consideration, and carefully to mature such a collection of Hymns as might

supply the want felt by so many, and render fuller and more complete the Psalmody of the Church,—a work in which, it need hardly be said, we have been anticipated by almost every section of the Christian Church, without exception of creed or form of worship.

Your Committee had published, during the previous year, a small volume of Hymns, with a view to afford ministers and others in the Church the opportunity of exercising their judgment upon the Hymns which stood highest in general estimation, believing that a publication of this kind would create a more general interest and enquiry than could possibly have been accomplished in a private way, by the labours of a Committee, however active and zealous. Your Committee have reason to believe that, in taking this step, they acted judiciously, and that the subject has been under the consideration of many in the Church.

At the last Synod the Committee was increased to sixteen members. The attention of this large Committee has been drawn, during the recess, to two points: first, to the Hymns in the published volume, with a view to exclude any that might be considered inferior or unsuitable; and second, to the selection of such Hymns as might with advantage be added to the collection. Several members of the Committee have given themselves heartily to the work, and it is hoped that a careful judgment will be obtained from all of them in the ensuing year, for the advantage, as well as safety and confidence, which attends united opinion.

It is probable that, from various reasons, a number of the published hymns will be laid aside, and a few others will be added to the collection. Copies of some excellent Hymns have been going the round of the Committee for the last three months—rather a formidable and difficult journey, scattered as the members of the Committee are from Chatham in the West to Quebec. The Convener has not the slightest idea, as this report is being drawn up, where they are, but he lives in the hope that they will find their way home again in the course of the coming year, with great benefit from their travels. The opinion of all members of the Committee is solicited on each Hymn, the Convener pointing out its general character and reputation.

It is very difficult to form a collection of Hymns of sufficient copiousness to answer the purpose, and fairly to represent the Hymnology of the Church, without swelling the collection to undue bounds. It is easy to make a small collection, for we then take the few best, about which there can scarcely be a difference of opinion. It is as easy, by gathering the necessary materials, to form a large collection. Both in Great Britain and in the United States, there are collections numbering from one to two thousand. A latitude of this kind is entirely foreign to our ideas; while, on the other hand, too narrow a limit would deprive the work of the comfort and completeness which are sought by adding to our Psalmody. When it is required to pass over a number of good Hymns, there is great difficulty in making a selection.

Your Committee hope in the course of another year, with due care and attention, to arrive at a harmonious and safe judgment with regard to the Hymns which may be advantageously employed by us, and crave that time for the further consideration of the matter.

In furtherance of the object, the Convener sent a series of papers on Hymnology to the *Presbyterian*, that through its pages the Church might know both the character of the hymns in the published collection and the spirit which has ruled in its formation. From these articles it will have been seen that the Hymns given are a limited and select number of the best productions of the first hymn writers, and that inferior authors have been passed over. A good Hymn will occasionally be found proceeding from a common-place pen; but it is better as a rule

to abide by those writers who have fairly established their reputation for superiority.

Your Committee would strongly recommend to the Synod, that the remainder of the published edition be put into immediate circulation, which may be done with a very little effort and interest. The price at which the volume has been hitherto offered is rather high. The Committee would suggest that it be reduced from 40 to 30 cents in the present binding, and that a number of copies be bound in a cheaper form, at a cost say of 20 cents, for circulation in the Sabbath School. A few dollars subscribed by the Session, or by persons interested in the School, would place in the hands of the older scholars a book of sacred song which maintains the highest standard of devotional thought, a thing which cannot be said of many works which are now finding their way from across the border into our Schools—both words and music being frequently a gross outrage on the propriety we wish to maintain in our religious exercises. It is not intended that the collection should be a Hymn Book for the Sabbath School, but merely that it should have a place there with other works, while the subject is under the consideration of the Synod and the Church. Our children will thus have the opportunity of committing to memory some of the most valuable Hymns. Should this circulation of the Hymn Book in the Sabbath School take place, it will greatly assist the Committee in their object.

Your Committee venture to allude, before closing their report, to rather a delicate subject: the opposition which a Hymn Book is sure to encounter from many. There never, probably, was a change effected of the most beneficial kind, which had not to proceed against the current of a strong attachment to the existing mode. The opposition is quite natural—no wise man will make light of it, or, on the other hand, attach too much importance to it. It is obvious that until we reach the state of perfection, changes will require to be made; and therefore, the question with rational people comes to be: Is the change called for?—is it a change for the better?—is it supported by good reason and argument? There are persons fond of novelty, who think changes are lightsome and agreeable; and there is, undoubtedly, a tendency of this kind at the present time. Your Committee are not of this mind. They think changes should seldom be resorted to in matters of religion: for the power of a religious form is greatly increased by the affection that grows up with custom and experience. They have no hesitation, however, in saying that there is strong and irresistible argument for the extension of our Psalmody. They would cite only one reason, which, in their opinion, is quite enough to settle the matter. The Psalms of David do not, cannot, in the circumstances, present the Gospel—the “good tidings of great joy,” which it is our privilege in the second dispensation to hear, with the same clearness and fulness as the Gospel narrative and the teaching of the Apostles. Gratitude to God, which gives rise to sacred song, is due chiefly for the great offering of the Cross, and the presence and gifts of the Holy Spirit; and the events which we love most to celebrate are those which culminated at the Crucifixion, the birth, life and death of our Saviour, his resurrection, and ascension to Heaven. Our whole life as believers, our views, our feelings, whatever gives rise to expression, are founded mainly on these events. Why employ exclusively, to express our Christian sentiments, the language of a dispensation that was confessedly imperfect, in which the grace and truth of God were not fully revealed? Had David written in the time of the Apostle Paul instead of when he did, his songs for the Church of God would have been very different. The first and last topic would have been the redemption of the Cross with the infinite love of the Redeemer; not indirectly and vaguely shadowed forth as in the

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revelations of prophecy, but in strains like that of the Apocalypse, "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain." This is the great argument for the enlargement of our Psalmody. The General Assembly has honoured it already by adding the Paraphrases. There are some more additions needed to give completeness and to take full advantage of the resources of the Church. Let these be made with extreme care, so that everything inferior and unworthy of the service of God may be avoided.

There is no wish to interfere with the comfort of persons who prefer the exclusive use of the Psalms; but they, on the other hand, should not lay down the law for others. Let us not deprive the pious of the expression they love and need, and in which they have found comfort and benefit. Let us increase the means of usefulness. While we continue our use of David's Psalms, and love and admire them as they deserve, let us rejoice to add to our worship such Hymns as Toplady's "Rock of Ages," Watts' "When I survey the wondrous Cross," and Charles Wesley's "Jesus, lover of my soul!" Hymns of this description have a sacred mission to perform, and will raise the enthusiasm of God's people in the worship of their Lord and King.

Your Committee trust that this question of a Hymn Book will not be classed by any with the so-called innovations, which are now occasioning so much excitement throughout the Church. It is a matter of primary importance, and could only have been made of secondary, by a misapprehension of its nature and place in the service of God. The subject deserves the best attention of an Ecclesiastical Court. We are trying very late in the day to provide what is a real necessity in the Church of the Redeemer—songs of the Gospel time. We are carrying out the purpose of our fathers—as we trust our children shall do after us—gathering into the treasury of the Church, for the use of its members, the best and noblest of the songs of God's people, as they make their appearance from age to age.

Your Committee beg to thank the Synod for the favorable consideration it has given to this important subject, and confidently leave the matter in its hands.

## APPENDIX K.

*To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY :

We, the Ministers and Ruling Elders of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, now in Synod assembled, embrace this opportunity of renewing the expression of our sincere attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government.

The Church of Scotland has ever been distinguished for its loyalty to the British Crown and its firm attachment to the British Constitution; and the branch of the Church in this Colony will, we doubt not, ever continue to be characterized by the same principles.

We cannot but rejoice that, during the unhappy war which has been carried on for some years between the sections of the neighbouring Republic, and amid the complications which in the close connections existing between nations must almost unavoidably arise, peace has been preserved, through the blessing of God and the wise counsels of your Majesty's Government; and it shall ever be our earnest prayer that this peace may continue. Still, we heartily concur in those measures of protection which your Majesty's Government sees fit to take in co-operation with the Government of this Province.

The confederation of the British American Provinces, should it be accomplished, will, we trust, have the effect of deepening the attachment to the British Throne, and of affording the means of developing the resources of these Provinces.

That God may bless your Majesty and the Royal Family will ever be our earnest prayer.

*To His Excellency the Right Hon. Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, Governor-General of British North America, &c., &c., &c.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

We, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, embrace the opportunity afforded by the Annual Meeting of our Supreme Ecclesiastical Court of renewing the expression of our devoted loyalty to our most Gracious and Beloved Sovereign, our attachment to the British Constitution, and our dutiful respect for your Excellency as the Queen's Representative in this land.

We are thankful to Almighty God for the preservation of peace and the measure of prosperity vouchsafed to the inhabitants of this Province during the past year; and, while gladly accepting the termination of the fearful war to which the neighbouring Republic has been subjected as a hopeful sign of the removal of danger, we see reason to believe that in the vigilance and wisdom characterizing the measures recently adopted by your Excellency's Government, we have an indication that nothing will be wanting on your part, or on the part of your advisers, to secure the permanent enjoyment of all the privileges possessed by us in common with our fellow-countrymen, and at the same time to maintain a friendly intercourse with the people of the United States.

We assure your Excellency that, in whatever pertains to the welfare of the country in which Providence has made it our lot to live and labour, we take a deep and continual interest, and that as a means of glorifying Him whom we serve as the Governor of the Universe and the Redeemer of men, it will ever give us very great satisfaction to contribute by our humble endeavours to the propagation of those principles, which are most likely to promote the cause of order, enlightenment, consolidation and progress.

As might be expected from our position and office, we are particularly concerned with the subject of the Higher Education; and it may afford your Excellency some satisfaction to hear that, by Queen's College at Kingston, we continue to furnish facilities for instruction in the higher branches of learning.

That the Giver of all Good may constantly bestow every blessing upon yourself, Lady Monck, and the other members of your family, and render your administration eminently beneficial to all classes in the Province, is the earnest prayer of your Excellency's dutiful servants.
